MoPac officials in Houston said all the schedules into Corpus Christi and to the Rio Grande Valley are being discontinued because of lack of patronage.

Daily round-trip schedules from Corpus Christi which are being dropped include seven to Houston, five to Brownsville and three to Refugio.

CPL HAVING METERS TESTED

All electric meters in Rockport-Fulton-Lamar are being tested by representatives of the Texas Meter and Device Company B. T. Hardeman, Central Power and Light Company manager, has announced.

These tests are a special service provided by C P & L to supplement the regular meter maintenance work of the Company's own personnel, Hardeman, explained.

The Texas Meter and Device Company has its headquarters in Waco, Texas and specializes in this type of work. A crew of experts double-checks each meter for accuracy, cleans faces and dials for easier reading, and otherwise sees that the meter is in top condition. If repairs are needed, the meter is replaced.

Hardeman emphasized that Central Power and Light Company has its own meter department, fully equipped and staffed, and that the testing and maintenance of meters is a continuous process. He pointed out that the Waco crew's work is in the nature of an audit.

Customers whose meters are locked up are requested to cooperate with the meter test crew by making them accessible for inspection.

Jaycees Plan House Numbering

The Aransas Co. Jaycees are planning a house numbering project. They have ordered house numbers in accordance with plans adopted and approved by the City Council.

Numbers will be ready in about two weeks and will be placed on the houses by the Jaycees. There will be no charge to the residents of Rockport, but anyone wishing to contribute to a fund to help take care of the cost of the house numbers may do so.

The advantages of having houses numbered are: To aid tourist and visitors; for future postal delivery; for telephone directory; for permanent city maps.

State Park Board Sees Goose Island

Members of Group Given Conducted Tour of Park's Facilities Before Being Entertained With a Fish Fry By Local Aransas County Parks Association

State Park Board members were entertained by the Aransas County Parks Association with a fish fry on Sunday, and heard an able presentation by Seth H. Steele, chairman of the local organization, on the needs of Goose Island State Park.

Car Check Now Should Avoid Rush

State safety inspection officers warned Saturday that Rockport motorists should have their vehicles checked immediately to avoid the usual yearly rush.

Last year most motorists waited until the last moment and had to wait hours to have their cars inspected as required by state law.

Deadline for obtaining the new 1957 sticker, at a dollar a throw, is April 15. Failure to obtain the sticker can result in arrest and fines up to \$200.

Cars must be checked for adequate brakes, lights, horn and steering. Any mechanical failure which might result in an accident must be repaired before the safety sticker can be issued.

The inspection stations, garages and service stations can be identified by a safety inspection sign placed in plain view.

JUDGE WENDELL FINES DWI

Edward Joseph Bruney, of Aransas Pass, pled guilty to a DWI charge in county court Monday.

Judge John D. Wendell fined him \$50 and \$21 costs; sentenced him to three days in jail, and suspended his driver's license for six months.

Damage Suit Against Local Deputy Tried In Federal Court

A jury began deliberating at 9:30 a. m. today on whether Samuel Dennis, 48-year-old Rockport Negro, was deprived of his civil rights Sept. 18, 1955, when Deputy Sheriff W. L. (Slim) Haynes struck him with a pistol.

Testimony and arguments to the jury were completed in the three-day-old trial yesterday afternoon in federal district court in Corpus Christi.

Judge James V. Allred presented an oral charge to the jury and dismissed it until this morning.

Dennis is seeking \$50,000 damages as a result of the blow which, he claims, left him permanently injured. The original suit, filed against Haynes and three others, asked for \$100,000. The other three were dismissed as defendants, and Dennis' attorneys yesterday asked for \$50,000 damages.

Testimony during the trial brought out that Haynes was arresting Dennis on a charge of disturbing the peace a few days earlier and that he had a warrant for the arrest when he struck the Negro with a pistol.

The plaintiff alleged Haynes called him a "smart damn nigger looking for rights" when Dennis asked why he was arrested and that Haynes wrongfully struck him, resulting in permanent injury.

Haynes, on the witness stand yesterday morning, said Dennis resisted the arrest, grabbed the deputy's blackjack, breaking the leather strap on it. Haynes then took his pistol from its holster and hit Dennis with it, he said. Haynes also testified that Dennis smelled and acted like a drunk man.

In presenting his charge to the jury, Allred said the defendant had a duty to arrest Dennis if he had a warrant "and to use

The Board, headed by Chairman Andrew Howsley, of Albany, was taken on a conducted tour of the area, after being oriented on park problems by Steele before a big map of the park.

The meeting was the outcome of an earlier trip in which the local group contacted the Park Board at its last meeting in Austin, making for increased facilities at Goose Island, pointing out that the park's attendance — 147,000 in 1956 — was second largest of any state park. If facilities were provided to adequately care for this number of people, Steele asserted, Goose Island should support itself.

Improvements desired by the County Park Association include twelve camp shelters at an estimated cost of \$9000; twenty-five concrete picnic tables and grills, \$1750; seven dry-pit latrines, constructed to health department standards, \$4200; shell roads and parking at the shelters, \$1300; other shell roads and parking areas through the park, \$2500; one modern latrine, with a septic tank and sanitary field, \$4500; water system for the mainland area devoted to picnicking, \$2000; power lines and necessary wiring, \$500; fencing, including three cattle guards, \$2250; tractor, grader and mower for park maintenance, \$2,500; and \$1500 for clearing brush.

Bill Collins, executive secretary of the Park Board, said that the Board had asked for a budget of \$1.8 million for the next two years, of which \$16,000 would be allotted to Goose Island, if the appropriation was not cut in legislative finance committees.

From this, presumably (although Collins didn't say so) must come the salary for the park manager during the next biennium, and all that can be expended on facilities of the park will be the difference between his total salary and whatever the legislature finally allows.

In the past two years this has been the pitifully small sum of \$450 annually.

Andrew H. Howsley, who was introduced by County Judge John D. Wendell, and other members of the Board all promised to do everything possible to develop better facilities for Goose Island, but pointed out that the final word on what could be spent lay in the hands of the finance committee of the legislature, now in session.

Howsley, Collins, Steele, and other members of the Board were all enthusiastic in their praise of the outstanding job being done by Park Manager Albert Wofford.

Parish Asks Salt Water Game Fund

Rep. Harold Parish of Taft has asked the Legislature to require the state comptroller to set up a fund especially earmarked for salt water game conservation work.

"I propose that we set aside 40 percent of the Game and Fish Commission's income from the state's royalty on mud shell," Parish said. "This money could be used to establish coastal passes to salt-water fishing areas, for research and for salt water fish hatcheries."

Parish said the Game and Fish Commission's royalty on oyster shell dredging is up to \$250,000 a year.

A recent report by the Game and Fish Commission said it wants to start soon on a long-range expansion of its hunting and fishing programs, including a license for system overhaul to finance the changes.

The commission's announced plan includes state-wide renovation of fresh water lakes, coastal passes to salt-water fishing areas and an "ambitious" wildlife restoration program.

The commission proposed a license bill that would make children, the only exemptions, and said it probably will ask a \$2.15 hunting license for small game only. \$5.50 license would be necessary for deer, turkey and antelope hunters.

Parish says any opposition to his proposal that 40 percent of the shell royalty be earmarked for salt water game work "will come from the Game and Fish Commission — if there is any opposition."

He added that sportsmen in other areas "want salt water work financed by a salt water fishing license."

"We'll oppose that until the Coast gets its fair share of the present Game and Fish income," he said.

He Remembers The Subways —

Local Octogenarian Helped Link Brooklyn-N.Y.

Next September, Fred Booth will be 88 and, while still active, he admits that he isn't quite as spry as he was back in 1907 when he helped drive the first subways under the Hudson River, linking New Jersey and New York.

"There were two tubes," he said, "each 16 feet in diameter. They started over in New Jersey and wound up at Gimbel's store, in downtown Manhattan."

Mr. Booth's part of the job was installing the third rail from which the subway trains drew electrical power, and he laid 37 miles of this, crossing beneath the river four times.

"I never had anything to do with actually digging either of the tunnels," he said, "but we were always close behind the men who did, and saw how it was done. The holes under the river, about a mile long, were tunneled from either shore at the same time, and, when they met under the bed of the Hudson, had been engineered so perfectly that they were only 3/4 inch out of line with each other."

These tunnels, he continued, were lined with giant tubes of cast iron, built up of curved segments, 18 inches wide and three feet long, bolted together with

two inch bolts, after the joint had been buttered with a compound made of iron fillings and acid.

When the seams had been calked with this preparation, which caused the segments to rust to together, and the great bolts drawn tight, the subway tube was ready for use, and practically indestructible.

As the tunnels pressed forward under the river, only a system of looms to contain air at high pressure kept the mud of the river bottom and the water above it from entering the tubes. A circular shield at the working end of the tube was jacked forward into the rock and clay remaining to be excavated, little by little, and the spoil was removed. Then a new section of cast iron segments was bolted in place and thus, 18 inches at a time, the subways were excavated from one river bank to the other, passing under the Hudson, which formed part of the waterways surrounding New York.

After the tracks were laid, one of the most efficient safety systems in the work was installed, making it practically impossible for the subways to have a wreck. However, there was another

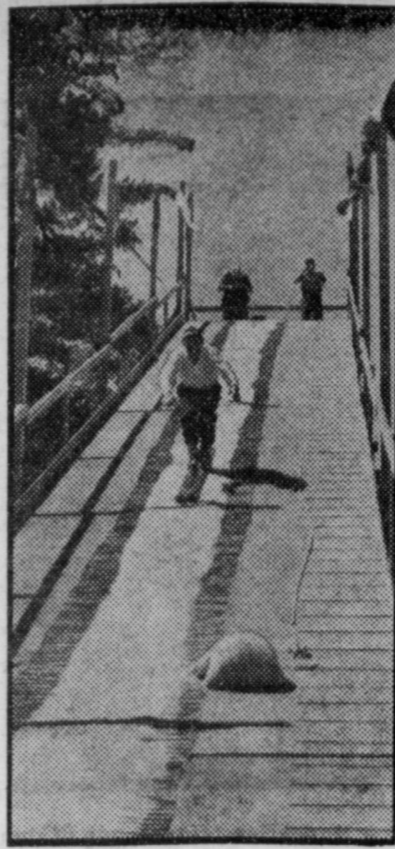
bugaboo that the engineers had to figure upon, Mr. Booth said. That was power failure.

"When the system was operating," he said, "there were always two trains of eight cars each under the river, and at capacity they carried about 1600 persons. If the power had failed, and there was no air supply, all those people would have smothered."

"As long as the trains ran, they furnished their own ventilation. They acted like pistons, pushing stale air out of the tubes ahead of them, and dragging fresh air in behind. Underground, you could feel a wall of air as much as 1000 yards ahead of a train."

"But there had to be pumps that could furnish air to all those people if the trains stopped, and there were giant stand-by installations always ready."

Mr. Booth came to Rockport eighteen years ago, while he was still a young fellow of seventy.

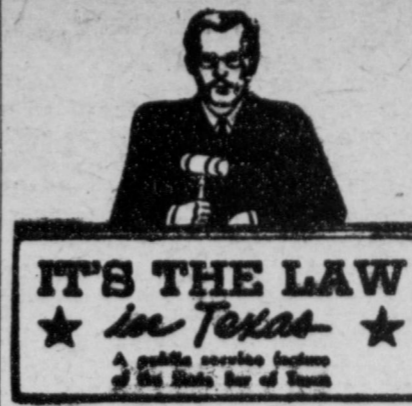

Income Tax Information

Under the provisions of the federal Internal Revenue Act, all persons who have a gross income over \$600 must file income tax returns, except if the taxpayer is 65 or older he need not file a return unless he has gross income over \$1,200. This is because persons who are 65 or older have two exemptions which automatically eliminate any tax liability for income under \$1,200.

All federal tax returns for individuals must be filed on or before April 15. Although many persons believe that a tax return need only be postmarked by the due date, such is not the intent of the statute. The returns are supposed to be in the office of the Internal Revenue Service by the due date specified.

Tax forms and instructions will be received by most persons during January. The instructions being distributed this year contain the following statement: "The Internal Revenue Service will mail Form 1040 ES, as far as is practical, to each person who may need it. Anyone else required to file should obtain the form from an Internal Revenue Service office in time to file by April 15, 1957."

Declarations of estimated tax are required from all persons

who expect gross income of more than \$400, plus \$600 times the number of exemptions which may be claimed, if more than \$100 of the income will not be subject to withholding.

Single persons with more than \$5,000 and married persons with more than \$10,000 expected gross income must file declarations of estimated tax even though all of the income is subject to withholding.

Declarations of estimated tax, except those for farmers, must be filed by April 15. Like the income tax return, this date is one month later than the deadline for years before the new Revenue Act went into effect. However, the final dates for quarterly installment payments remain the same — April 15, June 15, September 15, and the last one on January 15 of the following year.

If a person, other than a farmer, desires to file his income tax return and pay his tax in full, he may do this on or before January 15 instead of paying his last quarterly installment. It does not relieve anyone from filing the original declaration of estimated tax and making three payments on it. However, in most cases this provision does remove

the possibility of a penalty for an under estimate of tax liability.

Farmers have special provisions concerning declaration of estimated tax, and may postpone the filing of any estimate until February 15 of the following year.

The penalty for underpayment of tax liability on the declaration of estimated tax was reduced by the 1954 act. There is no underpayment if the taxpayer remits at least 70% of his tax as shown on his final tax return. If there is an underpayment, the penalty is 6% per annum interest on the additional amount which should have been remitted. It is expected that there will be more strict enforcement of this provision in the future by the Internal Revenue Service.

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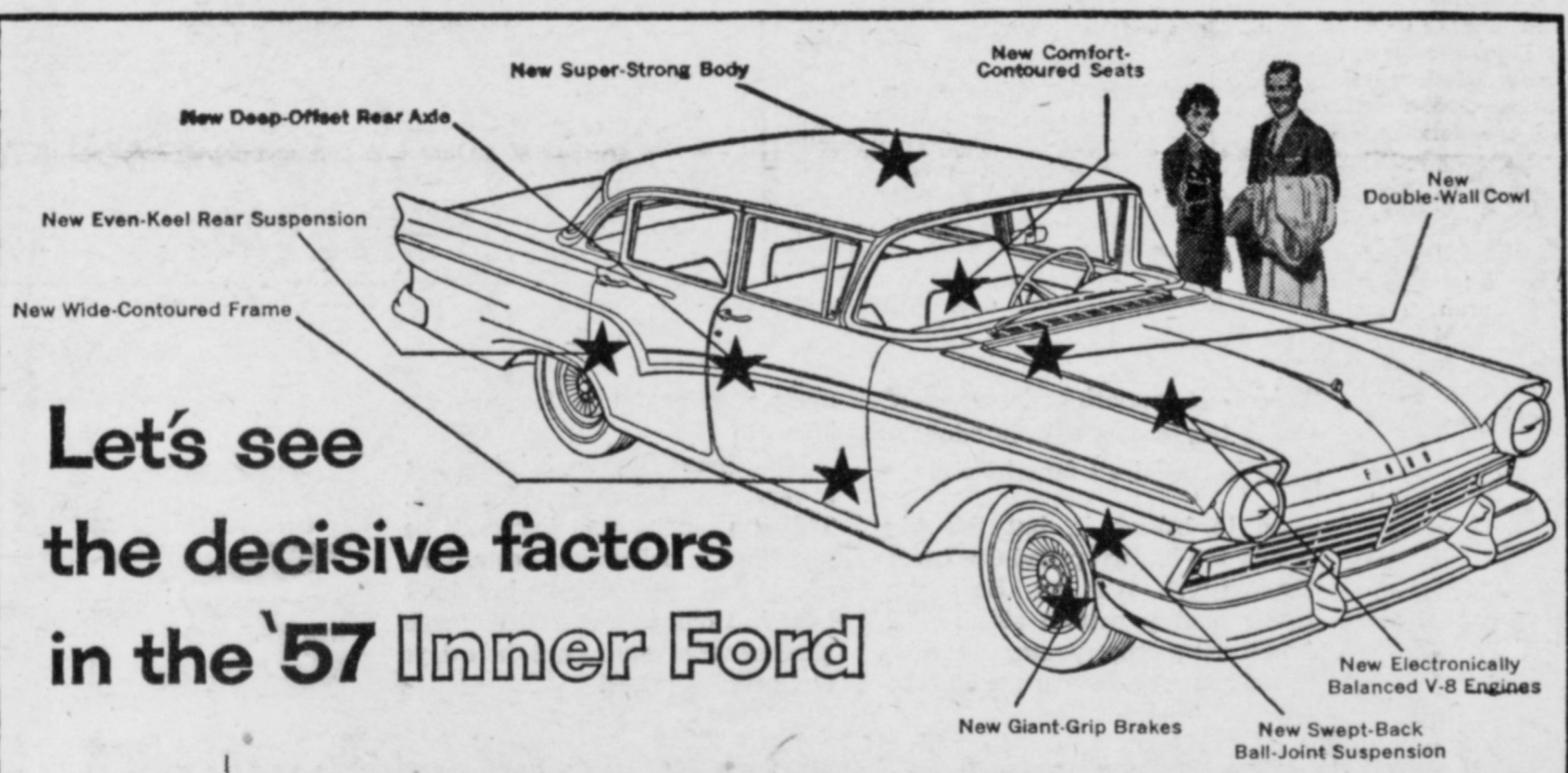
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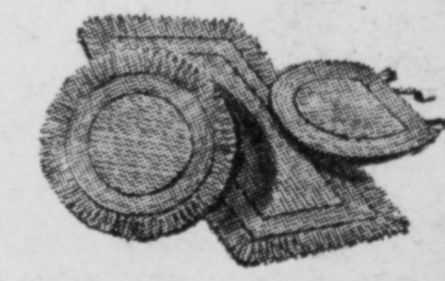

The Red Cross, serving sufferers since the beginnings of the uprising, in distribution of food, medicine, clothing and other necessities, in Vienna and Budapest, is launching a campaign for \$5,000,000 in this country to meet costs of the mammoth humanitarian program. By the end of the year the Red Cross will be feeding over 200,000 victims daily in Hungary, besides supplying needed clothing, fuel and medical supplies.

February 5 Last Day For Veterans To Bid On Land Tracts

Austin — Texas veterans were reminded Friday that they have only until February 5th to submit bids on 56 tracts of land which the Veterans' Land Board has for sale.

Land Commissioner Earl Rudder, who is chairman of the VLB, explained that — unlike normal procedure in the Veterans' Land Program — veterans are not required to obtain an application number to purchase any of these tracts.

The lands to be sold, which are located in all sections of the state, have been forfeited by original owners who purchased the property through the Veterans' Land Program.

Commissioner Rudder urged veterans who are interested in this sale to inquire immediately of the Veterans' Land Board in Austin for information.

Pacific said the Texas Railroad Commission refused to permit them to change their schedules as provided in their ICC certificate.

Midwest Bus Lines, which employed 35 drivers, operated the service. The lines recently were purchased by Trammell Crow a Dallas businessman.

A Midwest official who asked not to be named said the service from West Columbia to Corpus Christi and Brownsville was dropped because some parts of it could not be abandoned. These included the routes to Port Lavaca and Old-Ocean, which were profitable when used by construction workers 10 years ago, but which have been losing out to private car transportation since 1950.

Southwestern Greyhound Lines Inc., filed application with the Railroad Commission to take over two South Texas routes abandoned by the Missouri Pacific Transportation Co.

Bryan Bell, motor transportation division director of the commission, said no hearing date has been set for the application. He said the commission would set the rates but probably they would be the same as those set previously for the routes.

The Corpus Christi-Brownsville route also would include a cut-off. The application specified one route from Corpus Christi through Robstown, Riviera, Raymondville to Brownsville. The other would be a cut-off east from Riviera through Falfurrias, Edinburg, Mission, McAllen, Mercedes, Harlingen, Los Fresnos to Brownsville.

The Houston - Corpus Christi route and return would pass through Angleton, Gregory on State 35 to Corpus Christi.

Marine News

According to an announcement to the local notice to mariners issued by Commander Eighth Coast Guard district, the U. S. Corps of Engineers, Galveston, advised 18 December 1956 as follows:

"Navigation interests are advised that firing practice will be conducted on the gunnery ranges of the U. S. Naval Air Station, Corpus Christi, Texas, from 7:00 a. m. to 4:30 p. m. on the following days: 7, 8, 9, 18, 21, 22, 29, 30 and 31 January 1957.

Mariners are cautioned to avoid the following described area in Laguna Madre in which projectiles may fall:

"The area has as its northerly and southerly limits, respectively, lines drawn at 90 degrees from the centerline of the Gulf Intracoastal Waterway at latitude 27°31'12"N., longitude, 37°20'07"W. (Mile 575.2), and extending in a westerly direction to the westerly shore of Laguna Madre. The easterly and westerly limits, respectively, are the westerly edge of the Gulf Intracoastal Waterway and the easterly shore of Laguna Madre.

"A large red flag will be displayed from an elevated position in the immediate vicinity of the firing point from which firing is being conducted.

"The channel proper of the Gulf Intracoastal Waterway is out of range of the firing and navigation therein will not be affected by the firing practice.

According to a recent announcement by the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service, the shrimp catch in Texas declined to one million pounds in the Aransas-Rockport area during November, the last month of record.

This decline, the service said,

was due to departure of about 30 boats from Texas to fish out of Florida west coast ports, and due to the fact that weather conditions were bad all along the Texas coast.

Shrimp catches from the Brownsville-Port Isabel area also leveled off in November, with a total catch of 1.7 million pounds, down about a half million from October.

Shrimp in the 15-20 classification predominated in catches made during the last two weeks of the month, and prices were steady and high.

Finfish production was high, because of the start of the winter fishing season, and conversion of bay shrimp boats to finfish fishing. Many buyers were forced to stop buying because of the light demand during the latter part of the month.

Fish prices were low, but what hurt fishermen most was lack of a market at any price. Thousands of pounds of red snapper were landed during the period, and often went begging for a buyer.

Shrimp landings along the Texas coast in December dropped 1,030,000 pounds of tails over November, to 2,038,000, with Brownsville producing almost half the total.

Galveston was low, with 38,000 pounds; Sabine Pass and Port Arthur, 48,000 pounds; Port Lavaca and Palacios, 74,000 pounds; Freeport, 98,000 pounds; Rockport-Fulton, 160,000 pounds; Aransas Pass and Corpus Christi, 618,000 pounds; Port Isabel, 799,000 pounds; and Brownsville tops with 1,003,000 pounds.

Oyster landings in the same period amounted to 2687 barrels from Galveston and 6569 from the Sabine Pass-Port Arthur region.

Finfish landings were 41,000 pounds at Galveston and Freeport during December; 6000 pounds in the Port Lavaca-Palacios region; 137,000 pounds from Port Isabel;

and 22,000 from Sabine Pass and Port Arthur.

The Tidewater Oil Company has applied for a permit to operate in Aransas Bay, at locations on State tracts 119, 124, and 125, central to a point 1 1/2 miles northeast of Fulton. A department of the Army blanket permit has been asked, authorizing erection and maintenance of structures to be used in connection with drilling of wells, and work at each well site would consist of driving eight 3-pile dolphins and sinking a drilling barge, erecting a derrick having a top elevation of 173 feet above mean low water, and constructing a protective structure.

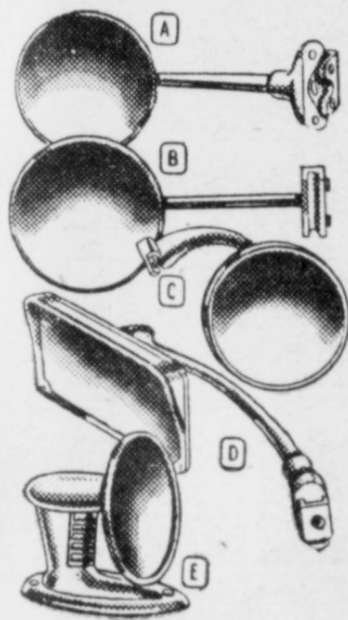

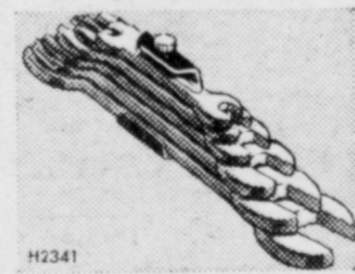

Pollution of Coastal Waters Can Be Federal Offense Say Engineers

Pollution of coastal waters can be a Federal offense, according to a notice issued by the Corps of Engineers, U. S. Army, who recently issued the following notice:

Navigation interests are advised that refuse matter has been deposited in the inland and coastal waters of the United States in the Galveston District and oil has been discharged into these waters from vessels and from shore in violation of Federal statutes. These

deposits have contaminated the waters and beaches and have prevented the full enjoyment by many of the recreational and commercial advantages provided by nature. For the information and guidance of all concerned, extracts from applicable laws are quoted below:

"It shall not be lawful to throw, discharge, or deposit, or cause, suffer, or procure to be thrown, discharged, or deposited either from or out of any ship, barge or other floating craft of any kind, or from the shore, wharf, manufacturing establishment, or mill of any kind, any refuse matter of any kind or description whatever other than that flowing from streets and sewers and passing therefrom in a liquid state, into any navigable water of the United States, or into any tributary water from which the same shall float or be washed into such navigable water; * * *

"It shall not be lawful to deposit, or cause, suffer, or procure to be deposited material of any kind in any place on the bank of any navigable water or on the bank of a tributary of any navigable water, where the same shall be liable to be washed into such navigable water, either by ordinary or high tides, or by storms or floods, or otherwise, whereby navigation shall or may be impeded or obstructed: * * *

"Except in case of emergency imperiling life or property, or unavoidable accident, collision, or stranding, and except as otherwise permitted by regulations prescribed by the Secretary as hereinafter authorized, it shall be unlawful for any person to discharge, or suffer, or permit the discharge of oil by any method, means, or manner into or upon the coastal navigable waters of the United States from any vessel using oil as fuel for the generation or propulsion of power, or any vessel carrying or having oil thereon in excess of that necessary for its lubricating requirements and such as may be required under the laws of the United States and the rules and regulations prescribed thereunder."

"The term 'oil' means oil of any kind or in any form, including fuel oil, oil sludge and oil refuse."

"The term 'person' means an

individual, partnership, corporation, or association; any owner, master, officer or employee of a vessel; and any officer, agent or employee of the United States;"

"The term coastal navigable waters of the United States" means all portions of the sea within the territorial jurisdiction of the United States; and all inland waters navigable in fact in which the tide ebbs and flows;"

"The term 'Secretary' means the Secretary of the Army."

The law provides for fines ranging from \$500 to \$2,500 or for prison sentences ranging from 30 days to one year, or both, for violation of the above laws. Penalties also include revocation of licenses of masters, pilots and engineers or other persons acting in such capacities on board of any boat or vessel engaged in unlawful dumping or oil pollution.

The cooperation of all is solicited in the preservation and protection of navigable waters in order that they may yield the greatest benefits to each and every one whether his interest be in navigation, food or sports fishing, hunting or recreation.

Radar Aid Saves Taxpayers Money

The taxpayers of Oklahoma, Texas, Louisiana and Arkansas received a bonus during 1956 from the 33rd Air Defense Division according to Brigadier Gen. Wm. P. Nuckols, the 33rd Commander.

The primary job of the 33rd is to protect this four-state area from enemy air attack. The job is done through the eyes of the Division's 24-hour a day radar warning system. It is the radar operators who maintain this constant search for enemy aircraft who have directed other aircraft which were in distress to a safe landing. It is this secondary function which has meant a bonus to the taxpayers.

Last year it cost the taxpayers \$11 million to operate the four-state air defense net of the 33rd. During the same period, the defense system, as an extra service to the taxpayers, saved 67 aircraft which were in distress and the lives of 89 persons. The aircraft were valued at some \$22 million. Compared to the 33rd's annual operating budget, that's a net profit of \$11 million.

The aircraft saved during the year included Navy and Air Force planes and ranged from trainers to B-47 Stratofortresses. There were many more aircraft which were given assists by the radar system but are not credited as definite saves.

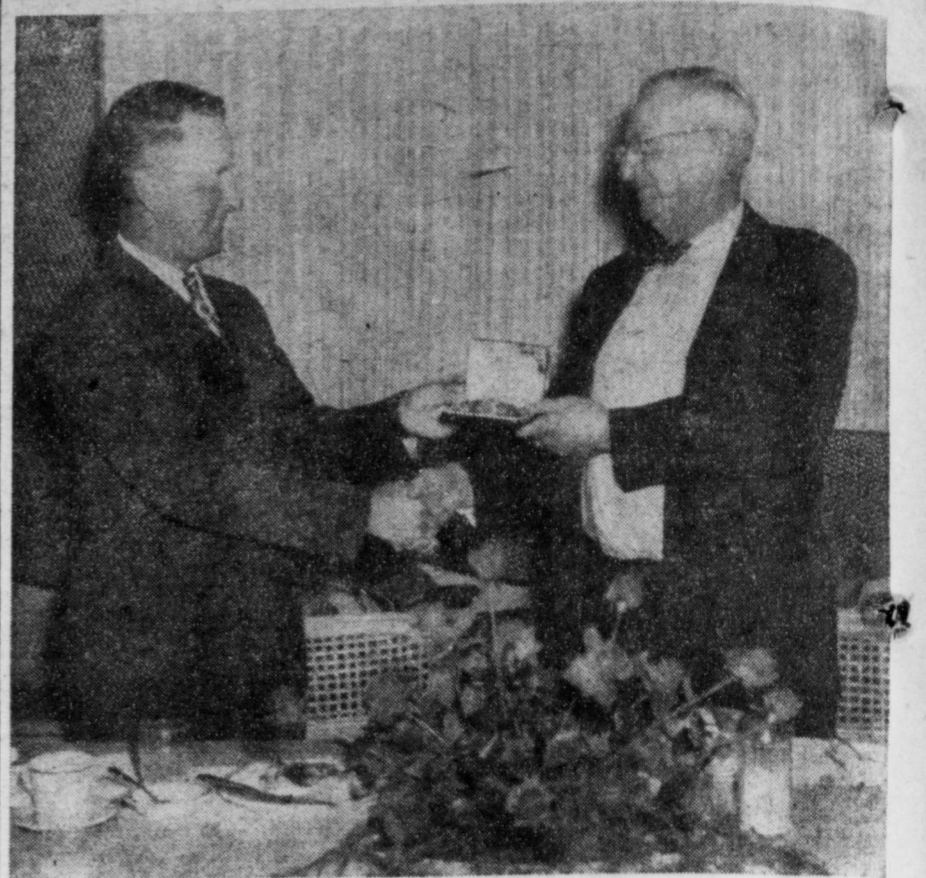
