From Galveston the storm roared northward across Texas towards low-pressure trough, and then swung sharply to the northeast, drawing new life from the turbulent atmosphere over Lake Michigan and, crossing the St. Lawrence valley, moved out over the North Atlantic.

In the old days, hurricanes struck with little or no warning. As a result, great loss of life and property occurred because people in their path were unwarned until the storm was practically upon them

Today this has been changed. largely through work initiated through Willis L. Moore, former chief of the United States Weather. Bureau.

At the beginning of the Spanish-American war, Moore took a long, long look at the record and saw where more navies had been destroyed by weather than by the enemy.

President McKinley. after seeing Moore's evidence, said:

"I am more afraid of a West Indian hurricane than the whole Spanish fleet. Get this storm warning service inaugurated at the earliest possible moment.'




