But up at Fulton Leroy Key Seafood of Port Lavaca took four stalls some time ago, and moved boats down to operate on this season's oyster crop; Priddy's Oyster House has two boats working; and Clark's Fish Market has one stall that they're occupying, and may take more in the near future.

And another sign of the times is a couple of cases filed in county court recently, and set for trial before a jury on February 13, charging a local fisherman with using a power dredge to obtain oysters in less than six feet of water.

John Belt, from Lockney, and Bill Savoie, of Kankakee, Ill., brought in 20 trout. Homer Vickery, of Arkansas City, Kansas, went once, and came in with three nice reds, 14 trout, two drum and a sheepshead.

Highway Dept. Will Spend \$260,000 For Traffic Safety In County

The Texas Highway Department will spend \$260,000 for traffic safety improvements in Aransas County during 1958, D. C. Greer, State Highway Engineer has announced. This is in addition to the regular construction and maintenance program.

At the January meeting of the State Highway Commission, an unprecedented \$25 million was appropriated exclusively for safety improvements designed to give Texans safer traveling on high-traffic volume roads. The new program is formed from an engineering study of accident rates against the State's average fatal-plus-injury rate of 70.1. Those spots in the State Highway System that average higher than this rate are the ones being earmarked for work under this program.

Greer stated that the Traffic Safety Program would be directed toward 918 miles of highway in 104 counties. The 158 projects scheduled will be on highways which carry traffic volumes of from 600 to 3,000 vehicles per day. Narrow pavements will be widened, and shoulders improved. Culverts and structures at hazardous locations will be widened, and dangerous curves flattened. In addition, other safety features were programmed—channelization of traffic, control of access with barriers placed along hazardous sections, control of access with frontage roads at points of congestion, and similar work.

"We expect to get all work under way on this special traffic safety program during the calendar year of 1958," Greer said. Projects for the county are:

1. State 35, from Church St. in Rockport north to the South end of Copano Bay Causeway, 6.5 miles, widen surfacing and surface shoulders.
2. Loop 70 in Rockport from St. 35 near 8th St. to St. 35 near Wood St., 2.7 miles, reconstruct and widen pavement.

Roaten Drug Store To Have New Building

Rockport is to have a new and modern drug store, according to a joint announcement made this week by Shelley Roaten, of Roaten's Drugs, and Arthur Bracht, who will erect the building on a downtown Austin Street corner for occupancy under a long-term lease.

The all-masonry building will be, if present plans are carried out, of concrete block and brick veneer construction, fire-proof, air-conditioned and with a glass front facing on Austin Street.

The 50-foot by 100-foot single-story structure, is being designed by the San Antonio architectural firm of Phelps, DeWees and Simmons, and preliminary sketches will be ready within the next two weeks, while construction is scheduled to start some time in early March.

The new drugstore will have 4000 square feet devoted to display of goods, Roaten said, and approximately 1000 square feet for storage, air-conditioning machinery, lavatories, and similar facilities.

To insure that best use will be made of the space, he has engaged the services of a consultant in drug store layout and planning, and expects to make the new business a complete, self-service establishment.

The building will be in the lot Bracht owns where the old barbecue pit used to stand, on the same block as the Elliot-Hughes Hospital, and across the street from the Central Power and Light Co.

Citizen's Delegation Meets With Court On Crime Wave

On the day before the sheriff's department cracked the local crime wave wide open with the arrest of four local youths, a representative committee of Rockport and Fulton businessmen met with the Commissioners' Court to request that additional funds be budgeted for additional police protection in both city and county.

Leonard LeBlanc, acting as spokesman, pointed out that the men available were not sufficient to police the area properly and that if the present state of affairs continued almost anything could happen.

The city was not financially able, he said, to pay policemen and to set up a corporation court. He, as representative of the group, requested that the commissioners make an effort to allocate sufficient funds to add one or two men to the sheriff's department.

J. B. Jackson, one of the delegation, also expressed the sentiments of the group, when he said that none of the members felt that it was possible for the present force to give all the protection needed.

"We don't know what can be done," he said, "but we want to

do whatever is necessary to correct the situation."

County Judge John Wendell pointed out that Aransas Pass spends \$40,000 a year on police, and still has a crime problem.

Jackson pointed out that the county was opening up so many new areas and the population getting so widely disseminated that a sheriff's department that was adequate some years ago would no longer answer.

"The department is doing so many things," he added, "that it doesn't have time to carry out the needed investigations."

James H. Sorenson, Jr., said that it looked like the sheriff's department was getting blamed

Local Real Estate On Upswing

According to Emory M. Spencer, local real estate and oil operator, real estate transactions in this area during January are higher than they have been in a long time, with a total of \$150,000 worth of property changing hands within the first 30 days of this year.

Spencer, who keeps his finger on the market through one of his companies, Modern Abstract and Title, says that none of the transactions have been exceptionally large. However, houses that have been on the market for a year or two have moved in January, in sharp contrast to most of 1957, when the real estate business here was terribly slow.

He said that the sharp upswing represents trading among local people as well as sales to outsiders who have bought property here, and indicates rather widespread buying among people in the various income brackets.

In Copano Campsites, for instance, there have been three or four sales recently in the more moderately priced lots. The fact that these are among the few remaining along Copano Bay that have access to the water may have something to do with this, he said.

Last Minute Rush On Poll Taxes Ends With 1331 Paid

A last minute rush on the poll tax offices on Friday was responsible for the considerable rise in poll taxes were paid before the deadline at midnight on January 31, according to Sheriff A. C. Shivers, County Tax Assessor-Collector.

Local Crime Wave Mere Ripple Now

Local Sheriff's Department Aided By Special Officer From Cattlemen's Association, Highway Patrolmen and Post Office Inspector Solve Crimes

The local crime wave is a mere ripple now, thanks to the work of Sheriff A. C. Shivers and Deputy Sherman Mundine, whose investigations were climaxed by Mundine's arrest, last Saturday morning of four Rockport youths who admitted entering six Rockport business houses; incarceration of a fifth early Sunday morning; the arrest of a Gregory youth on Monday and a pick up of a seventh man on Tuesday evening, clearing up nine more robberies and recovering much of the loot.

Charged in Justice of the Peace court on Wednesday morning with burglary in the nighttime were: Alfonso (Pancho) Zavala, Joe Torres, August Rodriguez and Tony Garcia, alias Tony Sanchez, all of Rockport, and Joe Ortiz, of

Gregory. They were held for the Grand Jury under \$2,500 bond each. Two Rockport juveniles, 14 years old, were being held for the juvenile court.

Mundine was aided during the course of the preliminary investigations by Leon Vivian, special officer of the Texas Cattleman's Association, and State Highway Patrolmen R. L. Dickerson and Dale Witten assisted in the arrests in the small hours of Saturday morning. U. S. Postal Inspector D. C. Goode was also active, helping obtain confessions from the accused youths who will be charged with burglary and felony theft before the Aransas County Grand Jury, which meets for the spring term of court this next week.

Mundine said that it was extremely probable that the members of the gang will also have to face Federal charges, because one of the buildings entered by them was a post office, at Fulton.

The burglaries totaled 15 in number, some of which had never been reported, and extended over a period between November, 1957 and January 30 of this year, with at least 9 of them occurring between January 10 and that latter date.

In November, members of the gang entered Roaten's Drug Store for the first time, taking, according to (Continued on page 5)

NEW PERSONNEL TO ARRIVE AT LOCAL AC&W BASE

Coast Guard Finishes Marking Fulton Harbor And North Aransas Bay

According to advice received today from the Port Aransas Coast Guard Section, the C. G. Cutter Primrose, buoy tender in the Corpus Christi-Aransas Pass region, has completed installation of navigational aids in the neighborhood of Fulton.

These aids were authorized last November by Headquarters of the 8th Coast Guard District in New Orleans, in response to repeated requests of the Aransas County Navigation District.

Commissioner Raymond Owens, of the District, and Chief J. C. Chiguizola, of the Port Aransas Station, planned the location of the various aids on Fulton channel and in the north end of Aransas Bay, where the Navigation District wanted to facilitate movements of the barges of the Southern Minerals Corporation and the Peninsula Pipe Line Company, used to transport approximately 300,000 barrels of oil a month from fields on Live Oak and Lamar peninsulas and in Copano Bay.

These aids are as follows: A light on the left hand side of Fulton breakwater going out. A lighted buoy, No. 2, on the left hand side of the Fulton channel going out, and an unlighted buoy, No. 4, on the same side of the channel, painted red.

Two other unlighted red buoys, No. 5 and 7, mark the right hand side of the channel, leaving the harbor.

In the north end of Aransas Bay, lighted buoy No. 1 marks the channel, between Two-by-Four and Peanut reefs; lighted buoy No. 2 marks Seash Tongue Reef; and lighted buoy No. 3 is on the seaward end of the old Japonica reef.

Commissioners Purchase Fogging Machine, But Defer Buying Sheriff Cars

Aransas County Commissioners, at their regular meeting, voted to buy a new Tifa Todd fogging machine to use in mosquito control, at a price of \$1800.25, and a new Jeep in which the machine would be mounted.

The Jeep will be purchased from Chester Johnson Motors on a cost plus basis.

The commissioners also opened bids on a pair of cars for the Sheriff's department. The Commercial Motor Co., of Aransas Pass, was low bidder, with a tender of \$4,008.18 for two Fords; while the Curlee Chevrolet Co., of Sinton, was next with a bid of \$4,275.80 for a pair of Chevrolets. Third in the roster was the Auto Service Co., of Rockport, with \$4,338 for two Plymouths. George Clark Chevrolet put in a bid of \$4,491.66 for two Chevrolets, and Gulf Chevrolet was high with \$4,554.

Commissioners Allen and Mills voted to accept the low bid; Commissioners Sparks and Davis voted against, and the county judge's vote, which would break the tie, was left pending until the next meeting on February 10.

200 Race Cars To Run Here Feb. 23

Over 200 of Texas' speediest cars will converge here February 23 for drag races at the local airport, the first of 1958, according to Don Atkinson, president of the Corpus Christi Timing Association, who said that arrangements have been concluded with the Commissioners' Court for use of the airport.

The races will be sanctioned by the Alamo Timing Association, of San Antonio, and a member of the American Hot Rod Association, and will be run under the rules and classifications used nationally.

"We are anxious to get our 1958 racing program underway," Atkinson said, "and are particularly happy to be able to continue to use the airstrip at Rockport. Its 4500-foot runways give us plenty of room for warming up and stopping, and far exceed the minimum safe length requirements of the national organizations."

There will be cars from Corpus Christi, Laredo, various points in the Valley, San Antonio, Houston and towns in the Coastal Bend area, Atkinson said, and these will include some entries from Victoria.

Atkinson said that ticket taking, traffic control and policing of the grounds will be in the hands of Rockport's Volunteer Fire Department as they have been in the past, and that the concession will be handled, either by the Fire Department or by some other local organization.

If past drag race attendance is any criterion, between 1500 and 2500 people may be expected for these on February 23.

Car Inspection Deadline April 15

Major Kent Odom, Commander of Region No. 3 of the Department of Public Safety, announced today that the deadline for having cars inspected under the Motor Vehicle Inspection Law is April 15. "All registered vehicles in Texas must be inspected by April 15 and have an inspection sticker on the windshield," Major Odom said. He stated that there will be no extension of the April 15 deadline and advised motorists who have not had their cars inspected to do so now, before long lines start forming. "In the past, many people have waited until the last few days of the inspection period to have their vehicles inspected and have had to wait in long lines at inspection stations," Major Odom said. An inspection of the motor number, brakes, headlights, tail lamps, stop lights, horn, windshield wipers, and mirror will be made as a part of the inspection. According to the records of Capt. Ivan Lawrence, of the motor vehicle inspection function of the Department of Public Safety in Corpus Christi, there are 642,756 motor vehicles in the Corpus Christi region's 38 counties, and only 136,263, or 21.2% of the vehicles have been inspected as of

Dec. 31, 1957. In Aransas County, there are 2,146 vehicles and only 209 or 9.7% of the vehicles have been inspected. Captain Lawrence had the same advice for motorists as did Major Odom. He stated "By having your vehicle inspected today, you will be driving a safer vehicle." Do you have a current inspection sticker on your windshield?

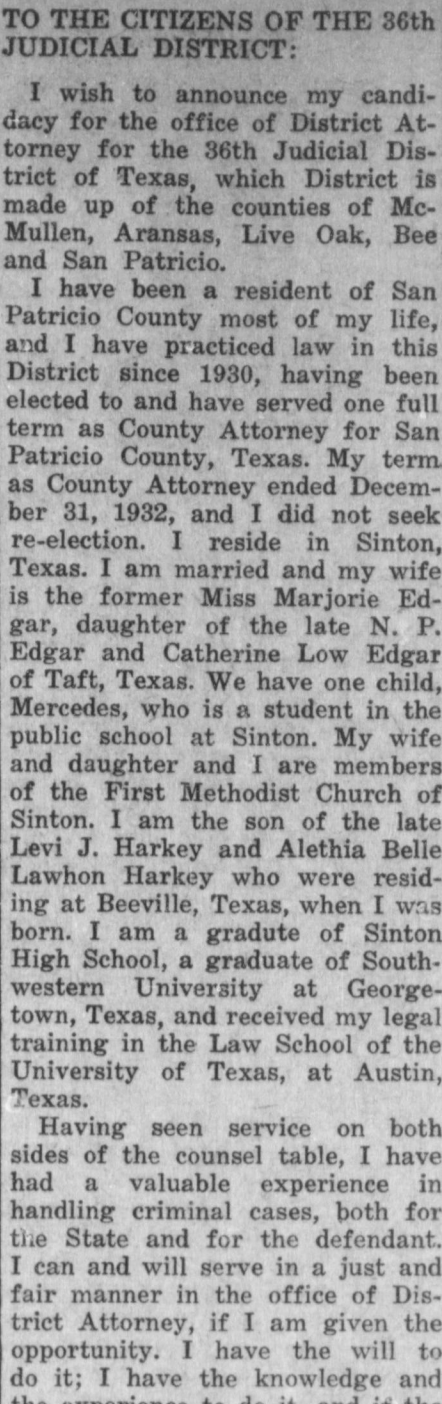

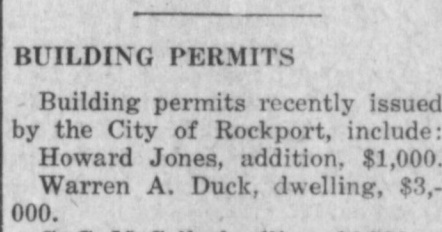

LOCAL CRIME WAVE—
(Continued from page 1)

According to their confessions, \$156 in cash, a couple of wrist watches and some cameras. On the same night they also broke into Mundine's Barber Shop and took \$6.

Early in January, the alleged thieves entered Fulton Red and White Grocery, and stole both work and sport shirts, an alarm clock, bananas, cigarettes and sox, along with \$10 in cash. They also rifled drawers and made an attempt to open the post office safe, which was in the same building, and smashed a window entering the DeForest Marine Construction Co.

The following night, they entered West's Red and White, making off with a \$50 bill, some small change, and cigarettes, then crossed the street to Hinton's Barbecue which they entered without taking anything. From the barbecue stand they went to the Auto Service Co., where they found a 36-inch stilson wrench in a truck at

the back, and attempted to pry open the door. Failing in this, they entered through an unlocked window, and stole a tire, some wrenches, and a couple of flashlights before making their big haul of the night, at Johnson's Drug Store.

They entered the store by smashing a panel of glass in the front door. The four youths concerned in this particular burglary rifled the cash register, getting about \$100 or a little better in cash, although between the cash register and the final split some of them appear to have been short changed. Just who got all the money will probably come out in court later. In addition to this they obtained some change, cameras, wrist watches, billfolds, a fountain pen or two, and a number of cigarette lighters.

As might be expected, with practically everyone in the bunch willing and anxious to make a confession, each of them concerned about shifting as much of the blame to someone else as is possible, there are some startling discrepancies in the various stories.

About a week later, as well as can be told from their statements, four of the youths burglarized Dutch's Drive In, and carried the beer which they obtained there, down to the beach where they drank it before going home.

About the same time, or a little earlier, they broke into Butch's Grocery, entering through a window and the back door, and carrying off \$23 in rolls of nickels and pennies, as well as cheese, bread, beer and bologna.

Apparently beer was a necessity for members of the group, for on January 25 two of them again burglarized Dutch's Drive Inn for some Jax, and then took off for a dance at Tivoli. Returning from this, they jettisoned the driver with whom they had gone to the dance, after picking up another

member of the gang, burglarized Jackson's Seafood machine shop for some tools and then proceeded to Johnson Fish Company, where they tried to open the safe. As a matter of fact, they drilled holes in the door without any luck; then tried a smaller safe, without getting it open; prowled a file cabinet which had nothing but papers; smashed a typewriter; and then left, after throwing a check protector into the water. The drill that they had used to work on the safe, and which they had obtained from Jackson's machine shop, also was heaved into shallow water near Johnson's Fish House.

Dissatisfied with the proceeds of the night's work, the three of them then went to town and entered Roaten's Drug Store by pushing and prying one of the back doors open.

In this theft they took \$56 from the cash register, along with cameras, a movie projector, two bottles of Three Flowers hair oil, watches, lighters, bill folds, and a little change. According to the confession of one of the youths responsible for this particular break-in, the three of them walked home, carrying the proceeds of the robbery with them.

Following this, the latest burglary was one in which they satisfied their taste for more beer by breaking into Dutch's again, and heading for the beach with five cases of Jax and Pearl, and they were engaged in drinking this when Mundine and the two highway patrolmen arrested them.

Mundine, who was greatly aided by Vivian, special agent of the Texas Cattle Raisers' Association, said that preliminary investigations pointed to a group of Latin-American youths in Rockport. Following this, Mundine and the two highway patrolmen arrested six Saturday morning, while they were staging their borracho, and four were shortly identified as some of the burglars while the other two were released.

Questioning of the four that were held led to uncovering, a little at a time, of a considerable portion of the loot Saturday. A camera, cigarette lighters, a case of beer and a watch were discovered in the home of one of the youths early Saturday evening, and continued investigation resulted in the arrest of a fifth member of the gang at his home about 3 o'clock Sunday morning. This had been used as headquarters by members of the group, where they planned

the burglaries and went to split up the plunder.

At this place, Mundine recovered a Polaroid camera and photographic equipment, a moving picture projector, and other items stolen from Roaten's Drug Store on January 25.

On Monday, Sheriff Shivers recovered more of the loot, and a sixth man, Joe Ortiz was arrested and returned to Aransas County jail, where he was lodged along with the rest of the gang. Tuesday evening, Mundine arrested the seventh man, Joe Torres, of Rockport.

A sixteenth burglary that officers were anxious to solve has no connection with this gang, Mundine said, referring to the theft a little over a week ago of approximately 200 pounds of blasting powder and 90 blasting caps from the General Geophysical Company, of Houston.

Sheriff A. C. Shivers questioned gang members on this, but with out result.

She was born in Audubon, Texas, Jan. 8, 1886, the daughter of the late Dr. and Mrs. W. F. McMullen. She received her education in the Rockport schools and in Huntsville, Ala.

A resident of Rockport for the past 57 years, she had been active in many forms of civic work, most notably her work with the American Red Cross which she helped to organize in Aransas County, and her association with the Order of the Eastern Star, of which she was a past matron and the last charter member.

She was also active in the Women of the Presbyterian Church and the Rockport Cemetery Association.

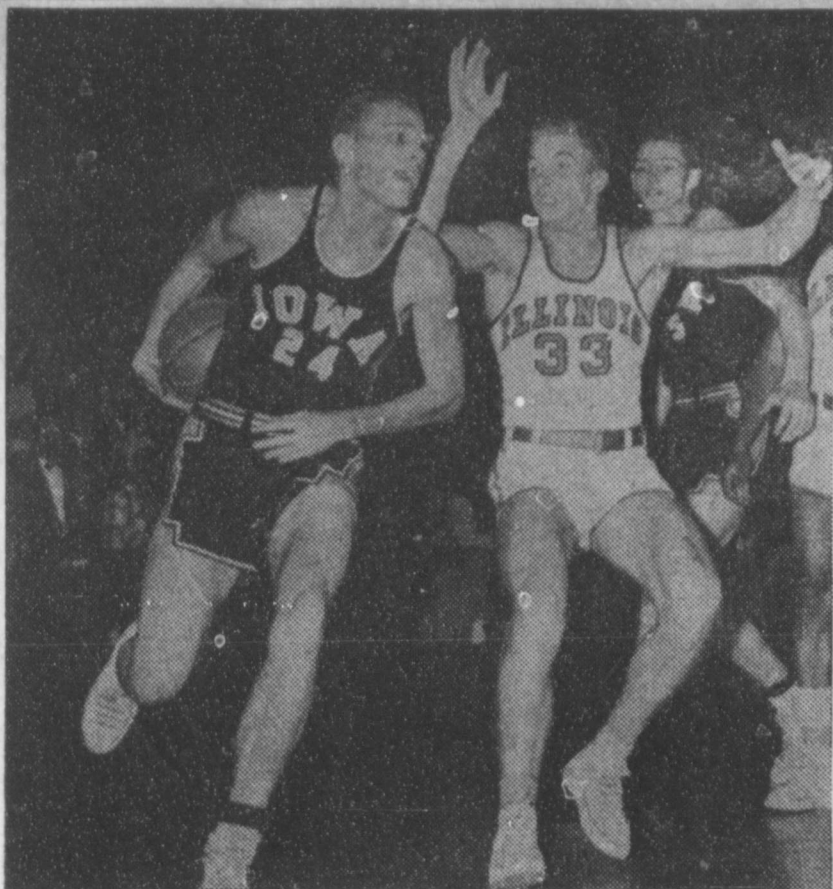

In addition, Gray said, he expects to invite officers of local clubs and service organizations to participate in the meeting, to which all parents of the explorers are also invited.

Scout Troop 49, under Scoutmaster L. W. Tuer is also expected to attend, to talk about the rifle range and to see a film made at the Boy Scout Jamboree last year, which Robert Arley Shivers attended.

At the Monday night meeting, the VFW, explorer post sponsor, will also present the Post with an American flag.

Fire Marshall Asks, Is There Dynamite In Your Home?

It has been called to the attention of the Fire Department that many home owners are still using gasoline, benzine and naphtha for cleaning purposes. One Aransas County house wife recently used benzine on greasy clothes to loosen the oil and grease on her husband's work clothes before placing them in the washer. The fumes were ignited either by one of the automatic switches or the motor of the machine. The resulting explosion tore the machine apart and damaged the surrounding room in the amount of nearly \$200. Fortunately she was not in the room or she might have suffered serious injury.

In another town, recently, a young newly married couple went to their new home to clean the floors where workmen had spotted the surface at the time they installed the plumbing in the kitchen and bath. They expected their furniture to be moved in the next day, so they started cleaning with gasoline, which he had siphoned out of his car. The fumes traveled to the pilot light of the water heater. The resulting explosion and fire wrecked the house and the young couple were so badly burned it was necessary to bury them in sealed caskets.

Another housewife, having been warned that gasoline was dangerous to use near a fire, took a pan of gasoline into the open patio and put the gloves she wished to clean on her hands and washed them in gasoline. A spark of static electricity generated by the rubbing, ignited the gasoline and she spent several months having the skin grafted onto her hands.

Gasoline is liquid dynamite. Four drops of vaporized gasoline will shatter a large sized can, and there are 48,000 drops in a gallon, with a potential power to wreck an entire block of buildings. Gasoline vapor is heavier than air and will flow as far as 100 feet to a source of ignition. The flash will travel back to the source faster than the eye can follow. Gasoline, benzine, and naphtha are always very dangerous; kerosene less so, but it will explode on contact with any hot surface or open flame.

Every day of the year 32 Americans die in fires, 70 or more are injured, 1,200 homes, 116 stores, 105 factories, 15 schools, four theatres and four hospitals are burned with a property loss of \$2,950,000, not counting the loss of time through injuries and job losses. Approximately 3% of the above happens in Texas.

The Rockport Fire Department will answer fire calls but they cannot repair the damage, heal the injured or bring back the dead. They will inspect any private property, at the request of the owner, without charge, to help eliminate fire hazards.

Dealers Have New Deal On Car Dealers License Application

Automobile dealers that want to continue in business have a new deal when it comes to their dealer's licenses, according to Mrs. Margaret Weber, tax deputy in Sheriff A. C. Shivers' office.

Before a dealer's license can be purchased, Mrs. Weber said, the dealer wanting to purchase the dealer's license must have made application to the State Comptroller's Office in Austin for a license to do business in Texas.

When this license is issued by the comptroller, he also assigns a license number to the dealer, and this is called the "store tax number" and must be affixed to any application by any dealer for any dealer's license.

And the dealer can't get this store tax number from the local tax office, but must apply to the comptroller's office in Austin, and must have the store tax number before he can purchase a dealer's license at the local license office. On top of that, if he happens to have two or more establishments, he must have a store tax number for each separate place of business to present at the same time that he goes to his local license office to purchase his dealer's license or licenses.

The purpose of all this new deal, the director of the motor vehicle division in the state comptroller's office says, is to prevent purchase of a dealer's license by someone that it no dealer at all.

Children Unhurt In Trailer Fire Tuesday

The two children of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Brewer who were in the family trailer at Shady Grove Trailer Park when fire broke out were rescued, suffering only minor burns and injury from smoke, although the front end of the structure was gutted and the rest damaged by smoke and water.

Mrs. Brewer, wife of an employee of the Loyd Richardson Tow Boat Co., had left the two children in the trailer while she went to the grocery operated in the park by Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Ormand, and was in the grocery store when the flames and smoke were first noticed by Captain Jack Vein Oeuisen, who alarmed the trailer park.

Mrs. Brewer dashed across the short distance between the store and the trailer, and braving the flames, entered and came out with Billy, 1, while Marvin Pool, who occupies the trailer next to that of the Brewer's, carried Fay, 4, to safety.

Mrs. Ormand said that only the prompt arrival of the Rockport Volunteer Fire Department stopped the conflagration from spreading to other trailers in the immediate neighborhood.

The two children were taken to Dr. Wood's Clinic where they were

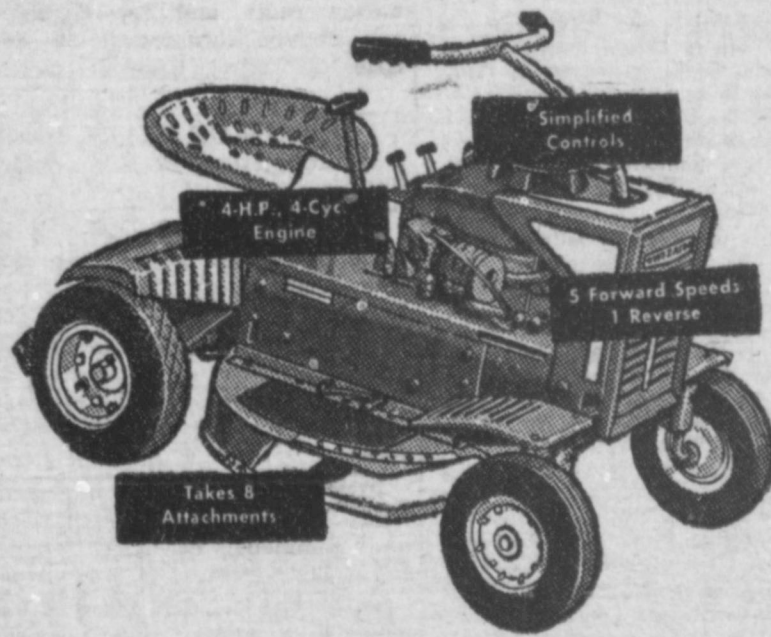

A complaint was filed before a United States Commissioner at San Francisco, Calif., on January 9, 1957, charging George Edward Cole with violation of the Unlawful Flight to Avoid Prosecution Statute in that he fled from the State of California to avoid prosecution after allegedly murdering a police officer.

Cole is described as follows: Born, March 24, 1927, Philadelphia, Pa. Height, 6 feet 1 inch. Weight, 160 to 178 pounds. Build, medium. Hair, brown, receding. Eyes, brown. Complexion, medium. Race, white. Nationality, American. Occupations: bus driver, truck driver, typist. Scars and marks: pit scar on outside corner of right eye, small cut scar on inside of left wrist, appendectomy scar; tattoo, small heart and names "Mem" and "Dad" and letters "GP" or "SP" on left forearm; tattoo, 8-point star on back of left hand. He wears full upper denture.

Cole has previously been convicted of grand larceny and robbery. He reportedly has stated that he will shoot any police officer attempting to apprehend him. Cole is considered armed and dangerous.

Any person having information which might assist in locating this fugitive is requested to immediately notify the Director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, United States Department of Justice, Washington 25, D. C., or the Special Agent in Charge of the nearest FBI Division, the telephone number of which appears on the first page of local telephone directories.

Texas Draft Call For February Is 541

Austin, Texas. — The Texas draft call for February will be the biggest since July 1957, Col. Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director, said Friday.

Colonel Schwartz also announced that Texas draft boards will forward men for pre-induction mental and physical examinations in February. Exams are also scheduled in January.

The state's February call for induction into the Army is 641, as compared with 493 for January, 340 for December, and 346 for November. The quota in July 1957 was 661.

Draft boards will forward more than 2,000 men in February for the pre-induction examinations, in addition to a similar number in January. These are the first such examinations in Texas since the past August, when about 1,500 were examined.

The February quota will be filled with men who are at least 22 years old on Feb. 1, with the exception of volunteers or delinquents, who may be younger.

The Texas quota of 641 for February is the state's share of a national call for the Army of 13,000 men. This is the biggest national quota since July 1957, when the Army asked for 13,000 men.

Highest point in Texas is Guadalupe Peak, 8,551 feet.

Old Aransas County Courthouse Pictured In Houston Chronicle

The old Aransas County courthouse, torn down a couple of years ago to make room for the present modern structure, was featured in a story in the Houston Chronicle rotogravure magazine, "Texas," this past Sunday. The story, entitled "Courthouse Growing Pains," said:

Courthouses come in many styles in Texas.

There's the pseudo-Moorish-Morocco-mid-Victorian type, like the recently demolished Aransas County building, which had a quiet charm all its own, despite domes that aped the minarets of Istanbul and the onion-shaped spires of Moscow's Red Square, and fitted in gracefully with the coastal scene.

Then there were others, built early in this century, like the huge, high old Nueces County courthouse which architects and engineers insist is sound as a dollar. Here you take your courage in your hands and dash through a sort of two-by-four tunnel, one of which adorns each entrance, hoping that none of the terra cotta statuary on the facade will take that moment to fall.

Besides these there is a new type, rising here and there over Texas — modernistic, air-conditioned structures of steel, ceramics, plastic and aluminum, like the new Brazos County courthouse at Bryan, or the multi-storied Harris County courthouse.

Anyone doubting that Texas is suffering from growing pains has only to study the headlines to see that county after county has been beset by lack of room in its courthouse or, what is apparently worse, lack of air-conditioning.

"Our collapsing courthouse" reads one paper, where the county's office building is about to fall down.

"Renovation Almost Completed for San Patricio Courthouse" trumpets a Sinton weekly.

One Cameron County commissioner, tired of constant hassles over the location of the county's offices, suggested building a courthouse on wheels that could be pushed from one municipality to another, on a sort of pro rata basis.

Nor has the transition from the old, high-ceilinged courthouses of yesteryear to modern masonry and interior decorating always been one of unalloyed bliss. After all, the courthouses belong to the people, and Joe Dokes is never backward in his criticism, especially when it comes to politics!

One county judge — after existing in a draughty and rain-swept barn for years, where every change of the weather gave his rheumatism a fit — was severely criticized by a number of his constituents because the color of the wall-to-wall carpeting in his new office offended their aesthetic sensibilities.

But at least he had his office, and that is not always the case, for sometimes the problem of county finance can be rugged.

In one of the larger counties of the state, commissioners were recently faced with the sad news that the state limit on taxation wasn't high enough to service the bond issue necessary for their grandiose new building. In another, by the time commissioners
