Silver Bay Completes Snapper Cruise Off Texas, East of Rockport

The M/V Silver Bay returned to Pascagoula on February 10, completing a 20-day experimental red snapper trawling trip off the Texas coast. 39 trawling stations, were made on broken and hard bottom in depths of 10 to 100 fathoms, using a 52-foot, 41/2" mesh nylon trawl and a 76-foot, 5" mesh mainla trawl. Both trawls Starts Complete were rigged in the standard New England style with rollers along the footrope and V-D rig between Remodeling Mon. the net and doors.

Red snapper catches ranged from 0 to 475 pounds per haul. Except for one drag in 23 fathoms, all catches from inside of 40 fathoms contained less than 100 pounds of snapper. On February 3, during a short period of calm weather, 4 drags were made with the nylon trawl in 40 to 50 fathoms, in the area bordered by 27°43' to 47' north by 95°37' to 43' west, which yielded 580 pounds of snapper. 

Texas Shrimp Landings For Year Higher

Although the Brownsville area still continues to lead in shrimp landings, with the Aransas Pass-Corpus Christi region second, with the other ports of the Texas coast retaining their same relative positions, shrimp landings as a whole fell steeply during December, according to the latest report of the US Fish and Wildlife Service. The total last month, for all ports, was only 2,163,000 pounds, compared to 4,225,000 in November, which was a drop itself. Nevertheless, for the entire year, Texas is approximately ten million pounds of shrimp tails ahead of 1956.


