Telephones Essential To Radar Installation

Expansion of Rockport System Brought About By Construction of Radar Site North of Rockport Will Also Benefit Service in Whole Region

and weather detachments. "Through this spiderweb system of communications and AC & W station can talk to any other AC & W station within the United States within a matter of min-

Preparations for this load on the Rockport telephone exchange have been going steadily and surely. Some months ago the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company announced that only Corpus Christi and Rockport would remain within the Corpus Christi division of the company. Almost immediately afterwards, a second announcement was made concerning installation of underground cable between Rockport and Corpus Christi, an installation not duplicated elsewhere in this area. Such an installation, according to Stan Bell, manager of the telephone company's Corpus Christi division, is one of the largest he has ever seen serving a town the size of Rockport.

The cable, which will give the area excellent communications no matter what the state of the weather may be, carries a ninehundred phone capacity immediately north of Rockport, tapering off to a two-hundred phone line five miles to the north, near the Aransas County Airport where the AC & W station is being built.

While work on laying the cable was progressing south of Rockport, telephone equipment in the city was enlarged to care for an additional two hundred more telephones, and construction of subterraean works for handling the cable beneath the streets of Rockport was completed.

While no official announcement has ever been made, either by the telephone company or the Air Force, it would be idle to believe that this is being done for any forseeable rise in civilian facilities of the area. This could have been done with a minimum of trouble by construction of surface lines, as the need arose.

Nevertheless, civilian facilities in the area will be improved, especially as present construction of the Rockport telephone building will provide an additional four-hundred-phone capacity in the early spring. At this time, or perhaps later in 1957, all phone numbers will be changed in the Rockport-Fulton area.

Many drivers violate the rules ing. Traffic signs and signals may ever, don't depend too much on of right of way covering left-hand turns at intersections. When turning left, you should always be on the inside (or center) lane, displaying the proper hand sighal. You must allow all cars coming from the opposite direction, already in the intersection, to pass through before completing your turn. Even when the intersection is cleared, do not proceed unless other oncoming traffic is far enough away to be able to see your signal and slow down to allow you to turn with safety to all concerned.

Stay in the inside lane until your left-hand turn is entirely completed, and only then move gradually over to the right-hand lane if you wish. When turning right, stay in the right-hand lane at all times. Do not swing wide into the center lane, as to do so is unnecessary, unlawful and dan-



Rare Opportunity Save Money by Voting For Amendment No. 3

Voters of Aransas county will The Aransas County High have an opportunity in the general downs last Friday night as they most progressive change in county fiscal operation seen in 100 years or more, according to County Judge John D. Wendell.

That will be to vote for House Joint Resolution No. 23 which would amend the Constitution of Texas to allow Commissioners Courts to reallocate the tax levies for the four regular county operating funds on an annual basis without the necessity of holding reallocation elections.

Adoption of the amendment will do more to put county government for the score. The Pirates tied on a business-like operating basis than anything that has been proposed in many years, Judge Wendell declared.

Under this basis the Commissioners Court could levy only the amounts actually needed in the operating funds instead of the amounts now fixed by the Constitution, which are, General Fund 25c, Road and Bridge 15c, Permanent Improvement 25c and Jury Fund 15c, this being on a

The full amounts fixed by the Constitution are not always needed in a certain fund, but a larger amount may be needed in another fund. Under the present law, the only way the amounts can be changed is for the Commissioners Court to call a reallocation election every six years or cond toughdown. Satsky kicked oftener. Holding these elections, of course, costs the counties thousands upon thousands of dollars, Judge Wendell pointed out.

By voting for this amendment, the taxpayers can save themselves money in two ways. First, by making it possible for their Commissioners Court to operate on a more business-like basis, and second, by eliminating the cost of expensive reallocation elections.


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MONORAIL TO BE INSTALLED AT FAIR




