City's Back Tax List Almost Ready

Approximately 385 people that own property or businesses in Rockport are on the list of delinquent taxpayers now being compiled and ordered by the City to be published in next week's issue of the Pilot, and will run for three consecutive weeks, as a preliminary to suits for collection of back taxes.

About one hundred and thirty of those listed owe for personal property, the largest individual amount being \$201.00, plus interest and penalties. Next largest amount in this division is \$177.15, and all the rest are less than \$100 each. However, councilmen have pointed out, to all of these should be added interest and penalties, which will raise them considerable. As it now stands, the personal property roll shows that these hundred and thirty people owe the city a total of about \$1,300.00. Penalties will bring this up to about \$2000, if it is all collected.

In the real estate division of the list, the largest individual account is \$999.52, which penalties will raise to around \$1700 or \$1800; next to this is one for \$644.25. The great majority of the taxes that are delinquent are for lots and outlots in the Doughty and Mathis subdivision. The total, for all real estate in Rockport, amounts to around \$8500.00, before addition of penalties and interest.

C. Mooers, Turfman, Dies In New York

One of the most colorful characters on the American sports scene passed when Cliff Mooers fell dead in the Idlewild airport at New York recently.

The 67-year-old Texas oilman with a great love for golf and horse racing marched across the San Antonio scene, to the entertainment and amazement of a lot of people who became his friends.

Harold Scherwitz, Sports Editor of the San Antonio Light had this to say of him:

This dept. first bumped into Mooers when the scores of the Rockport Open Golf tournament were turned in for publication. We looked coldly at the names and figures. It sounded like a gag. But it wasn't — and yet it was, if you follow up. Mooers called together a bunch of friends, put up all kinds of prizes and called the competition the Rockport Open. A couple of these affairs were played on a 9-hole course at Rockport. A few were played at the San Antonio Country club, where Mooers still is on the rolls as a paid-up member.

The top prize, which wound up going to the players who lost the most money in the involved tournament betting, was a clever in a plush cash — "a hacker for a hacker."

He named one of his most famous racehorses Old Rockport, and this steed won the \$100,000 Santa Anita Derby in 1949. Although he owned 250 horses, a lot of them good ones, at various times, and was headed to Narragansett, R. I., to see Traffic Judge run when he died. Mooers went all out over the Old Rockport triumph. He never tired of describing it to his friends — although you can't say the same for as to write a long poem about it, and have recordings made of the calls during the famous race.

While he believed in having fun with his money, he was no eccentric. Tod Menefee, San Antonio Country club pro, who played golf with him on his last visit here this year, says he had one of the brightest minds he ever encountered. His ability to make the expensive sport of racing pay dividends is perhaps the best proof of that statement's accuracy.

The sports world is poorer, much poorer, with the loss of such colorful guys who enjoyed life and kept things humming in anything they undertook.

Here the assembled ornithologists will have another chance to observe the whoopers, this time from a tall tower near refuge headquarters, and to see other birds and animals at close quarters, many of which the visitors have never seen before.

Ducks and geese winter there in great numbers; deer are plentiful; and there are wild turkeys, javelinas, over 300 species of birds, and a host of small animals, such as coons, possums, armadillos, all of which are inhabitants of the Texas brushlands.

PIRATES LOSE TO BISHOP BADGERS

The Aransas County Pirates finished their 1956 football season last Friday night bowing to the district champions, the Bishop Badgers by a score of 33-7.

The Badgers struck early when Rennie Bull went off tackle for 18 yards and a touchdown just before the first quarter ended. The extra point was added and they took a 7-0 lead. The Badgers scored twice more before the half. Both touchdowns came on breaks. One after they had recovered a Pirate fumble. Bowers went up the middle for 55 yards. The other came on an intercepted pass by O'Neal that covered 45 yards. At halftime the Badgers were leading 20-0.

After a scoreless third quarter, Bishop again turned a Pirate fumble into a touchdown. Bull again ambled 63 yards for this score. The Bull was not content and later in the fourth quarter he once again found pay dirt on a 46 yard scamper. The Pirates got into the scoring act when Eugene Satsky faded back to pass and not finding a receiver open went 42 yards up the side line for the Pirate lone touchdown. Satsky added the extra point to make the final score 33-7. John Cabaniss threw a key block that helped clear Satsky on his touchdown run.

Ray Washington, playing his last game turned in another fine performance, snaring five passes for 67 yards. Bobby Close played his usual stout game on defense. Senior Allen Thomas was the leading ball carrier for the Pirates with 98 yards on 15 carries.

The Pirates finished the season with 6 losses, three wins and one tie. The prospects for next year look much brighter as the Pirates lose only three senior boys from the starting lineup and only five altogether.

Wildlife Artist Visits Rockport

Frances Lee Jaques, one of America's premier wildlife artists, if present plans develop, will do a series of four paintings and a frieze for the administration building soon to be built at the Rob Bessie Wildlife Foundation, near Sinton.

Jaques, staying at Rockport Cottages, home of Mrs. Jack Hagar, was here to consult Dr. Clarence Cottam, director of the refuge, accompanied by his wife, Florence Page Jaques — author of seven books, all illustrated by her more famous husband. He said:

"The project is an extremely interesting one for several reasons. In recent years, the cost of producing museum exhibits with natural backgrounds has risen enormously, both because taxidermists able to do this sort of work are scarce, and artists able to do such backgrounds are scarcer."

Mr. Jaques ought to know, for he was a staff artist at the American Museum of Natural History in New York for many years, and helped prepare many of that museum's bird and animal groups.

To present these in a life-like setting, and to obtain an effect of depth and perspective not possible with older procedures, Jaques developed a technique of painting on sheets of glass which were then mounted one behind the other, before a painted background. This dispensed with much time and labor consumed by the former method, and had the advantage of truer presentation of exhibits.

Jaques has a tremendous amount of experience against which he can draw in doing such work. He collected materials in the Arctic and Newfoundland for bird and walrus exhibits in the American Museum. In Panama he gathered data for tropical bird groups and sketches that enabled him to illustrate "My Tropical Air Castle" and "Birds of the Panama Canal Zone."

He made two trips to South America and from these came knowledge that led to the magnificent illustrations in "Oceanic Birds of South America." There, too, and in Panama, he gathered the material that made it possible for him to picture mammals in the book "South American Zoo."

He went to the South Pacific before World War II, and to the Bahamas, England, and Switzerland. He has been from one end to the other of this country and Canada.

While in Rockport, after their conference, the Jaques visited with Mrs. Jack Hagar, nationally-known bird authority, and took a human's holiday by driving to the Aransas Wildlife Refuge, to see the whooping cranes.

Navigation District Tries Experimental Groins At Fulton

The Aransas County Navigation District embarked this week on an experimental program of groin construction in the Fulton area, aimed at preserving beach facilities that were constructed last year, but that have been eroding rapidly.

The W. F. Bartlett Company or Aransas Pass is contractor on the job, and the work will consist of a series of short groins, formed from thirty-six inch diameter concrete pipe, that will be set on end, side by side, in such a manner as to break up the flow of currents along the beach, and consequent washing away of the sand.

The beach, which was dredged from the bottom of the bay about a year ago, added greatly to the conveniences of the region from the tourist standpoint, and the residents of Fulton and the Navigation Board are much interested in preserving the shore line at its present location.
