he blacked out, turned pale and, after regaining consciousness, was weak, shook all over, and had severe nervous headaches, and wanted to sleep.

Confirmation of this was offered by Mrs. Tommie Lee Matchett, Moore's older sister, and Mrs. John L. Jarrett, a next door neighbor to the Moore's. All three women said that under these conditions the youngster was "mentally upset" and at times was unable to control his actions or to tell right from wrong.

Concluding witness for the de fense was Dr. Enos Martin, assistant superintendent for the Austin State Hospital. Martin said that Moore exhibited symptoms of paranoid schizophrenia. He suffered from delusions of persecution, when he thought that people were talking about him or laughing at him, and heard voices which, Moore told the doctor, he would obey, no matter what they told him to do. He also told Martin that the leaves of trees talked to him, and that he had dizzy spells when he blacked out. At that time he refused the idea of an electroencepholagraph. Martin said that he tabbed

Moore as probably dangerous, and to be held under conditions of maximum security while in the hospital. However, he showed some signs of improvement, and at the end of the 90-day period was returned to Gatesville.

Miller read Martin the confession signed by Moore shortly after the Dosier killing in 1955, and asked him, judging by its wording and detail, whether he thought Moore was sane or insane when he made it. Dr. Martin said:

"I'd say he was sane."

The defense rested its case at this point and court was adourned until Tuesday morning, when the state presented its rebuttal witnesses, four law enforcement officers and a county attorney testified that they believed Moore was sane when he was arrested July 14 for Dosier's murder in May.







Under the new program, the six months active duty for training is open to men in the 181/2 through 25 years old age group. Previously the six-month active duty for training program was available only to the 17 to 181/2 year old group.

Enlistment in the Army Reserve is for a six-year period for these men in the 181/2 to 26 age range. The men will enter the active duty stage within 120 days of enlistment, and upon completion of this training will serve in the Ready Reserve for 51/2 years.


