# **Reynolds Renames Alumina Plant**

La Quinta - the alumnia plant operated here by Reynolds Metals Co. has been named the Sherwin Plant, in memory of the late R. S. Sherwin, Sr., a former Reynolds' vice president and one of the world's foremost authorities on production of the powdery substance from which aluminum is made.

Announcement of the Board of Directors' decision to name the plant after the man who played a major role in building the Company's alumina production came this week from Richard S. Reynolds, Jr., president of the Reynolds Metals Co. The new name becomes effective immediately, replacing La Quinta by which it was formerly known. As soon as a suitable plaque is prepared, brief unveiling ceremonies will be held.

Mr. Sherwin, who died in Corpus Christi on July 2 at the age of 80, had been with the Reynolds Metals Co. since that organization went into the production of aluminum in 1940. Prior to that he had been with the Aluminum Company of America for 35 years and had much to do with the early development and control of what is now known as the American Bayer process for making alumina from bauxite. It is this process that he installed in the La Quinta

career was in some phase of chemical development, and he spent much time with Alcoa overseas After joining Reynolds he placed the first alumina plant in operation near Sheffield, Ala. He played a major role in laying out and putting in the plant, which now will bear his name; and about three years ago, he moved to Corpus Christi to live in sem-retirement, serving Reynolds in an advisory capacity. His son, Ralph Sherwin, Jr., who followed him into the aluminum business, has been manager of the Sherwin Plant since it was opened in 1952.



### **Exploratory Vessel** Makes Red Snapper Catches With Nets

The MV Silver Bay, which has been engaged in a two weeks exploratory cruise for red snapper in the northern Gulf of Mexico, along the Louisiana and Texas coasts, has returned to Pensacola. A combination of mechanical difficulties and heavy weather, including hurricane Audrey, re-

stricted trawling operations. However, twelve exploratory drags were made for snapper between the Mississippi coast and Freeport, Texas, in depth of 17 to 56 fathoms.

Scattered small and medium red snapper were found in all areas where the nets were put over, the best drag being 260 red snapper, weighing 350 pounds, plus 67 pounds of grouper and porgy. In one tow, 500 pounds of me-

### **ALL TEXAS HUNTING** SEASONS SET

Austin - The state game and fish commission said open season and bag limits in Texas for 1957 have been established, but final approval is still needed by the fish and wildlife service. This is expected at once.

The seasons are:
