



Aransas County Harbor **Facilities Becoming** Nationally Known

Aransas County harbor facilities are becoming nationally known, according to J. L. Baughman, chairman of the Chamber of Commerce publicity committee.

One extensive story on developments here, prepared as part of the work of the committee, will appear soon in "Boating Industry," which has a circulation of. 15,000, and goes to boating enthusiasts and suppliers throughout the nation.

Articles prepared by the committee also made the Associated Press and some of the big state dailies, after the opening of the harbor.

In addition to this, Baughman said, his committee has been in contact with the National Association of Boat and Engine Manufacturers, whose business it is to help promote the sport.

J. H. Ayers of La Porte was master of ceremonies and also Hayes, Billy and Johnny, Mrs. Lily asked the blessing at the meal.


