

After examination of the area, Rockport was selected as the place at which Morgan line steamers would call twice a week to receive shipments of "Boston Canned Beef" as it was called. Joseph F. Smith, a son of the pioneer, built a wharf and laid out a townsite. Another wharf, extending from where the LaPlaya Hotel was later located, was built by the Coleman-Fulton Pasture Company, and the southern half of Rockport was laid out by Doughty and Mathis.

In no time at all there were 11 canneries established along the coast, from Ingleside to Live Oak Peninsula. There were four in Fulton and Hobart Huson, the Refugio historian, says that there were a lot of others scattered around.

Among them were the Carruthers and Fulton Co.; Lyman Meat Packing and Canning Co.; Coleman, Mathis and Fulton; the American Meat Co.; J. W. Baylor and Co.; McNeill, Nash and Co.; D L & E G Holden; the American Beef Packery; Boston Packing Company; West & Weiser; Butler and Co.; J. M. Doughty and A. W. Clarke and W. A. Cushman (Cushman and Co.) in the Rockport-Futlon area.

Cushman's was located on Frandolig (Nine Mile Point). Doughty and Clarke's was south of Rockport, on the shell ridge. John M. Brundrett had a packery on St. Charles Bay.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT THE GENERAL ELECTION ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958. HJR #30-Number Three on the Ballot.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 30 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of Texas to require that vacancies in the office of County Judge and Justices of the Peace be filled by the Commissioners Court only until the next General Election.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

ISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Section 28 of Article 5 of the Constitution of the State of Texas is hereby amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Section 28. Vacancies In Offices Of Judges Of Superior Courts To Be Filled By The Governor.

"Vacancies in the office of judges of the Supreme Court, the Court of Criminal Appeals, the Court of Civil Appeals and the District Courts shall be filled by the Governor until the next succeeding General Election; and vacancies in the office of County Judge and Justices of the Peace shall be filled by the Commissioners Court until the next succeeding General Election."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1958, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing that vacancies in the office of County Judge and Justices of the Peace shall be filled by the Commissioners Court only until the next General Election."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing that vacancies in the office of County Judge and Justices of the Peace shall be filled by the Commissioners Court only until the next General Election."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes have been cast in favor of said amendment, same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election herein provided for and shall cause this proposed amendment to be published in the manner required by law and shall cause said election to be held as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

"A municipality so providing a term exceeding four (4) years for any of its non-civil service officers must elect all of the members of the governing body by special election."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

"(b) The Legislature may by law permit the County of Potter (in which the City of Amarillo is partially located) to render financial aid to that district by paying a part of the expenses of operating and maintaining the system and paying a part of the debts of the district (whether assumed or created by the district) and may authorize the levy of a tax not to exceed Ten Cents (10¢) per One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuetion (in addition to other taxes permitted by this Constitution) upon all property within the county but without the City of Amarillo at the time such levy is had for such purposes. If such tax is authorized, the district shall by resolution assume the responsibilities, obligations, and liabilities of the county in the manner and to the extent hereinabove provided for political subdivisions having boundaries coextensive with the district, and the county shall not thereafter levy taxes (other than herein provided) for hospital purposes nor for providing hospital care for needy individuals of the county.

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

17 proposing an amendment to Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 66, to provide that the Legislature shall have authority to provide a system of retirement and disability pensions to certain retiring Texas Rangers and their widows; stating the maximum of such pension; and providing a fund from which such pensions may be paid.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, shall be amended by adding thereto a new Section 66, to read as follows:
"Section 66. The Legislature shall have authority to provide for a system of retirement and disability pensions for retiring Texas Rangers who have not been eligible at any time for membership in the Employees Retirement System of Texas as that retirement system was established by Chapter 352, Acts of the Fiftieth Legislature, Regular Session, 1947, and who have had as much as two (2) years service as a Texas Ranger, and to their widows; providing that no pension shall exceed Eighty Dollars (\$80) per month to any

"(b) Each county shall have the right to provide for and administer a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the appointive officers and employees of the county or precinct, or for the appointive and elective officers and for the employees of the county or precinct, provided same is authorized by a majority vote of the qualified voters of such county and after such election has been advertised by being published in at least one newspaper of general circulation in said county once each week for four consecutive weeks; provided that the amount contributed by the county to such Fund shall at least equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person and shall not exceed at any time seven and one-half per centum (7½%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the county.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section I. That Section 5 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 5. The Legislature shall mee every year, under the condition and limitation hereinafter set forth, at such time as may be provided by law, and at other times when convened by the Governor.

"During the First Regular Session of each Legislature, which shall convene in January, 1959, and e.ch succeeding two (2) years thereafter, the first thirty (30) days thereof shall be devoted to the introduction of bills and resolutions, passing upon the confirmation of the recess appointees of the Governor and such emergency appropriations, passing upon the confirmation of the recess appointees of the Governor and such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor in special messages to the Legislature; provided that during the succeeding thirty (30) days of the First Regular Session of the Legislature the various committees of each House shall hold hearings to consider all bills and resolutions and other matters as may be submitted by the Governor: provided further that during the folk wing sixty (60) days the Legislature shall act upon such bills and resolutions as may be then pending and upon such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor in special messages to the Legislature; provided, nowever, wither House may otherwise determine its order of business by an affirmative vote of four-fifths (4/5) of its membership.

"During the Second Regular Session of each Legislature, which shall convere in Januar 1966, and each succeeding two years thereafter, the Legislature shall be authorized to consider and act upon the following only:

"b. Consider emergency matters submitted by the Governor; bills embodying such matters shall be come law only if the same shall be passed by a two-thirds vote of the Members elected to Each House.

"Whenever the term Biennial Session," appears in Article 17 of this Constitution, it shall be construed to mean First Regular Session."

"Any bill considered in the Second Regular Session of the Legislature must be introduced in that session."

Sec. 2. That Section 24 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 24. Members of the Legislature shall receive from the public Treasury a salary of Seven Thousand, Five Hundred Dollars (\$7,500) per annum and expenses of office in amountant manner as determined by law. The Legislature shall not provide for any per diem for a greater number than one hundred and twenty (120) days during the First Regular Session, sixty (90) days during the Second Regular Session, and thirty (20) days during any Called Session."

Sec. 3. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new section to be known as Section 24a to read as follows:

"Section 24a. In addition to other compensation provided herein, the Lieutennt Governor of the State of Texas and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall be entitled to temporary residence in the State Capital during their term of office in such quarters and under such conditions as the Legislature may provide."

Sec. 4. That the foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submited to a vote of the qualified voters of the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1958, at which election all billots shall have printed thereon:




