The commissioners' court, at its regular meeting, set the date for a public hearing on the county budget for Sept. 8 at 10 a.m. In other business, they set the date for opening bids on Navigation District bonds for Aug. 27 and refused to pay the District Attorney's office phone bill.

## Canal Bids To Be Let September 1

### Navigation District Chairman Tells City Council That Intracoastal Cutoff Is Now Nearing Construction Phase of Program

Navigation Chairman Dick Picton told members of the city council at their regular meeting that the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers intended to ask for bids on construction of the Intracoastal Canal Cutoff between Rockport and Ingleside by Sept. 1, and he requested the city's aid in obtaining the needed right-of-way.

Picton stated that there were a number of tracts in the southern end of Aransas County with absentee owners that would have to be condemned, because these owners could not be found. Because of the city's wider powers of con-

demnation of such land for transfer to the Federal government, Picton asked that the municipality undertake the necessary condemnation proceedings.

Councilmen agreed to acquire the needed land for rights-of-way and spoil areas, expenses of all legal actions to be borne by the Navigation District.

County Engineer James A. Jarboe then appeared before the Council in his capacity as president of the Rockport Chamber of Commerce. He asked that the council and S. F. Jackson, with other participants in the dispute over widening Austin Street, make every effort to reach an agreement in order to release the right-of-way and get construction underway this fall.

Mayor Hollis Collum pointed out that if some agreement was not reached soon, there was an excellent chance of losing the appropriation for widening and paving the Highway 35 Business Route through Rockport, in which the disputed land is included.

The State, Collum said, would bear approximately \$268,000 of the cost of the project, which would include curbs and gutters, against \$63,000 the city must furnish.

Plans for the project are now complete, according to a letter from T. O. Foster, district engineer for the State Highway Department, who says that the State's part is being financed from emergency funds provided by the Federal Aid Highway Act of 1958.

A time limit for expenditure of these funds has been set, Foster told the council, and the time is near when the program must be under contract in order to keep from losing these funds.

Foster stated that all right-of-way must be clear by Sept. 15 in order for the project to be included in the October contract letting by the Highway Department, the last in which it can be included.

Ells L. Clark, representing S. F. Jackson, reiterated Jackson's offer that he would agree to widening the street if the city would pay for moving the three buildings he owns, which the city alleges are protruding into the street.

The council took no action on this.

### Shrimpers Considering Conservation Program

According to Jim Barr, of Brownsville, executive secretary of the Shrimp Association of the Americas, the shrimp industry of Texas, having become alarmed at the drop in shrimp production, is considering asking authorities for a closed season, probably during the months of June and July each year.

Because regulatory powers of the Texas shrimp fishery are at present in the hands of the legislature, it would be necessary to transfer these powers to the Game and Fish Commission by legislation.

Industry members and leaders are of the opinion, Barr said, that a sound conservation program, properly implemented, is the only way to insure future shrimp production along the Texas coast.

To this end, a conservation committee of the Texas Shrimp Association is working on the problem, in order to recommend a program, not only to TSTA directors, but to state authorities as well.

## demnation of such land for transfer to the Federal government, Picton asked that the municipality undertake the necessary condemnation proceedings.

Councilmen agreed to acquire the needed land for rights-of-way and spoil areas, expenses of all legal actions to be borne by the Navigation District.

County Engineer James A. Jarboe then appeared before the Council in his capacity as president of the Rockport Chamber of Commerce. He asked that the council and S. F. Jackson, with other participants in the dispute over widening Austin Street, make every effort to reach an agreement in order to release the right-of-way and get construction underway this fall.

Mayor Hollis Collum pointed out that if some agreement was not reached soon, there was an excellent chance of losing the appropriation for widening and paving the Highway 35 Business Route through Rockport, in which the disputed land is included.

The State, Collum said, would bear approximately \$268,000 of the cost of the project, which would include curbs and gutters, against \$63,000 the city must furnish.

Plans for the project are now complete, according to a letter from T. O. Foster, district engineer for the State Highway Department, who says that the State's part is being financed from emergency funds provided by the Federal Aid Highway Act of 1958.

A time limit for expenditure of these funds has been set, Foster told the council, and the time is near when the program must be under contract in order to keep from losing these funds.

Foster stated that all right-of-way must be clear by Sept. 15 in order for the project to be included in the October contract letting by the Highway Department, the last in which it can be included.

Ells L. Clark, representing S. F. Jackson, reiterated Jackson's offer that he would agree to widening the street if the city would pay for moving the three buildings he owns, which the city alleges are protruding into the street.

The council took no action on this. ## Shrimpers Considering Conservation Program

According to Jim Barr, of Brownsville, executive secretary of the Shrimp Association of the Americas, the shrimp industry of Texas, having become alarmed at the drop in shrimp production, is considering asking authorities for a closed season, probably during the months of June and July each year.

Because regulatory powers of the Texas shrimp fishery are present in the hands of the legislature, it would be necessary to transfer these powers to the Game and Fish Commission by legislation.

Industry members and leaders are of the opinion, Barr said, that a sound conservation program, properly implemented, is the only way to insure future shrimp production along the Texas coast.

To this end, a conservation committee of the Texas Shrimp Association is working on the problem, in order to recommend a program, not only to TSTA directors, but to state authorities as well.

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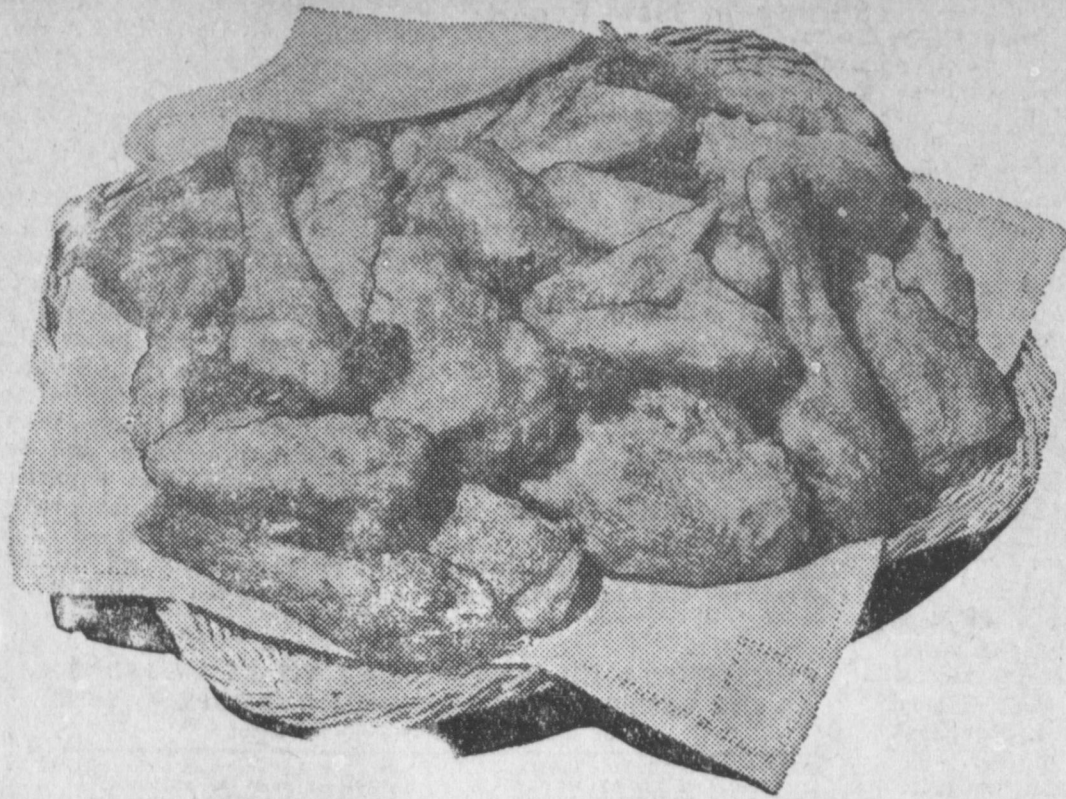

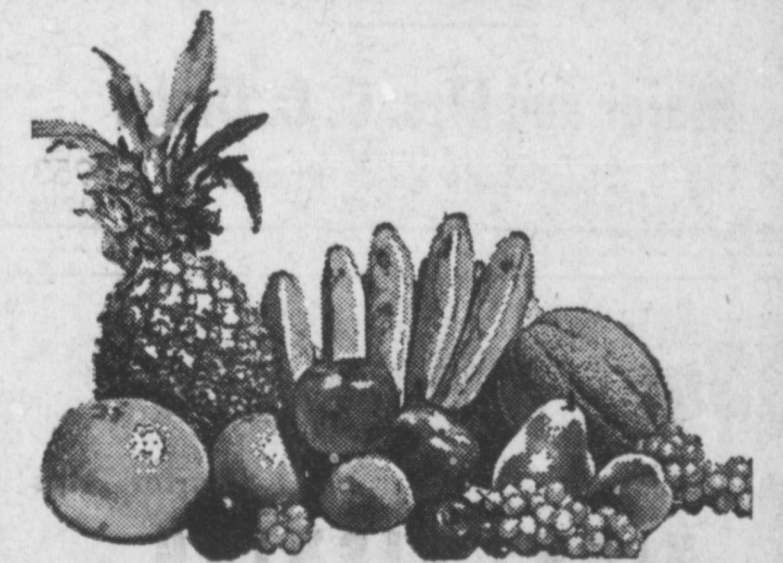

### George Fulton Early Surveyor In Rockport

Reams of newspaper copy have been written about the old Fulton mansion, but very little about its builder, George W. Fulton, who remains one of the shadowy figures of this coast, despite the fact that he has grandchildren and great grandchildren still living, among them being Mrs. Gladys Gibson of Corpus Christi.

When William Richardson of the Galveston News made a survey of the coast from the Guadalupe River southward, he had with him young Fulton, who was chief engineer of the survey.

The survey lines run at this time later enabled Fulton to tie in new survey lines in Aransas County and to locate the lands of Governor Henry Smith, who lived on the southern shore of Copano Bay, not far from the end of Copano Causeway.

And, while he was attending to this, he was also wooing the governor's daughter, to such purpose

that she later became Mrs. Fulton. Somewhere between the fifties and the seventies, he became Colonel Fulton, and, envisioning the potentialities of a port in Aransas Bay at which the Morgan liners could sail, located the community of Fulton. Here he built the mansion that has become famous in story, and the area became a shipping point for shallow draft vessels running between Galveston and other points on the Texas coast.

Fulton's importance increased when Mr. Holden—one of the Colonel's sons-in-law—started a green turtle cannery. Later, diamond-backed terrapin, grown in various pens along the shore, were shipped to market.

In the meantime, Colonel Fulton himself expanded his interests, gradually acquiring the many thousands of acres on which grazed the cattle of the Coleman-Mathis Pasture Company, which eventually became one of the largest concerns of its kind in the southwest.

The Colemans were Goliad County pioneers, with Thomas M. Coleman senior partner in the concern. His son, Thomas Atlee Coleman, later became a well

known cattleman in the section southwest of San Antonio.

The other member of the firm, Thomas Henry Mathis, whose home still stands in Rockport, withdrew from the partnership in the eighties. Thomas M. Coleman got Pasture No. 2, with headquarters at Mathis. John Coleman, another member of the firm, received the company's pasture on the Nueces.

Not long after Mathis withdrew from the firm, he entered negotiations with that pioneer steamship line owned by Henry Morgan, and operating along the Gulf Coast, and with the King and Kenedy interests, of Rio Grande steamboat fame.

Through these negotiations the Texas packing industry was started.

After examination of the area, Rockport was selected as the place at which Morgan line steamers would call twice a week to receive shipments of "Boston Canned Beef" as it was called. Joseph F. Smith, a son of the pioneer, built a wharf and laid out a townsite. Another wharf, extending from where the LaPlaya Hotel was later located, was built by the Coleman-Fulton Pasture Company, and the southern half of Rockport was laid out by Doughty and Mathis.

In no time at all there were 11 canneries established along the coast, from Ingleside to Live Oak Peninsula. There were four in Fulton and Hobart Huson, the Refugee historian, says that there were a lot of others scattered around.

Among them were the Carruthers and Fulton Co.; Lyman Meat Packing and Canning Co.; Coleman, Mathis and Fulton; the American Meat Co.; J. W. Baylor and Co.; McNeill, Nash and Co.; D L & E G Holden; the American Beef Packery; Boston Packing Company; West & Weiser; Butler and Co.; J. M. Doughty and A. W. Clarke and W. A. Cushman (Cushman and Co.) in the Rockport-Fulton area.

Cushman's was located on Frandolig (Nine Mile Point). Doughty and Clarke's was south of Rockport, on the shell ridge. John M. Brundrett had a packery on St. Charles Bay.

Mr. and Mrs. Pat Gilpin and their children, Sandy and Joan, have recently moved here from Hallettsville. Pat used to teach in the Aransas County Independent School system, and has returned. He will be assistant coach at the high school this year, in addition to teaching classes.

### Special Interest on Latin Shrimp in New Report

Special interest in information about the shrimp fisheries of Latin America has led to the recent publication by the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service of a report, "Survey of Shrimp Fisheries of Central and South America" which can be obtained from the service for the price of a postage stamp and a little time needed to write a letter.

The service has also issued another which contains interesting information about shrimp fisheries throughout the rest of the world. It is entitled Foreign Shrimp Fisheries (other than Central and South America).

This report examines the shrimp fisheries of Canada, Greenland,

the Caribbean area, Europe, North Africa, the Near East, Asia, Australia, and Oceania. Of these areas, the shrimp fisheries of Asia are the most important in terms of resources but not in utilization. It may be surprising to many to learn that India has a shrimp fishery which is almost equal to that of the United States. But India's contribution to the shrimp market in the United States is infinitesimal compared with that of Mexico, and is far below that supplied by Panama, Ecuador, Peru and Columbia. While the catch in India is very large, primitive fishing, processing, and distribution methods limit expansion of the industry. European production is largely absorbed at home. Other fisheries are small although some have growth possibilities.

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 30** proposing an amendment to the Constitution of Texas to require that vacancies in the office of County Judge and Justice of the Peace shall be filled by the Commissioners Court only until the next General Election.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. Section 23 of Article 5 of the Constitution of the State of Texas is hereby amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 48** proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that a home rule city may provide by Charter Provision and a general law that the term of office of its officers, either elective or appointive, shall not exceed four (4) years; provided, however, that tenure under Civil Service shall not be affected hereby; providing for an election, a form of ballot and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Article XI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section II of Article XI and to read as follows:

"Section II. Home Rule Cities may provide by charter or charter amendment, and a city, town or village operating under the general laws may provide by majority vote of the qualified voters voting at an election called for that purpose, for a longer term of office than two (2) years for its officers, either elective or appointive, or both, but not to exceed four (4) years; provided, however, that tenure under Civil Service shall not be affected hereby. And providing for automatic resignation when such officers become a candidate for election to another office and providing for election of members of such municipalities and the filling of vacancies occurring on such governing body by special election."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing that a Home Rule City may provide by charter or charter amendment, and a city, town or village operating under the general laws may provide by majority vote of the qualified voters voting at an election called for that purpose, for a longer term of office than two (2) years for its officers, either elective or appointive, or both, but not to exceed four (4) years; provided, however, that tenure under Civil Service shall not be affected hereby. And providing for automatic resignation when such officers become a candidate for election to another office and providing for election of members of such municipalities and the filling of vacancies occurring on such governing body by special election."

Sec. 2. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

SJR #3—Number Nine on the Ballot.

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.**

**SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 3** proposing an amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 5, to provide that the Legislature may authorize the creation of a Hospital District for the City of Amarillo, Texas; authorizing the County of Potter to render financial aid to and participate in the operation of such Hospital District; authorizing the Commissioners Court of said county to assess and levy taxes on property outside the incorporated limits of such city; further authorizing a county-wide Hospital District for Wichita County, Texas, and authorizing the creation of two districts in Jefferson County; and further providing that any enabling Act shall not be invalid because of its anticipatory character.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto another section to be designated as Section 5, which shall read as follows:

"Section 5 (a) The Legislature may by law authorize the creation of two Hospital Districts, one to be coextensive with and have the same boundaries as the incorporated City of Amarillo, as such boundaries now exist or as they may hereafter be lawfully extended, and the other to be coextensive with Wichita County.

"If such district or districts are created, they may be authorized to levy a tax not to exceed Seventy-five Cents (75¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation of taxable property within the district; provided, however, no tax may be levied until approved by a majority vote of the participating resident qualified property taxpayers voters who have duly rendered their property for taxation. The maximum rate of tax may be changed at subsequent elections so long as obligations are not impaired, and not to exceed the maximum limit of Seventy-five Cents (75¢) per One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation, and no election shall be required by subsequent changes in the boundaries of the City of Amarillo.

"If such tax is authorized, no political subdivision or municipality within or having the same local character as the district may levy a tax, medical or hospital care for the individuals, nor shall they maintain or erect hospital facilities, but the district shall be responsible to assume all such responsibilities and shall assume all of the liabilities and obligations (including bonds and warrants) of both. The maximum tax rate shall be authorized to be levied to discharge such obligations, liabilities, and responsibilities, and to maintain and operate the hospital system, and the Legislature may authorize the district to issue tax bonds for the purpose of the purchase, construction, acquisition, repair or renovation of improvements and initially equipping the same, and such bonds shall be payable from said Seventy-five Cents (75¢) tax. The Legislature shall provide for transfer of title to properties to the district.

"(b) The Legislature may by law permit the County of Potter (in which the City of Amarillo is partially located) to render financial aid to that district by paying a part of the expenses of operating and maintaining the system and paying a part of the debts of the district (whether assumed or created by the district) and may authorize the Legislature to issue bonds to exceed Ten Cents (10¢) per One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation (in addition to other taxes permitted by this Constitution) upon all property within the county but without the City of Amarillo at a time such levy is made for such purposes. If such tax is authorized, the district shall by resolution assume the responsibilities, obligations, and liabilities of the county in the manner and to the extent hereinabove provided for political subdivisions with the district, and the county shall not thereafter levy taxes (other than herein provided) for hospital purposes nor for providing hospital care for needy individuals of the county.

"(c) The Legislature may by law authorize the creation of a Hospital District within Jefferson County, the boundaries of which shall include only the area comprising the Jefferson County Drainage District No. 7 and Fort Arthur Independent School District, as such boundaries existed on the first day of January, 1957, with the power to issue bonds for the sole purpose of purchasing a site for, and the construction and initial equipping of, a hospital system, and with the power to levy a tax not to exceed Seventy-five Cents (75¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation of property therefor for the purpose of paying the principal and interest on such bonds.

"The creation of such Hospital District shall not be final until approved by a majority of the qualified resident property taxpayers voting at an election held on the first day of January, 1957, upon the tax rolls of either drainage or said School District, nor shall such bonds be issued or such tax be levied until so approved by such voters.

"The district shall not have the power to levy any tax for maintenance or operation of the hospital or facilities, but shall contract with other political subdivisions of the state or private individuals, associations, or corporations for such purposes.

"If the district hereinabove authorized is finally created, no other hospital district may be created embracing any part of the territory within its boundaries, but the Legislature by law may authorize the creation of a hospital district incorporating therein the remainder of Jefferson County, having the powers and duties and with the limitations presently provided by Article IX, Section 4, of the Constitution of Texas, except that such district shall be confirmed at an election wherein the resident qualified property taxpayers voters who have duly rendered their property within such proposed district for taxation on the county rolls, shall be authorized to vote. A majority of those participating in the election voting in favor of the district shall be necessary for its confirmation and for bonds to be issued.

"(d) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be invalid because of their anticipatory character."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at the general election to be held the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1958, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment providing that a Hospital District be created in Jefferson County, Texas, and authorizing Potter County to lend financial aid to and participate in the operation of said Hospital District, and further authorizing the Legislature to create a county-wide Hospital District in Wichita County, Texas, and Hospital Districts in Jefferson County, Texas."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to create a Hospital District, coextensive with the incorporated limits of the City of Amarillo, Texas, and authorizing Potter County to lend financial aid to and participate in the operation of said Hospital District, and further authorizing the Legislature to create a county-wide Hospital District in Wichita County, Texas, and Hospital Districts in Jefferson County, Texas."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

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"(d) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be invalid because of their anticipatory character."

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"AGAINST the constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to create a Hospital District, coextensive with the incorporated limits of the City of Amarillo, Texas, and authorizing Potter County to lend financial aid to and participate in the operation of said Hospital District, and further authorizing the Legislature to create a county-wide Hospital District in Wichita County, Texas, and Hospital Districts in Jefferson County, Texas."

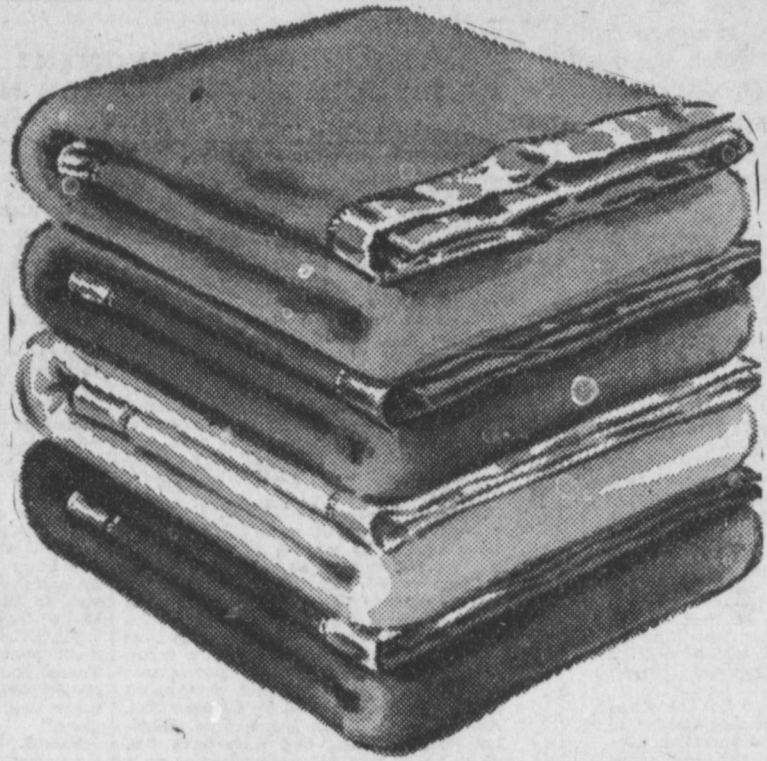

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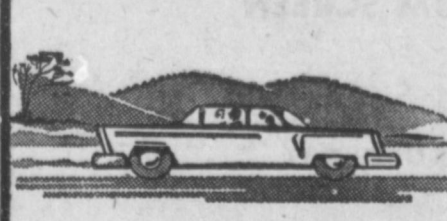
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## We Will Spend Two Days at the Fair Says Miss Jarboe

This week, Miss Marjory Jarboe's letter speaks of Brussels and the World's Fair, and of some of the places that she and her sister, Maud, saw between the time they left Venice of the Lagoons and arrived in Brussels.

"We are almost at Brussels, where we intend to 'live' at the fair for our two days. I've much to tell you about the last week. I'm sorry this wasn't written sooner but every minute we are not sleeping or on the bus traveling we have been sightseeing, shopping, or seeing local entertainment. I believe I wrote last from Vienna, so I'll start at Salzburg and later fill in more on some of the towns I haven't said much about, as Florence, Capri, Innsbruck and Vienna.

From Vienna we took the bus

for Salzburg, arriving in time for the opening of the Music Festival which is held each year in honor of Mozart. Flags were draped from every building. That first evening the President of Austria was there for the candle lighting ceremony in the Platz (square) of the Cathedral. Candles were lit in windows of all buildings in that area, then dancers robed in white and each carrying a candle danced a slow, graceful minuet. Finally the cathedral chimes played a minuet and the opening ceremony was over.

The next morning we took a tour of the salt mine which gave Salzburg its name. The mine is in a mountain a half hour's ride from Salzburg, at Durrenberg. The mines were first developed by the Romans; 30% of it is in Austria; 70% in Germany, but by the most recent treaty Austria can mine all the salt while the Germans get all the timber on the surface. We took a chair lift to the entrance, going over the tips of fir trees. Putting on white, two-piece overalls, we entered the mine, walking between the rails

into the damp shaft. To get from shaft to the next lower shaft we made a human toboggan down the wooden runners, sitting with our feet held up; the guide braked us with ropes. There was a museum, a salt lake we ferried across and a railroad. We made the train cars by sitting on a wooden runner (which was on wheels) and hanging onto the person ahead. It is so damp the shafts grow together from the sedimentation in about a hundred years.

That night we saw the opera "Don Carlos." The voices were beautiful, the leads were good-looking, and the Vienna Philharmonic was in the pit. Need I say more! The stage was against a cliff which had galleries carved into it. From these galleries the stage continued forward, using stone colored props to form the set. The set was abstract, representing one time a castle, another time a monastery. No stage curtain was used; the executioners had hooded costumes with roosters' combs. The ceiling next to the rock cliff backdrop was a canvas tarpaulin, so there was an actual fire for the heretic burning scene. The crowd was international—dressed in everything from diamonds and furs to trenchcoats.

Sunday afternoon the "Everyman" morality play was held on a platform before the Cathedral. It was a perfect spot, for the Cathedral faces on a square with arches being the only openings out from it. At the beginning, on sides of the square above the arches, six trumpeters were standing silently. Their faces were whitewashed and their costumes gray, so they looked exactly like statues. Then they raised their trumpets—and the performance began. Faith and Hope looked very ethereal in white and blue robes. Money, or money, was gilded completely, face included, over his suit were gold mesh chains. Death wore a very realistic skeleton costume and the Devil looked very husky and devilish. Again, at the end of the performance, curtains pulled back from two windows of the Cathedral and there, as a shadowbox, stood two tableaux of three statues each. Posed beautifully, with robes folded just so—only again they were people. I enjoyed it greatly.

That night Joan, Maud, Mary Baily and I went to see the Salzburg Marionettes. It was delightful fantasy. They like to produce that are impossible on the stage with live actors, for they can heighten reality and accomplish

the impossible. We saw "The Magic Flute," with Mozart's music played by the Vienna Philharmonic (recorded) and opera singers' voices for the marionettes' parts. The figures are a meter (about one yard) high. They were really a delightful sight. Pappagalo leaped, skipped, and shook with fright. The hero was a bit stiff, but perhaps he was supposed to be dignified. In one scene there was a pelican scratching a lion, a giraffe, and birds flying. Later cannibals danced, angels soared, lightning struck, to mention some of the variety of experiences the marionettes could create. The program said that with marionettes it is natural to create humor by exaggerating natural movements, but to touch upon pathos, tenderness, and sorrow is difficult. This is because these expressions of emotion come from the face, and the position and movements of the body. To achieve pathos, etc., the puppets are carved with many joints in the trunks, limbs, and neck so that they can move freely and with subtlety. They did get across these emotions to me. At the end the marionettes took curtain calls, bowed to each other, and acknowledged our clapping with as much finesse as had the live actors the night before at "Don Carlos."

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**New Scallop Beds Discovered in Gulf**

The search for edible products in the Gulf of Mexico goes on and, according to the latest U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service's release, one of the service's research vessels, the Silver Bay, has located commercial quantities of clams in the eastern part of the Gulf.

The Silver Bay made over two hundred drags between Florida and Mississippi, along the continental shelf. Between Cape Romano and the Anclote Keys, off the Florida coast, hard clams were taken in all tows made—69 of them—where the bottom was suitable, according to Francis J. Captiva, research man from the Service, who was in charge of the exploration.

The best fishing grounds were off Passe-A-Grille Beach, Venice, and Marco, Florida.

Forty-six tows between Cape San Blas and Horn Island failed to produce any of the shellfish in the waters off Mississippi and Alabama.

One result of the cruise was the discovery of a scallop bed approximately 10 or 12 miles long, off Panama City, Florida, where 40 bushels of these shellfish were taken a number of times in 15-minute tows. Another large bed of smaller Gulf scallops was located off Cape St. George, and third, somewhat smaller, between Mobile and Pensacola.

**Hatch Saves People of This District**

**\$750,000**

\$750,000 is the estimated amount of money that Richard D. Hatch, candidate for District Attorney in the Democratic Primary Runoff Election August 23, has saved the people of the 36th District during 1956, 1957 and 1958 through his efforts in keeping telephone and gas rates down.

Hatch, as attorney for the City of Taft in 1956 and 1957 conferred for many hours with representatives of the gas and phone companies reviewing their requests for rate increases. The law requires that the companies be allowed a fair return on their investment and it is very difficult to determine what is a fair rate. But Hatch used his experience as a graduate engineer from Texas A. & M. College and his legal training from Baylor University to represent the interest of the people. Practically every city in the area had accepted a higher gas rate, but finally the company accepted the rate increase suggested by Hatch as reasonable for Taft. THE COMPANY THEN REDUCED RATES IN THE OTHER TOWNS TO THE TAFT RATES. This resulted in saving the people of the area approximately \$400,000 for the winters of 1956 and 1957, and since the same rates will be in effect during 1958 the savings in gas costs to the people will amount to over \$600,000.
