

DWI Cases On Upswing Here

DWI arrests in Aransas County are on the upswing, although, according to an analysis of records in the Corpus Christi district office of the Texas Highway Patrol, highway patrolmen stationed in the district made less arrests for DWI in 1957 than in 1956 and the conviction percentage was the same each year.

In 1956 highway patrolmen made 448 DWI arrests in the district and as of June 1, 1957, 382 had resulted in DWI convictions for a conviction percentage of 85%.

In 1957 highway patrolmen made 399 DWI arrests and as of June 1, 1958 337 had resulted in DWI convictions for a conviction percentage of 85%. The figures for 1957 include the 16 counties that comprise the district until Sept. 1, 1957. Liveoak, McMullen and Bee counties are not included after ed only after that date.

The plant expansion calls for the addition of a 110,000-kilowatt plant in CPL's South Texas system. Plans to expand the plant were announced only a few weeks after it began its initial production of electricity late last month.

Bates said the decision to enlarge the plant was made on the basis of anticipated area growth and the projected increase in the use of electricity during the next few years.

The present building at the plant will be extended 110 feet to the south to accomodate the new plant facilities. In addition to the turbocooling tower and additional switchboard equipment will be installed to handle the increased power output.

dent and chief engineer, said the new generating unit would be The new turbo-generator will operate at a higher temperature and steam pressure than CPL's present plants. Both the higher temperature and steam pressure contribute to greater efficiency of the unit, Lovelady pointed out.

He said the new generating unit will utilize the "reheat" principle, in which steam is passed through the boiler twice, each time leav-1000 degrees.

The new turbo-generator at Bates plant will be capable of producing half again as much power as the 75,000-kilowatt unit now in service at the plant.

Generating equipment for the plant addition was ordered in 1957 and preliminary engineering work has been under way since that time. With the completion of the second generating unit at Mission, Bates plant will be able to supply 185,000 kilowatts of electricity, enough to serve a city of 350,000 population.

When the new unit at Bates plant goes into service in early 1950, CPL will be able to supply its customers with 950,000 kilowatts of electricity, almost five times as much as was available in 1950. The highest customer demand to date has been 523,1000 kilowatts, but the utility company's engineers foresee a continued steady increase in the use of electricity in coming years.







\$5 Each for Tags From Big Game Fish

The Woods Hole Oceanographic Institution is offering a \$5 reward for every tag on amberjack, tuna, marlin and sailfish sent to its laboratories at Woods Hole, Mass., and the tag will be returned as a souvenir after the ichthyologists are finished with it.

Along with the tag, says Frank J. Mather III, who is in charge of investigations aimed at determining where these fish come from and where they go, the scientists would like to have the dope on several things.

They want to know where the fish was caught; what species it was; when it was caught; and its length from the fork of its tail to the end of its snout. And, because of the way fish are built, Mather says, this means to the tip of the upper jaw on tuna and amberjack; to the tip of the lower jaw on
