

Enforcement of Garbage Ordinance Is Discussed By City Council at Meeting

Over \$15,000.00 Might Be Obtained By Discontinuing Free Garbage Services

The City Council met in special session Wednesday night. Mayor Chester Johnson presided at the meeting with all aldermen present in addition to City Secretary Mary Lake Segler, City Attorney Joe Caldwell and Water Superintendent Tom Shults. The meeting was called due to the fact that there was not a quorum for the regular meeting set for Monday night.

The city attorney read several submissions from the State Highway Department regarding the Pearl Street project (the proposed Farm-to-Market Road). After considerable discussion the ordinance regarding this project was passed by the council. Another ordinance covering all state maintained highways through the city was also read and approved.

The mayor reviewed the standing of the water and sewer project for the school. It was decided by the council that they would let the school enter into a contract of their own for the laying of these lines to the city limits and that the lines necessary for connecting to existing city lines would be handled separately.

An agreement between the city and M. A. Rowan regarding water and sewer facilities for his proposed subdivision was read and Mr. Rowan's check covering the extensions on his property was accepted.

Alderman Porter moved that a transfer of \$3,850.00 be made from unappropriated surplus funds as follows: \$650.00 to the Street Light Account; \$3,000.00 to the Garbage Account, and \$200.00 to the Office Salary Account. Alderman Harrist seconded the motion and it carried unanimously.

A request for a street light was read and approved. The delinquent tax situation was discussed. It was disclosed that quite a large sum was still due on 1955 taxes in addition to the amounts due for past years. Due to the increasing growth of the city and the increasing demands for services to taxpayers it is necessary that all back taxes be paid. The publication of a delinquent tax list was discussed as a possible means of speeding up these collections before turning the accounts over to an attorney for collection. Also the enforcing of the garbage ordinance was discussed as a possible means of obtaining additional revenue for the city. At present the expense of operating the garbage service is running around \$12,000.00 a year. This free service is quite a drain on the expected tax revenue of around \$44,000.00 yearly. If the ordinance were enforced the city revenue could possibly be increased by around \$15,000.00 to \$18,000.00 a year. No official action was taken on the garbage ordinance.

Plans are being made for the Methodist Vacation Church School, Aug. 13. A meeting for the entire school staff will be held Monday night at 7:30 in the Fellowship Hall to organize each department.

The theme for the school will be "The King's Adventureland." Mrs. John Haynes has been selected as superintendent and Mrs. Matt Scott as assistant superintendent. Marie Holland will be song leader and music and crafts will be under the direction of Mrs. Charlene Hunt. Mrs. A. C. Glass is secretary-treasurer.

Carl M. Osborn, zone chairman, and A. L. Bachman of the Fulton Lions Club attended a staff meeting of the 1956-57 officers of District 2-A, at Kerrville Lions Camp for Crippled Children. District Governor John J. Painter outlined the aims of his administration for the coming year and various committees were appointed. About fifty men were present from Laredo and Eagle Pass to Brownsville and the Gulf coast.

A trailer house belonging to Ty Dorethy was completely destroyed by fire at 11:15 a.m. Sunday. It was located west of town on Market St. Fire Chief Dick Fox said it was already a total loss before the Fire Department was called.



RACE FOR COMMISSIONERS IN PRECINCT 1 WILL BRING LARGE VOTE THERE SATURDAY

Voting in the Democratic Primary will start at 8 a. m. Saturday, July 28. Polls will close at 7 p. m. In the county the only contested race is between W. B. Allen, Commissioner of Precinct No. 1, who is seeking re-election, and Milton Harrell, manager of the Port Bay Hunting and Fishing Club. From all reports a large vote is expected in Precincts 1-A and 1 for these candidates.

Other county officials seeking re-election are unopposed. They are: A. C. Shivers, for Sheriff, Tax Assessor-collector; Weldon Cabanis, County Attorney; A. L. Davis, County Commissioner, Precinct No. 3; Everett A. Brown, Constable, Precinct No. 1; Democratic Executive Committee: Emory M. Spencer, County Chairman; R. D. Torres, chairman, Precinct 1; R. J. Fox, chairman, Precinct 2; Matthew W. Scott, chairman, Precinct 3; Walter D. Heldenfels, chairman, Precinct 4.

In the district races, Judge John Young of Nueces County is opposing John J. Bell, who is seeking re-election. This is a hotly contested race and should bring out the voters in droves. For Representative, three candidates are opposing Harold B. Parish in his bid for re-election. They are: Roy Hinton, of Rockport; R. G. (Pat) Kinde, of Aransas Pass, and Frederick Johnson, of Sinton. William S. Fly for State Senator, and John H. Miller for District Attorney are unopposed.

Throughout the state races of particular interest to local voters are the ones for Governor, Lieutenant Governor and Attorney General. Price Daniel, Ralph Yarborough, Reuben Senterfitt, W. Lee O'Daniel, J. J. Holmes and J. Evetts Haley make up the ticket for the Governor's race. A. M. Alkin Jr., C. T. Johnson and John Lee Smith are contesting Ben Ramey's bid for re-election as Lieutenant Governor. The four seeking the Attorney General spot are Tom Moore, Ross Carlton, Will Wilson, and Curtis E. Hill.

What are the voting records of other democratic voting countries as compared to America's? In 1948 only 51 percent of eligible voters had voted; in 1952 this percentage jumped to 63, and in 1954 the percentage of eligible voters who participated fell to 52 percent.

Now let us look at the turnout of voters in the most recent elections of national legislatures in these countries: Britain, 77 percent; Sweden, 79; Norway, 79; Denmark, 81; New Zealand, 92; Italy 94; Austria, 96. These are some records that the American citizen can aim for. As you see, compared with other democratic nations, our recent election day turnouts have been disgraceful. Let's make 1956 the year of the active and informed voter.

No one has raised a voice against the program of area progress which we—you and I and the other people of the 14th District—have molded and moved into action while I have been in Washington. Still, hanging over this race, is an issue over which neither you nor I had any control. It is an issue which you are bound to consider when you cast your ballot, and it is about which I believe you want the full, correct facts.

It is true that I, as an attorney, represented clients in legal matters before authorized agents of the Texas Veterans Land Board. Dozens of other lawyers did the same thing. It was within the proper bounds of our profession to so serve, and I served honorably at all times. A lawyer cannot be personally responsible for the conduct of all of his clients any more than a business man can be held accountable for the actions of his customers.

When the administration of the Texas Veterans Land Program came under question, I returned to Texas and appeared before all investigating committees and before the De Witt County Grand Jury. I gave those bodies every piece of information that I had—and I did it gladly.

Afterward, I returned to Washington because it was my responsibility to you to be there. It was then that a Guadalupe County Grand Jury returned an indictment charging me with conspiring to steal state funds under the Veterans Land Program. With an indictment pending against me for which there was no basis in fact and about which I had been given no opportunity to testify, I did what I believe any of you would have done in a simi-

lar situation. I requested an immediate trial. In response to my request, however, I was informed that a crowded docket would make it impossible for my case to come to trial until 1956.

The entire matter, however, was brought up for prompt reconsideration shortly afterward—that time by a grand jury that did not mind hearing two sides of a question. The grand jury which indicted me was illegally constituted. Thus the question of the indictment came up for reconsideration immediately by a new grand jury.

You have heard a great deal during this campaign about the fact that I was indicted in Seguin. But the man who opposes me has been silent indeed about the fact that the indictment was dismissed and that a new grand jury refused to return an indictment because it found my conduct had been above reproach.

There are those, I know, who feel I should have returned to Texas and waged a vigorous battle against those who persecuted me and who hurt my wife, my family, and my friends. Perhaps, from a personal standpoint, I should have. But I feel I served you better by staying on the job in Washington. I feel I was a better Congressman for doing as I did. I feel I showed you—and all of the other people of our district—that I could stand trial by fire. Nobody was able to take away my good name.

My opponent first told you that area progress was the primary consideration in this race. Now he tells you that integrity is the important thing. I am perfectly willing to meet him on either ground. I have believed throughout this ordeal that right makes might—that people who are honest and diligent and decent can overcome those who would accuse and smear and try to destroy a man's good name. I believe that even more firmly today than ever before.

I have complete faith in your fairness—and I ask nothing more. I know you will do the right thing. You always have. I know you are capable of properly appraising my service to this district, and I know you are not the kind of people to be misled by this attempt that has been made to shatter my good name. For these reasons, I gladly place my career as a public official in your hands. And for these same reasons, I am confident you will send my back to Washington for a second term as your Congressman.

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
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

LETTER TO THE PILOT:

The Democratic Primary ballot contains three referendum questions. Voting citizens will be asked their opinion on these highly controversial questions, presumably giving our legislature guidance in the preparation of legislation regarding them.

In the interest of an informed electorate, the following question and answer series has been prepared by a concerned citizen.

Q.: What is the legal status of a referendum?

A.: It has no legal status. It is not legislation. It is not a Constitutional amendment. In the case of a party primary, a referendum is used only for the purpose of preparing party platform.

Q.: The first referendum question reads: "(FOR OR AGAINST

specific legislation exempting any child from compulsory attendance at integrated schools attended by white persons and Negroes." Wouldn't specific legislation making such exemptions be a step away from compulsion and a step toward freedom?

A.: The way the referendum question is worded, your thought will be the first thought of many people. But the referendum question does not touch the basic issue — which is not integration at all — but rather whether or not we shall continue to require school attendance.

Q.: If legislation making exemptions on such a general basis were passed, what would prevent wholesale abuse of the attendance law?

A.: Nothing would prevent it. This is why the referendum question does not touch the basic issue.

Q.: If legislation making such exemptions were passed, would it tend to destroy public education?

A.: It would, in effect, make attendance at school purely voluntary. One of the essential components of democracy, an educated people, would be destroyed.

Q.: What, then, is the real reason behind this first referendum question?

A.: To circumvent the Constitution of the United States as interpreted by the Supreme Court.

Q.: The second question reads: "(FOR OR AGAINST) specific legislation perfecting state laws against intermarriage between white persons and Negroes." Aren't the state laws already adequate in this regard?

A.: Yes. The law reads as follows: "If any white person and Negro shall knowingly intermarry with each other in this state, or having so intermarried in or out of the state, shall continue to live together as man and wife within this state, they shall be confined in the penitentiary not less than two nor more than five years." (Article 492, Penal Code. See also Art. 493, Penal Code, and Art. 4607, Revised Civil Statutes).

Q.: Is this law as it stands commensurate with the Constitution of the United States?

A.: Doubtfully, if at all. Q.: Why?

A.: It is not within the spirit

of a free society that the state should have the power to tell its citizens whom they may or may not marry. If the state has the power to do so on this basis, it can just as well forbid intermarriage between social, economic, or religious groups.

Q.: Then why this referendum question?

A.: Perhaps politicians who need to know how far they can go in the use of inflammatory campaign material can answer your question.

Q.: The third question reads: "(FOR OR AGAINST) the use of interposition to halt illegal federal encroachment." What is the legality of interposition itself? What is the difference between interposition and open rebellion?

A.: No one has yet been able to give an answer to either question. The Supreme Court has not ruled on it to my knowledge. Briefly, the legality of interposition is dubious.

Q.: From what was said about freedom a moment ago, it seems that the individual needs a little

"federal encroachment" now and then to protect his rights as a free citizen, lest they be taken away from him by the state. Do you agree?

A.: Emphatically. The question of the rights of the state governments is not really the basic issue in our society. The basic questions, rather, concern states' responsibilities to uphold citizen's rights.

NATIONAL FARM SAFETY WEEK

Walter T. McKay, state director, Farmers Home Administration, has asked that all FHA employees do everything they can to help promote farm safety and encourage greater effort in helping to reduce the tragedies and losses caused by needless accidents, Alfred H. Conrad, county supervisor, advised today.

The President has proclaimed the week beginning July 22, 1956, as National Farm Safety Week. In urging full participation in this campaign, Mr. McKay stated that

in one year the farm accident toll was 14,500 people killed, 1,250,000 injured. In addition, the money loss represented by farm accidents and also by fires probably runs around a billion dollars a year—the human misery can't even be measured, McKay said.

"It is the policy of Farmers Home Administration to promote safety among its borrowers as part of its service to farm families," McKay stated. "We don't think of safety as separate and distinct but as an inseparable part of our entire program. Our three safety aims are:

"First, to improve the health

and welfare of families by eliminating safety hazards on farms and in homes; second, to reduce families' financial losses caused by accidents and fires; and third, to make farm production more efficient by reducing or minimizing accidental injuries and illness."

In summary Mr. McKay advised that Farmers Home Administration is interested in every borrower making his farm a safe place to live and work, while he improves his family's economic condition. The two go together, and the lack of one can be the undoing of the other.
