### Lamar Chapel of Our Lady Star of the Sea One Of Oldest Buildings

The Chapel of Our Lady Star of the Sea at Lamar is one of the oldest buildings in the area that is still in use, and it has served as a spiritual home for the Catholic people of the vicinity for many

The first portion of the Chapel was completed in 1858. The land on which it stands was obtained by the missionaries in 1854.

The foundation and walls of the original building were constructed entirely of concrete obtained from shell in the bay, near where the chapel now stands.

The steeple on this original building was damaged in the 1919 hurricane and was never replaced as it had been, although the chapel 1931.

## **Rockport School** Of Fine Arts Has **Large Class**

The Rockport School of Fine Arts opened this past week with a class of 32 pupils, who turned out 320 paintings of the area during the first week they were

Simon Michael, head of the school, says this is one of the largest classes he has had, and that the students came from all over the country to attend.

The school has grown steadily since its inception in 1948, when Michael, on a visit, was impressed with the wonderfully varied opportunities for portrait, landscape, marine and still life painting in

The first year classes were held, sixty students attended classes in June, July and August, and the number has increased steadily since that time. In 1954 over 125 attended, coming from points as of a cyclone fence around the far apart as West Virginia, Michigan, and El Paso.

In 1952, with the aid and encouragement of Emory M. Spencer, Michael acquired the present beautiful grounds and erected his home and studio, designed by Spencer, under the great live oaks Bad Brush Fire which, through the seasons, are filled with all the birds that inhabit the locality.

Most of this work is well underway. Lockwood and Andrews have already prepared a number of preliminary plans to determine how toutilize the area available to the best advantage. Land titles are being searched, and negotiations are under way to acquire the actual land needed for the harbor, without which all the other work

would be useless. In addition, the District has planned, and now has almost completed, a brochure for presentation of pertinent facts about the area, to firms that may be interested, and to others which the District is: trying to interest, in settling in this area, and using the facilities that the Cove will provide.

The brochure offers an over-all explanation of what the District has in mind, supplementing this with full facts about the Cove, its location, transportation facilities, and so on.

In the center of the folder is a section pointing up the area's natural advantages, giving reasons why the Cove is the logical place for industry to settle. This will be aided by maps outling the situation.

The sixth page will give a forecast of the type of expansion that can be expected in Aransas County, and the necessary charts and statistics will amplify this material.

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

Landings were very light and catches per vessel were extremely poor, according to a brief report of a trip to that area by the Service's San Pedro (Calif.), local representative. Out of 8 established shrimp packing and freezing plants, only 2 were operating part time. The average catch of the shrimp draggers per trip of about 17 days, ranged between 2,000 to 3,000 pounds. Guaymas ex-vessel prices for heads-off shrimp averaged about 33 cents per pound for white, and much less for the more prevalent brown shrimp.

Traffic accidents in the Corpus Christi District of the Texas Highway Patrol in May took 11 lives in 9 fatal accidents that occurred in 6 of the 16 counties as the numand only one motor vehicle continued to increase.

Five of the 11 deaths in May occurred in Nueces County in 3 in which there were no deaths in the county. Two deaths occurred from 2 fatal accidents in Victoria County and there was one death each in Calhoun, Dewitt, Goliad and San Patricio counties.

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

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## A well-known radio commentator

opens all of his news broadcasts with, "How's the weather"? The catch phrase indicates what subject is most important to residents of the states bordering the Gulf of Mexico. Advance weather information is often a matter of life or death to those who put out to sea in fishing vessels, charter boats, and even deep-sea tugs. This is especially true of the threat of sudden storms coming from the empty wastes of the central and western Gulf, where they gather

force and violence undetected. Last year no major hurricanes hit the Gulf Coast; nevertheless, the losses to fisheries and other industries from storm damage alone ran over five million dollars. Adequate warning might have cut this figure by several million. Weather experts have been pleading for the only possible means of bettering weather observation in the Gulf of Mexico—the immediate establishment of a Weather Ship in the area where most of this destructive weather spawns.

The battle for a Gulf Weather Ship was begun in Congress last year by Congressman T. A.



The barracuda of our coast probaly is more dangerous to man an most sharks. Occasionally en at Galveston and Aransas s, it is common about Port abel and farther south, often reaching a length of six or eight feet and a weight of over 100

Resembling a fresh water pike to the casual glance, this fish generally is found in the neighborhood of coral reefs or similar formations, where it lies, undisputed lord of the realm, feared and avoided because of its immense, tiger-like teeth, its flashing speed and its surly and vicious disposition. Its food consists almost entirely of fishes, and large barracudas, according to Norman, have the interesting, if somewhat unpleasant habit, when gorged, of herding a shoal of fishes into shalw water and there keeping guard over them till they are ready for another meal.

This fish is most inquisitive and will investigate any unusual thing that comes within reach of its senses. This curiosity, backed by its fearlessness, make it extremely dangerous to man, as it does not hesitate, when its attention is attracted, to deliver a ferocious, slashing attack on anything that it may consider eatable. 




