WHY AND WHERE THE "SPAGHETTI WORM"

All of us who go fishing in the bays and gulf are at times plagued with and bothered by the presence of "spaghetti worms" in the flesh of the fish we catch. Their presence does not affect the savor of the meat nor are they harmful when eaten, but they can decidedly tame the appetite of the uninitiated.

The Marine Laboratory of the Texas Fish and Game Department here in Rockport is undertaking a program to learn more about the why and where of the worm. They are particularly interested in determining the numbers or the infestation of the worms in some of our more common sport fishes, such as the Sea Trout, Black Drum and the Redfish. This is a problem which should be of interest to us all. Bill McFarland, who is working on the problem at the Marine Laboratory, says that very little is known about these creatures. How they actually find their way into the flesh of the fish is a baffling problem, although it is most probable that the fish are infected through some of the food they eat.

Bill tells us that although wormy fish are common in this area they are not always easy to obtain. Therefore, he would appreciate our help in getting wormy specimens. So if you're out fishing and get a wormy one don't throw it away. If you eat the fish cut off a steak containing the spaghetti worms. Place it in the ice box or if possible freeze it until you get a chance to give it to Bill at the Marine Lab.

McFarland assures us that he will not eat any specimens we

turn in, but rather hopes that in this manner he will be able to get a clearer picture on the incidence of infection.
