





A glance at a map listing some of the more notable ones over a period of the last hundred years ary School. shows that in the Americas they cluster thickly along the Atlantic coast, from Maine to Florida; are especially prevalent along the southern shores of the Caribbean; and have occurred frequently in the western Gulf of Mexico, on a line between Campeche and the mouth of the Mississippi.

One or two have developed in Texas waters; several, of course, have struck the west coast of Florida; the Pacific coast, from Los Angeles to Peru is lined with dots denoting the attacks of red tides; and the Gulf of California is also called the Vermillion Sea, because its waters are colored with countless billions of small organisms similar to those causing the lethal attacks.

The rascal responsible for most of the uproar is a dinoflagellate known as Gymnodinium brevis-so tiny that it takes over 900 of them laid side by side to measure an inch.

Under the microscope they look like transparent pansies or fourleafed clovers, with thread-like tails that they flail from side to side to progress through the wa-

These blooms ordinarily occur after periods of heavy rainfall, high temperatures, and calm weather, and are generally associated with unusual influxes of fresh water into the Gulf.

Then the flooded rivers pour their discharge into the sea, carrying quantities of dissolved foods on which the organisms feed, allowing them to reproduce by divisicn and re-division until the sea becomes soupy with their untold numbers.

During this period of frenzied reproduction, Gymnodinium brevis becomes malignantly poisonous and enormously destructive, killing fish, turtles, porpoises, shellfish, and even sponges, wiping them out over thousands of square miles of ocean.

Moreover it stages a gas attack as, when the organisms are close inshore, an acrid, stinging odor emanates from them, causing burning of the eyes and nostrils, accompanied by coughing and wheezing and, often, constriction and soreness of the throat. 

They have dragged it through the Tide in gunny sacks and they have emptied it in liquid form, as well as conducting a series of tests by distributing it from airplanes.

Copper sulphate does, indeed, kill Gymnodinium brevis, but there are obstacles to its use. In Japan the areas controlled are relatively small and easily handled, because they know where their Tide will strike.

In Florida, they haven't been able to determine with any certainty where the next attack will occur, and by the time scientists are aware of an outbreak it is usually so wide-spread that the extremely high cost of copper sulphate would make its use out of

the question. However, laboratories at Miami and Galveston have succeeded in growing cultures of the pest, and they have hopes that through a study of ecology-that is, relationship of Gymnodinium to its environment—they may be able to discover some organism that



### PREACHERS MAY NOW HAVE SOCIAL SECURITY

Clergymen may now have the protection of old-age and survivor's insurance, according to a statement by H. M. Cleveland, District Manager of the Corpus Christi social security office.

"It is now possible, on an individual elective basis, for ordained, commissioned or licenses ministers and Christian Science practitioners to acquire social security retirement and family insurance protection on the same basis as those who are self-employed," he explained.

There are two steps which a clergyman who wishes to participate in this Federal insurance program must take. First, he must get a social security account card if he does not already have one. tificate, Form 2031, with the District Director of Internal Revenue guests. indicating his desire to be covered by the law. Copies of this formmay be obtained from the Internal Revenue Service or from the Social Security Administration.

The waiver must be filed by April 15, 1956, in order to obtain social security credits for 1955 earnings, Cleveland says. For further information on this subject, get in touch with your social security district office at 424 Taylor Street, Corpus Christi, Texas. lets on all phases of the social security law are available.

> Second, all pools formed by natural and man-made depressions should be drained if it is at all

Third, all standing water which is impossible to eliminate should be treated with oil or insecticide.

If the pools do not contain much vegetation, kerosene, fuel oil or lutions containing one per cent of (lindane), dieldrin, or heptachlor should be used. In some cases it may be easier to use an insecticidal dust on the water surface and in these cases, dusts containing 5 per cent DDT, chlordane, TDE or phene, 1 per cent lindane or 21/2 per cent dieldrin or heptachlor may be used. Applications of oils or insecticides should be repeated as often as wigglers are observed. One precaution must be observed in this operation, and that is not to treat pools in which fish are reared. There are a number of

New Brunswick, N. J .- Chumming, competition and agitation are three of the major reasons why fish bite, says Dr. James R. Westman of Rutgers University, who began research on the subject

Competition means the presence of a large number of fish. Chumming is the giving of a nonhooked handout to the fish. (It makes the fish careless). Agitation is caused by currents, air jets, propeller blades or lure action.

Dr. Westman says the ordinary fisherman should be able to hook an extraordinary amount of fish if these three factors are working. He says he did it many times in experiments in oversized laboratory tanks as well as in farm ponds, lakes and the ocean.

Section 3. The Board may elect honorary members, in recognition of outstanding and unselfish service to the community.

### Board of Directors

Section 1. Composition and election. (a) The management and administration of the affairs of this Corporation shall reside in a Board of Directors consisting of not less than nine nor more than liteen members.

At the first annual meeting of his corporation, the members shall elect not less than nine and not more than fifteen directors. One-third of the directors shall be elected for one year, one-third shall be elected for two years, and one-third shall be elected for three

At all annual meetings following the first annual meeting, the terms of the Directors shall be such that the terms of one-third of the directors shall terminate each year and their successors shall be elected for a regular term of three

(b) No member of the board shall be eligible to serve for more than two consecutive three year terms after the first annual meet-

(c) Any member absenting himself or herself from three consecutive meetings shall be automatically dropped from membership on the board of directors.

### Committee

Section 1. The Executive Committee shall consist of the officers, the immediate past president and two other persons elected from the board. In the event the immediate past president is no longer a member of the board of directors, his membership on the board shall automatically be extended for one year to permit his participation on the executive committee and in United Fund activities in general. This committee shall have authority to conduct the business of the board in intervals between meetings in accordance with the rules and regulations and subject to approval and ratification by the board.

Section 2. Budget and Admissions Committee. The budget and admission committee shall consist of not less than five members elected by the board of directors. The president of the corporation shall name the chairmen of the budget and admissions committee at the beginning of each calendar year and such chairman need not be a members of the board of directors. 




