

James A. Jarboe, county surveyor, then reported on a meeting in which he and Norvell Jackson had discussed with the Navigation District the possibility of dredging Little Bay, for use as an additional water sports area, and for a harbor at the northern end.

Jarboe said that the Navigation District was in process of negotiating with Lockwood and Andrews to bring the district's master harbor development plan up to date, and that the probability was that test borings would be taken in Little Bay to see whether the sand or other bottom was suitable for extension of the present beach, and for fill on Frandolig Island.

The Navigation District commissioners had told Jarboe and Jackson that the State Highway Department was also negotiating with the district for enough land to construct the necessary traffic channel at the T. Noah Smith corner, and that the department had also tentatively explored the idea of widening the highway along the waterfront from the Smith home northwards.
