## **City Council** Calls Bond **Election Dec. 17**

The City Council, at its regular meeting on Monday night, called a bond election for Dec. 17, to decide whether or not Rockport will be able to take advantage of the Highway Department's offer to bear a large proportion of the cost of paving along Highway 35 Busi-

Absentee voting on the propositions begins on Friday, Nov. 29, and will continue until three days before the election.

The election will decide whether or not the city shall issue \$80,000 of Ashland, Ohio, caught 13 reds in tax bonds, payable in ten years and callable in five, and allocate a portion of the present tax money to payment of this obligation.




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

Then let us hasten to say that all who have reached the tion. age of accountability may be baptized if they can meet the requirements of the Lord for baptism.

Well, then, who may be baptized? Listen to Jesus when He said, "He that BELIEVETH and is baptized shall be saved. He that BELIEVETH not shall be damned." (Mrk. 16:16).

Hence, we see that no Atheist, Agnostic, Infidel, nor any other unbeliever can be Scripturally baptized. Philip, the evangelist, said to the inquiring eunuch, "If thou at the Church of Christ this evento the inquiring eunuch, "If thou at the Church of Christ this evenbelievest with all thine heart, thou ing. mayest." That is, the eunuch could be baptized, if he believed with all of his heart. (Acts 8:37).

Having then seen that one must be a believer before he can be baptized, we ask are there any other qualifications that one must have before being baptized? Yes, an individual must have repented of all sins; for we hear the Apostle Peter saying, "Repent and be baptized everyone of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins, and ye shall receive the gift of the Holy Ghost." (Acts 2:

Hence, unless, and until a man REPENTS he is not qualified, or prepared for baptism. Baptism can do the impenitent man no good whatsoever. Well, is that all that one should do before being prepared for baptism? No, for the Lord requires a confession of our faith; for Jesus tells us, "Whosoever therefore shall CONFESS me before men, him will I CON-FESS also before My Father which is in heaven." (Mat. 10:32).

Now listen to Paul, "For with the heart man believeth unto righteousness! and with the mouth confession is made unto salvation." (Rom. 10:10).

Again, let us look at the conversation of the Ethiopian eunuch: 'And as they went on their way they came unto a certain water: and the eunuch said, See, here is water; what doth hinder me to be baptized, And Philip said, If thou believest with all thine heart, thou mayest. And he answering, and said, I believe that Jesus Christ is the Son of God." Acts 8: \$6,37).

Hence, we see that a CONFES-SION is required for Scriptural baptism, and that CONFESSION is, the divinity of Christ; or, I beheve that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of the living God." (Mat. 16: 16). No other confession is 12quir ed of anyone in becoming a Christion. Hence, we must conclude that one must be taught the gospel of Christ sufficiently that he understands and believes it with the whole heart; and has genuinely repented or turned from all sins; and confessed his faith before he is prepared for baptism.

This also may occur when very large populations of certain kinds of microscopic algae or dinoflagallates, such as those found in the "red tide," are present very near the surface. Thus, the "red water," which is actually more often brown than red, which is observed in many areas and after which the Red Sea and the Vermilion Sea in the Gulf of California have been named is due to the abundance of certain algae or dinoflagellates.

## Fred Percival Passes Away zen of this country, only to dis-The Junior High School Pep At Age of Eighty-eight

Mr. Fred Percival, 88, for many years a resident of Rockport, passed away last Sunday, and on Monday, after a service conducted by Mr. Harry Carter, lay minister of St. Peter's Episcopal Church, was laid to rest in Rockport Cemetery, with the members of the Masonic Lodge acting as pallbearers.

everything movable. For many years Mr. Fred was the Thunderbird. an employee of the State Highway Department, first in this area, and then in the Laredo District, attaining the distinction of being resi-

dent engineer. Mrs. A. C. Shivers remembers that when she went to work for the Highway Department in 1929, Mr. Percival was at Rockport, and occupied with the planning and construction of the Copano Causeway. He also planned and laid out much of the Hug-the-Coast Highway, now known as Highway 35, and the roads between Beeville, Sinton, Taft, Aransas Pass, Rockport, Lamar, Tivoli, and Port Lavaca, were either the result of his planning or his supervision.

At various times during Mr. Fred's life, principally before he went to work for the Highway Department, where he stayed for 30 or 35 years, he surveyed a great portion of the land in Aransas and the surrounding counties. When the old Coleman-Fulton Pasture Company lands began to be marketed by the Taft Ranch, Mr. Percival laid out most of the land blocks, and later, many of the various subdivisions in San Patricio, Bee, Aransas and Refugio coun-

So wide had been his experience, and so well was he acquainted with this part of South Texas and its surveys that he was frequently called in as an expert witness in

in his work, Mr. Fred had to re-examine old and crude surveys made before his time, and in the process discovered some long forgotten communities, among them the ghost town of St. Mary's, and the old Mission of Refugio, on Copano, one of the oldest recorded communities in Texas, near present Bayside.

He also found evidence of a large and permanent Indian settlement on Laniar Peninsula, near the present terminus of the Corano




