Oregon To Make **Another Tuna Trip**

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service M/V Oregon is scheduled August 9 to carry out three weeks of commercial scale long-line fishcentral Gulf of Mexico. It is planned to make from 15 to 18 100 basket (1000 hook) sets throughout this area to obtain a more accurate estimate of possible commercial production of deep swimming yellowfin tuna in the Gulf of Mexico.

In cooperation with the marlin reasearch program of the Woods Hole Oceanographic Institute all marlin landed in good condition will be tagged and relseased.

Shrimp Trawl Law To Be Enforced

The shrimp trawl law as passed by the 47th Legislature amended by the 50th Legislature will be enforced during the closed seasons a Game and Fish Commission spokesman said today. The law provides that trawls shall not be greater than ten (10) feet at the mouth as measured along the webbing attached to the cork line, or twenty-five (25) feet in length. Further, the law provides that boards used to spread the trawl open shall be of no greater dimensions than twelve (12) inches

by eighteen (18) inches. The use of trawls or boards of greater dimensions than provided by the Legislature constitutes a violation of the law the spokesman said.

One negative report concerns wild turkey which seem to have had another poor production season after promising spring prospects. Nevertheless, good hatches of young turkeys have been reported for some sections.

Of course, no one can tell just what will happen before the harvest season begins in the fall, but present indicatons point to a pretty good overall hunt.

Fresh Water Eel Most Amazing Fish

Occasionally, fresh water eels are caught in the Yacht Basin. The fisherman who has accidently hooked one, pulled it into his boat, and then felt like jumping out leaving the long, slithering, and winding fish in complete charge of the situation may not consider eels particularly interesting. Actually, they are a most amazing

The flesh of eels is considered a delicacy by many. Eels are found in the Mississippi Valley and to the Atlantic Coast, but not along the Pacific coast. They are also found along the West Coast of Europe. Not only are they powerful swimmers, but are also able to wriggle short distances across land, sometimes being found in damp lowlands in search of frogs, crayfish, and other foods.

In the past the eel was truly a fish of mystery, since no one knew what its young looked like, or at least thought he didn't. However, in the middle of the Atlantic Ocean biologists had from time to to time caught a strange little ribbon or leaf like organism, perfectly transparent and having colorless blood. Some called it a "glassfish". Finally a Danish oceanographer discovered that eels migrated to the Sargasso Sea and it was then learned for the first time that these "glassfish" were young eels.

Quite apart from their nuisance value (which is terrific), redbugs are not too desirable citizens for, tiny as they are, some of them pack a terrific wallop, especially in the Far East, where they are carriers of scrub typhus.

This was a matter of extreme concern during the war in the Pacific, where the disease, also known as Japanese River Fever, was very prevalent. So serious did the problem become that a lot of research was done on redbugs.

One result was the discovery of a chigger annihilator with the jawbreaking name of dimethyl phthalate. It slaughters 'em.

Just hie yourself down to the drugstore and buy yourself a little. Then draw the mouth of the bottle around the top of your boots and socks, and the edges of all the openings in your clohing, so that the redbugs have to cross a treated band to reach the restaurant.

It generally lays 'em in the aisle for keeps.

If you can't pronounce dimethyl phthalate, ask for benzyl benzoate, which works also.

If you can't pronounce either one, buy a nickle's worth of sulphur. Used freely it will keep red bugs at a distance—and maybe your friends as well.





ern end, wih a heavy increase of trucks using the highway. As a result, the pavement became brok-

en and riddled with potholes in only a matter of months. STATE DRAFT CALL NEEDS 536 MEN

A state draft call for 536 men for September was announced Thursday by Brigadier General Paul L. Wakefield, state Selective Service director.

The quota, the state's share of a national call for 10,000 men, is 14 less than the August quota. The July call is identical with the August quota. Calls have ranged between 500 and 550 a month during most of 1955.

Local board quotas for the September induction into the Army will be mailed from state Selective Service headquarters during the first week in August.

There will be no physical-mental examinations of men for military service through the draft boards in September, except in isolated cases, General Wakefield said.

With the exception of volunteers and possible delinquents, the Auguse induction call will be filled only with men who on September 1 are 21 years of age or older, he said. He said such direction of induc-

tion of older groups was under authority of the national director of Selective Service and such instructions were received with the state call.



To anyone with half an eye for beauty, there are few animals that are more grotesque.

These clumsy seadwellers might also be called cattle of the sea, because they live on grass instead of eating fish, and rove in herds throughout the warm shallow waters of tropical America.

They have even been in Texas at various times, and, not too long ago, the writer picked up a fragment of solid ivory-like rib that once belonged to a manatee, on a spoil bank thrown up from the Intra-coastal Canal, near Corpus Christi. Moreover, some fifteen years ago, fishermen found the remains of one on the shores of Copano Bay, near Bayside. It was

a male, nearly eleven feet long. Others used to inhabit the lower Port Isabel, though none have been seen there for many years.

By nature, they are herbivorous, preferring shallow bays where they can feed on aquatic vegetation, or lie stationary on the bottom while resting, coming to the surface Ballou. occasionally for air. In deeper water, they float with the back arched, their upper parts close to the surface, the head, tail and flippers hanging downwards.

Their bodies are almost without hair, except for a few coarse whiskers. They are slow, harmless, and swim with the help of a pair of flippers that they can move in any direction.

In the old days, especially in Florida, where they were once plentiful, Indians harpooned them or caught them in huge nets, killing them by driving a wooden plug into their nostrils.

Manatees are almost the only animals that have a solid skeleton. There is no marrow in their bones, which are as heavy and fine-grained as an elephant's tusks. As the beasts feed while submerged, it is believed that this structure serves them as do the stabilization tanks the Persian Gulf. of a submarine. The weight permits the animals to sink in the water while carrying a large load of air, and enables them to stay under for longer periods.
