PIGGLY WIGGLY Recipe of the Week

MINCEMEAT COOKIES

3 1/4 cups sifted all-purpose flour, 1 teaspoon baking soda, 1 teaspoon salt, 2 cups brown sugar lightly packed, 1 cup soft shortening, 2 unbeaten eggs, 1 cup moist mincemeat, 1/2 cup Pet Evap. Milk. Sift the flour, baking soda, salt and brown sugar into a 2-qt. bowl. Add the rest of the ingredients all at once. Beat hard 2 min. with spoon or electric beater at medium speed, scraping sides and bottom of bowl often. Drop by teaspoon about 2 in. apart, onto greased cookie pan. Bake near center of 350 oven (moderate) 10 to 12 min., or until cookies are light-brown. Take from oven and let stand 1 min. before taking from pan. Makes 6 doz.

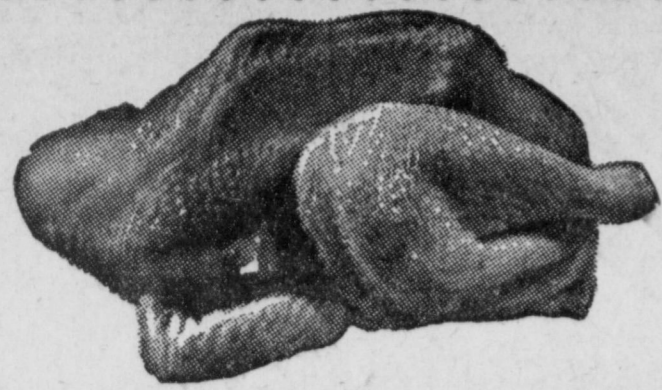

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Surf Theatre To Re-Open Christmas Day

The Surf Theatre, closed since Labor Day, will re-open Christmas Day with a matinee at 4:30.

Under a new policy the Surf will present only one complete show nightly, starting a-half hour later than usual, which at this time will be 7:30. The show will begin with the shorts and previews, followed by the feature to be shown only one time; and then the shorts will be shown again after the main feature for the late comers. Mr. Barnard states he hopes the public can be trained in a short time to accept this policy, that they will plan their theatre attendance in advance, make an effort to be on time just like going to church or keeping any other appointment, because he believes that so much greater enjoyment can be had by seeing any picture from the beginning. He is well aware that a few 9 o'clock stragglers may be disappointed at first, but hopes the bulk of the audience will be satisfied. There will be a matinee on Saturdays and Sundays at 3:30 as in the past, but not a continuous performance thru to the evening show. After one matinee showing the theatre will close down and the auditorium emptied of all patrons. This means again that you must be on time to see a complete show. Such a policy is necessitated in an attempt to cut overhead to a minimum, and will result in quite a savings in labor, heat, and electricity. TV has made quite an inroad into theatre attendance, no matter how temporary it might be, and Mr. Barnard is firm in his belief that the downtown area still needs a theatre.

Admission to the Surf, generally, will be 50c for adults and 25c for children. However, as an inducement to family attendance,

whenever Father and Mother both attend the Surf with their family, all children under 12 years will be admitted free.

Starting with Christmas Day, admission to the Cove Drive-In will revert back to 50c each adult in order to conform with the downtown admission prices.

The feature attraction on opening day (Christmas Day, 4:30 p.m.) at the Surf will be "War and Peace" starring Audrey Hepburn and Henry Fonda, an utterly fine motion picture, a masterpiece of greatness. Due to the great length of this picture, which will be 3 hours, 42 minutes, there will be only two complete shows starting at 4:30 and 8:15. Also due to the limited seating capacity, for this day only, all children occupying a seat will be charged 25c.

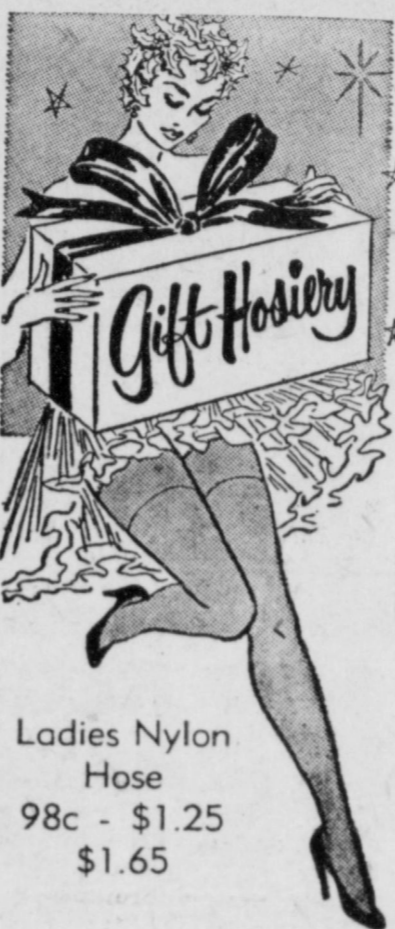

Funeral Services Held For Early Resident of St. Joseph's And Rockport

Funeral services were held here Saturday afternoon for Mrs. Alpha Kenedy Wood, 88, early Rockport and St. Joseph's resident, and widow of the late Will W. Wood, second white male child to be born in this city.

Mrs. Wood, who had long been at home at 717 French Place, San Antonio, died in a hospital in that city and was brought to Rockport for interment in the cemetery where four generations of the Wood family are buried.

She is survived by a grandson, John H. Wood, and by two granddaughters, Kathryn Winter Wood and Nancy Clark Wood, all of San Antonio, and a sister, Mrs. W. C. James of Richmond, Virginia. Alpha Anna Kenedy moved to Rockport in 1872, to live with her half-sisters, Mrs. Ben Shelton and Mrs. C. R. Bell, who were granddaughters of Joseph F. Smith, one of the founders of the city.

On January 17, 1889, she married William W. Wood, who was

born in Rockport on May 24, 1873, the second white male child to be born in this city. He was the grandson of Colonel John H. Wood, veteran of the Battle of San Jacinto, and co-founder of Rockport.

With her young husband, Mrs. Wood spent the early years of her marriage on ranches. Wood's father, Richard H. Wood, a lifetime resident of this city, owned the Inez Ranch at Victoria and St. Joseph's Island. These he turned over to Will and his bride to manage, while the elder Wood served as Mayor of Rockport, state representative, and Game, Fish and Oyster Commissioner.

The young Mrs. Wood and her husband were residents of Rockport for many years, where both took a prominent part in the community. While still in his early twenties he started the Wood Aransas Pass Transfer Company, at Rockport, and along with his regular transportation service carried the first regular mail service between a number of the local towns.

He was appointed presidential postmaster of Rockport by President Cleveland, and because he was actually appointed to the post four months before his 21st birthday, Mrs. Wood was married to a man who could not take office until he attained his majority! However, he did take the post, and held it four years, resigning to become city tax-assessor-collector at the age of 25.

Later he became a Deputy United States Marshall for the Western District of Texas and, of course, took Mrs. Wood with him.

Later he went to Nicaragua, where he managed the Linda Ventura and Alpha silver mines, owned by his father, but his whole company was forced to flee the country just ahead of one of the Central American revolutions.

After Mrs. Wood nursed him back to health from a siege of sleeping sickness which he contracted while in Central America, he joined the Rough Riders under General Theodore Roosevelt, and

fought with them through the Spanish American War.

When he returned, he and Mrs. Wood lived on St. Joseph's Island, where he took full charge of his cattle ranching interests which, at that time, comprised some 100,000 acres and 5,000 head of cattle.

However, in 1919, the Wood family cattle were wiped out by the devastating tropical hurricane that struck Texas in that year. Thirty-five hundred out of four thousand head of purebred Herefords were destroyed.

Shortly after this disaster, the Woods moved to San Antonio, where Mr. Wood served as constable of Precinct One for many years, and later he was Sheriff of Bexar County for two terms. He died on his seventieth birthday, May 24, 1943, and was buried in Rockport Cemetery.

Mrs. Wood, who had celebrated her golden wedding four years before, was to outlive her husband by thirteen years.

A number of Rockport men attended the first annual meeting of the Corpus Christi Diocesan Council of Catholic Men on Sunday, to hear an address by Bishop Adolph Marx.

Bishop Marx urged the delegates to have the faith of Job in the Old Testament in launching their new organization, and asked them to encourage men and women to become priests and nuns of the church.

Over 1000 Catholic men attended the meeting, including the Rev. G. J. O'Doherty, Fred Bracht, Frank Tully, S. M. Currie, Luis Lugo, Jack McCready, Dick Simpson, and Ed Pena.

After the resignation of Mrs. R. A. Johnson as president was accepted, Mrs. Everal West was elected president, and Mrs. B. C. Draper first vice-president.

Mrs. Calhoun's fifth grade won the attendance prize. At the close of the meeting coffee and cookies were served by Mrs. Ernest Hackett and the other members of the social committee.

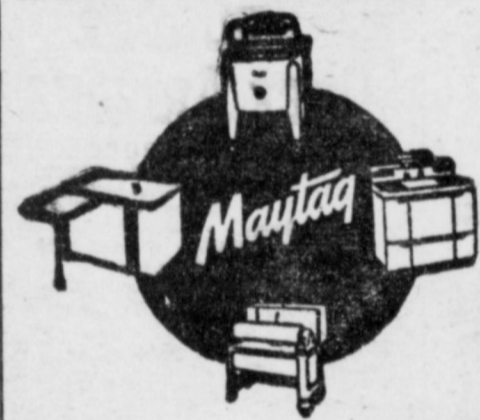
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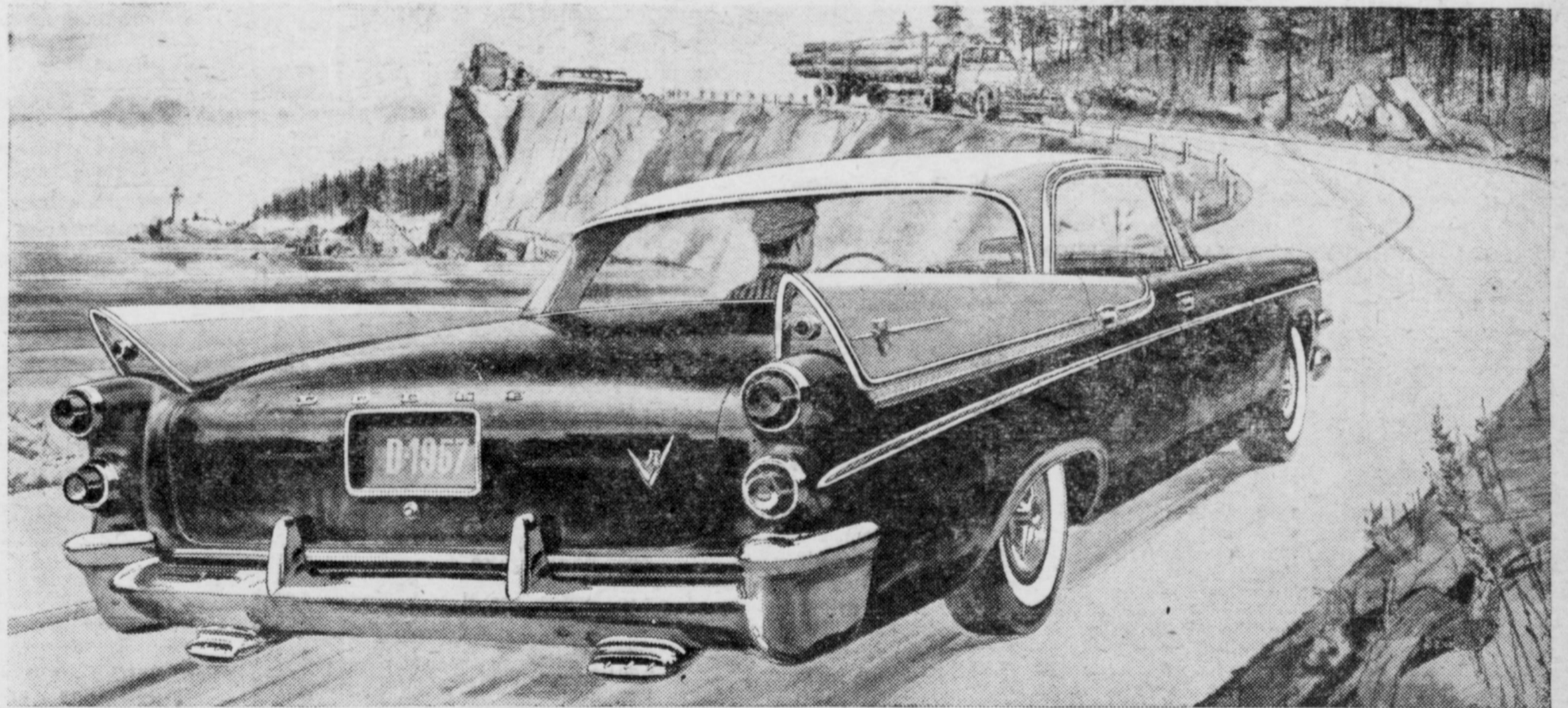


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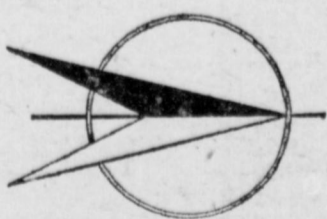

Gentlemen:
An examination has been made of the books and records of the City of Rockport, Texas, for the fiscal year, October 1, 1955, to September 30, 1956. We have examined the accounting procedures of the city, and, without making a detailed audit of all transactions, have examined or tested accounting records and other supporting evidences by methods and to the extent we considered appropriate. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards applicable in the circumstances, and included procedures considered necessary.

General Fund

The taxes collected, as well as various other receipts issued, were traced to the depository. The General Fund Account in the First National Bank of Rockport, Texas, was composed of four funds: the General, Street Maintenance, Schoolhouse Refunding Bond and Sewer Improvement Bond Fund. The deposits and disbursements of this bank account have been charged and credited on the books to one of these funds. During the year the last bonds and coupons were paid on the Sewer Improvement Bonds. The balance of \$895.07 left in this fund was transferred to the General Fund. Also, \$829.08 was transferred to the General Fund to close it out. These two transfers leave only the General and Schoolhouse Refunding Bonds Fund making up the General Fund Account in the bank at the end of the fiscal year.

Water and Sewer System

Receipts for the year reflect the amounts deposited by source. The total receipts were \$59,992.68. The total disbursements were \$52,351.75. These disbursements include \$11,795.04 for permanent improvements. At the end of the fiscal year there were 949 water connections, all metered, and 562 sewer connections.

The card system on the water deposits was checked with the control.

Construction

The balance of \$6,074.97 that had been left from the sale of the Sewer and Water Bonds was for improvements to the system. A schedule of these disbursements is shown herein.

Bonded Debt

Total bonds outstanding on September 30, 1956, were \$225,000.00; of this amount, \$221,000.00 were water and sewer revenue bonds and \$4,000.00 were tax bonds. All paid bonds and coupons for the period were examined. A schedule of the bond issues is included, which shows the maturity dates and amounts.

Other

All bank accounts were reconciled. Checks were examined for payee, amounts, signature and endorsements. Supporting invoices and records were test-checked with the disbursements and no exceptions noted.

The City records and the internal control are continuing to improve. All these records are in excellent condition.

The tri-county Whooping Crane Girl Scout Council—serving Aransas, Bee and San Patricio counties — has some extremely interesting figures in its annual report, send to national headquarters. The council budget is \$13,281.93 for the coming season.

Two hundred and fifty-seven adults have the welfare of the council program at heart. This includes twenty board members and forty-five members on various committees.

These adults are spread between the following neighborhoods: 13 troops in the Aransas Pass-Ingleside region; 18 troops at Beeville; four troops at Mathis; eleven troops in the Rockport-Fulton area; nine troops in Sinton; and thirteen troops in the Taft-Gregory region.

There are 507 Brownies in these troops; 352 intermediates, and 14 seniors.

Sixteen adult training courses were held during the summer, which 115 leaders attended.

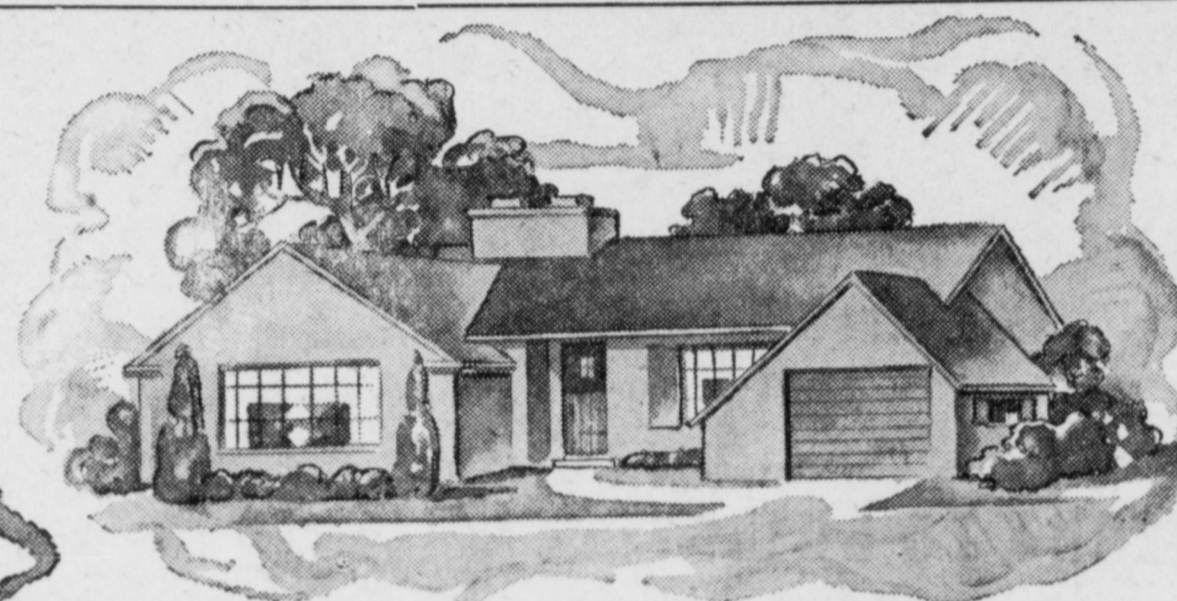
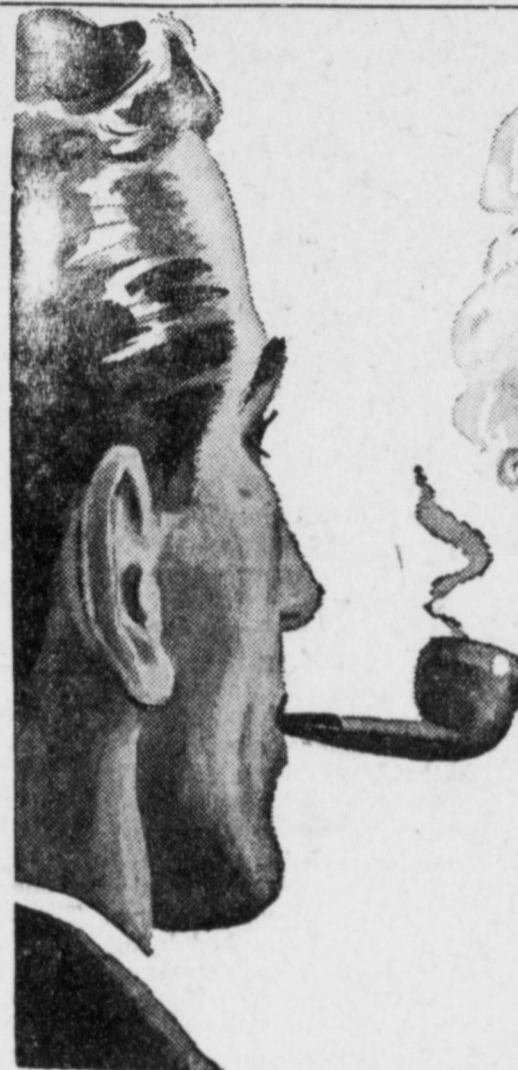

Mrs. Taylor was born in Chicago, Texas. Before moving to Kingsville in 1940, she had lived in Rockport.

She was a retired telephone operator and a member of First Methodist church of Kingsville.

Survivors are a son, Joe Taylor of Corpus Christi, and two brothers, F. A. Ross of Houston and T. A. Ross of Kingsville.

Mrs. S. F. Jackson Has Interesting Story On Early Settler in Corpus Paper

Mrs. S. F. Jackson, long-time correspondent for the Corpus Christi Caller-Times had a most interesting story on Mrs. Manch Brundrett another early resident of the region, in the Sunday edition of the Caller.

For those who haven't seen it the story follows:

Mrs. J. W. Brundrett, who recently celebrated her 85th birthday anniversary, was born Lydia McRae in 1871 in historic old Lamar, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Murdock McRae.

Her maternal grandfather, Archibald McRae was born in Scotland, and her paternal grandfather, Humphrey Heard, was a native of Ireland.

Both families were among the earliest settlers in this area and their descendants are prominent citizens in Aransas, Bee and Refugio Counties. Mr. McRae was the second settler in Lamar, coming in soon after James Bryne (originally O'Bryne), his close friend, when the county was a wilderness.

Lydia McRae was christened when she was one year old at the little Presbyterian Church built in Lamar just the year previous, and on the same day, J. W. Brundrett, who was to become her husband, received the rites of baptism.

The McRaes were devout church people. Her father, Murdock McRae, was an elder in the Presbyterian Church in old St. Marys prior to the building of the church in Lamar and superintendent of the Sunday School.

The circuit riding ministers of all faiths stayed in the homes of Mr. McRae and Capt. James B. Wells and used the same church Mrs. L. A. D. Wells gave the lot upon which the church was erected by the labor of the little group of members and every afternoon at 4 o'clock, they assembled at what was known as the "work bench" and were served cake and coffee by Mrs. McRae, Mrs. John Brundrett and others of the congregation.

The storm of 1886 destroyed the church and great limbs of the hugh

oak tree which shaded it were torn off causing wide spread grief, as the tree was a well known landmark in the area.

A few years later, Mrs. McRae (the only surviving member of the church), sold the lumber to Bert Ballou and it was brought into Rockport on a barge owned by H. G. Smith.

Lydia McRae in 1891 married J. W. Brundrett, who was born on St. Joseph's Island. Soon after they were married, they moved to Black Jack Ranch on Bilmott Bayou and lived there for 20 years.

For a period of six years, their closest neighbor lived three miles from them.

Life was strenuous on this ranch on Black Jack Peninsula, where the Aransas National Wildlife Refuge is now located, with very little free time. "Do it yourself" was not a craze but a necessity, coupled with the lack of conveniences which are an important part of modern ranch life.

One year they branded 900 calves. Before their children were born, Mrs. Brundrett helped her husband round up the cattle, riding a side saddle with her long riding habit touching the ground.

They ground their own corn, milked 25 cows and churned the butter in an earthen crock with a wooden dasher. They had no means of refrigeration and no market for the butter so they seasoned all the food with butter and always had buttered grits for the supper meal.

Hundreds of pounds of green grapes, huckleberries, dewberries, corn and other vegetables were put up each year in self-sealing jars.

They needed plenty of food, according to Mrs. Brundrett, because in those days, people passing through the country stopped for the night at the nearest house and sometimes remained for several days.

About once a month, the Brundretts went by small sail boat to Lamar or Rockport for staple groceries.

Election days was a big occasion in the Brundrett household and Mr. "Manch," as he was called, was always in demand to help hold the election at Faulkner, 12

miles away. Mrs. Brundrett and the babies would accompany him in a two wheel gig.

Another diversion which the family enjoyed was hunting trips to Carlos City, midway between their ranch and Faulkner. They would load a big feather bed in the wagon for the children, along with plenty of food and the wash pots, and then they would be off. Sometimes they were gone for as long as a week to hunt deer and wild turkeys.

The after supper pastime was playing dominoes or checkers, and on very special occasions there would be a dance or a "social" at Lamar.

When the children became of school age, they employed a governess for them. A little later, two more Brundrett families moved to the peninsula, the John Brundretts and the George Brundretts, so a small school house was built and "Manch" was one of the three trustees.

In 1917, the J. W. Brundretts moved to Rockport where Mrs. Brundrett became active in church, school and civic circles.

She still maintains a home in Rockport, but spends a good part of her time visiting her children and grandchildren in various parts of the state, since her husband's death in 1940.

She had eight children, seven of whom are still living. They include a son, Elmo Brundrett of Rockport; six daughters, Mrs. George Sorenson of Palacios, Mrs. Fred Mires of Taft, Mrs. Lloyd Smith of Rockport, Mrs. D. L. Knight of Falfurrias; Mrs. W. A. Kell of Premont; Mrs. Ingle Turner of Woodboro. She has 20 grandchildren and 17 great-grandchildren.

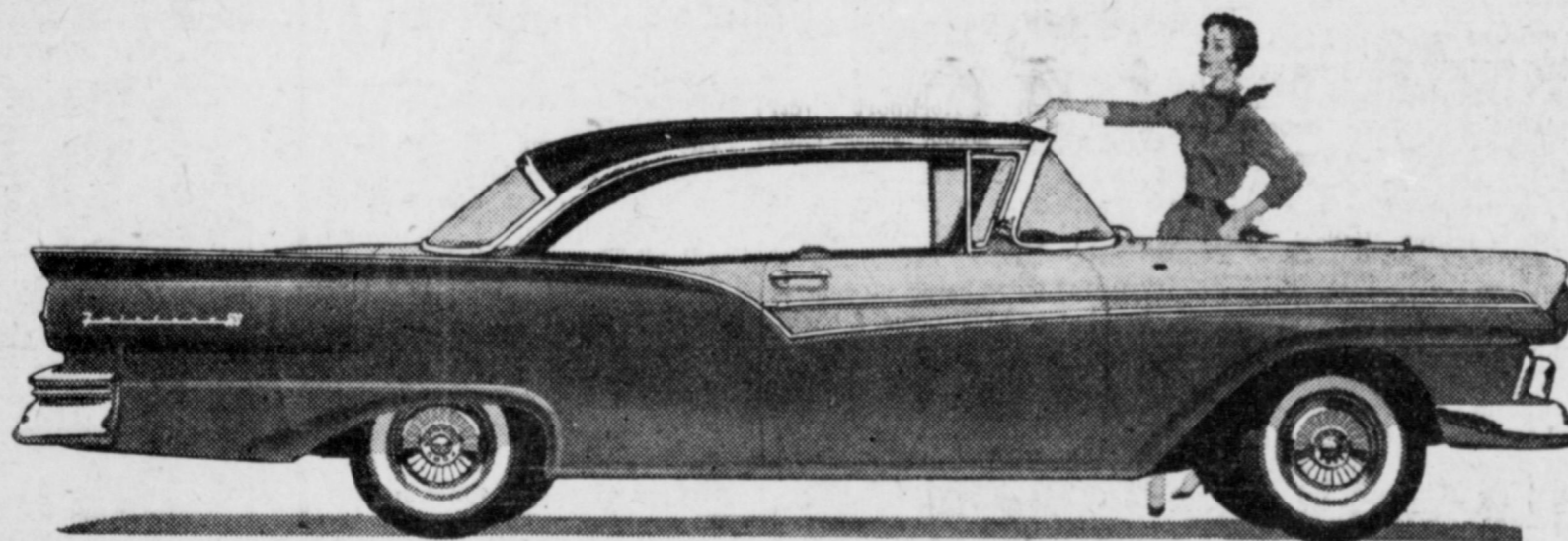
Miss Ballou and Mr. Isaacs will be married Dec. 23 at the First Baptist Church.

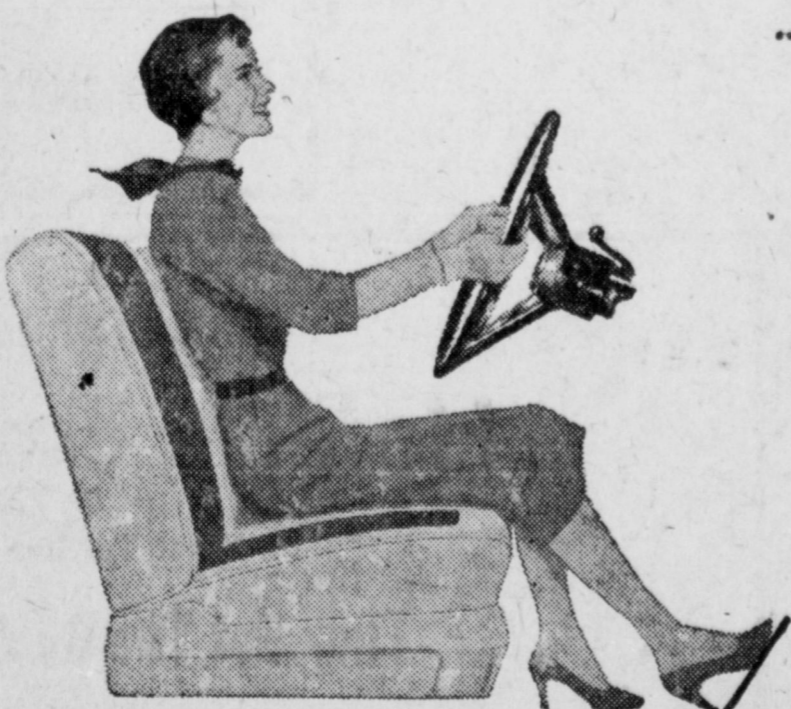
