Prospects for a commercial fishery for yellowfin tuna in the Gulf of Mexico become brighter with every trip of the U. S. Fish and square feet, large lot, with large Wildlife Service vessel Oregon, as Summer home on bay shore distribution and abundance of these

The Oregon, which has made 41 trips throughout the Gulf in the last few years, has just docked with 35 tons of yellowfins, taken on twenty sets of long-line gear, in addition to large numbers of great game fish of the sea, that inhabit the same waters where

the yellowfins are found. Harvey Bullis, Chief of Gulf Fisheries Exploration, in charge of the Oregon says that the cruise was divided into two parts. From Nov. Miss Jean Mullinax, on her 16 to Dec. 3, two sets of 670 hooks

Average weight of the tuna in the Campeche area was 76 pounds compared to 123 pounds in the northern Gulf.

Beween December 3-13, ten sets were made in an area 30 to 40 miles southeast of South Pass, at the mouth of the Mississippi. Catch rates were excellent here, varying from 3.7 to 8.6 yellowfins per hundred hooks, and during the first seven days of the trip, 25 tons were landed.

The tuna ranged in weight from 15 to 185 pounds, and averaged 116 pounds for the entire 30-day trip. Twelve percent of the tuna were damaged by sharks, but the remaining whole yellowfins weighed 61,844 pounds.

Of interest to sportmen was the remainder of the catch. The lines brought in 9 broadbill swordfish, weighing 1330 pounds, 11 white skipjacks, 7 blackfin tuna, 35 white marlin, 4 blue marlin, 14 wahoo, and 107 sharks of five species.

In addition, large surface schools of mixed blackfin tuna and white skipjack were observed daily, and large schools of spawning mullet were observed in 750 fathoms.

Bait fish used were menhaden and croakers, and the catch was considerably higher, by about 4-to-1 when the menhaden were



Unfortunately however, there is nothing static in this world of ours and all things change. Humanity grows old and departs; the work of men's hands serves its purpose and is replaced; even rock disintergrates and becomes dust again. And while the eighty-fiveyear-old seat of Aransas County's affairs is something we all hold dear, still, no one will deny that the old building is woefully inadequate for even today's needs. Nor can it be successfully repaired nor added to. Maintenance is extremely costly. Its stairs much too steep for the elderly, who must on occasion go there, facilities for women-who more and more become active in government-are non-existant, its jail cannot hold desperate felons—as was just recently evidenced.
