# **Bank Assets Climb** Since July Report

Total Now \$3,009,619 Against \$2,789,671 Three Months Ago; Deposits Reach \$2,063,415 Compared to \$1,720,208 Reported In July

Assets of the First National Bank have climbed steadily during the last three months, reaching a total of \$3,009,619, \$219,947.83 more than the total three months ago. Individual deposits have also risen to \$2,063,415.08, an increase of \$343,206.72.

Government deposits increased from \$23,970.77 to \$31,-587.74 but state funds have decreased slightly, falling from

\$847,602.81 to \$705,154.96. This decrease is due in part to withdrawals by the Navigation District to pay for work done

on Rockport and Fulton harbors. Loans and discounts also decreased slightly, from \$457,920 .-91 to \$395,806.12.





#### Automobile Manfacturers Say There Are 72 Million Drivers In America

The Automobile Manufacturers Association have just come out with the 35th edition of Automobile Facts and Figures. Some of the highlights are as follows:

The 72 million drivers of cars, trucks and buses for the third year in succession have surpassed the half-trillion mile mark, reaching 564 billion vehicle miles last year. This is an average of 7,800 miles per driver.

There are 3.3 persons per passenger car in the United States, or an average of one car per family: but sample surveys show that only about 71% of families actually own automobiles. Dividing the total population of the country by the total automobile registration results in the 3.3 figure, because the total car registration includes the cars owned and the extra cars which 12% of car-owning families possess.

101 billion are needed for road and street construction during the next ten years, according to surveys by state highway departments and the U.S. Bureau of Public Roads. Inadequate highways cost motor vehicle users several billion dollars a year in added fuel and repair bills and accident losses. Thousands of lives lost may also be laid to his cause. Insurance premiums paid by

motor vehicle owners exceeded \$4,165,000,000 annually. The number of traffic deaths
