Lions Entertain Young Lady Geologist With Birthday Party at Thompson's Spa

Rockport Lions entertained Miss Nancy Easley, of Corpus Christi, with a birthday luncheon Thursday, and in turn she told them of her struggle to become a geologist, all alone among 900 boys.

"I wanted to go to the Colorado School of Mines," Nancy said, because they offered just

everything I wanted, but it caused quite a furore when I registered there for the fall term after I graduated from W. B. Ray High School in Corpus Christi in 1952. The Colorado School was originally supposed to be a coeducational institution, but in the 78 years before I went there only 12 girls had been admitted and only four graduated.

"Everyone was awfully nice, except a few of the boys. One of them said 'I hate girls, that's why I came here!'"

But if a few diehards held out against femininity in a school that hitherto had been devoted only to the men, the rest of them soon ca-

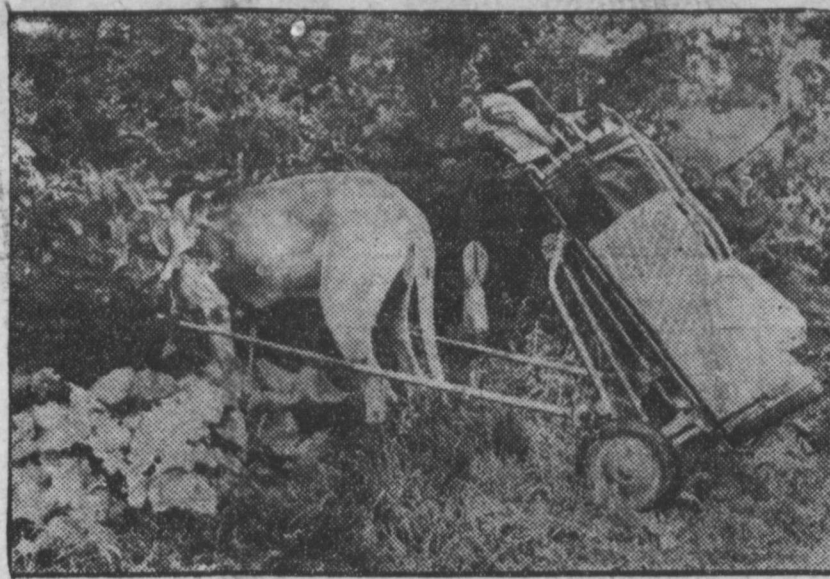

Tree Sale to Be Held On Nov. 9 By Jaycee-ettes

Amendments Backed Heavily Across State

Water conscious Texans splashed to the polls through a wide-spread rain Tuesday and approved a \$200 million water bond measure and two other amendments to Texas' bulky state constitution in incomplete returns.

All three of the proposals to patch up the lengthy document had better than a two-to-one majority. Only a simple majority was required.

In Aransas County the vote was 101 for, 11 against the retirement amendment; 110 for and 4 against the pension proposal; and 98 for, 13 against the water-amendment.

C. of C. Plans For Winter Sport Show

Directors Discuss Christmas Lights, New Members, Sports Shows, Bulletin Board At Chamber, And Hear Reports From Various Committee Chairmen

At their regular meeting on Tuesday night, directors of the Chamber of Commerce discussed a number of things of paramount interest to the community.

First business on the agenda was a report by various members who had attended the South Texas Chamber of Commerce meeting in Corpus Christi recently. Among these were Mrs. Mary Juergens,

manager of the chamber, Jack McDavid, Chamber president, A. C. Shivers, Chamber vice president, all of whom were at the Tuesday night meeting, and Seth H. Steele and Leonard Le Blanc.

Mrs. Juergens said that much of the meeting was consumed by a discussion of Texas water problems, and what could be done to remedy them.

A report for the membership committee was then given by Mrs. Charles A. Roe, Sr., who said that four new memberships had been taken out during the past month. These included the Boat/Barn, Stewart's Cafe, the Yacht Haven Cafe and Lenoir's Landing.

James A. Jarboe, chairman of the industrial committee, then discussed the recently filed suit in which Aransas County hopes to obtain lands that were allocated to Nueces County by a mistake of legislative codifiers years ago. He pointed out that while the Intra-coastal Canal cut-off would probably be opened up in the near future, because of legislative boondoggling and gobbledook back in the past century, all industry along the canal would be taxed by Nueces County, instead of Aransas, although the land would be practically in Rockport's front yard.

Mrs. Juergens then reported upon plans for Christmas lighting. Money enough to start this in a modest way has already been collected or pledged, she said, by various organizations and individuals. There will be street garlands and stars along Austin Street and Broadway in Rockport, she said, Fulton decorations will be taken care of by the Fulton Lions.

The Jaycees will sponsor their usual house lighting program, according to Mrs. Juergens, as part of the Yule season.

President McDavid appointed Cecil Cole, J. T. Slocum and Jack McCreedy as a committee to work on the decorations, which, it is hoped, will be ready to light up on November 29.

As an addition to the usual decorations, it was voted to place a Christmas tree on the grounds of the Chamber of Commerce building, and to use Scotch Lite to make a big Merry Christmas across the facade of the building.

Mrs. Juergens, Mrs. Roe and Mrs. J. D. Griggs then told of the plans The Tourist Promotion Committee had made for the winter. The first Tourist Card Party has already been held, they said, and the bingo games would start immediately after Christmas.

The directors then went into the matter of booths at the Dallas and Houston sports shows this winter, as it was felt that those which Mrs. Roe had planned last year for San Antonio and Dallas had been great successes.

Mrs. Roe outlined plans for new exhibits, and the directors were enthusiastic in their acceptance of the plan, which will be financed by individual contributions from merchants and other organizations in the Rockport and Fulton area.

Mrs. Roe pointed out that the fishing maps used last year as give aways had proved most successful, and the directors were of the opinion that this ought to be continued this year, but that some changes should be made in the map, to make it of more use.

It was suggested that door prizes at the two shows should consist of an all expense tourist, from each place to the winning registrant, at both Dallas and Houston.

The directors, mindful of the great good that the Intra-coastal Canal has done throughout this area, then went on record as supporting the work of the Intra-coastal Canal Association, and endorsing its aims as of great benefit to South Texas and the community as a whole.

A spirited discussion then ensued in regard to the quality of bus service offered the community by the Continental Trailways organization, and a number of the people present expressed themselves as anxious to see some improvement made. A number of instances were cited by those present in which the transportation company was remiss.

**Were Old Time
Winters So Bad?**

With winter's warning on the wind and snow in the Panhandle, do weather records disclose the fact that winters in the Coastal Bend were as wintry as some old timers say they were?

Way back in 1835, Brownsville experienced a light snow storm, so it's pretty nearly a cinch that the Coastal Bend received its share. Then in 1866, 1881 and 1886 snow fell again in the Valley.

"Mrs. S. G. Miller, whose book 'Sixty Years in the Nueces Valley,' is a classic, tells of another storm in January, 1872, when a terrific blizzard swept down from the north. Within a short time on January 10 ten inches of snow and sleet lay on the ground, and the next morning a deep white blanket of snow shrouded the hundreds of head of cattle that lay in drifts, dead of cold and exposure.

Uncle Bob Mercer, over at Aransas Pass has been around these parts for some time, having been born over on Mustang Island around 1874. He says that the freeze of 1886-1887 was another buster, with bays in the area icing over, and the channel at Port Aransas frozen as far out as Cline's Point on the Cove side.

Texas "blue northerners" ordinarily bring cool weather only for a day or so, but there are some cold spells like these that a lot of people remember.

In 1897 there was an inch of snow on January 25, followed by a few flakes the next day. On Jan. 27, it snowed two inches and on Jan. 28 three more. An old newspaper story by S. P. Pantou, one-time editor of the Aransas Harbor Herald says:

"A cold norther blew the water out of Redfish Bay, and then snow covered the bottom of the bay. Aransas Bay became so cold that fish were paralyzed and hundreds of tons of them drifted ashore. 'There were such piles of them along the shore about Rockport that if left to rot there a pestilence might ensue, and over 300 cart loads of them were taken away.

"Corpus Christi Bay was likewise so cold that the flippers of the big turtles froze and they drifted ashore helpless. Citizens found them scattered along the beach; turned them over, and picketed them out till they could be shipped to market.

Schools of mullet in Redfish Bay

escaped extinction by piling into the deep pool by the Aransas Pass pavilion, where they lay in piles until the weather moderated.

"Press dispatches told of an American family, out driving near Victoria, Mexico, inside the tropics, being caught in the norther and chilled to death, along with their driver!"

Another exceptionally cold spell came in 1910, when Uncle Bob Mercer was working as an engineer on the Aransas Pass jetties, and traveling to and from work by boat.

"Even the mail boat didn't go out that day," Uncle Bob recalls, "and I borrowed a skiff and sail and took off. I had to break ice all along the channel from where Rice Brothers Shrimp Cannery was clear out to the Morris and Cummings Cut, but after that it got easier."

In 1924, several old timers in the area remember wading in the shallows near Fulton, breaking the ice to pick up large fish that were so numbed with cold that they couldn't swim, and hundreds of thousands of pounds more were frozen and wasted.

Corpus Christi weather bureau records show that there was a snow storm on Jan. 23, 1926.

Nineteen-thirty was another exceptionally cold winter, according to Mrs. R. L. Mercer, who is as good or better historian than her husband, Uncle Bob.

"So many head of cattle died

in that spell of cold weather," she said. "The loss was especially great between Rockport and Port Lavaca, where there was little shelter. I remember that 200 head froze to death in one place."

A couple of years later, two-tenths of an inch of snow fell in March, 1932, but the next considerable spell of snow and ice waited until 1940 to arrive, and lasted for four or five days, with tremendous destruction of fish, cattle and water pipes.

The destruction of fish by these freezes has always been terrific, and nearly 400 years ago Cazeza de Vaca remarked on such kills, with a notation to the effect that at such times the Indians feasted.

Major freezes apparently occur about every 14 years, but after this one in 1940 there were severe ones in 1945, 1947, and 1951. In the last, particularly, there were

millions upon millions of pounds of fish destroyed. However, after

such freezes, biological investigations have shown that the fish popu-

lations recuperate within three or four years.

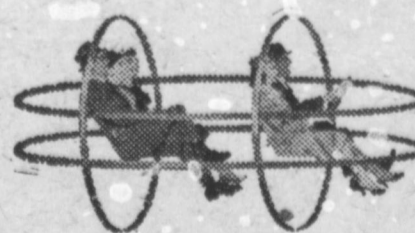

We learn that this was a figure of speech that the prophet used to reprove them for their own systems of worship which they had devised; and they had no waters of salvation in them. They could hold no water. The Lord had nothing to do with them: they had hewed them out.

Now the next thing that we read about them, was that they were carried into the captivity of Babilonia to be slaves to them. Now all of this was but a type or shadow of what has come to pass in this dispensation of time. The professed followers of Christ have fallen victims to the same Satanic principle: that is they have forsaken Christ, who is the fountain of living waters and are following men, whom the Lord hath not sent.

Moreover, they have hewed them out cisterns, even broken cisterns that can hold no water. They have devised human systems of religion; human creeds, human ways of worship, human names, and human plans of saving the lost. But beloved, God says "They have hewed them out broken cisterns that can hold no water. We plead with people to come back to the Bible, and the Bible alone, accept Christ, and not man as your Saviour; walk in His way; obey Him, wear His name; worship God as He has directed, and receive all spiritual blessing in Him.

Jerimiah was very unpopular because he preached this doctrine; and we will be unpopular in our day for standing for the truth of God; but remember, "Ye shall know the truth; and the truth shall make you free." My friends, you have a cordial invitation to attend the services of the church that stands upon the Bible.

He says: "The Rockport Chamber of Commerce has requested me to introduce a resolution petitioning Congress to change the name of the Aransas National Wildlife Refuge to the Rockport National Wildlife Refuge. Due to the fact that this is the home of the Whooping Crane and that Rockport has spent an awful lot of money promoting the preservation of this famous bird and due to the fact that some confusion has arisen in the past over the exact location of this refuge, I am happy to do this for my area and will try to get the resolution passed during this special session."

"At the request of many of the people in my area, I made an inquiry of Mr. Howard Dodgen, executive secretary of the Game and Fish Commission, to find out what the commission's plans were concerning their program for artificial reefs and the opening of Cedar Bayou. In his letter of November 4, Mr. Dodgen states that the commission will complete Roolover Pass before commencing on other similar projects. However, the commission has a tentative item which earmarks \$80,000 for dredging out Cedar Bayou."

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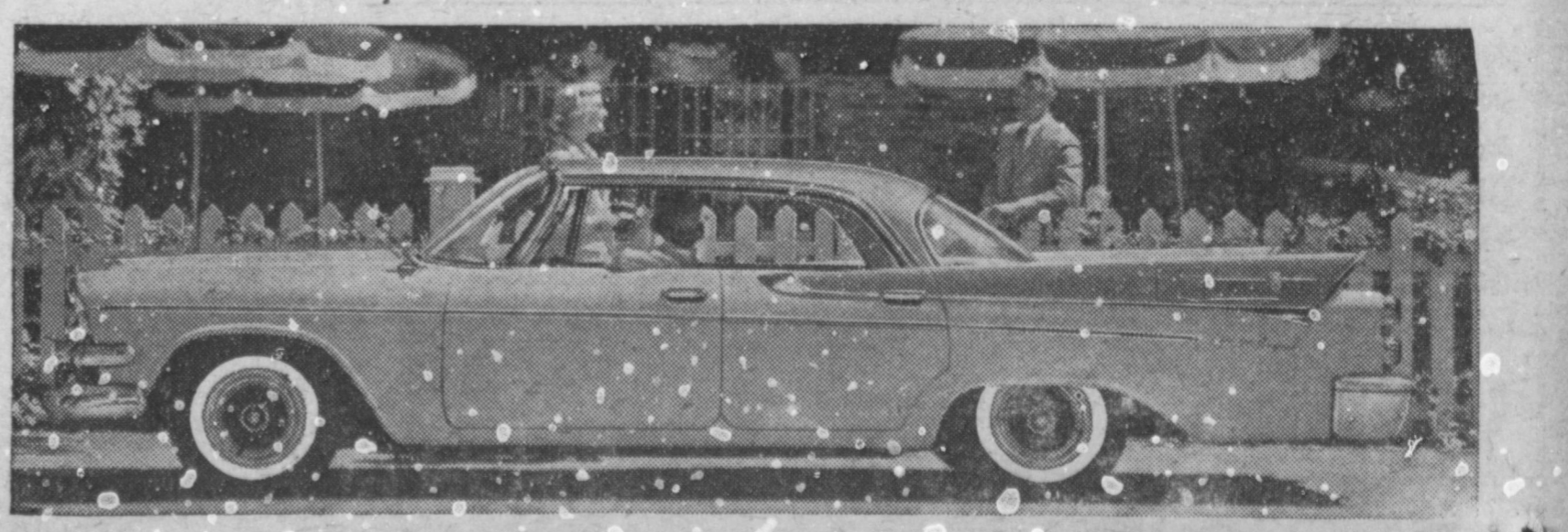
