## 1969 Received Here Saturday

First load of wheat from the 1969 crop was received here on Saturday, May 24th, at 5:00 p. m., when Roy Wiseman brought in a load of 15,900 pounds to the Nine-Point Grain, Inc. The grain was combined by Buck Bland.

The wheat had a weight test of 61 pounds; moisture content of 14.5 per cent and averaged around 20 bushels per acre.

The first load of wheat for 1969 arrived three days earlier than last year, despite the continued wet weather.

Harvey Croft of the Nine-Point Grain, Inc., said that with "open weather" the wheat will begin to roll in to local dealers at a fast clip by this weekend.

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

Q-How long does one have to serve in Viet-Nam to be eligible for the G. I. Bill to return to college, and how much would a married veteran with no children receive each month? A-Actual service in Viet-Nam itself is not a requirement for benefits (including educa-tional assistance) under the G.

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

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



Evidently, the editorial in "Cotton Picks" last week concerning the \$1.00 per bale program and the CPI budget fell into that category, or I sure hit some raw nerves. Squeals were heard all the way to Memphis, Tennessee.

Most of us Monday morning quarterbacks find it easy to point out flaws in game plans that didn't quite work out. It is a different matter to create the plan. I certainly don't envy the CPI trustees their enormous responsibility to invest wisely the millions of dollars donated by cotton farmers as to research and promotion. But the Rolling Plains donated about \$500,000 last fall, and we are vitally in-

I am whole-heartedly in favor of the \$1 per bale program. Whether cotton lives or dies as an industry may depend on it. It is a shame that we didn't have such a program years be-

But my point is still valid. Cotton farmers must make a profit to stay in business.

Prices must be competitive. Polyester and rayon prices have steadily declined. Foreign cotton prices are down. There is little hope for a substantial, or prolonged increase in the price of our product in the near fu-ture. We do not have a monop-
