Many School Buildings Here Fail to Meet Present Needs

Annex Built In 1918; Main Building at Rockport In 1935; Junior High School Constructed in 1938; Not Enough Room and Maintenance Cost Too High

Many of the present school buildings in Rockport are not filling the need of an increased school population; some of them are barely meeting minimum requirement of the State Health Department; and maintenance costs on the older buildings are so high it is uneconomical to operate them any longer.

The annex was built in 1918, at a total cost of \$881.25.





Land Office Tightens **Exploration Regulations** To Help Shrimpers

The Texas Shrimp Association has been assured by the State Land Office that regulations are being tightened on oil company boats exploring offshore waters. each oil exploration vessel operating in the Gulf. These inspectors have explicit instructions that suspended charges of explosives used in seismic work shall be individually suspended by dual floats before being detonated. Exploration companies had petitioned the Land Commission to relax the regulations regarding the use of these floats, but their request has been turned down. 


