In addition to the juniors and seniors, faculty members, school board members, class sponsors and the Junior Room Mothers were present.



at 7:40 a.m. at the VA Hos- tion in the drive. They also agreed to clean up the small park in front of the Woman's Club, where they are building a barbecue pit. The Junior Chamber of Commerce has agreed to clean up the Rockport beaches, which is a considerable job in itself.

Fire Chief Dick Fox says that the Rockport Fire Department will wash down streets on Thursday night of cleanup week, and urges everyone in the downtown area to make an effort to dispose of trash in front of, and around their property, pointing out that this trash is dangerous from both health and fire standpoints.

President of the Chamber of Commerce, Arthur Bracht, said last week that this is an excellent chance to clean out those stacks of old boards and other trash under which rats, snakes and cockroaches breed, to the detriment of the health standards of the city, and to rid the town of old automobile tires, tin cans, bottles, and similar containers in which mosquitoes breed.

He went on to point out that rats carry both bubonic plague and typhus; that cockroaches harbor and spread other diseases; that flies are suspected of spreading polio and known to be dangerous from other health standpoints; while mosquitoes spread malaria, yellow fever and similar infections.

Along with the cleanup disposshould go an effort to rid the city of stray dogs and cats that are of rabies, and on the day prior to cleanup week Dr. Blue Schmidt is vaccinating al dogs that are brought in to his clinic in Rockthe Fulton Fire Station in the afternoon. Steele pointed out that these
