

# **School Board Says Money Ready For Old Bonds Now**

### Large Proportion Of County, City, And **School Taxes Paid**

Tax collections for school, city County tax assessor-collector A

C. Shivers says that the large majority of those handled in his department were paid in October, by people wanting to take advantage of the three per cent discount given during that month. A total of \$244,055.89 was paid by the first of November, or 92.48%.

Total school assessment for the Aransas Co. Independent School District is \$20,221,481.00, according to Mrs. Katherine McLester, bringing in \$303,325.15 annually. Of this, as of Tuesday morning, \$236,081.93, or 78% had been paid.

The City, according to Mrs. Mary Lake Segler, received \$25,-350.98 in October, and as of November 10, had collected an additional \$14.84, the latter total amounting to slightly over 62% of the total.

It will be remembered that the 1851 issue was for \$325,000 with accumulated interest of \$595.90. This rate of payment was based on anticipated tax collections according to the valuation of property in the county at that time. but, because of oil development, these valuations increased rapidly and made twice as much money available as was beleived possible.

This puts the school system in the position of being entirely out of debt, and able to ask for another bond issue at the present time, without raising taxes.

The money raised by the bond ssue was spent on adding two classrooms at Fulton, costing \$14,-457.50; bond servicing, \$1,462.50; cost of the site of the present high school, \$15,804.86; new furniture and equipment, \$39,921.29; and a new high school building. which cost \$252,788.75.

In addition to having money for retirement of this bond issue, the school board has paid off every nickel of outstanding indebtedness. Surely this is a record to be proud of, and one that deserves our support at the coming election on December 3, when voters of the county will be aksed to okay

a new bond issue.

This is the layout for the new elementary school at Fulton, which will replace the present building, and which will probably be built on a new site.
