Rockport's New City Hall Now Occupied

Rockport's new city hall, into which personnel moved on May 27. The building is of concrete block construction, with its foundation consisting of a monolithic concrete slab, 30 x 50, furnishing fifteen hundred square feet of floor space for the various offices. There is a main office, a council room, private offices for the city secretary and the water superintendent, the necessary washrooms, and a storage vault for records. Ceilings are of acoustical tile; interior walls are of mahogany paneling; windows are aluminum; and the floor is of asbestos tile. The grounds are being landscaped, and grass and shrubs are being planted as quickly as possible. The structure is located at the intersection of Broadway and Austin Street, just west of the Chamber of Commerce building.





the finder is not entitled to keep and not merely "mislaid."

In general, property is legally 'lost" when parted with involuntarily - through accident, neglect, forgetfulness or any other unintentional circumstance. Property PICTURE IN AIR is not lost in the legal sense when voluntarily left by the owner, in-

tending to pick it up later - even though he fails to do so. Such property is "mislaid." Thus, if one loses a watch on

it was dropped, it is legally "lost." The same is true of a fountain the finder owns what he has found against all but the true own-

On the other hand, a package left on the seat of a bus is "mislaid" rather than lost. In one





### BABILITY INSURANCE OR WORKERS AFTER AGE 50

Disability insurance will first be paid for the month of July to workers who are at least 50 years old and who have filed a proper application before then, according to District Manager H. M. Cleveland of the Social Security Administration. The amount of these payments is determined from the average monthly earnings of a worker in the same way the retirement insurance for older workers is figured.

To qualify under the disability provisions of the Social Security Act, two requirements must be met. One concerns a worker's past employment, and the other concerns his present ability to work.


