The third annual field trip of the Texas Ornithological Society, the largest ever held, with 153 bird watchers from over the nation attending, closed in a blaze of glory with an event that almost outshaded the great whooping cranes of Aransas Wildlife Refuge, from an ornithological standpoint. Brown and son, Ashland, Ohio, caught two 5-pound reds and a couple of 2-pounders.

Jerry Hodges, of Crosbyton, Texas, while not duplicating his big catch of a couple of weeks ago, still managed to catch nine reds that weighed up to 5 1/2 pounds and seven trout that weighed up to three pounds. Art Olander, Theokee, Okla., caught two reds 20 inches long, and a flounder that would run close to 4 pounds, on Monday, and then Mr. and Mrs. Olander went fishing again on the same day, and came in with 26 rat reds, running up to 2 pounds apiece.

On Saturday, Ed Whitfill caught nine trout; Homer Vickery and H. F. Gilley, of Arkansas City, Kans., brought in 18 specks.
At Mills Wharf, Eddie Edmonson fished John Blocker, of Kentucky last Thursday, and they caught 60 trout. Saturday Harry Lee Mills guided R. E. Watson, of San Antonio, and brought in 38. On Sunday, Harry fished Mr. and Mrs. Gibson and another couple, all of Houston, and they landed 135 trout. Herb had R. E. McBride and party, also of Houston, on the same day, and they strung 69. Eddie Edmonson had Glenn Brooks, Dallas. They pulled in 49 more specks; while Morris Gregory, fishing Roy Grumley, of Austin, hooked 60.

On Sunday, Herbert had Mr. and Mrs. Green, Sr., and Mr. and Mrs. Green, Jr., of Houston, and they tallied 151 nice trout before they quit fishing. On the same day, Herb had Mr. and Mrs. Siepel and party, San Antonio, and they raked up 69.

City Council Approves Budget

The city council, at its regular meeting Monday night, approved a budget of \$51,000 for the coming year; accepted a bid of \$764.80 for fencing; o.k'd purchase of \$100 worth of shell for city streets; voted city employees a Christmas bonus; and discussed drainage problems.

The budget breakdown is as follows:
Building fund, \$1,000; office expense and salaries, \$7,000; social security, \$300; sewer improvement bond, \$1,200; garage account, \$15,000; street lights, \$2,500; donation to Aransas County Emergency Corps, \$1,500; insurance, \$1,200; school house refunding bonds, \$1,300; operations, \$14,000; street maintenance fund, \$6,000.

The following bids were received on H-beam fencing for the site of the city's elevated water tank:

Ankele's Hardware and Appliance Co., \$764.80; Rockport Lumber Co., \$830; Aransas Butane Co., \$1,021; and Cyclone Fence Co., \$784.96.

\$100 was allotted from the street maintenance fund for shell for a road to the E. Garcia property. The council decided to give a Christmas bonus to city employees. Those with service of more than one year will receive the equivalent of two week's salary; those with service of less than a year will be given a week's salary.

The Rev. A. Arnott Ward will address the organization on "The Family Lives By Spiritual Values." Miss Barbara Schuster will present a reading.

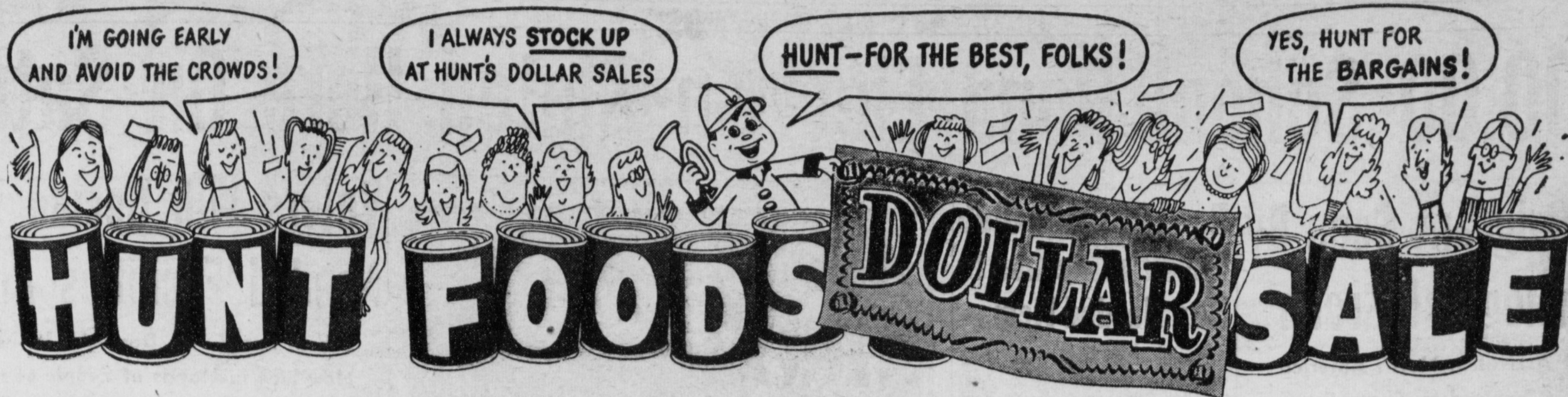

For the money, when voted, the Aransas County School District will receive the following:

1. A junior high school plant, to be built on the present high school campus, and joined to the present high school buildings by covered walkways, making an exceedingly attractive unit.
2. A new gymnasium, also to be built on the high school campus, to accommodate both junior and senior high school students. Included in this will be folding bleachers to accommodate spectators at basket ball games, etc.
3. A new building site, and a new, eight classroom school building at Fulton Elementary, to take care of the rapidly growing grade school needs there.
4. A quonset field house, as an adjunct to the football field.
5. A library addition to the

high school, which will be available for both junior and senior high school students.

6. Eight new classrooms at Rockport Elementary School, which will be built in units attached to the present elementary school.

7. Furnishings for the new classrooms, repairs to old classrooms that are to be retained, and various other miscellaneous items to numerous to list.
