## Deep Frio Find Tests In Aransas

Getty Oil Co. (Tidewater Oil Co.) No. 1 State Tract 124, Aransas County deep Frio gas distillate discovery 3 1/2 miles northeast of Rockport, was preparing to test other indicated gas and oil pays after showing gas-distillate from perforations at 9,360-65 feet.

The above section was tested under 7,000-foot water cushion and through 3/4-inch chokes. Water cushion hit the surface in eight minutes and gas in one hour. Top choke was changed to 12-64-inch and working pressure was 4,400 pounds.

Top choke was changed back to 1/2-inch and the project flowed gas and 53.6 gravity distillate throughout Thursday night with a working pressure of 2,900 pounds. Friday morning working pressure leveled off to 1,950 pounds and testing unit was attached.

On a two hour test through 1/2-inch chokes the project showed a working pressure of 950 pounds and flowed at the rate of 1.71 million cubic feet of gas daily plus 21.9 barrels of 54.4 gravity distillate a million. Gas-oil ratio was 45,609-1.

A three-hour test through 14-64-inch choke showed a working pressure of 2,000 pounds and flowed at the daily rate of 1.56 million cubic feet daily plus 24 barrels of distillate a million cubic feet of gas. Gas-distillate ratio was 41,700-1.

The project flowed gas at the daily rate of 1,348 million cubic feet plus 24.6 barrels of distillate on a two-hour test through 12-64-inch choke from perforations at 9,360-65 feet in 5 1/2-inch casing at 10,040 feet, 460 feet off bottom. Tubing pressure was 2,075 pounds and gas-distillate ratio 40,600-1. Twenty-one minute shut-in pressure was 2,800 pounds and 27-minute pressure was 2,995 pounds.

The discovery, which has indicated several pays, is on a 320-acre lease in Aransas Bay, one mile northeast of Fulton.

Slick Oil Corporation of Houston No. 1 K. E. Werland, wildcat nine miles northeast of Gregory, has set 7-inch casing on bottom at 9,660 feet after reaching that depth in sidetracked hole. Plug back depth is 9,608 feet.

No further details were available and no information has been released on drillstem tests, which were reportedly run at 8,907-31 and around 9,272 feet. Loss of a drillstem test tool in the hole at 9,608 feet caused operator to sidetrack. Completion apparently will be attempted above the whipstock.

This project is on a 320-acre lease in Section 52, Sixth Addition to Taft Farm Lands.

Tennessee Gas Transmission Co. No. 6 Bennett C. Ocker, wildcat eight miles southwest of Austwell, was drilling below 7,126 feet in shale. The scheduled 9,600-foot test is in Block 4, Lucas Subdivision, Maria Jesusa Ximenes Survey, A-224.

## Fulton Lions Hear Insurance Experts

## Navy Continues To Use Airport

True to its promise made in open meeting at the Aransas County Courthouse on June 14, the Navy continues to use Aransas County Airport for touch and go landings, although its lease expired on June 30.

The action followed refusal of the Commissioners' Court to renew the lease under which the Navy had operated since 1951, and under which the Navy paid a pro-rata share of the airport's operation costs based on a percentage of weight-frequency use, with a maximum of \$5,000 annually. The Court originally voted in April not to extend the contract following the Fulton protest, accompanied by a petition bearing 161 signatures.

The Navy is operating under the provisions of an "AP-4" agreement between the Civil Aeronautics Administration, the military and the municipality at the time of construction providing for joint usage. County Judge Johnnie Wendell referred to this agreement when, as he announced the court's decision on June 14, he said that "the Navy can use the field jointly on a touch-and-go basis without our consent and without payment to us."

At the time of the protest in April, the Navy voluntarily stopped using the field and attempted to route its air traffic to other fields in the area. However, Naval officials announced that aircraft were "stacked up" on the other fields and the acute congestion was a definite hazard.

The use of the Aransas County field for "touch-and-go landings," where student pilots touch their wheels to the runway and take off again without actually completing the landing, is necessary they said.

Residents of the northern half of Live Oak Peninsula claimed that the low-flying aircraft frightened fish in the bay, caused tourists to move elsewhere, disrupted classes at the Fulton Elementary School and generally inconvenienced the people of the area.

A spokesman for the Navy said last night that the field's landing pattern has been altered to prevent airplanes from passing over the school. He also expressed regret at any inconvenience caused to area residents.

McDavid then informed the board that L. E. Casterline had tendered his resignation as a director. This he agreed to do.

## Alex Scott Withdraws From Navigation District Race

Alex Scott, who is seriously ill in Spohn Hospital, has withdrawn from the race for one of the positions in the Aransas County Navigation District No. 1.

This leaves six candidates, the three incumbents, and three men running against them. Incumbents are N. F. Jackson, chairman; Raymond Owens, vice-chairman and Dick Picton, secretary of the board. All three are serving their second term on the board.

Candidates who have put their names up for the first time are M. W. Cochran, Ted Atwood and W. S. Coaker.

Under the terms of a resolution passed by the Navigation Board before calling an election, one of the winners of the upcoming contest will serve for two years; one will serve for four years; and one will serve for six years.

Never again will all commissioners be elected at one time. One will be elected every two years, to serve for six years at a time.

There will be five voting places for the election.

At Aransas Pass, in Precinct 1A, the ballot boxes will be placed in the Union Hall of Local 4316, and Mrs. Glenn Ellis will be presiding judge, assisted by Mrs. E. E. Glenn.

Precinct One voters will cast their ballots at the Fire Station in Rockport, with Mrs. Faye Brundrett as presiding judge, assisted by Mrs. Fred Diehrich.

Precinct Two polling place will be at the courthouse in Rockport, with Mrs. Alma Ratliff as presiding judge, with Mrs. Gertrude Mills as assistant.

In Precinct Three voters will utilize the school building at Fulton. W. S. Steede is presiding judge, and he will be aided by Mrs. E. G. Cooke.

Lamar voters, in Precinct Four, will cast their ballots in the Concession Hall at Goose Island State Park. Mrs. C. H. Mills is presiding judge, and she will be assisted by Mrs. Elmo Brundrett.

There will be six names on the ballot, but the state law specifically provides that only three people can be elected to the Board of Navigation and Canal Commissioners, as the navigation board is officially titled.

## Registration For Drag Races Starts In Early Morning

Registration for the drag races to be held at the Aransas County Airport will begin at 7 a. m. on the morning of July 4, under the sponsorship of the Corpus Christi Timing Association. The races will be sanctioned by the Alamo Timing Association of San Antonio and run under the rules of national hot rod associations.

There will be six stock classes, according to Don Atkinson, president of the Corpus Christi organization, classified on the basis of weight to horse power, and anyone having an older model car that he wants to tune up and run will have just as much chance as anyone else on this basis, he stated.

Other classes besides those for stock cars will be classified on weight per cubic inch, and in this group, he said, are four classes of stock cars, with big race motors.

Besides these, there will be six classes of motorcycles, and three classes of altered coupes and sedans.

"We also intend to run all of the fuel classes, including those burning nitro and different fuel mixtures, along with three classes of street roadsters, three classes of modified roadsters, three classes of gas roadsters and the retail fast class that will be your regular dragsters. There will also be three classes of sport cars and a four-cylinder class.

"The four fastest cars and the fastest motorcycle will run, also."

Registration will start at 7:00 a. m., time trials will begin at 7:30 a. m. and last till noon, and elimination will begin at 1:00 p. m. and last all afternoon.

Atkinson says that every precaution will be taken to operate the meeting safely. Sergeant Floyd Graham, of the Corpus Christi Police Department will be in charge of safety rules and regulations, and he will be assisted by a number of off duty Corpus Christi patrolmen. Graham and his men, Atkinson said, will work closely with the Aransas County Sheriff's department.

There will be complete insurance coverage, he said, by the Continental Insurance Company, and policies will be carried giving \$300,000 coverage for accident and \$100,000 bodily injury and public liability. All minors must have a signed release from their parents to be allowed to participate. There is special insurance for drivers and people in the pit area, which will be open to the public during the noon hour when all activity will cease.
