Mr. Jacques ought to know, for he was a staff artist at the Ameriman Museum of Natural History in New York for many years, and helped prepare many of that museum's bird and animal groups.

To present these in a life-like setting, and to obtain an effect of depth and perspective not possible with older procedures, Jacques developed a technique of painting on sheets of glass which were then mounted one behind the other, dispensed with much time and labor consumed by the former method, and had the advantage of truer presentation of exhibits.

Jacques has a tremendous amount of experience against which he can draw in doing such work. He collected materials in the Arctic and Newfoundland for bird and walrus exhibits in the American Museum.
