## District Engineer to Speak At Opening Of New Fulton Harbor, September 11

Colonel Willard T. McCrone, Corps of Engineers, U. S. Army, in charge of the Galveston District will be the principal speaker at the opening of Aransas County's new harbor at Fulton, two miles north of Rockport, on September 11.

Colonel McCrone's speech will highlight the day's activities which will include formal opening of the harbor, a fish fry, and the annual party given by the Rockport Sportsmen's Conservation Association for sports writers in the state.

The new harbor will provide accommodations for 130 boats of all classes from outboards to the big shrimpers, and is the fruition of many years' planning.

Combined with the famous Rockport Yacht Basin, more familiarly known as the Fish Bowl, it will give Aransas County two fine harbors, located in the midst of some of the best hunting and fishing territory in the state, and will provide excellent facilities for sportsmen as well as commercial vessels.

Hosts for the occasion will be the board of Aransas County Navigation District No. 1 and the Rockport Chamber of Commerce. Festivities will start with a fish fry, sponsored by the Fulton Lions Club, between 12 and 2:30 p.m.

At 2:30 p.m., the harbor will be formally opened, by clipping a ribbon stretched across its mouth.

Colonel McCrone will be the speaker at this time. Between 3:00 and 5:00 p.m., visiting dignitaries and guests of the two organizations will be entertained with a boat trip. At 6:30, a reception will be given for them at the Live Oak Country Club by business men of Rockport and Fulton.

The \$200,000 Fulton project—which included construction of a bathing beach as well as a harbor—is part of a long-range program instituted by the Navigation District to provide adequate recreational and industrial facilities for the area.

Next step in the plan will be the development of an industrial har-

bor at the Cove, two miles south of Rockport, one of the few spots along the coast where rail and highway transportation are readily available.

This harbor will be situated on the proposed Intracoastal Canal cut-off, between Rockport and Aransas Pass.

The fourth and final step will be development of Frandolig Island and Little Bay, between Rockport and Fulton, as a recreational area, with storm harbor facilities.

## High School Registration To Be Held August 23-26 Inclusive, School Starts September 6, Says Dave Coleman

High school registration will be from August 23 to 26, inclusive, and school will start on September 6, according to Dave Coleman, principal of Aransas County High School. The schedule for registration is as follows: Tuesday morning, August 23, senior students with last names

beginning with the letters A through M will register.

Tuesday afternoon, seniors with names beginning with the letters N through Z will be registered.

Wednesday morning, August 24, juniors with names beginning A through L will have their turn.

Wednesday afternoon is allotted to students with names beginning M through Z.

Thursday morning, August 25, sophomores with names beginning A through J will register.

Thursday afternoon, those sophomores with names beginning K through Z will be due.

Friday morning, August 26, freshmen with names beginning with the initials A through M will register.

Friday afternoon, freshmen with names beginning with N through Z will be registered.

For those who registered last spring, this is merely a confirmation of their choice of subjects.

Any new students in the District will report at the times announced.

Dave Coleman, high school principal, will be assisted in registering the students by Mrs. Richard Taylor, guidance director for the district.

All elementary and Junior High students will report for the first time on Tuesday, September 6, at their respective schools.

Parents of all students entering the first grade must bring their birth certificates, showing they will be six years of age before September 1.

School buses will run September 6, and school will be in session on that day.

## School Board Okays Budget For 1955-56

The Aransas County Independent School District Board at its regular meeting, compiled the following proposed budget for the school year of 1955-56:

Administrative expense, including salaries, supplies and incidental expenses, \$25,106.74. Salaries for teachers: \$198,636.24.

Other school expenses, including transportation and food services, \$16,369.00.

Operation of plant: \$20,350.00. Maintenance, \$18,100.21; fixed charges and interest on loans, \$2,740.

Total of these current expenses amounts to \$281,302.19.

Capital outlay for new buildings, additions to buildings and needed furniture and equipment will amount to \$48,640.30.

Debt service, including redemption of the last of the serial bonds issued for construction of the present high school, \$35,593.31.

This brings total disbursements for the year to \$365,536.00.

To defray this expense, the School District will receive a state per capita allowance of \$83,141.00; \$12,046.00 will be received from foundation funds; the county available fund will produce \$349.00; and local maintenance taxes will amount to \$270,000.00.

A detailed breakdown of these costs and receipts is shown elsewhere in this issue.

## Navigation Board Meets, Discusses Lighting Harbor

The Aransas County Navigation Board, at a meeting Tuesday night discussed the problem of lighting the new basin at Fulton, and the board's attorney, Ellis L. Clark, was instructed to prepare the necessary application forms to Central Power and Light Company. Ten lights of the type being used in the new street light installation at Rockport will be used to light the basin, giving illumination equivalent to 60 of the old type now used along Austin street, at a saving of nearly \$50 a month over what the sixty would cost.

The board also discussed tax problems with Sheriff A. C. Shivers, County Tax Assessor and Collector.

Commissioner T. D. Picton reported on the cost of the well necessary to insure adequate water for the new basin, and was authorized to proceed with the drilling of this well.

Acquisition of land in the Cove area was discussed, and the board's attorney, Ellis Clark, was authorized to take the necessary steps to obtain the area necessary.

Some current bills were approved for payment, and then the board devoted the rest of the meeting to drawing a tentative set of regulations for operation of the harbors under its control.

At the regular board of directors meeting of the United Fund of Aransas County the charter was received and the constitution and by-laws accepted.

The board announced its readiness to send communications to the various organizations that were planning to come into the group and asking them to submit their budget for 1956.

At the next meeting of the board, chairmen for the participating organizations will be named to take care of the drive scheduled to take place in November.

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### THE BABY SITTER AND FIRE PREVENTION

In practically every home where there is a baby or growing youngsters, the baby sitter is used on occasion. Many parents regularly leave their most precious possession—their children—for hours at a time with some enterprising teenager, yet in all too many cases very little consideration is given to possible circumstances which could arise during this fill-in period which typifies the modern American way of life.

Every baby sitter should be given simple, definite instructions so as to know how and when to act in an emergency—in the interests of personal safety as well as for the children.

Briefly, the most important considerations include:

1. Giving constant care—never leaving children unattended;
2. Getting the children out of the house;
3. Calling the fire department.

In many cases the baby sitter is called into a strange house; should be briefed on the location of the back stairs, the back exit, arrangement of the house, the most direct way out, the location of the telephone and vital telephone numbers, such as the Fire and Police Department and the family doctor.

It is imperative that no delay be allowed in removing the children in case of a gas leak or the failure of an automatic heating device, using the neighbor's phone, if necessary, to report the condition. In severe cold weather, small children can be wrapped in blankets rather than waiting to dress them.

If smoke is detected in some part of the house, it is a good policy to get the children near the door for immediate removal if necessary.

Parents can do much to reduce the increasing toll of deaths and injuries to pre-school children as a result of playing with matches and fire. Practical education should begin as early as possible.

Teach children and they will prevent fires!

**Mrs. Mary Borglum, Sculptor's Widow, Dies**

Mrs. Mary Margaret Borglum, 80, widow of Gutzon Borglum, Mount Rushmore Memorial sculptor, died Wednesday in Corpus Christi where she was visiting friends.

Mrs. Borglum had lived in Beeville since 1954, having moved there from Mexico City and has been a frequent visitor to the Rockport School of Fine Arts. She was born in Marasch, Turkey, where her father, Dr. George Montgomery of Vermont, was U. S. Consul and a congregational missionary.

Mrs. Borglum's husband, regarded by many as the greatest sculptor in American history, was most noted for the carving of 60-foot statues of Presidents Washington, Lincoln, Jefferson and Theodore Roosevelt on the face of Mount Rushmore in the Black Hills of South Dakota.

Borglum died in 1941 before the work was completed. His son, Lincoln, a Beeville resident, finished it.

Mrs. Borglum was a graduate of Wellesley College at Boston, Mass., and held a post-graduate degree from Berlin, Germany. She was considered an authority on foreign languages.

Mrs. Borglum was the author of "Give The Man Room," a biography of her husband. She also wrote "Tales in an Arabian Garden."

She owned a publishing company in New York before her marriage and was a social worker in the slums of New York City. She was a member of the Episcopal Church.

She is survived by one son, Lincoln of Beeville; one daughter, Mrs. David Vhay of Reno, Nev.; one brother, Dr. Marshall Montgomery of Franklin, N. H. and four grandchildren.

Funeral services were held Wednesday at St. Phillip Episcopal Church in Beeville with the Rev. John Worrell, pastor, officiating. Burial will be in the Hall of Fame section of Forest Lawn Mausoleum at Glendale, Calif. Only two other persons are buried in the Hall of Fame section other than her husband.

Mrs. Borglum had planned to build a home in Rockport, and to bring with her many of the artistic treasures left by her great husband.

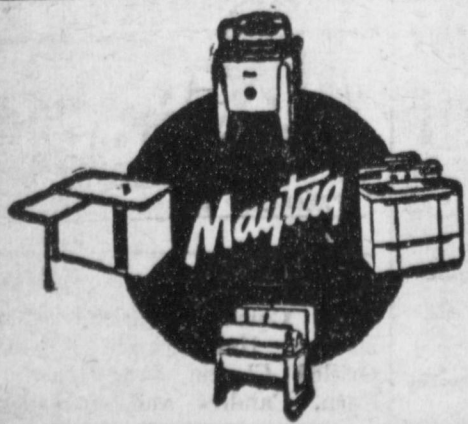

**SOCIAL SECURITY HAS A BIRTHDAY**

Twenty years ago, on August 4, 1935, to be exact, the Social Security Act became law, according to H. M. Cleveland, Corpus Christi District Manager of the Social Security Administration.

Most people refer to old-age and survivors insurance under the Social Security Act as "Social Security," he said. In commemorating the 20th Anniversary of the signing of this law, Cleveland told how it affects the lives of almost all of us. His statement shows that almost 8 million persons are now receiving more than 400 million dollars every month in benefits under the retirement and family insurance provision of the law. Over 70 million people are now insured so that in the event of retirement or death, they or their families will be eligible to receive the benefits.

The average retired worker is now receiving about \$60 a month. However, the average for those who have retired in the past year or so is now nearly \$80 a month, and their wives' benefits average about \$41 a month.

Cleveland stated that an important part of the old-age and survivors insurance program is the protection given to widows and children in the event of a worker's death. Today, the average benefit for a young widow with two minor children is \$185 a month. Total family benefits can be as much as \$200 or as little as \$30 a month. In addition, single lump-sum death payments ranging from \$90 to \$255, are payable when a worker dies.

A new booklet which explains this Federal family insurance has just been received from the Government Printing Office, and Cleveland says that his office will be pleased to mail a copy to anyone who requests it. The address is the Social Security Administration, 424 Taylor Street, Corpus Christi, Texas.

**You Take Your Choice When You Fish At Rockport**

Rockport offers some of the handiest, as well as the most varied and interesting fishing in the United States, and the list of fish that may be taken here is a long one.

Among the more common shore-dwelling species are speckled trout, drum, redfish, sand trout and croakers, all first cousins, and all excellent eating, furnishing a world of sport for the angler.

Sheepshead are another favorite, being found around piling and along jetties in the winter time, while salt water pike, or robalo occasionally invade the bays, and furnish a spectacular leaping fight when hooked on light tackle.

Tarpon are common at certain seasons of the year, and may even be caught in Rockport harbor at times during the summer. There is nearly always a big one or two laying under the wharves where the party boats clean their catches, and as the silver kings swirl up to get the scrap from the cleaning, they have given many an angling tyro a severe case of tarpon fever, from which there are few cases of recovery.

In the spring, another favorite, particularly with shore fishermen, is the gafftop, a sort of stream-lined salt water catfish, with long streamers on his fins.

It is only a short run from Rockport to the Gulf and there, along the jetties that guard Aransas Pass, jewfish as large as 400 or 500 pounds are occasionally taken, and jackfish or crevalle are summer visitors, either around wharves and old piling when small, or offshore in deeper water, around the mouth of the pass, where they may weigh 15 or 20 pounds. Pompanos, smaller members of the same family, are caught in the surf.

Offshore, great schools of king and Spanish mackerel are present during the warmer months, while on coral banks that can be reached easily, there are red snapper, various groupers, dog snapper as large as 100 pounds, and warsaw

that look like giant black bass that may reach a couple of hundred. On the reefs, too, are amberjack, cobia or ling, and stray barracudas. Dolphin also occur in large schools when they are small or as they grow larger, singly around floating objects or bits of seaweed.

Wahoo, bonito, and sailfish are also caught offshore.

In the winter, within walking distance of downtown, speckled trout and redfish run into the Rockport Yacht Basin, and are so plentiful at times that the place is known as the Fish Bowl. This year there will be another, the new boat basin at Fulton, three miles to the north.

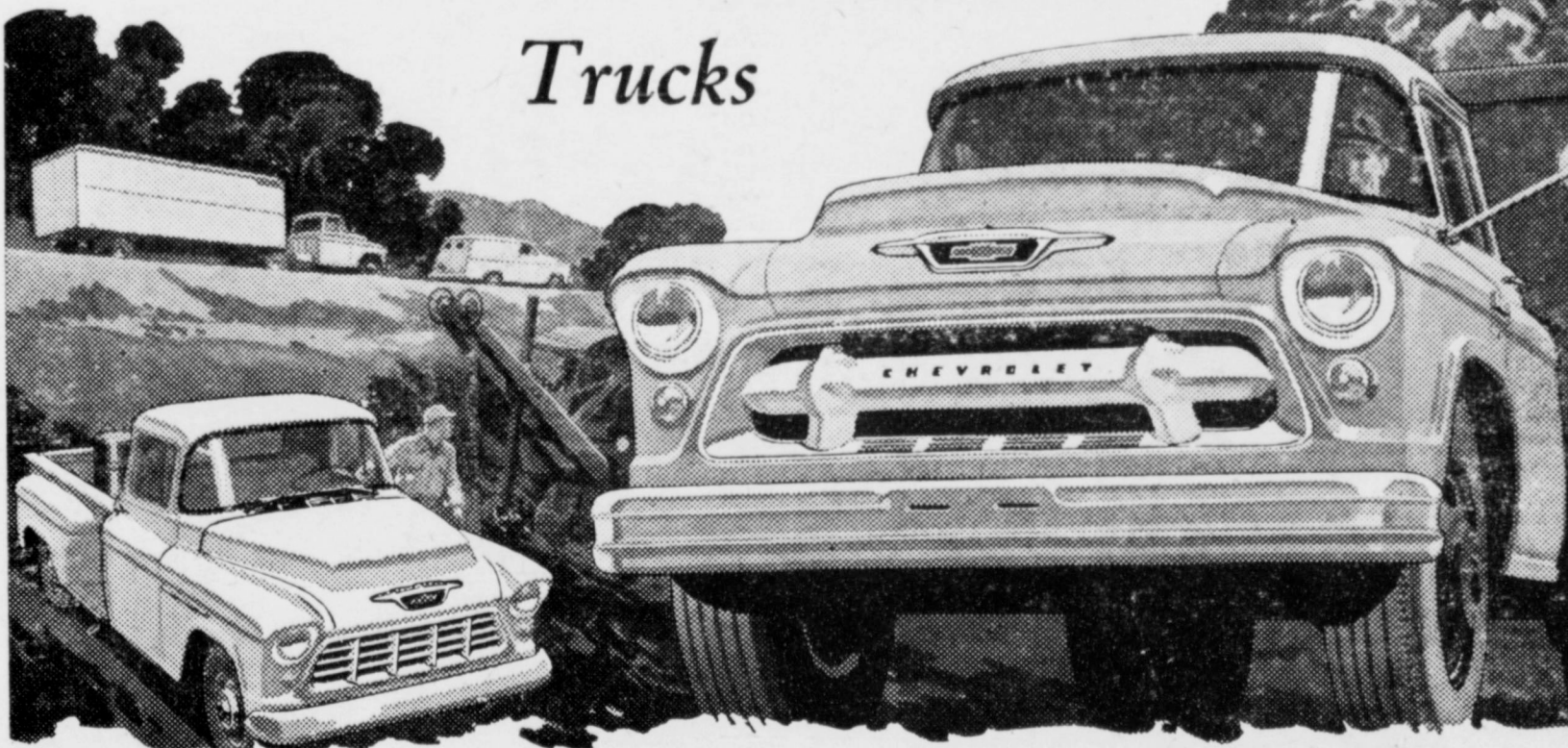

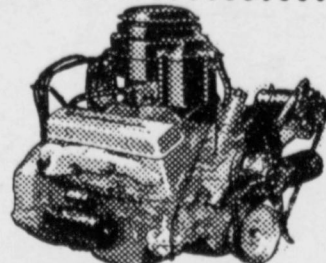

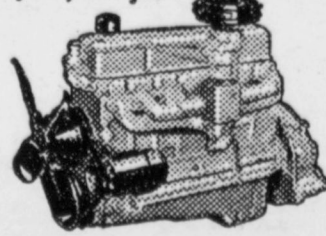

Mrs. M. J. Bearden, co-chairman of the event with Mrs. Ed Masley, says that contestants must observe the following:

1. Only one poem of not less than four nor more than 32 lines may be submitted, and a contestant may compete in only one division.
2. Poems may be written either in formal or modern manner, and may be either rhymed or unrhymed.
3. Poems must be original, un-

published work of the writer. Poems which have won first prize elsewhere may not be used.

4. Poems must be typewritten, double-spaced, on letter size (8 1/2 by 11 inch) paper.

### Game and Food Fish of the Texas Coast

In last week's article on these fishes, we ended with the barracuda, which few people along the coast ever see, although in some places they are fairly plentiful.

This week we will deal with some of the big, mackerel-like fishes.

Wahoos are worldwide in their distribution and, although usually a solitary fish, D. W. Wiles, Fisheries Officer for Barbados, British West Indies, says that they occur in schools around that island, and may reach weights of over a hundred pounds.

Other names for the fish are: one, peto, guarapucu, kingfish and queenfish.

Weight: Averages 20 pounds. Record (from the Bahamas) 133 1/2 pounds.

Habits and food: One of the great game fishes of the sea, the wahoo loves the blue water of the open ocean and Gulf Stream. It is also found around deep reefs. Feeds almost entirely on small fish. In Texas they have been caught at Freeport, Port Aransas and Port Isabel.

Color: Back grayish-blue, fading to lavender and silver on lower side and belly. Vertical markings pronounced in large fish, fading quickly on death. Very small wahoos have markings always present.

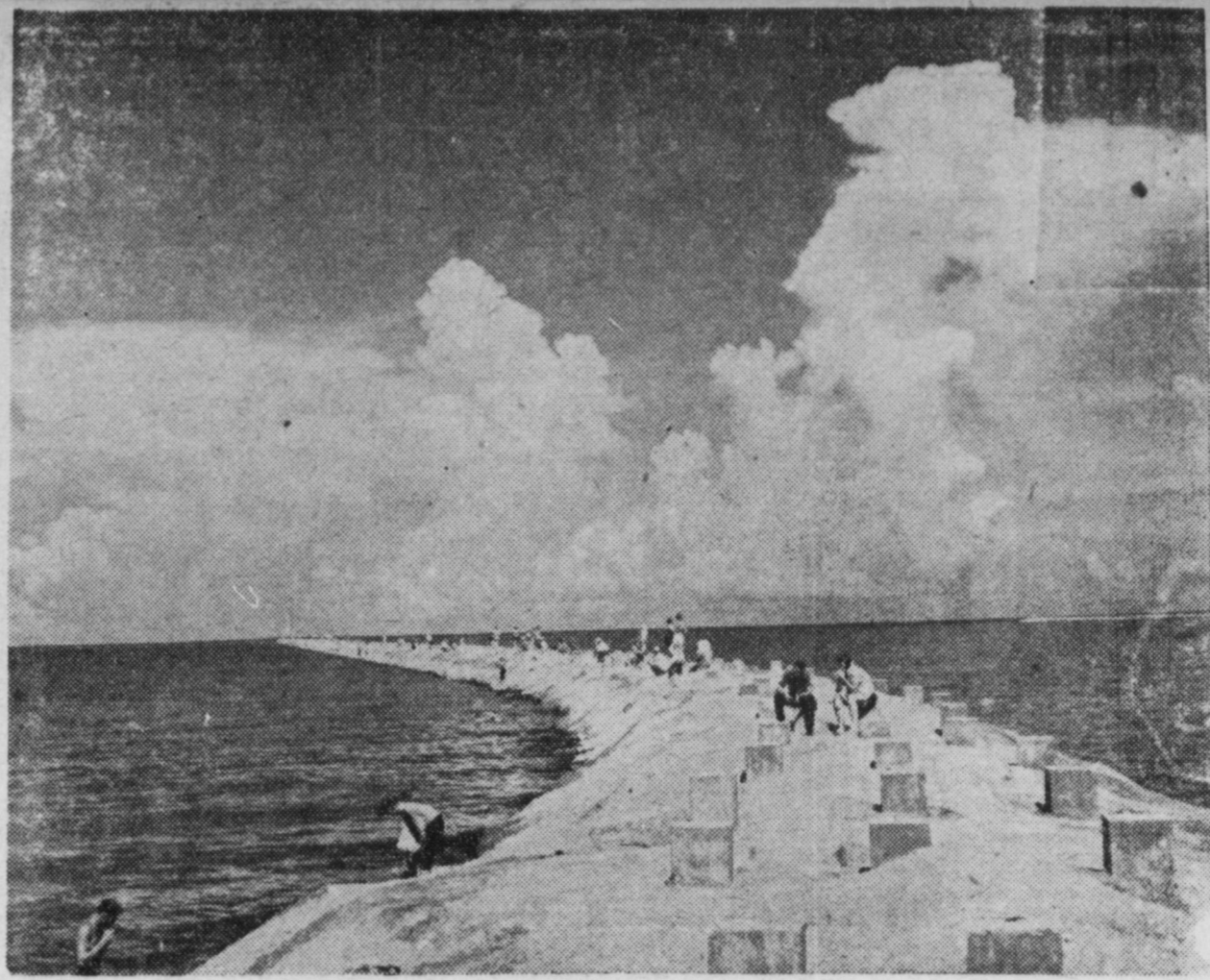
There are three species in the Spanish mackerel-kingfish group. Two of them, the Spanish mackerel and spotted kingfish or cero, resemble each other very closely.

The Spanish mackerel has many other names: Spaniard, spotted cybium, bay mackerel, spotted mackerel, being only a few.

Range: Cape Ann on the east coast, to Brazil; Gulf of Mexico.

Size: Average about 2 pounds. An 8-pounder is large. Reported to have reached a length of six feet and a weight of twenty pounds. However, this is probably erroneous, someone having mistaken a spotted kingfish for a Spanish mackerel.

Habits and food: Numerous listings of this species in the literature on Texas fishes attest its presence off our coast during most of the year. Young, less than two inches long, are common in the surf during most of the summer.



NEW PADRE BEACH "PIER"—Reaching almost a mile into the Gulf, the jetty at the Padre Beach area on the south tip of Padre Island has just been opened to fishermen after receiving a \$250,000 concrete cap. The U. S. Engineers applied the cap to stabilize boulders forming the jetty, but in the process—they provided Padre Beach with one of the finest fishing piers found anywhere along the Gulf coast.

They feed on small fish, squid and shrimp. Along our coast they are generally caught in the Gulf around the mouths of harbors and passes, rarely venturing into the bays.

Color: Bluish or greenish on back and upper sides; silver below, with orange or brown spots.

The Spotted Kingfish or Cero, like the Spanish mackerel, has a multitude of names. Some of these include pintada, sierra, cero, spotted cero, kingfish and painted mackerel.

Range: Cape Cod, Massachusetts to South America, West Indies and Gulf of Mexico.

Size: Because this species is easily confused with the Spanish mackerel, there is no very accurate data on its weight. However, one taken at Port Aransas was a little over three feet long, and weighed close to 20 pounds. The ordinary data given by most authors is that it "grows to a length of 6 feet and a weight of 20 pounds." This confusing, for almost any six foot fish will weigh more than that.

Habits and food: Schools of kings feed near the surface, when they may be caught by casting. At other times they feed well down, and heavy weights are needed to reach them. Little is known of their food habits, but presumably these are the same as those of the next species.

Color: Bluish above, sides and belly bright silver. Markings on the sides may be absent, but ordinarily it is easy to distinguish them from Spanish mackerel by a horizontal bar from head to tail, along the mid-line of the body, which the Spaniard does not have.

The third member of the group, the great kingfish, or king mackerel, is the one commonly caught off the Texas coast. Other names for it are: cablla, cavalla, cero, Florida kingfish, horse mackerel, sierra, and silver cero.

Range: Tropical Atlantic, common throughout the West Indies, off both coasts of Florida, and the shores of Mississippi, Alabama and Texas, but does not seem to frequent Louisiana waters to any great extent, probably because of the great turbidity of the water off that coast.

Size: Average 10 to 15 pounds. Record (Bimini) 73 pounds.

Habits and food: Fish caught

during June were full of spawn. No immature fish have been taken off the Texas coast, the average being from 24 to 30 inches in length. Squid is their preferred food, but these fish also follow the shrimp boats, picking up scrap fish shoveled overboard.

Color: Bright green or blue green on back and upper sides; iridescent aluminum on the rest of the body. No spots.

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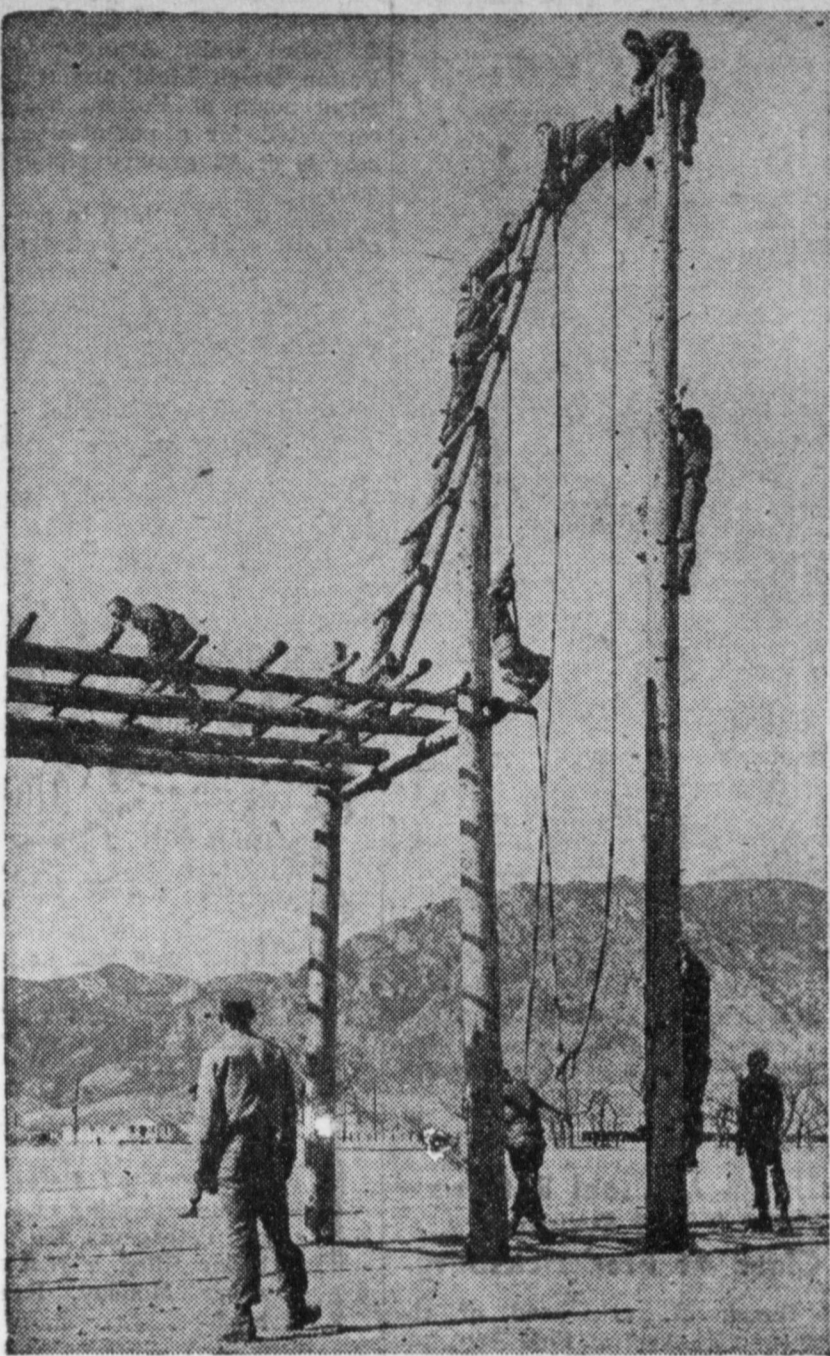

**ROADRUNNERS ARE CLOWNISH, MISPLACED CUCKOOS**

The roadrunner, or paisano, a long-legged, ground-dwelling cuckoo, is a raffish citizen of the border, a desert clown that can, without seeming to half try, trot a good twenty miles an hour, and that will race anything from a horned toad to a hot rod. He looks like he had been assembled by a committee, from spare parts. Imagine, if you can, a long, striped snake on two legs, with a feather duster on his head and another trailing along behind. He is about a foot and a half tall, with a tail as long as his body, a ridiculous crest, stubby wings that he rarely uses, and a blue, mocking eye circled with yellow rings and shaded by eyelashes a movie star might envy. Top this off with a cocky, self-assured air, and an uninhibited willingness to meet any situation head on, and you have the paisano. Typical of the Southwest, these birds furnish part of its folklore, and their own position in literature is secure, because they have been written up by Frank Dobie!

At first glance, a roadrunner appears tail-heavy, but on this rudder depend some of his most amazing stunts. He uses it and his wings just as a pilot uses his stabilizers. Under full steam ahead after a dodging lizard, the paisano will throw out a wing and dodge as quickly as the reptile. Another dodge, a flirt of his tail, and he is off in an entirely new direction, without any lessening of speed, plunging headlong into a clump of cactus only to emerge whacking his limp victim against the ground before swallowing it head first.

Rattlesnakes are the paisano's meat, but so are other snakes, lizards, tarantulas, horned toads, grasshoppers, English sparrows, gophers, mice and even rats. Working in pairs as the birds sometimes do, they can account for animals that to the casual glance appear well able to take care of themselves.

However, even a single roadrunner is well able to take care of a rattler up to two or three feet long. The bird, with wings extended and tips dragging, dashes toward the snake, trying to strike it at the base of the brain. Pass after pass is made at the reptile, which strikes repeatedly, sometimes hitting the feathers of the wings, until at last, bruised and exhausted by blows from the paisano's bill, the snake becomes slower, and the bird is able to reach it with a last, fatal peck. In spring the paisano's thoughts lightly turn to love and little paisanos, and he woees his lady fair with song. On fine mornings he may perch on any dead tree or tall cactus and here, pointing his bill downward until its tip almost touches his toes, he coos in his most seductive tones, sometimes for an hour or more.

"Coo-coo-coo!" he cries. "Ooh-ooh-ooh!" in a whistly bass, his head rising a little with each syllable, until at last his beak points skyward and his love song dies out in a throaty murmur. Evidently it produces the desired result, for there are still plenty of little paisanos!

### IT'S THE LAW in Texas

A public service feature of the State Bar of Texas

Taxpayers who receive income from stock dividends will benefit from changes made by the 1954 revenue act. This act provides for the partial exclusion of dividends from gross income. The first \$50 of dividends received by the taxpayer will be excluded from his gross income. If the spouse of the taxpayer also receives dividends, the first \$50 of those dividends will likewise be excluded. Thus it is possible to exclude a total of \$100 dividends from gross income.

If the stock is held as community property it is considered that one-half of the dividend goes to the husband and one-half to the wife. Amounts, received from co-operatives, life insurance companies, mutual savings banks, and building and loan associations are often called dividends. However, for the purpose of this exclusion, they are not considered to be dividends and may not be excluded.

Another provision concerning dividends is a credit against tax. The income tax liability is computed in the normal manner. However, from it may be subtracted a credit equal to 4% of the dividends received after July 31, 1954. This credit cannot be computed on dividends received before August 1, 1954, nor on dividends excluded from gross income. The credit cannot exceed 2% of the 1954 taxable income.

Under the former law, 3% of the proceeds from annuities was included in gross income, and the remainder was excluded until such time as the nontaxable portion equalled the cost of the annuity.

Under the new law, at the time the first payment under the annuity is received, the taxpayer determines from a table the number of years of his life expectancy. This he divides into the cost of the annuity, and each year thereafter, he excludes from gross income that portion of the annuity payment which represents cost.

If the annuity is to be paid for a certain number of years instead of for life, that number of years is used instead of life expectancy to determine the portion which shall be excluded.

In the past, a person who had the foresight to build up a retirement income from private sources was penalized in that he had income on which he must pay a tax, whereas the person who received only Social Security benefits did not have taxable income. The 1954 revenue act attempted to remove this inequity, and it has provided a credit against the income tax of persons receiving retirement income. This computation is too complicated to set forth here, but the effect is to provide a possible saving of \$240 a year to certain persons having retirement income.

In certain cases, proceeds from insurance policies constituted taxable income where there had been a transfer of ownership. The new law eliminates this under a few selected instances of transfer of ownership.

### New Flame Resistor Developed For Cotton

College Station—Cloth that will pass the most stringent laboratory tests for flame resistance is the result of an improved flame-resistant treatment for cotton fabric. The process is a development of workers at the USDA's Southern Regional Research Laboratory, New Orleans, La.

Two other methods of making cotton cloth flame resistant had been developed by the laboratory. One was known as the "THPC" process and the other utilized a bromoformallyl-phosphate (BAP) material. Fabrics treated by either method are flame and glow resistant and useful for many purposes.

When the two treatments were combined and applied to the cloth, the combination proved much more effective than when either was used alone. The resulting product will pass the tough strip-burning test.

One part of BAP emulsion is mixed with two parts of the THPC-resin solution and applied in a one-bath treatment. The cloth is impregnated with the mixture, then dried and heat-cured. The process adds about 18 percent to the weight of the cloth but normal fabric properties are otherwise little changed. The flame-resistant finish is highly durable to both laundering and dry cleaning.

Its almost as good for the Texas fisherman as it is for the Virginian, and certainly of much more use than anything that has ever been published on freshwater fish of the Lone Star State up till now.

All the old favorites are there, bluegills and black bass, crappie and "punkin" seed, and there is a good black and white picture of each, along with a short summary of food, habits, and how to fish for them.

There are some fish in this that the Texas fisherman won't be interested in, of course, but for a quarter it's a nice addition to any angler's library.

The section devoted to color plates of the various species is a good one.

In addition, there's a good section on fish cookery, another that answers many of the questions commonly asked about fishing and conservation, and an excellent, if short, reference list of publications dealing with fish and fishing.
