What It Teaches

Let us study the question today: How can a child of God be forgiven for sins committed since becoming a Christian? Must he go back and confess his faith in Christ, and be baptized again? No. That is not the law of pardon to the erring child of God. Once he has been scripturally baptized, then it is not necessary to be baptized again. The Bible says, One Lord, one faith, one baptism (Eph.

Hence, he does not need to be baptized over every time he sins. The Bible nowhere teaches that a child of God is to be baptized; but it does teach that you must be baptized to become a child of God. (Mrk. 16:16; Jno. 3:5; Acts 2:38; Acts 22:16; I Pet. 3:21).

But no apostle ever commanded any child of God to be baptized again. However, we do read in Acts 19:1-6, of some people being baptized again who thought they had been scripturally baptized, but had not; for they had not even heard that there was any Holy Ghost. So they were not baptized in the name of the Holy Ghost at all the first time; for they knew only the baptism of John the Baptist. So, if your first baptism was not according to the scriptures, then it is the same as no baptism at all, and you should be baptized

just like the Bible teaches. But our question has to do with those who have obeyed their Lord, and become children of God, and then commit other sins, how may they be forgiven? Fortunately, we have an example of a man like that in the Bible. Turn now to Acts 8:13, and we read, "Then Simon himself also believed: and when he was baptized, he continued with Philip and wondered, beholding the miracles and signs which were

Now Jesus says that a man like that is saved. Mrk. 16:16. But now in that same chapter, down about verse 18, let us read again: "And when Simon saw that through the laying on of the apostles' hands the Holy Ghost was given, he offered them money, saying, give me also this power, that on whomsoever I lay hands, he may receive the Holy Ghost. But Peter said unto him, Thy money perish with thee, because thou hast thought that the gift of God may be purchased with money. Thou hast neither part nor lot in this matter: For thy heart is not right in the sight of God. (Now notice) Repent therefore of this thy wickedness, and pray God, if perhaps the thought of thine heart may be forgiven thee. For I perceive that thou art in the gall of bitte ness, and in the bond of iniquity." Now what was this erring child of God told to do that he might be forgiven? Repent, and pray to God that he might be forgiven Well. let's see again. (I Jno. 1:9).

"If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just to forgive us our sins, and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness." Now John tells us to confess our sins. Now let's turn to James 5:19,20, and read: "Erethren if any of you do er from the truth, and one convert him; Let him know, that he which converteth the sinner from the error of his way shall save a soul from death, and shall hide a multitude of sins."

So, beloved, if you are an earing child of God, repeat of your sins, confess them, and pray to God that you may be forgiven. That is the law of pardon to you. There are many who reed to do




sive and fun to make. Just heat the edges of four cakes of commercial paraffin with a warm iron, and form a block. Put a strong wick between the middle cakes before sticking them to-

For a frothy finish, melt paraffin with a colored wax crayon and whip it with an egg beater. Spread the foamy, colored paraffin on the square candle and then stick sequins and other bright ornaments on it. For a frothy finish, melt parafornaments on it.

To make round candles, fill small cans with melted paraffin. Drop in a weighted string wick when the paraffin is hard enough to hold it up.

Christmas Ornaments May Stain Carpets

Christmas crepe paper and New Year's confetti can permanently stain rugs and carpets.

Party papers are colored with a wide range of cheap dyestuffs. When the paper becomes wet, the dyes run badly. The dyes will transfer permanently to textiles. If crepe paper and confetti accidentally get wet keep them off rugs and carpets.

Should a rug become marked with a paper stain, immediate first-aid is necessary. Mix a teaspoonful of neutral soapless detergent in one-half pint of lukewarm

Apply the detergent solution directly to the stain a few drops at a time. Use an eye dropper. Sponge the stained area with clean, white unstarched cloth or cleansing tissue. This will blot up moisture. Begin at outer edge of stain and work in. Repeat if nec-


