Dr. Sabin Seeks Oral Vaccine Against Polio

A new polio vaccaine that might be swallowed as a pill or mixed in a glass of milk is now closer to realization as a result of the work of Dr. Albert B. Sabin of

the University of Cincinnati, Ohio. Emphasizing that his new vaccine is still in the experimental stages of limited testing, Dr. Sabin urged widespread use of the Salk vaccine saying: "the Salk vaccine is the only polio vaccine available for public use at this time and advantage should be taken of its protective effects to the maximum of its availability."

Using a new technique to isolate live virus polio strains, Dr. Sabin reported recently on the development of a vaccine comby the National Foundation since 1940 at a cost of more than one


