Arthur Bracht was given a standing vote of thanks for his work as president this past year, and Matt Scott and Seth Steele, both outgoing directors, were also given recognition for their work with the chamber.

Ellis L. Clark reported on the legislative committee's efforts on behalf of the chamber, and recommended that the organization familiarize itself with issues coming before the 85th Congress. Too much government in competition with private business, too high taxes, uncertainty, inflation, and lack of public education in these matters were all things that needed to be considered, he said.

Mrs. Juergens, chamber manager, reported that entertainment for the occasion would be furnished by five men from the 813th Radar Squadron, which will be stationed here later, after construction of the AC&W station at Aransas County Airport.

These men were contacted through Major D. L. Graff, commanding officer of the 747th AC&W Squadron at Ellington Air Force Base, who has also been in charge of construction here.

Mayor Chester Johnson, and Steele to contact legislative appropriation committees on funds for development of Goose Island State Park.

While in Austin, Sheriff Shivers also contacted Colonel Homer P. Garrison, head of the State Highway Patrol, again asking that a pair of highway patrolmen be assigned a post in Aransas County.

Colonel Garrison did not commit himself, other than to promise a fresh survey of the situation.

According to Borchert's letter 23 schools will be represented, and ten trophies and 43 medals will be given to winners in the various events.

## ARANSAS COUNTY PAYS 1130 POLL TAXES FOR 1957

Aransas County citizens paid an unexpectedly high percentage of poll taxes for 1957. There were 1130 paid, against about 1740 last year, and six exemptions granted. One reason for the number was the fact that there have been rumors of a local option election aimed at alcoholic beverages.

## CONGRESS PASSES BILL TO PAY FOR DEFERRED GRAZING

According to a telegram received yesterday from Congressman John Young, the House of representatives passed, as amended, a bill to provide for payments to farmers and stockmen on a deferred grazing program. The vote was 207 to 108. This bill was introduced by Congressman Poage of Texas, Congressman John Young, and other Texas congressmen.

## Million Allotted Intracoastal Canal

The President's budget message, submitted to Congress on January 16, recommended that \$1,048,000 be allotted to the Texas portion of the Intracoastal Canal for operation and maintenance during 1957.

In addition to these amounts recommended specifically for the Gulf Intracoastal Waterway, the Budget proposed the expenditure of substantial sums for the improvement of deep-water channels in Texas which coincide with the Intracoastal Canal. The Sabine-Neches Waterway was allotted \$980,000, the Houston Ship Channel \$1,000,000, the Port Aransas-Corpus Christi Waterway \$1,000,000, and Brazos Island Harbor \$1,000,000. Furthermore, \$1,400,000 was recommended for the new Corpus Christi Bridge, completion of which will make possible the removal of the old bascule lift bridge, which has long been a serious hazard and obstruction to waterways traffic.

All of these sums represent new construction funds, and their appropriation by Congress will assure continued progress in the improvement and development of the Intracoastal Canal system. Millions of dollars in additional funds were recommended for maintenance and operation.

Author of Book On Birds In Literature Is Rockport Visitor

"Chaucer and Milton were great English poets, but very poor ornithologists," said Dr. Thomas P. Harrison, whose book "They Tell of Birds" has recently been published by the University of Texas Press.

Harrison — visiting nationally-known birdwatcher Mrs. Jack Hagar here, in the bird capital of America — is a member of the University's English Department, where he exposes sophomores to literature and upper classmen to the beauties of English poetry.

Hence his book could only be a study of birds in 17th Century literature — it's just as simple as that!

Four essays — one each by Milton, Spenser, Chaucer and Michael Drayton — were the target of Dr. Harrison's research.

"It was a study of the writings of these men," he said, "and of the birds they mentioned, but, more than that, it was a study of the men themselves, and how much they actually knew about birds. I'm afraid that most of them had an aesthetic appreciation and but little more.

Now that his first book has been completed, Dr. Harrison plans to write another on birds and Nineteenth Century poets, and is studying them to see if they were any better ornithologists than Spenser and Drayton.

"Most poets are so wrapped up in being poets that they're pretty poor naturalists," Harrison explained.

Take "Shelley's Ode to A Skylark" — about nine-tenths of this is Shelley and only about a tenth is the skylark, so it doesn't give too good a picture of the bird. Browning was another excellent poet who was a poor ornithologist. He mentions more birds than any of his fellow Nineteenth Century poets, but he was no more accurate when speaking of them than was John Keats.

However, not all lyricists are total losses as birdwatchers. Gerard Manley Hopkins, a Jesuit priest, has written a beautiful and much discussed sonnet on the windhover, which is the English equivalent of our sparrow hawk. Harrison said this sonnet could have been written only by someone thoroughly familiar with the little hawk. George Meredith (better known as a novelist) wrote excellent poetry on birds, and so did John Clare, a little-known contemporary of Keats.

Dr. Harrison spent a summer in England while writing his book and was impressed by the wide appreciation shown there for birds, both in the literature and in sanctuaries. The Britons are more interested in research such as he has been doing, Harrison said, and pointed to the fact that James Fisher, one of England's top ornithologists, is also concerned with poetry dealing with birds.

**Weather Man Makes Hurricane Survey**

The Weather Bureau, according to Russell Mozeney, of the Corpus Christi weather station, is engaged in making a survey of possible potential property damage and loss of life along the sea coasts of the Atlantic and Gulf, from Hatteras to Brownsville, if a super-duper hurricane should hit.

"The Bureau at Washington," Mozeney said, "feels that with the increase of sea coast populations, many of them who have never experienced a really bad tropical blow, some preliminary planning is badly needed by citizens and counties along the coast."

Increased building, by people unfamiliar with the terrific power unleashed by such storms could well bring about tremendous property destruction, especially as more and more people are building next to the water's edge, and with such destruction would go, or could go, considerable loss of life.

To minimize such damage, the Washington Bureau has instructed weather men along the coasts to determine, if possible, heights to which water has risen in past storms, types of construction being used in various localities, what sort of zoning has been set up by cities and counties, and similar information, which can be used as a basis for improved storm warnings.

Highest tides attained in the Rockport area, according to James A. Jarboe, county surveyor, came with the 1919 storm, that wrought such destruction along this coast and in Corpus Christi.

In Rockport, he said, waters reached a point on the old Prophet house, where Arthur Bracht was born, of 9.23 feet above normal. This was in a backwater, where there was no wave action to speak of.

However, along the waterfront, where waves rolled in from the bay, the height was greater. There is a place high up on the wall in the Rockport Electric where paint still refuses to stick, because salt water reached it in that storm. Another, in the office of Glass, Sorenson, and McDavid, about as high above the floors as a tall man can reach, marks the high water mark in that area.

Water levels, where the flow of the tide was impeded by buildings of the town, rose higher where than they did at Fulton. About where the Marine Laboratory stands, there was approximately ten or twelve feet of water in 1919. At Fulton, Jarboe said, where the tide had plenty of room, the highest level reached was only nine feet, and at Lamar, where the waters rolled out over the prairie, it dropped to only about six and a half feet above normal.

Great storms of this kind generally occur only once in several centuries as the usual rule, but there is no guarantee that they may not follow one another in the course of a few days.

**Ham Smith Celebrates 90th Year**

Aransas County's oldest native son celebrated his 90th birthday, February 1.

He is Hammond G. (Ham) Smith, the son of Capt. and Mrs. Francis M. Smith, who were among the earliest settlers in the area. Ham was born near where the Carbon Black Plant now operates, in the days when Aransas County was a part of Refugio County.

He attended local schools and then, still quite young, went to work on a ranch near the present location of Premont, driving cattle to market for several years. He moved to Corpus Christi as a carpenter for a short time; soon found a job at the Hall meat packery in Fulton.

In 1892 he married Miss Nina Olivia Canavero. After the birth of their second child, they moved to the Black Jack Peninsula, where he managed a small truck farm, raised milk cows and hogs.

Tired of the rugged life on Black Jack Peninsula, Ham longed to return to Fulton, so 12 years and four children later, he made the move.

He made a final trip to bring back some hogs on his scow, "The Bugaboo," on a cold, rainy day and the gasoline stove on the boat exploded.

He threw the flaming stove overboard, and, his clothes on fire, he jumped into the water himself. It was a year and a half before he could return to work.

His next move was to Rockport, still keeping his home in Aransas County. His family increased by one son in Fulton and after coming to Rockport, two more children were born, bringing the total to nine.

With so many mouths to feed, Ham never knew an idle moment. He sold his scow, "The Bugaboo" and bought the "Jerome Kirby," a two master, and carried on a general freight business, carrying supplies, groceries and lumber to Bayside and Tivoli.

He also knitted seines and made boat sails and engaged in seine fishing on a large scale.

During World War I, he set up a transfer and service car business in connection with the operation of a filling station.

When government boats were being built at Heldenfels Shipyard south of town, he took shifts of men to and from work, daily. As he was driving to the entrance of the shipyard one morning, a huge boiler exploded, tossing pieces of machinery and the bodies of several men through the air.

Smith remained active in business until 1952 when he turned over his filling station and small grocery to his daughter, Miss Sarahhelle Smith.

His wife died in 1951. Two of his nine children, Mrs. Leonard Casterline and Francis Smith, also are dead.

Six of his seven remaining children live in Rockport. They are Somer, Lloyd and Austin Smith, and Mrs. Fred C. Diederich, Mrs. A. L. Brundrett and Miss Sarahhelle Smith.

His eldest son, Tom Smith, lives in Houston. To help him celebrate his birthday, in addition to his children, his sons-in-law and daughter-in-law, there will be 17 grandchildren, 27 great-grandchildren and 4 great-great-grandchildren. Nearly all of them live in Aransas County or in the area. (Caller-Times)
