

New Courthouse, Jail Are Complete

Aransas County Commissioners And County Judge Accept Structure Marking End To Long Battle To Erect Building

Members of the Commissioners' Court, and County Judge John D. Wendell of Aransas County, meeting Monday with members of the architectural firm of Abbott and Evans, and of Braselton Construction Company, both of Corpus Christi, accepted the new Aransas County Courthouse, completed at a cost of \$393,393.

The building replaces a pseudoplace. Only one more thing remains to be done in Aransas County's building program - destruction of the old jail, built at the same time as the former court-

The courthouse is 134 x 220 feet, with central heating and an airconditioning unit that is zoned, so that when the district court and it's appended offices and jury rooms are not being used, it can be cut off from the rest of the building, and thus keep maintenance bills at a minimum.





Texas Coast Rapidly Passing Into Hands Of Real Estate Men

Negotiations for another chunk of Padre Island — by an eastern investment firm willing to pay \$1.5 millions for the property once more focuses attention on the report of the Seashore Recreation Area Survey, completed by the Nation Parks Service a year ago, in which the rapidly vanishing coast line of Texas was pointed out as the nation's coming seashore and residential region.

The survey extended from Maine to Mexico, and designated some 54 areas, embracing 640 miles of beach, as most suitable for public recreation. Six of these areas, comprising about a third of the total available coastal mileage, were located in Texas.

Since that time the picture has changed rapidly, with real estate developments gobbling up mile after mile of ocean frontage worth up to \$20 a front foot.

According to the report, there were 37 miles of beach between Sabine Pass and High Island, only half of which was suitable for development. From High Island to Boliver Roads, another 28 miles, is already largely developed by private capital. Galveston Island, twelve miles long, is split into many little holdings and is a metropolitan and regional recreation site, drawing its crowds from as far away as Louisiana.

Between San Luis Pass and the Old River at Freeport, lies the fifteen-mile stretch of Stephen F. Austin Island, five miles of which is already being developed as a seaside resort, while the other ten miles is subdivided as residential property.

Matagorda Peninsula, according to the National Park Service, despite the fact that the state of Texas is negotiating for land there on which to establish a park, is one of the least attractive Texas coastal regions, because of the poor quality of its beaches, dunes, vegetation and offshore waters.



Two SCS personnel here for the tour include Donald A. Williams of Washington, D. C., national administrator of the Soil Conservation Service; H. N. Smith of Temple, state conservationist for Texas; and Paul Walser, deputy state conservationist.

Their South Texas tour began with a visit to the Lower Rio Grande Valley, where they inspected conservation work in both irrigated and dryland areas in the Starr County districts; and then they toured the Coastal Bend area to get first-hand information on the upstream flood control project that is being launched in the San Diego-Agua Dulce Soil Conservation District. They toured the San Patricio district and then proceeded to Rockport, where they were met by Durwood Ball, work unit conservationist for the Copano Bay Soil Conservation District.

At Rockport the conservationists boarded a plane for, a trip to Matagorda Island, where an extensive conservation program is being carried out by the Star Brand Cattle Co., which operates a ranch on part of the island. They were met at the ranch's island landing strip by Toddie L. Wynne, owner of the Star Brand Cattle Co., Leon Parker, ranch foreman; and A. J. Kupper, a former work unit conservationist who is now foreman of a ranch operated by Wynne near Kaufman. Wynne and his staff conducted the group on a tour of the island ranch.

The conservation program on Matagorda Island is being carried on in cooperation with the Copano Bay Soil Conservation District and under supervision of SCS technicians assigned to the dis-

A considerable amount of swale land on the island has been reclaimed by the construction of small dikes, which serve as walkways for cattle and, at the same time, shut out salt water from the bays. These small cut off areas become fresh water ponds which provide water for livestock and waterfowl. Also, land areas that have become accessible through these crossings have been seeded to introduce grasses such as blue panic, buffel, and KR



But suppose you want to revoke you will entirely. Here again, the surest and most effective method is to execute a new will or co-

Since a will does not take effect until the death of the person making it, the provisions of the will should be reviewed by the maker at least once a year to be sure that changing conditions and circumstances have not been such as to require a modification of the will. It is very easy to postpone doing a thing of this kind, but failure to do so may result in the intentions of the maker of the will being thwarted to a certain

There are many changing cirustances which would be brought to his attention if a person would review his will at least once a year in the light of circumstances at the time.

Such things as deaths among the legatees or devises named in his will, births, marriages or divorces in the family, accidents or sickness among the close relatives which make it desirable to increase or decrease the amount given certain ones, substantial increase or decrease in the value of the estate of the person making the will, death of all witnesses to the will and many other factors, may cause a person to want to execute a new will or add a codicil to his old one.

This poured more than \$3.5 million in U.S. money into Mexican pockets, which may account for some of the heat. At any rate, this flood of prosperity furnished credit to buy more boats and gear, although an increased Mexican import duty, plus assessments for civic improvements in the Merida district, constitute a handicap which the U.S. Consular office says could be harmful to the Mexican industry if the market were to drop appreciably.

The October catch of shrimp on the west coast of Mexico has been very good, although not comparable to that of 1955. However, the catch per boat is down.

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

Fin-Fish Catch **Higher This Year**

Almost every species of salt water fish caught in Texas produced a higher commercial poundage this year than last, according to figures recently released by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service for the fiscal year of 1955-

Redfish produced 454,073 pounds as against 417,467 last year, and while this is not an important amount of fish, the figures, representing a yearly sample from the same cross section of Texas coastal waters, certainly indicate a trend.

Speckled trout was considerably higher than last year's poundage, 726,933 pounds coming from the coast in the present period as opposed to 576,070 pounds a year

Flounders accounted for 106,661 ounds in 1955-56, in comparison o 74,589 the preceding year; and black drum was way up, also, with 984,578 this year against 752,-013 a year ago.

Mullet, never a fish of much interest to commercial men, rose to 31,267 pounds, or about 20,-000 more than for the previous 550 pounds to 1303.

Texas fishermen produced about four tons more of gafftops this year than last, landing a total 31,270 pounds; but pompano suffered a decline from 9,995 pounds last year to only 4,495 pounds in the present report.

Red Snapper showed a market increase, going from 865,560 in the fiscal year of 1954-55 to 1, 291,454 in 1955-56. Grouper usually brought in along with red snappers, amounted to 30,243 pounds this year, a rise of over ten

Sheepshead is on the upturn, also. In 1955-56, the report shows that 36,320 pounds were caught, as against 16,620 last year, but both of them put together are still a long way from the time, in the 1890's when this species furnished the principal catch in

Galveston Bay. Warsaw, which looks like a giant black bass and is one of the groupers, produced 22,608 pounds in the season just past, compared with 24,457 for the same period a year ago, and is one of the few species to show a drop. Scrap The Norway rat is world-wide F. L. McCord. The Christmas fish accounted for about eleven son in charge of the music. 
