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#### "KEEP IN STEP"

To many millions of Americans the words "Keep In Step" brings back memories of time spent in the service. Those who were unable to keep step with the rest were put back into special groups and the ones who took advantage of the opportunities presented were moved forward.

The same words "Keep In Step" may well apply to Rockport. The entire coastal area is rapidly expanding. Practically all cities in this area have made civic improvements which are and will continue to pay off. It is true Rockport has made extensive water and sewage improvements which were badly needed and should take care of some expected growth. But what about our civic pride? What has been done to improve the main thoroughfare in Rockport? Highway engineers have expressed themselves as being anxious to give Rockport the same kind of approaches and pavement that other cities in the area have. However, some of the work and some money must be spent by local people. Curbing and guttering in addition to drainage must be obtained before the State Highway Department can do anything. Much discussion has taken place concerning this vitally needed improvement, but nothing concrete has been done.

At Monday's City Council meeting the council decided to take some definite action and see what could be obtained. It was decided that a poll would be taken from property owners along the proposed route to determine if they were in favor of paying for the curbing and guttering that is necessary. In the next few days workers will contact every property owner concerned and get their reaction. As a result of this poll the council will be in a position to see what can be done.

Highway officials have expressed the opinion that if everything went well, that if the property owners want the improvement and can comply with the necessary requirements that such a project could possibly be completed by

So, it appears that the time has come for Rockport to "Keep In Step" or fall back. When those taking the poll call on you, give the proposition serious consideration and express your opinion so that the city council may be in a position to determine what action can be taken to keep Rockport in step with other coastal cities.



FINDERS KEEPERS?

"Finders keepers, losers weepers." Is this old rhyme true or false? Lawyers say it is not always strictly accurate under the law. It is sometimes rather difficult to define the rights of a finder in court.

There are some rather fine distinctions and exceptions to the "finders keepers" maxim that have plagued the courts—and finders— the aid of an attorney who knows for generations. In the first place, the facts, because the facts may the finder is not entitled to keep change the application of the law.) the property unless the original owner is not known and cannot be located. Neither may he keep it unless the object is truly "lost," and not merely mislaid.

In general, property is legally "lost" when parted with involuntarily-through accident, neglect, forgetfulness or any other unintentional circumstance. Property is not lost in the legal sense when voluntarily left by the owner, intending to pick it up later-even though he fails to do so. Such property is "mislaid."

Thus, if one loses a watch on the street by having the clasp break, not knowing where or when it was dropped, it is not legally "lost." The same is true of a fountain pen falling through a hole in one's pocket unobserved. In such cases, the finder owns what he has found against all but the true owner.

On the other hand, a package left on the seat of a bus is "mislaid" rather than lost. In one southern state, a pocketbook left in a barbershop by a customer was held to have been "left," not "lost." The barber was arrested and convicted of larceny when he

spent the money that was in it. Under the law the finder of either lost or mislaid property should make a "reasonable effort" to find the real owner.

When articles are left on a train or bus, in a public hotel room, or even when dropped on a shop floor, under circumstances indicating that the true owner will later return to claim them, such items are not considered lost. The proper custodian to hold them for the owner's return would be the proprietor or other person in

Remaining unclaimed, the property sometimes goes to the custodian, sometimes to the finder. The distinction here appears to be whether the place it is found is private or semi-private, or a place





Austin.-A total of 12,023 people said recently.

During the same period, a total of 12,993 Texans received their discharges from the uniformed services, or were transferred to the reserves from active duty.

Of the 12,023 Texans entering the various services, 10,541 went in by enlistment, appointment, or other voluntary means. The remaining 1,482 were drafted through the state's 137 draft boards.

"Actually, many of the men who went in through the draft boards were volunteers," Colonel Schwartz said. "But all are count-

ed as draftees, as they volunteer for induction." Men between the ages of 17 and 26 can volunteer for induction through draft boards. Seventeen-
