Up In Arms Over Bill

Texas shrimp fishermen are up in arms over a bill that they claim threatens destruction to the \$75 million shrimp fishery in the State of Texas.

Cause of the uproar is House Bill 610, authorized by Representative Harrington of Port Arthur, aimed at the regulation of catching and sale of shrimp from waters in Texas.

At an executive meeting called by the Texas Fisherman's Association in Galveston, it was pointed out that there are three main objections to the bill:

1. It reduces the size of shrimp trawls from the present sixty to one hundred feet across the mouth to only 35 feet, thus cutting the catch potential in half or less.


From time to time, some of our customers have kept a "diary" of telephone calls - calls they make and calls they receive.
