

Along The Waterfront



At the meeting of the Sportsmen's Conservation Association on Tuesday night, Ben Vaughan of Corpus Christi, explained the commission's thinking on Cedar Bayou to those assembled.

Maurice Cochran says that "The engineer's estimate of \$2,000,000 for the Cedar Bayou job is out of the question. The Rockport sportsmen agree that this figure is beyond realization. Several of them are attending the meeting in Corpus Christi and taking a plan for opening Cedar Bayou fish pass at a cost of approximately \$300,000."

Roy Swann, in the Corpus Christi Caller, says: "Ben F. Vaughan, Jr., our Corpus Christi member of the Game and Fish Commission, has explained the proposal to every hunting and fishing club in the area, speaking to the Rockport Sportsman's Conservation Association Tuesday night."

"What's going to happen is something else. Everyone has his own, self-rated fish pass idea. It's a cinch some of them are good ones."

"Friday in Vaughan's office something will be done towards coordinating these ideas. A committee from the Copano Sportsman Club, the Rockport group and members of the Port Aransas Boatman's Association and the Laguna Madre Fisherman's Association will meet with Vaughan and Commission executive secretary Howard Dodgen and other commissioners."

"So the coastal project there is not nearly dead and another coastal 'fishing aid' is just about to come to life, meaning the artificial snapper reef is fast coming to reality."

"Actual location of the reef isn't definite, though. Boatmen have advocated a location farther from the jetties over an area known to have had a shell bottom at one time."

"It is generally agreed, though, that the reef should be located as near the jetties as possible so that more fishermen will be able to take advantage of it."

"The whistling buoy area would be perfect. By locating the reef a half mile south, the smaller boaters could locate it easily and it would be accessible to more people than if located farther offshore."

"The reef building project, in case you're not up on the subject, is one that has proven its value in waters off Alabama and Florida."

"Old car bodies and other metal junk simply are dumped—after being tied together so they won't drift around—and left to accumulate marine life. Snapper, grouper and the likes gather around the junk in the depths and sport fish such as kingfish, ling, etc., generally are taken over the same area."

"If the snapper reef proves itself here as it has in other places, it's possible many others will be built along the coast."

36th District Court Case Postponed When Three Hurt at Gregory

A postponement of a case in the 36th District Court came Monday, when three people were hurt in a wreck near Gregory, none of them seriously.

Injured were W. F. Knowlin, 55, San Antonio attorney and driver of one of the cars, who was admitted to Memorial Hospital in Corpus Christi suffering from concussion, cut scalp and chest injuries.

A passenger in Knowlin's car was W. L. Pridgen, 55, also of San Antonio, admitted to Memorial with broken ribs and multiple bruises.

The two cars collided near Gregory, at the intersection of Highway 181 and 35, and the other driver, G. B. Diamond, of 423 Peoples St., Corpus Christi, was only slightly injured, being treated for chest injuries and released.

Deputy Sheriff M. L. Raeder, of San Patricio County, said Knowlin was headed south on 181 and Diamond was driving east on 35 when the cars met. Knowlin was tossed from his car and knocked unconscious for several minutes.

He and Pridgen were en route to Rockport, as parties to a suit filed in 36th District Court, before Judge John Miller, by J. C. May, of Fulton. May alleges that Pridgen defaulted on a contract of sale for land in the Fulton area, and asks damages.

GRAND JURY FINDS SIX TRUE BILLS

The Aransas County Grand Jury, late Tuesday, brought in six true bills.

Tony Sanchez, alias Antonio Garcia, August Rodriguez, and Alfonso (Pancho) Zavala, were named in three of them for burglary of the Fulton Red and White, the Auto Service Company in Rockport, and Johnson's Drug Store, on or about Jan. 10, and bond for Sanchez and Zavala was set at \$3,000 in each case, while that for Rodriguez was assessed at \$2,500 in all three.

Robert George Gwinn, of Aransas Pass, charged with burglary in connection with entry into the premises of W. D. Tollett, in Aransas Pass, on Dec. 23, was indicted and his bond set at \$5,000.

Gwinn is said to have entered the Tollett premises by crawling over an air conditioner, and is alleged to have abstracted a number of company checks from the back of Tollett's check book. These he is alleged to have filled in in the same manner as a bonafide check given to him earlier by Tollett.

One of these checks was cashed at the Billups Station in Portland, another at one of the Biel Grocery stores in Corpus Christi, and a third at the Cotton Club in Corpus Christi.

Douglas D. Barnett was indicted for child desertion, and his bail set at \$3,000.

Rockport Has First Snow Since 1947

Rockport, which hardly knows what snow looks like, woke up Wednesday morning with a blanket of white covering the ground (even though most of it melted by noon) and with snow adorning rooftops, palm trees, and the bursting buds of Spanish daggers, while much of the Coastal Bend suffered likewise.

In Rockport the grass was covered at 7 a. m., but after the sun came out in the middle of the morning the snow melted rapidly, causing no damage to light or telephone company lines and other utilities throughout the area. Temperature at 7 o'clock was just above freezing.

A little over 100 years ago, a heavy freeze hit this area and F. C. Holzheuser, of Victoria, an old timer, was reported in the Gonzales Inquirer a number of years ago, describing the incident.

"On Sunday, May 17, 1857," Holzheuser said, "when I was 17 years old, I went in a small boat from Indianola across the bay to Sand Point. . . . After we had finished eating about 4 o'clock in the afternoon, we observed a black cloud. In half an hour the northwester struck us, and in another hour it was freezing. . . . Before nightfall the waters of the bay had frozen out for a distance of 20 feet from shore. We suffered intensely through the night, as we were all dressed in summer attire. The next morning broke clear and calm and we returned to Indianola."

Aransas County Scholastics Show Gain for 1958

The Aransas County population of scholastics shows a gain of 108 during the past year, leaping from 1,099 at the beginning of 1956 to 1,207 this year, according to Judge John D. Wendell.

In those six years old and younger, there were 67 males and 49 females; seven years, 55 and 74; eight years, 40 and 55; nine years of age, 55 and 61; 10-year-olds numbered 56 and 54.

In the next age group, that of the 11-year-old students, it was 57 males and 60 females; 12 years, 41 and 52; 13 years, 42 and 43; 14 years, 49 and 39; 15 years, 57 and 47; 16 years, 38 and 37; and 17 years, 47 and 32.

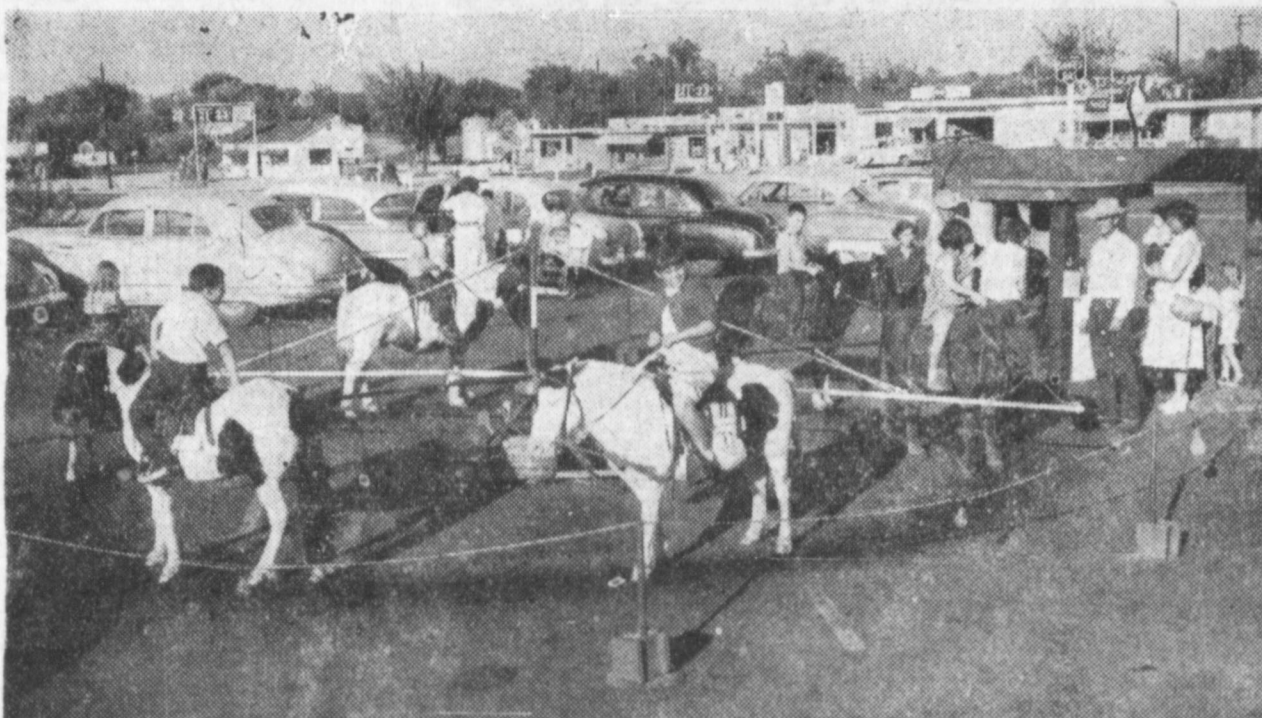

If we wish to know the meaning, use, or spelling of a word we immediately refer to a good dictionary, which is an authority on such matters. If we wish to know the correct time of day, we look for a clock that is regulated by the U. S. Naval Observatory which calculates the correct time from the movements of the sun. In like manner, we seek out a good attorney at law to tell us the meaning of a certain law or statute. We consider these to be an authority in their respective areas.

Now, do we have such an authority in all matters religious? Or can we just each of us go by our "think so"? One man will "think this," and another will "think that," which is just the opposite. Can we ever be sure that we have reached the correct conclusion on such a basis as this?

For example, in 2 Kings chapter 5, we have there an account of a man who was a leper, and he had been told by the prophet of God, Elisha to go and wash in the Jordan seven times that he might be healed of his leprosy. But Naaman said, Behold, I thought, he would come out to me, and stand, and call on the name of his God, and strike his hand over the place, and recover the leper."

This man said, "I thought." But was it to be done the way "he thought," or the way the prophet of God said? Now, beloved, I am glad to tell you that we do have a perfect guide book, rule or standard by which we may weigh, measure, and test all religious teaching: and that is the Bible. Listen now to the word of God, "All Scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness: That the man of God may be perfect, thoroughly furnished unto all good works." (2 Tim. 3:16,17).

May I ask what more do we need? If we need doctrine, reproof, correction, instruction in righteousness, that the man of God may be made perfect, we can get all of that from the Bible. If you wish to know what to do to become a Christian, then read the following Scriptures: Mrk. 16: 16; Acts 2:38; Acts 8:37, 38; Rom. 10: 10; Rom. 6:3-5; Acts 22:16; 1 Pet. 3:21; Acts 3:21; Acts 16:31-34. From these passages, you find that you are to BELIEVE in Christ as God's Son, REPENT of all sins, CONFESS CHRIST before men, and BE BAPTIZED by a burial in water for the remission of sins. Then the Lord will add you to His church. (Mat. 16: 18; Acts 2:47). How much plainer could the Lord have made it? Is that not simple enough for all? It's time we were swapping our "think so's" for the Lord's say so's.

Judge Stephen Rice, III, Passes Away Sunday

Judge Stephen E. Rice, III, about 63, died Sunday evening at 7:30 in Bethesda Hospital, Washington, D. C., after a lingering illness.

Born in Apalachicola, Fla., he was a graduate of the U. S. Naval Academy at Annapolis, and during World War II served as deck officer of the carrier USS Lexington. He was wounded in the battle of Leyte Gulf, when a Japanese pilot crashed a Kamikaze plane on the flight deck. Complications from the injuries received at that time eventually resulted in his death.

It was while serving on the Lexington that he received a citation for bravery. An American plane landed on deck, with a torpedo still aboard, and Rice, with complete disregard for his own safety, was instrumental in securing the torpedo before it was detonated, and in disarming it.

Returning from the Navy with the rank of Captain, he was shortly afterwards appointed to the Tax Court of the United States, on the bench of which he was serving at the time of his death.

He was well-known in Rockport where he frequently visited his uncle, R. R. Rice.

Judge Rice is survived by his widow, Len, and two sons, Stephen E. Rice, IV, and Jeffrey, of Oakton, Va.

Plaintiff seeking equitable review asks to set aside a settlement made with her husband, Clifford Mooers, dated May 1, 1956, and this Court's decree of approval entered the next day in cause No. 1464, styled "Ex Parte: Clifford Mooers and Wife, Dolores Mooers," recorded in the minutes, Vol. 6, p. 636, and asks an accounting and for a declaration fixing the identity of the residuary devisee under a purported will of such husband as admitted to probate December 10, 1956, in which suit it is claimed that plaintiff as the wife of such decedent for 27 years before his death was induced to consent to such property settlement and decree by the fraud of her husband and his agents, consisting of false representations and concealment of material facts as to the nature, extent and value of the community property and of plaintiff's true interest therein at such time, and because of further false promises to bequeath and on account of mistake induced by fraud of her said husband and coercion; and it is claimed that a fraud was also practiced by such decedent on this Court, and that the proceedings did not comply with Article 2624a.

It is further claimed in such suit that all or substantially all property in decedent's name at the time of such settlement and at the time of his death was community property, and that had the wife received those properties awarded to her in such settlement, such were greatly less than her share at such time, and such contract was grossly unjust and disadvantageous to her; but that there was further material fraud and deceit practiced on her as to those properties which it was recited she was to receive under such settlement because of failure of title and of consideration in material part and inability to deliver and failure to deliver personal property of the kind and value which it was represented such wife should receive.

Plaintiff offers to do equity and makes a continuing tender to restore that which she has received and asserts that due to her situation, inexperience, ignorance and deception she could not sooner have discovered such fraud and brought this action.

It is further claimed that since such husband's death the defendant H. B. Fuqua, acting as Independent Executor under the pur-

ported will of such husband, has come into possession of but has not distributed all of those properties which the husband wrongfully took under such settlement and decree and in which plaintiff had a continuing equitable ownership and interest, and that the other defendants are claiming to own or have some interest in such properties and estate as the respective cash legatees and residuary devisee under such purported will; and that among such properties are lands and interests in lands within the State of Texas including those described, listed and identified in such petition, including the following:

ton court. The meeting ended with the councilmen promising to explore the situation.

On Monday of this week, Le-Blanc and Jackson appeared again before the Commissioners' Court. The commissioners, after considerable discussion, pointed out that funds were not available at this time for hiring additional deputies, and would not be under the present budget. They promised the committee members, however, that the court would bend every effort to work out a program whereby more law enforcement would be available in the county.

At the City Council meeting on Monday night, councilmen decided that hiring of a city policeman, while desirable, was financially impossible at this time. Councilmen stated that to hire such a law enforcement officer and to set up the necessary legal machinery to back him up would cost in the neighborhood of \$10,000 a year which the city did not have.

One councilman suggested that, on the ballot to be used for the upcoming city general election, later in the year, a place should be provided to allow voters to express themselves in the matter. Particularly did he want to know whether they were willing to submit to the necessary added taxation necessary to support a police department and a corporation court.

First Snow—

"Sixty Years in the Nueces Valley," is a classic, tells of another storm in January, 1872, when a terrific blizzard swept down from the north. Within a short time on Jan. 10 ten inches of snow and sleet lay on the ground, and the next morning a deep white blanket of snow shrouded the hundreds of head of cattle that lay in drifts, dead of cold and exposure.

The freeze of 1886-1887 was another buster, with bays in the area icing over, and the channel at Port Aransas frozen as far out as Cline's Point on the Cove side.

In 1897 there was an inch of snow on Jan. 25, followed by a few flakes the next day. On Jan. 27, it snowed two inches and on Jan. 28 three more.

A cold norther blew the water out of Redfish Bay, and then snow covered the bottom. Aransas Bay became so cold that fish were paralyzed and hundreds of tons of them drifted ashore.

Another exceptionally cold spell came in 1910.

In 1924, several old timers in the area remember wading in the shallows near Fulton, breaking the ice to pick up large fish that were so numbed with cold that they couldn't swim, and hundreds of thousands of pounds more were frozen and wasted.

Corpus Christi weather bureau records show that there was a snow storm on Jan. 23, 1926.

Nineteen-thirty was another exceptionally cold winter.

A couple of years later, two-tenths of a ninch of snow fell in March, 1932, but the next considerable spell of snow and ice waited until 1940 to arrive, and lasted for four or five days, with tremendous destruction of fish, cattle and water pipes.

Major freezes apparently occur about every 14 years, but after this one in 1940 there were severe ones in 1945, 1947, and 1951. In this last year Valley citizens and millions upon millions of pounds of fish were destroyed. However, after such freezes, biological investigation has shown that the fish populations recuperate within three or four years.
