AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 13, 1956 BOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 20 proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adopting a new Section to be known as Section 51-b, giving the Legislature the power to provide, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient, for assistance to needy individuals who are citizens of the United States, who are more than eighteen (18) years of age and less than sixty-five (65) years of age, who are permanently and totally disabled during any period when he is receiving old age assistance, aid to the needy blind, or aid to dependent children, nor while he is residents of the State of Texas, except that the individuals who are receiving aid for the permanently and totally disabled may not, during the same period of time, receive Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Needy Blind, or Aid to Dependent Children, or be resident in any completely State supported institution; and provided further that not more than Twenty Dollars (20) a month out of State funds may be paid to any individual receive and the individual fundational for assistance payments ahall not exceed the amount paid to that individual fundation. Another part of the research is being carried on at the University, where the first comprehensive study of a shrimp's anatomy is being pursued,
