## Additions Made At Goose Island

A. Y. Wofford, manager of Goose Island State Park, says that his crews and various contractors have just finished making many additions to the park before the start of the summer tourist season.

On Goose Island itself, there have been six new camping shelters completed, making 14 that are now available. In addition, he said, an extension has been added to the shower house and commodes installed in the extension. This is a new departure for the park, and one of which he is very proud. Moreover, he added, three additional latrines have been added to those already on the island.

The concession building has been completely rewired throughout, which has long been needed, and which was called to the attention of the State Park Board at the time of their visit here, several years ago, when Seth Steele was chairman of the local parks advisory board.

The picnic area is now completely fenced, Wofford said, and all stock is excluded from it. Besides this, an old well has been rehabilitated, a new pump house built, and water distributed in that portion of the park through a system of hydrants.

To complete the list of improvements, he said that a small room was also being added to the park manager's dwelling.

## School Board Makes Two Policy Changes

**Driver Education No Longer Required Subject; Physical Education Credits Not To Be Given For Athletics and Marching Band, Elliot Says**

The Aransas Co. Independent School District hired five teachers at its regular meeting; leased a site for a youth recreation center; an dtook a long look at the Hale-Aikin report, after which two radical changes in school policy were approved, dealing with driver education and athletics.

A. B. LeFevre, who has been teaching in the Pharr-San Juan-Alamo District, was hired as principal of the high school, replacing Jack Horton, who resigned

## Bike Inspection Slated Saturday

Plans for the bicycle rodeo and inspection, to be held under the auspices of Troop 49, Boy Scouts, at the Aransas County Woman's Club building are shaping up nicely, according to Scoutmaster Louis Tuer.

The project is being sponsored by the local troop and the Aransas County Safety Council, and is designed to bring about safety bicycle practices and to develop safety conscious bike riders. Such training is invaluable, for in a few years, Tuer points out, these will be the drivers of automobiles on the highways.

Bicycles which have a headlight, horn, or bell and all standard equipment in good working condition will be checked and given an A rating, Tuer said. Bicycles with no lights, bell, or horn, but which have all standard equipment in good working condition, will be given a B rating, he said. The program will be set up in where bikes will be checked for four stages.

Step one will be inspection, the above features, as well as loose chains, handlebars, etcetera, and adjustments made if possible.

Step two will consist of a short written test and the proper answers to the various questions are as follows:

1. Bicycle riders should always use a hand signal before making a turn.
2. Bicycles do not have the right of way over pedestrians.
3. Cyclists should not carry parcels under one arm while they are riding.
4. It is not safe to carry an extra rider on your bike.
5. A bicycle should be ridden on the right hand side of the street.
6. An eight sided sign means stop.
7. A street is not a good place to practice stunts on a bike.
8. Before making a left turn a

earlier this year. Mrs. LeFevre was also hired to teach in the junior high school, as was C. D. Snyder, formerly of Thailand.

Mrs. Snyder was employed as an elementary school teacher, and Mrs. James Kautz, the former Mary Martha Scott, was rehired, after having been out of the system for several years.

Dr. H. F. Elliot, president of the school board, says that this leaves only five vacancies yet to be filled. Three of these are replacements and two are new departments, special education for retarded children and a music teacher for the elementary grades, that the board decided to add after a study of the Hale-Aikin report.

Elliot said that the board had also signed a lease allowing the Aransas County Youth Sponsors a site for the long-needed youth center. The ground just east of the present high school home economics building will be used, he said, and the old barracks building at present on the Rockport Elementary School property.

According to Elliot, the youth sponsors and Aransas County young people have accumulated enough money through a variety of projects to move the building as soon as school is out, and to fix it up as a club house.

Minor repairs are being made to the present home economics building, the school board president stated. Once these are completed, the place will serve as an administrative office to be used by the new school superintendent and his secretary. The superintendent, who will take over in June when Pat Greene retires, is J. D. Gray, who comes to Rockport from Pearland.

This is necessary, Elliot said, so that two of the offices formerly occupied by Greene may be used by LeFevre and his secretary, while the third will be used as a counselling office. The office now occupied by the principal of the high school will be turned over to Chester Barre, who will begin his first full term as principal of the junior high school this coming fall.

Two radical departures in school policy were approved also, President Elliot stated.

First, the board decided, driver education is no longer a required subject, and no child or youth under 15 years old may enroll for the course, although it will still be available to those above that age.

In the second alteration in policy, physical education credits will not be given for participation in athletics. All students must take the regular physical education course, as is required by law, and athletics and marching band will be on an after school basis, and not during scheduled class hours. Nor will credit be given, as has been stated, for either athletics or marching band, both of which have been taken in the past as a substitute for physical education.

In other action, the board tabled a request for an addition to the athletic plant in the form of a track, and discussed steps to be taken in order to sell the old Fulton school property. The board decided to deed to Fulton Church the land on which it is built, and which had been orally deeded to it by the old Fulton School District.

The Fulton Lions and the Fulton Fire Department were authorized to move their buildings from the property and, once this is done, the School Board will offer the old school building and the 12 lots on which it stands for sale, some time in the near future.

The call states that the bonds will be for acquisition "of additional facilities, including the first phase of harbor improvements at the Cove and Little Bay, including dredging, the construction of protective dikes, levees, embankments and means of access and the construction of additions

to the existing harbor improvements in the said district at Fulton."

Chairman of the Navigation District Dick Picton said that work at the Cove at this time will consist of dredging a basin, with approximately 4500 to 5000 feet of water frontage; installation of roadways and a fresh water supply system; and space for rail facilities, such as the harbor was originally planned in 1954.

This basin will not be bulkheaded he said, but it will be protected by a levee of medium height against storm damage.

"Recent soil borings have shown sandstone, shell and caliche underlying the area," he said, "and this will permit us to dredge with a steeper slope than in sand or silt, and it will also mean the sides of the basin should stand up well without bulkheading."

"It is the thinking of the Navigation Board," he continued "that, this basin should be rented on a front foot basis, as are basins at Brownsville and Aransas Pass." Lessees will be allowed, within requirements set up by the Navigation Board, to bulkhead or not, depending on their needs.

"The eastern side of Conn Brown Harbor in Aransas Pass is not bulkheaded over most of its length," Picton said, "and where they are preparing to lengthen it about 2500 feet without any type of retaining wall, the City of Aransas Pass has already been besieged by prospective lessees. In fact, they have had twice as many applicants for the frontage as they have room for."

"At the same time, to preserve the greatest possible flexibility in meeting customers' requirements at the Cove, they will be allowed to construct the type of piers and wharves that will fit their individual needs."

"Experience elsewhere has shown that this type of harbor leases well, and certainly it keeps the taxpayers' load at a minimum."

Picton pointed out that the Cove is a commercial type harbor, designed to give storm protection as well, and not a yacht basin. This first phase, which the Navigation District intends to construct if the bond issue passes, will be roughly equal in size to Conn Brown Harbor, at Aransas Pass, giving plenty of room, with a minimum depth of 12 feet.

In addition to the completion of the Cove, work on the first phase of the long range plan for Little Bay will be carried on, and some minor work at Fulton, Picton said.

The Commissioners Court, in calling the election, also named the polling places and election judges.

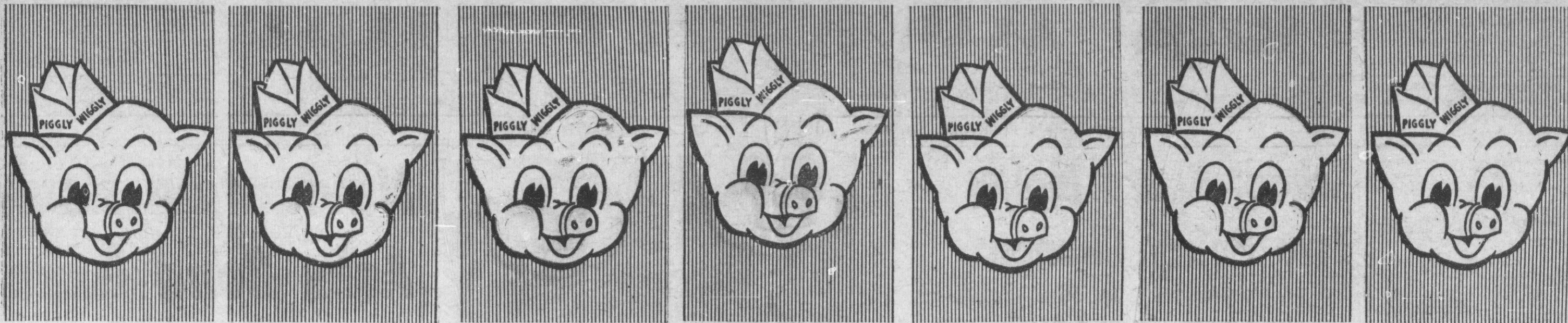

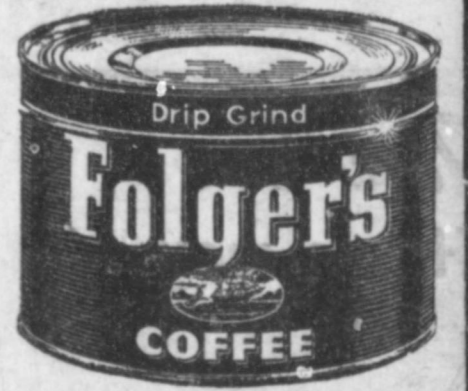

- bike rider should make a hand signal by extending the left arm sideways. 9. It is not wise to ride through an intersection while cars are making turns. 10. A package rack helps a bicycle rider who is trying to ride safely. 11. When approaching a flashing red light, a cyclist should stop, and only proceed when it is safe. 12. Bicycles ridden at night should not have a red light shining toward the front. 13. Before making a turn, a bike rider should look back to see if there is traffic close behind. 14. The smart cyclist wear light colored clothing when riding at night. 15. When approaching a flashing yellow light, a bike rider should slow down and then move ahead only when it is safe. 16. Cyclists should obey all traffic signals. 17. Bicycles should be walked across heavily traveled streets. 18. Riding in a single line is the sensible thing to do. 19. When passing a parked car, you should ride three feet away from it, and give warning with your horn or bell. 20. The rider should not rest by taking his feet off the pedals when tired. After passing this test, Tuer said, bike owners will test their skill by going through two tests courses which will be marked off in the street in front of the Woman's Club building, which the Navigation District has given permission to close while the inspection is going on. Stage four will be handled by Sergeant H. E. Hale, of the Texas Highway Patrol, and Sheriff A. C. Shivers, who will award certificates to those satisfactorily completing the tests. The different stages will be manned by members of the Safety Council and members of Explorer Post 49 will act as judges on the skill tests. They will also render assistance where needed.

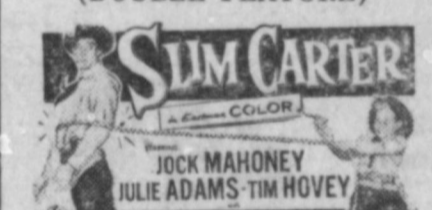

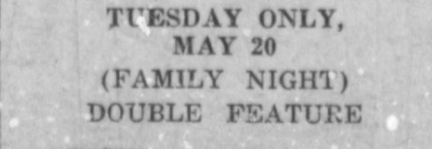

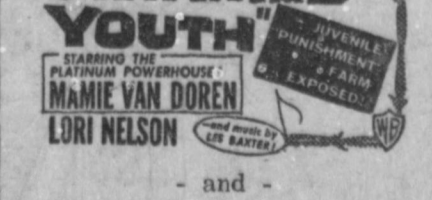

He preached at his own church, the Woodlawn Hills Baptist, and was active in founding the Baptist Church of Castroville.

Meantime, he was chronicling the colorful folklore of Southwest Texas, and working on an "eyewitness" account of the great Exodus of the Jews from Egypt, under the leadership of Moses.

That book, which is non-denominational, is now off the press, and tells the story in plain, simple language by a young man, the eyewitness of the events.

Blackwell, who is well-known in Rockport, said that he tried to capture the unspeakable horror of the Egyptian slave camps; the travail of the journey to the promised

ARANSAS COUNTY HAS NO ACCIDENTS ON FATAL LIST

During April, according to a recent release from the Highway Department, traffic accidents occurring in the Corpus Christi District took 15 lives, but passed Aransas County by.

An analysis of records indicates that vehicles traveling highways in the South Texas area of Corpus Christi in 1957 were driven slower than in 1956. Statewide in 1957 there was a 1.6 miles per hour reduction from 1956 in the average speed of all vehicles traveling rural highways. Also in 1957, only 6% of the vehicles traveling Texas rural highway were exceeding 60 miles per hour compared to 15.6% in 1956.

In 1956, 4,472 speeding arrests were made by Highway Patrolmen in the Corpus Christi District. Of the 4,472, 229 were charged with driving 90 or more miles per hour and 70 of the 229 were charged with driving 100 or more miles per hour.

In 1957, speeding arrests in a comparative area totaled 4,339. It was only the second year since 1950 that speeding arrests were less than in the previous year. Of the 4,339 speeding arrests in 1957, 160 were charged with driving 90 or more miles per hour and 37 of the 160 were charged with driving 100 or more miles per hour.

Of the 160 charged with driving 90 or more miles per hour in 1957, 120 were charged with such violation at night, 40 during the day.

Careless Home Training Causes Delinquency

ARANSAS PASS—At a five-county law enforcement conference attended by officials from Aransas, Bee, San Patricio, Live Oak and McMullen counties, approximately 250 were told that juvenile delinquency is largely the fruit of careless training at home, and will continue until parents recognize this fact and do something about it.

This conclusion was reached during an afternoon session where H. W. Herndon, superintendent of schools at Odem; the Rev. Bill Arnold, pastor of the First Baptist Church at Aransas Pass; the Rev. Dale Hasson, of the First Methodist Church here, and County Judge John Monroe of Beeville discussed the problem.

Failure of parents to devote the necessary time to training their children in Christian homes is the main cause of delinquency, the panel said. All other problems such as drugs and drinking are merely contributory factors.

Sponsored by the cities of Rockport, Aransas Pass, Gregory, Portland and Ingleside, the conference was the first of its kind in the area, and various civic organizations of Aransas Pass also aided in its success. Staff Sergeant Emmett E. McPherson, of the 813th AC&W Squadron at Rockport is attending a driver's course this week at Foster Air Force Base. This course will qualify the sergeant to instruct the local squadron's private vehicle driver's education program.

The 813th will start its program to train all of its men who are 25 years of age or under, in safe and skillful driving practices as soon as Sergeant McPherson returns.

The squadron now has nine men under the age of 25 who have never had civilian driver's training either in high school or otherwise. These men will undergo a 10-hour course of instruction as a part of an Air Force-wide training program aimed at cutting down accidents in airmen's privately owned vehicles.

This is the second in a series of features on Air Force personnel stationed at Rockport Air Force Station, one of the Air Defense Command's newest aircraft control and warning units.

This week's feature is about a sergeant who has more service with the United States Air Force to his credit than any other person assigned to the 813th Aircraft Control and Warning Squadron.

M/Sgt. Gerald B. Stockton Master Sergeant Gerald B. Stockton was born at Liberty Hill, Texas, and graduated from high school there in 1928. He later attended Southwestern University and the University of Texas. He was employed in his father's drug store in Leander, Texas, immediately preceding his entry into the Armed Forces.

Sergeant Stockton's first experience with the air arm was in March, 1934, when he first enlisted in the old Army Air Corps. He was assigned to Randolph Air Force Base near San Antonio where he received six weeks of basic training. This was followed by a nine-month course in airplane and engine mechanics at Chanute Air Force Base, Illinois.

The Air Corps was still in its infancy in those days and the sergeant worked on the "line" maintaining such old ships as PT-3's, PT-3A's and PT-11D's, old hand crank jobs, which were used at the time as primary trainers for aviation cadets. Beside the present day Air Force super sonic jets and super-charged propeller driven aircraft, those old "crates" would seem like museum pieces.

After spending his first three-year enlistment in the Air Corps at Randolph Air Force Base, the sergeant was discharged in March, 1937, and was employed the next day with the Petty Geophysical Engineering Company of Carthage, Texas. In this job he started as a buck boy and worked up the ladder to observer in that oil investigation service, before the Nazis and Nippons began to warm up for the big onslaught.

Then, in 1939, with the war drums clanging in Europe and the Far East, Stockton, who had retained his reserve status with the Army Air Corps since his discharge in 1937, was recalled to active duty and assigned to the First Bombardment Squadron, Mitchell Field, N. Y., where he worked as a mechanic on B-18 bombers. Later, as the nation was shoring up its defenses and new units were being formed, Sergeant Stockton joined the newly formed 22nd Bombardment Squadron, which was later to see a lot of combat. The new unit was immediately moved to Langley Field, Virginia for training.

On Dec. 7, 1941, the sergeant with his squadron had just returned from maneuvers with their new B-26's, one of the newest of the Air Force's medium bombers, a low level attack bomber, much used during World War II.

Three days after Pearl Harbor, the sergeant's unit was moved to March Air Force Base, Calif. At this point, the build up in Armed Forces strength was terrific, and on Jan. 31, 1942, the sergeant and his unit were moved en masse to Australia where they participated in the early engagements of the Southwest Pacific. During that time, he served in technical supply.

In November of 1942, Sergeant Stockton was moved, as the fighting in the Pacific progressed in favor of the Allies, to New Guinea, where he stayed with his unit until early 1944 when he was returned to the United States for a special assignment to Combat Crew Training at Sioux City, Iowa. Later in 1944 he was returned to the combat area in New Guinea, where he remained until VE Day. Immediately after VE Day, he was rotated to the United States.

In June, 1947, the sergeant was again assigned to the Far East, this time, for duty with the Air Advisory Group in Nanjing, China. He remained on that assignment until the Red Chinese crossed the United States to withdraw all of its troops in 1949.

Upon withdrawing from China, he was transferred to Japan for

## Boatel Newest Business On The Waterfront

Bob and Levice Allen, after five years in India as state Department employees, are now living in Rockport, where they operate what is probably the only boatel in existence.

And a boatel—just in case you wondered—as a floating motel, without a carport.

This one of the Allen's is a flat-bottomed affair, 34 feet long and ten feet wide, that floats in sixteen inches of water, although it requires eighteen inches to operate properly.

It is powered by a 35 horse power outboard, which Bob says is sufficient to give a speed of ten or twelve miles an hour, and it will accommodate six people, or seven, if the steward is included. Its total weight is about four tons, and it is built of plywood.

It has a power plant aboard, to provide electricity for lighting, cooking, a refrigerator, hot water heater for the shower, TV or radio, and a washing machine. And, naturally, there's a head.

There is a 10 x 20 foot cabin with foam rubber divans and a dinette, which, when expanded, will sleep persons without the rollaway bed for the steward or captain, which Allen expects to furnish.

Allen was an electrical engineer before he went in the boatel business.

But he wanted a business on the water that would provide fun and a livelihood, so at an age when most men are looking at their retirement policy, he took off for Greece, and later for India, working on rural electrification for the cash needed to start his venture.

In India he met red-headed Levice, who approved of his idea, and married him to show that she did.

Back to the U. S. they came, and up and down the Texas coast they went, looking, inquiring, and investigating. At Rockport they

The Allens, who live in the Sid Richardson property, have been here most of the winter and spring, working away on their idea, getting the bugs out of everything and getting ready for the tourist season with the first boatel business in the part of the world, a radical and interesting departure in the marine world.

And it's certainly a comfortable one, even to the sun deck on top of the cabin, where you can lay and loaf, if you don't want to fish.

### Simultaneous Shots Can Speed Protection From Polio For Infants

Children as young as two or three months should have their first shot of Salk polio vaccine which can be given at the same time as protection against whooping cough usually given at this age, according to Dr. Thomas M. Rivers, NFIP Medical Director.

"Recent studies indicate that polio vaccine given simultaneously with other vaccines for infants provides safe, effective immunity," Dr. Rivers said. "Thus, protection against paralytic polio can be started early in life and mothers and doctors can be saved the inconvenience of extra visits for polio shots.

"Doctors usually start two and three-month-old babies on DPT, a triple vaccine against diphtheria, pertussis (whooping cough) and tetanus," he said, "because whooping cough can kill the very young. Smallpox vaccination is often delayed to save the baby discomfort. Since the Salk vaccine is a mild injection with no ill-effects, there is no reason to delay protection against paralytic polio."

Paralytic polio in the very young, though relatively rare, Dr. Rivers pointed out, is particularly tragic because a severe attack may result in a whole life scarred by this crippling disease. He cited the case of an unvaccinated 18-week-old baby boy in Houston, Texas who was stricken with polio in February and is now in an iron lung.

Dr. Rivers based his recommendation on two independent studies by National Foundation grantees. Safe, effective vaccination of two-month-old infants with Salk vaccine in one arm and DPT in the other arm has been reported by Dr. Gordon C. Brown, Professor of Epidemiology at the University of Michigan School of Public Health.
