
Funeral services for August Leon Domaschk, 16, were held at 2 p.m. Saturday at Cagle-Marshall Chapel, here in Rockport.

Council Says That Everyone Must Tie On To Sewers or Install Septic Tanks Within City Limits By September 1

Acting upon the advice of the newly appointed city health officer, Dr. W. S. Hughes, the city council has banned use of outdoor toilets within the city of Rockport after September 1, and then, in other action, tentatively approved a 1958-59 budget and instructed the city attorney to request property owners whose buildings encroach on downtown Austin street to have these moved by July 20.

Property owners must tie on to the city sewer or install septic tanks approved by the health officer, or face prosecution after the

first of September, with penalties running from not less than a \$10 fine to not more than \$200 for every day of non-compliance.

Further than this, the council requested Hughes to see that the garbage law is enforced. Specifying that all garbage must be placed in covered cans of not more than 30 gallons capacity, and that these cans shall be kept covered at all times, councilmen said that there was so many violations that a crackdown was necessary to protect the city's health.

Here, too, the penalty can be a stiff one, with a maximum fine of \$100 specified by the city ordinance.

In other action, the council approved a city budget of \$58,000 for 1958-59.

City secretary Jean Tuer told councilmen that they might expect an income of \$46,014.10 from a 90% collection of taxes, and that this would be supplemented by \$6,375.90 from curb and gutter levies and \$5,250 from other sources.

Mayor Collum's recommendation included \$10,000 for the street fund, \$7,200 to be devoted to retirement of school house refunding and street improvement bonds, and \$40,800 for the general fund. This last was broken down as follows: Office expense, \$3,500; salaries, \$3,500; social security, \$1,500; garbage collection, \$13,000; street lights, \$4,500; fire department, \$2,500; insurance, \$1,500; parks, \$500; building fund, \$500; and \$10,800 for general operations.

Carl Vickers, contractor for the well now being drilled to supplement the city water supply, reported to the council that he had been unable to complete it to specifications, as it did not produce the required 200 gallons a minute, and the sand content was too high.

Vickers, during the course of the talk, told the council that it should start considering the time, which he said was not too far away, when well water would be inadequate for the area's needs, and to make every effort to tie on to the San Patricio Municipal Water District, or some similar source of supply, for within 10 years, or perhaps less, this would undoubtedly be necessary.

Mayor Collum then told the city council that four businesses on downtown Austin Street, Mary's Malt, the Sea Shell Shoppe, Caspary and Wendell and Hinton's Fish Market encroached upon the proposed right of way for the Highway 35 Business Route, and showed a Highway Department map indicating that they protruded into the dedicated street.

The council, after some discussion, asked City Attorney Richard Hatch to draft a letter to the two property owners involved, asking that they move the buildings from the street by July 20.

10,000 Wieners Ordered For Lions Barbecue On 4th

This the Board promised.

In other action, Commissioners Picton, Owens, and Atwood, of the District, went over plans for the Cove, south of town, where they have projected a new harbor, and in the Little Bay area, where they have still other construction planned.

The Board approved the preliminary work done on the Cove which was presented to them by Homer Innis, Lockwood and Andrews, engineer, but told them to wait on preparing specifications for the Cove harbor, after the District's lawyer, Ellis L. Clark had cleared up one or two legal matters in connection with the harbor site, which, they said, should be done before the next meeting of the board.

They did authorize Innis to proceed with the preliminary planning phase on the Little Bay project.

Money for these was recently voted in a \$300,000 bond election.

WATER DISTRICT HEARING SLATED

The State Board of Water Engineers, in response to a petition from the Fulton area, has set August 4 as the date on which it will hold a public hearing on the matter, in Austin.

Citizens of the area, after a series of protracted meetings, decided some time ago that the only answer to rapidly accumulating water problems in the Fulton area lay in the formation of a water and sewer district.

This, they said, would lower insurance rates, give better fire protection, and better water and sanitary facilities, all badly needed in a section where surface pollution of wells had been increasing.

According to the notice of the hearing, the project is expected to cost in the neighborhood of \$495,000, if the District is formed and voters approve it.

New Restaurant Uses Different Sales Approach

Carlton Crawford, well-known along the Texas coast as an operator whose fleet combs the Gulf for seafoods, has developed an unusual sales approach. He catches his fish and shrimp, brings them in to his big freezing plant and kitchen at Palacios where they are properly prepared, and then sells them through the chain of seafood restaurants he has been building up over the last five years, newest of which will open in Rock-

port next week. "I was in the restaurant business before I was in the seafood business on our present scale," he said, "and I got the idea of combining them, so that people along the coast and inland would learn to know what good seafood tastes like."

The new restaurant, one of the largest in this part of the country, seating some 140 people, is the result of this idea.

"We couldn't do this without a lot of thought," Crawford said, "and a lot of special equipment. I believe we have one of the few really big shrimp peeling machines along the Gulf Coast. We can put whole shrimp into the machine, and they'll come out peeled, de-veined, graded by size, completely cleaned, and packaged without ever being touched by hand."

"The machine covers 7000 square feet of floor space and can produce 1400 pounds of incipient cocktails an hour. Of course, people like shrimp other ways, also, and not all of the production is used in cocktails."

"We don't butterfly our shrimp to make them look bigger than they really are, and we don't smother them in breading the way some people do, and a lot of folks like them that way. Shrimp supreme, a mixture of the delectable crustaceans with mushrooms, mac-

aroni, crisp bacon and seasoning is another fine way to serve them, and there is shrimp remoulade, shrimp creole, shrimp salad, and shrimp mushroom chowder as well."

Crawford didn't start with shrimp, however, for 30 years ago his first venture into the food business was an unsuccessful fig cannery at Palacios. The fruit and trees went bad, and to try to recoup his losses, Crawford went into the seafood canning business.

He had more success at this, and over a period of time, his operations expanded until they included a big fleet of deep sea trawlers, a complete machine shop and boat ways to care for them, a freezing plant, a kitchen and now the chain of seafood eating places, of which the one here is the latest.

This, which he has leased from Emory Spencer, has just been completely remodeled and expanded by Spencer, who has developed an establishment that seats 140 persons in the coffee shop and dining room, paneled in rare woods and indirectly lighted, and completely air conditioned.

Crawford's operations at Palacios employ from 75 to 300 people, and his five restaurants utilize almost as many more, all started because he made a failure in the fig canning business.

HAROLD PARISH OPENS CAMPAIGN FOR RE-ELECTION AS STATE REPRESENTATIVE

TAFT — State Representative Harold Parish today opened his formal campaign for reelection as San Patricio, Aransas and Refugio Counties. He cited his record of accomplishments and his seniority that will make his services even more valuable in the future.

Parish is chairman of the influential House Agriculture Committee and for the first time in the history of Texas was able to get a 100% favorable committee action on all problems presented by the Agricultural Industry and the Farm Bureau of Texas. He is this district's first member of the policy making Legislature Council which is preparing legislative recommendations for the next Legislature. As an experienced and active legislator on water legislation, during the First Called Session last year he served as the House conference committee chairman which ironed out the differences in House and Senate versions of the water planning bill which has been called "the most constructive piece of water legislation ever passed by the Legislature of Texas." He sponsored a bill creating the 156th Judicial District Court for Aransas, San Patricio, Bee, Live Oak and McMullen Counties. With the support of Aransas County citizens Parish secured the largest appropriation ever made to the Goose Island State Park. He initiated the move for and was instrumental in obtaining a State causeway between Aransas Pass and Harbor Island which is now under construction. He has worked for his district to obtain recognition of coastal problems by the Game and Fish Commission which recently resulted in the Commission's appropriation of \$375,000 for the opening of Cedar Bayou. He secured passage of a bill which permits San Patricio County to issue

certificates of indebtedness, to be retired by current tax levies, to buy highway rights of way, a bill that removed the necessity for a \$500,000 bond issue which would have raised property tax rates.

"I know of no Representative that has received more cooperation and help from the citizens of his district in solving their problems than I have," Parish said. "Your help has enabled me to be successful in working out many of the problems that have faced the District. With your continued help and support we will continue our work to solve other pressing problems of this district. Less than 20 of the 150 members of the House will have more seniority than I will have in the next Legislature and with this seniority I will be better able to help you."

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

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

More Than 3,000 Texans Released From Services

AUSTIN—A little more than 3,000 Texans were discharged or relieved from active duty in the armed forces in May, Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director, reported recently.

This compares with about 2,500 Texans who entered the various uniformed services in May, either as volunteers or inductees, Colonel Schwartz said in an official report to the national Selective Service headquarters.

The report is based on reports of entry and separation from the various armed forces to the state Director of Selective Service. Added to the volunteer entries are state draft totals for the month.

Of the 2,500 who entered all the services from Texas, around 1,800 entered by voluntary means. The remaining 700 were inducted from the state's 137 draft boards.

In addition to the above entries, two were drafted into the Army and one into the Marine Corps for failing to serve satisfactorily in the ready reserve.

During May, around 3,900 men were examined for service. Of this number 2,300 were found acceptable for future service. Nearly 1,600 were declared unacceptable by Army examining stations.
