

First National Assets Rise Here Since July's Report

Climb Amounts To Over \$100,000 In Past Three Months, Deposits Reach Close To \$3,000,000

Assets of the First National Bank of Rockport show a \$105,462 gain over the July report, but are still below those on the first of April.

At the close of business on September 26, total assests amounted to \$3,110,804.69 compared to \$3,005,342.30 in July and \$3,136,297 on April 10.

Cash balances, with other banks, including reserve balance and cash items, amounted to \$1,008,894.72; U. S. government obligations, direct and guaranteed, were \$1,199,057.

On June 30 these amounted to \$902,539.56 and \$1,198,631.00 respectively.

Demand deposits of individuals, partnerships and corporations totaled \$1,861,944.52, as compared with \$1,662,145.03 at the end of June. Deposits of status and political subdivisions amounted to \$897,728.03 in the present report, a drop, compared to \$1,003,369.59. Total deposits of all kinds were \$2,788,216.77, against a figure of \$2,695,476.36.

Capital accounts for September 26th were \$322,587.92; on June 30 they were \$309,865.94.

RARE CREATURE

White Humming Bird Seen

A white hummingbird flitting around the esperanzas at Dobkins Cottages on Fulton Beach has birdwatchers of this area making pilgrimages to see the rare creature.

Mrs. Jack Hagar, noted bird authority, said it was the first she had seen in 25 years of daily checking the territory. Dr. Clarence Cottam, director of the Welder Wildlife Refuge near Sinton, said he had never seen one. He planned to see this one if it remains in the territory.

Mrs. Hagar said the tiny bird, white with pearly gray head and back, dark red eyes and pink bill, could be an albino broad-tailed hummingbird.

Hundreds of hummingbirds have been migrating through Live Oak Peninsula during the past three weeks and the majority of those seen yesterday were broad-tailed. It has been a "big" migration, with numbers of western and Rocky Mountain species which

are not ordinarily credited to this area.

The ruby-throated hummingbird is the common species here, with rufous, buff-bellied and black-chinned hummingbirds seen in increasing numbers by Mrs. Hagar in recent years. This season she has also noted Costa's and Anna's hummingbirds, while Dr. Cottam reports Allen's on the Welder Refuge, never before identified to this vicinity.

Hummingbirds were massed yesterday on the north tip of the peninsula feeding on thickets of wild Turk's cap. Two rufous hummers were observed throughout the day belligerently defending a particular clump of Turk's cap from intruders of other species.

Dobkins said the albino bird had been around the cottages for a week, apparently quite normal in every way except its unique color — or lack of color — and it, also, steadfastly fought off other hummingbirds, who tried to drink from its chosen esperanza blossoms. (Corpus Christi Times.)

C of C Directors Discuss Highway

The Chamber of Commerce directors, at their regular meeting, held a thorough discussion of the status of the proposed six-lane Federal Highway that has been keeping community boosters in South Texas in an uproar, and listened to Seth Steele report upon the situation.

Steele, along with Jack Sparks, M. W. Cochran, William Furlong, and James Furlong were delegates to the recent meeting held in Corpus Christi on Friday, Sept. 14, at which an Expressway Association was formed and the following resolution passed:

RESOLUTION
Be IT RESOLVED that because the Federal Highway System, as presented in 1944 and approved by Congress in 1956, does not comprehend tying in to the system certain major segments of the population and economy of the State of Texas, located between the City of Houston and the City of Brownsville, an Expressway Association has been formed to implement the remedying of this situation.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Expressway Association at its meeting in Corpus Christi on Friday, September 14, 1956, determined that such implementation could be best fostered by: (a) Making available to the Texas Highway Department whatever rights-of-way might be required by the Highway Department to consider construction of an expressway-type highway between Brownsville and Houston, and tying in to the Louisiana line at Orange, Texas, on the already designated Federal Highway; (b) Making it clear that the Expressway Association in committing itself to the fostering of this project does not advocate it as an alternative to other proposals submitted by other sections of the State, but definitely is interested in the border-to-border proposal solely on its own merits.

IT IS FURTHER RESOLVED that the Expressway Association, while primarily devoted to the border-to-border project, wishes to offer to the Highway 77 Association, the Highway 59 Association, the proposed Highway 35 Association, or any other groups interested in highway development, whatever assistance and support it may give at any time to expedite the proposals which they currently or in the future may

Ground Observer Corps Meets

Approximately 50 men, women, high school and elementary school pupils attended the meeting of the Ground Observers Corps, Tuesday night, at the Rockport Elementary School auditorium.

Carl Osborn, chief observer, presided and introduced the speaker, Tech. Sgt. L. N. Woolley of Corpus Christi, Air Force Organizational officer, following the invocation by the Rev. G. J. O'Doherty and the pledge to the flag, led by Vernon Kleypas.

Sgt. Woolley gave a brief history of the Corps which was organized in 1951, following the Korean outbreak in June 1950 and the reasons for its organization. He stated that we had an organized aircraft spotting system in this country during World War II, but it was never put to the test. Now the Ground Observer Corps has been expanded to include every state in the Union. There are presently 73 Filter Centers in the U. S. where reports on aircraft are received, plotted and relayed to radar control stations. The Filter Centers in Texas under the 33D Air Division (Defense) are at Dallas, San Antonio, Bellaire, and Corpus Christi. Observation posts are being set up throughout this area every 8 miles, in so far as population and communication facilities permit.

Announcement was made that observation posts had already been set up at Lamar and at Copano Village and that the observation post in Rockport would be located at Libby's Place at the yacht basin. A telephone is to be installed at this point by the Air Force and will connect us with the Filter Center in Corpus Christi.

Sgt. Woolley explained who was eligible to assist in this project and the various ways that assistance can be rendered. A film, "The Big Picture", climaxed his talk, showing how the Ground Observer Corps functions, from the instant an unfamiliar airplane puts in an appearance, alerting, each filter center first, then on down the line until every observer post is alerted.

Alcoa Terminal For Aransas Co.

Delay in Port Lavaca-Pass Cavallo Ship Channel Causes Alcoa to Plan Deep Water Terminal For Trans-shipment of Bauxite in Aransas County

Delay in construction of the Port Lavaca-Pass Cavallo ship channel — authorization of which fell through when President Eisenhower vetoed the recent Rivers and Harbors Bill — has caused the Aluminum Company of America to come to a tentative agreement with Aransas County Navigation District No. 1 for establishment of deep water port facilities on Lydia Ann Channel, in the southeastern end of Aransas County.

County Judge Sentences Two

Two cases, one a DWI and the other for contributing to the delinquency of a minor, were tried before County Judge D. Wendell's court this week, resulting in both offenders pleading guilty.

W. R. Hubbard, charged with driving while intoxicated was fined \$50 and court costs of \$21, plus \$25 for doctor's fees for himself and damage to the Aransas County jail. Hubbard, when jailed, broke all windows on one side of the jail, cutting his hands and forearms severely, requiring medical attention.

In addition, he was sentenced to 90 days in jail, placed on probation for six months, and has his driver's license suspended for the same length of time.

Eighty days of Hubbard's jail sentence was suspended, provided that he give law enforcement officials no further trouble during the period of his probation.

Kelly Wright, charged with contributing to the delinquency of a minor, was fined \$25 and assessed \$21 in costs.

Hubbard is a resident of Aransas Pass, Wright of Rockport.

REBEKAHS ARE SPONSORING RUMMAGE SALE OCT. 13

The Rebekahs are sponsoring a rummage sale, to be held on Saturday, October 13. It will begin at 8:30 a. m. at the Odd Fellows' Hall. p27

The announcement of the agreement was made here Wednesday by Ben H. Sloane, manager of Alcoa's Point Comfort works, just north of Port Lavaca, and by N. F. Jackson, Thomas D. Picton, and Raymond Owens, navigation district commissioners.

Plans call for an expenditure of close to one million dollars to be made by the company on Navigation District property, to provide a place from which to trans-ship over a million tons of bauxite ore a year. This will be needed to supply the multi-million dollar expansion in the Point Comfort works, for production of alumina from ores mined in Dutch Guiana and the Dominican Republic.

The terminal, as designed by Johnston and Ford, of Victoria, calls for a double line of piling clusters, placed parallel to the shore on the west side of Lydia Ann channel. Between the inner line of piling and the shore, a ten-foot barge channel will be excavated. Barges bearing unloading machinery will operate between the inner and outer line of piling, and beyond the second series of piling, in a 26-foot channel still to be dredged, the ocean-going ore carriers will tie up.

These, Sloane said, will consist of two specially built ore vessels and between eight and ten Liberty ships, which will discharge their cargoes into Federal Barge Line tows, operating behind the shoreward line of piling. These tows will then make the trip from Lydia Ann to Point Comfort.

Ore movement will amount to more than 120,000 tons a month, Sloane said, for as long as is necessary to construct the Port Lavaca ship channel. This will be, he estimated, at least three or four years or, if Congressional action is slow, perhaps even longer than that.

Cost of the facility is estimated at between \$750,000 and \$800,000. Approximately 755,590 cubic yards of material must be dredged from the various channels, which include one 300x2400x36 feet and another 200x4200x10-foot channel immediately adjoining the deeper channel.

Mooring dolphins would consist of nineteen 14- and 19-pile clusters parallel and next to the shore on the west side of the port, and seventeen 19-pile clusters east of the first time, and extending for 960 feet, thus giving room for two vessels to tie up at once.

Sloane said that construction on the terminal is slated to begin on Jan. 1, 1957, and that the first cargo of bauxite is scheduled to arrive on the following Oct. 1

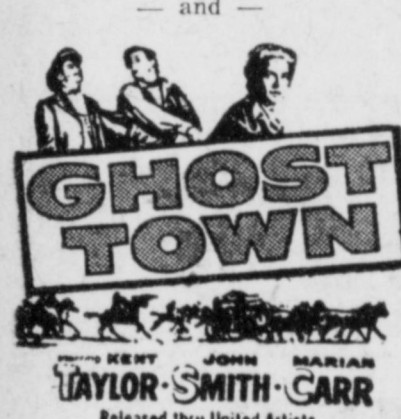

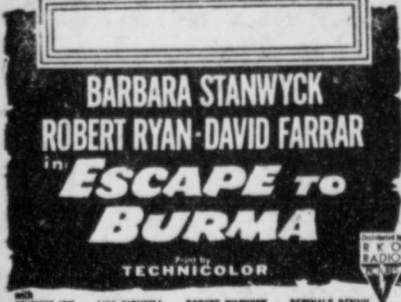

Local Dealers Attend Dallas Dodge Show

Draft Quota For November Is 858

AUSTIN — The state draft quota for November calls for 858 men, Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director, said Thursday.

The quota of 858 for Texas compares with a call of 847 for October, previously announced. The November quota is the biggest monthly call received since December 1955.

The November quota is the state's share of a national call of 17,000 men, all for the Army. At the same time he announced the November induction quota, Colonel Schwartz also announced a November call on approximately half the state's local boards for 1,500 men to take pre-induction physical and mental examinations for future calls.

He said that the boards not receiving a quota for these examinations already had been called upon to furnish men for examination in October.

Local board quotas for the Nov. induction and pre-induction examination are scheduled to be mailed from state Selective Service headquarters on Tuesday, October 2.

The November quota will be filled with men who are 22 years of age or older on November 1, with the exception of delinquents or volunteers, who may be younger.

Colonel Schwartz said he expected the November call to be filled with volunteers and men without children. Delinquents are liable first, he pointed out, but there are not many.

He warned young fathers the law requires them to advise boards about their children, or an expected child.

PEEKABOO.

Members of the Milwaukee Skin Diving Club found the answer to poor lake-trout reproduction in Green Lake. They told a fisheries biologist that lakers were dropping their spawn on a bald clay reef where mud puppies, or salamanders, gobbled it up. Last winter tons of limestone chips and rock were hauled onto the ice over the reef and last fall lake-trout spawn was dropping safely into the crevices of this rock bed where the mud puppies couldn't get at it. — Gordon Maquarrie, Milwaukee (Wis.) Journal.

The deer belongs to the group of animals called Pecora, which includes the true ruminants or cud chewers, with four-chambered stomachs. Other members are the giraffe, antelope, ox, goat and sheep.

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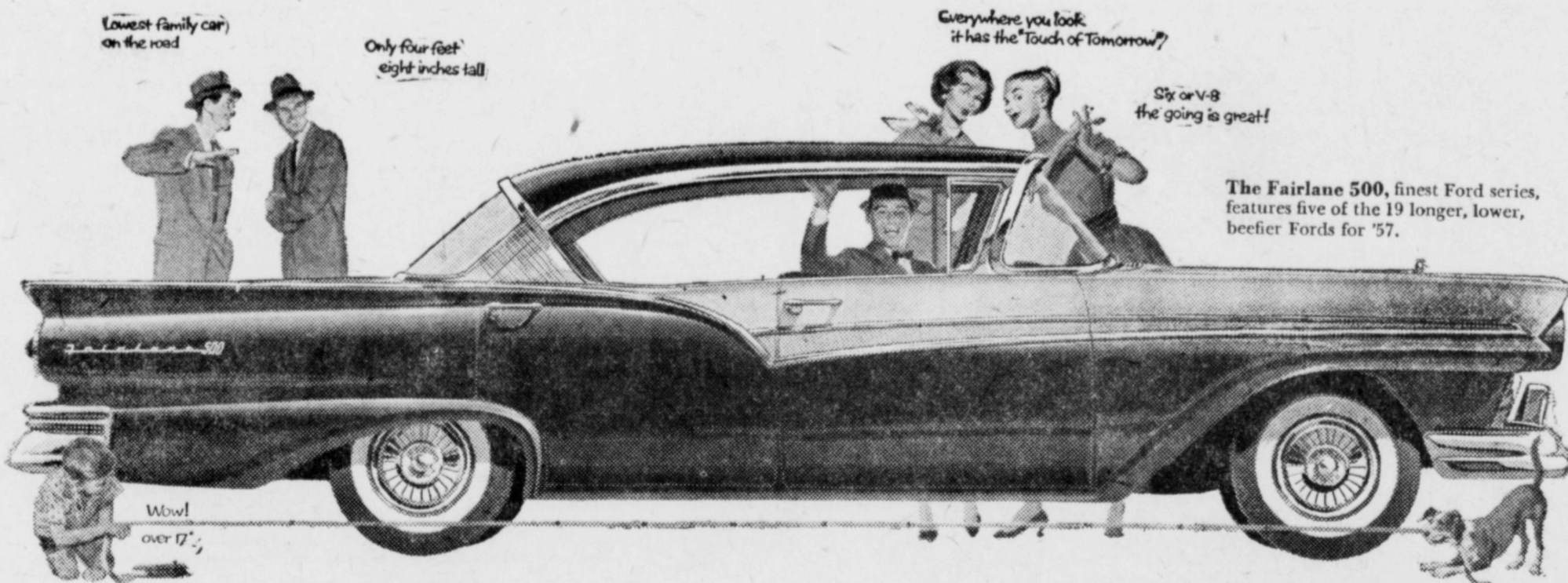

New Ford Now On Display At Commercial Motor Company

For the first time in its 53-year history, Ford Motor Company will produce two sizes of Ford cars, the company announced today. The 19 new models were unveiled by Ford dealers Wednesday morning.

W. E. Boehnke, Commercial Motor Company president, said the 1957 Fords "represent the biggest change in the modern history of the Ford car."

The new Ford line divides into two basic sizes, Fairlane and Custom, plus the station wagon series, each with its own body and chassis. In addition, the Fairlane series has been expanded to offer "Fairlane 500" models, which have extra luxury features.

The 1957 Fairlane and Fairlane 500 sedans are nine inches longer and four inches lower than last year's comparable models Custom and Custom 300 sedans are more than three inches longer and nearly three and one-half inches lower than the 1956 models. Station wagons are three and one-half inches longer and nearly six inches longer. Fairlanes and Fairlane 500's are built on a 118-inch wheelbase. Station wagons, Customs and Custom 300's have a 116-inch wheelbase.

"There has been no sacrifice of headroom inside the car, in spite of their reduced height," Mr. Boehnke said. "The new frame extends to the sides of the car, and this permits the floor to be lowered inside the frame rails. "The design and styling are new from the ground up. Every dimension is changed. Wheels, frame, rear axle, drive shaft, engines, and every inch of sheet metal in every body style are definite departures from past models," he explained.

An invitation has been extended to residents of this area to inspect the new Ford at Commercial Motor Co. in Aransas Pass.

Following graduation from Texas A. and M. College, Heldenfels assumed management of the highway construction division of the expanding Heldenfels organization.

It was at that time, too, that he and his two brothers, H. C. Heldenfels and James Heldenfels, became partners with their father in its operation.

Heldenfels Brothers' highway construction activity has expanded throughout the years under Fred Heldenfels' direction.

In 1937, Heldenfels Brothers attracted national attention by building a 35-mile stretch of soil cement highway through the heart of the previously untouched Kennedy County ranch land beside the Texas coast between Kingsville and the Lower Rio Grande Valley.

The highway was generally acknowledged to be the longest strip ever built by the technique of mixing construction materials with soil scooped up at the job site. It now forms a major link in U. S. Highway 77, one of Texas' most important thoroughfares.

In 1954, even more national attention was attracted by a \$2,750,000 concrete causeway that was constructed across Laguna Madre Bay to connect the south tip of Padre Island and the Texas mainland.

Throughout his career, Heldenfels has been a leader in professional circles.

He has served as national chairman of the highway division of the Associated General Contractors of America, and for three years he headed the Texas highway branch. He also is past chairman of the A. G. C.'s Texas executive committee.

For two years, Heldenfels has served as co-chairman of a Joint Co-operative Committee between representatives of the American Association of State Highway Officials and the Associated General Contractors.

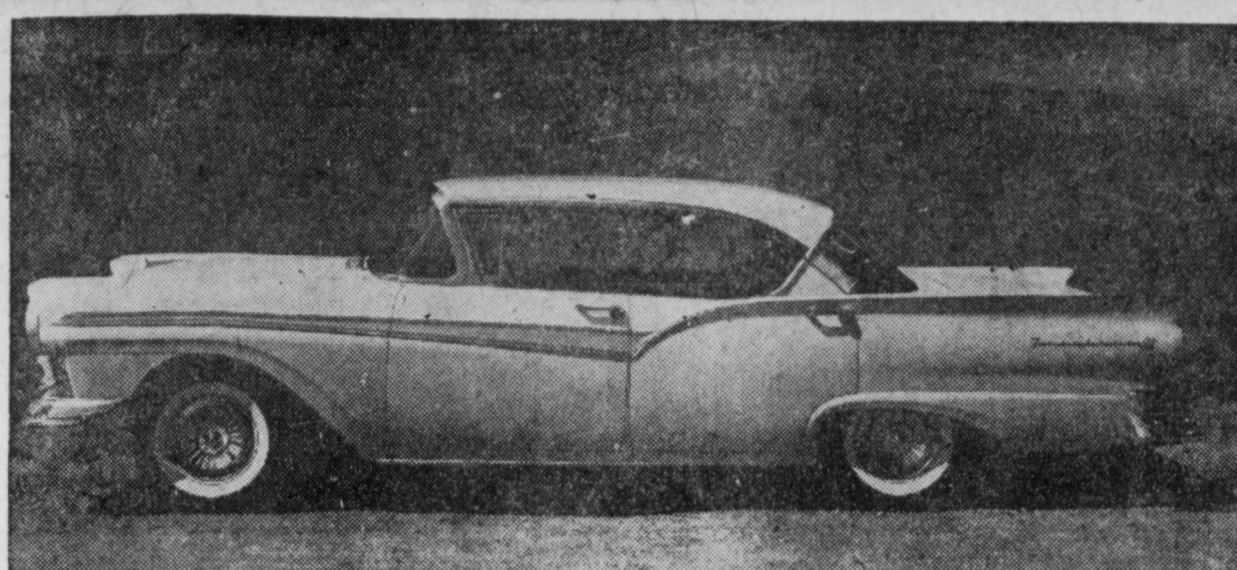
Heldenfels lives at 445 Del Mar in Corpus Christi. He is married and has two sons, F. W. III and John.

Members of Corpus Christi Family Killed Sunday Nite Near Estes

Three members of one Corpus Christi family died in a two-car wreck near here Sunday night.

The collision six and one-half miles south of Rockport took the lives of a mother and two children and injured two other persons.

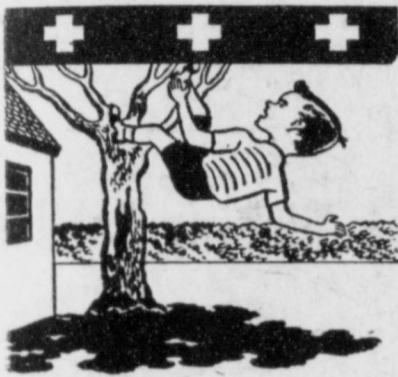

Traffic Accidents Kill Two In Aransas County

Traffic accidents during August in the Corpus Christi District of the Texas Highway Patrol took 13 lives in 11 fatal accidents that occurred in 5 of the 16 counties comprising the district. Four of the 13 deaths occurred in urban areas. During the month a total of 110 accidents were reported. In addition to the 13 deaths the 110 accidents resulted in 95 injured and property damage estimated at \$65,253.00. The figures are on accidents occurring in rural areas only with the exception of 3 fatal accidents that occurred in urban areas.

Five of the August deaths were in Nueces County and there were 2 deaths each in Aransas, Duval, Refugio and San Patricio Counties.

The 13 deaths in August was 4 more than in August of 1955 and 4 more than in July of 1956. The 110 total accidents reported in August was 20 more than in August of 1955 and 19 less than in July of 1956.

Of the 11 fatal accidents in August there were 7 in which there was a driver or pedestrian involved that was known to have been drinking. Of 85 fatal accidents occurring in the district in the first 8 months of 1956 there were 38 in which there was a drinking driver or pedestrian involved. Of the 11 fatal accidents in August there were 38 in which there was only one motor vehicle involved. Of the 85 fatal accidents occurring in the district in the first 8 months of 1956 there were 47 in which there was only one motor vehicle involved.

One driver involved in a fatal accident in August had been convicted, in Nueces County alone, of 18 traffic law violations, had been involved as a driver in two previous accidents, had once had his driver's license suspended as an habitual traffic law violator and was apprehended for speeding, by Highway Patrolmen, approximately two hours before the fatal accident.

During August Highway Patrolmen stationed in the Corpus Christi District arrested or warned a total of 2333 drivers for committing hazardous traffic law violations. Fifty two percent of the arrests were for either D.W.I. or speeding. Fines assessed in the district during August on arrests made by Highway Patrolmen totaled \$16,438.80. Speeding arrests made in the district by Patrolmen in the first 8 months of 1956 totaled 2,727 compared to 2,657 such arrests in the same period of 1955. D.W.I. arrests in 8 months of

1956 totaled 275 compared to 153 such arrests in the same period of 1956.

Traffic deaths in Aransas County in August numbered 2; and 2 were also injured in the same county in August. Traffic accidents reported from the same county during the same month of 1955 were 6. Traffic deaths in the same county in the first 8 months of 1956 were 4. Traffic deaths in the same county in the same period of 1955 were 7.

Injured in the same county in the first 8 months of 1956 were 17, and injured in the same county in the same period of 1955 were 11. Estimated property damage from traffic accidents in the same county in the first 8 months of 1956 totaled \$15,915.00. Estimated property damage from traffic accidents in the same county in the same period of 1955 was \$18,780.00.

OCTOBER DRAFT CALLS FOR 847 TEXANS

Austin—The state draft call for October will be the biggest since December 1955, Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director, announced Thursday.

The October call for Texas asks for 847 men, compared to 687 for September. The quota for December 1955 was 873. The October call of 847 is Texas's share of a national quota of 17,000, all for the army.

At the same time he announced the state induction quota for October, Col. Schwartz also announced an October call on approximately half the state's local boards for 1,416 men to take pre-induction physical and mental examinations for future calls. He said that the boards not receiving a quota for these examinations in October already had been called upon to furnish men for examination in September.

Local board quotas for October induction and pre-induction examination are scheduled to be mailed from state Selective Service headquarters on Wednesday, August 29.

The October quota will be filled with men who are 22 years of age or older on October 1, with the exception of delinquents or volunteers, who may be younger.

Col. Schwartz said he expected the October call to be filled with volunteers and men without children. He said delinquent men are liable first, but boards do not have many delinquents.

He warned young fathers to advise boards of fatherhood or an expected child, as boards by law treat a father as childless unless he furnishes the facts, as legally required.

Veterans Warned Against Income Increase

A warning to veterans and widows and children of deceased veterans receiving pension from the Veterans Administration to report immediately any increase in income that would raise their annual income above statutory limitations was sounded today by Scott B. Harrington, Manager of the Veterans Administration Dallas Regional office.

To remain eligible for pension under the law, according to Mr. Harrington, pensioners of World War I, World War II and of the Korean conflict may not have an annual income from other sources exceeding \$1,400 without dependents, or \$2,700 with wife or minor children.

Mr. Harrington said veterans, widows and children receiving pension can save themselves inconvenience and possibly money by notifying VA promptly of any increase in income which would put them above the statutory limitations.

Pensions are payable to veterans for permanent and total disabilities of a non-service-connected nature and to the widows and children of deceased veterans for non-service-connected death, providing the applicants are otherwise eligible.

Mr. Harrington said any VA office can explain full eligibility requirements for pension.

THEREFORE, the Expressway Association requests that all Commissioners' Courts in the following counties indicate tangible evidence of their interest in the project by presenting to the Association their assurance that every effort will be made to obtain commitments on rights-of-way necessary for presentation to the Texas Highway Commission's October meeting at Austin, Texas, it being understood in every instance that any resolutions passed by the Commissioners' Courts would, of course, be ultimately subject to the approval of the electorate in their various counties: Harris, Fort Bend, Wharton, Jackson, Victoria, Refugio, San Patricio, Kleberg, Willacy. These resolutions would complement the existing resolutions or facilities available in Cameron, Kennedy, and Nueces Counties.

A meeting with the Highway Commission in Austin is scheduled for this month, and the following letter to Steele from T. Frank Smith, general chairman of the Expressway Association is self-explanatory.

The meeting with the Highway Commission in Austin is scheduled for 2 p. m., October 25. At that time, the Expressway Association's resolution of September 14 will be presented, together with additional data it is felt will be instrumental in furthering the cause of bringing to fruition the border-to-border highway from Louisiana to Mexico, via Orange, Houston, Victoria, Corpus Christi, and Brownsville.

We should appreciate your efforts towards prompting all officials in your county and city, as well as all media representatives, whether they be newspaper, radio, or television personnel, to be in attendance at the October meeting with the Highway Commission.
