
BILL GRAY CALLS MEETING TO DETERMINE FATE OF EXPLORERS





Frandoleg Island Has Very Interesting To Guard from Hurricanes History Since First White Man Viewed I

gist and former member of the little thought - a hundred years from tip to tip. as coast would bear his name.

> Yet this is true, though no one knows exactly how it came about, and when the Aransas County Navigation District puts it up for sale in the near future, the commissioners will not only be selling 226 acres of land; they'll also be selling a lot of history.

The island - long, low and triangular - approaches the shores of Aransas Bay between Rockport and Fulton, arcing southward almost a mile to enclose Little Bay, which the district hopes to make into a sheltered harbor.

Down the middle of the island runs a high ridge of shell, crowned with chaparral and Spanish daggers. To its west lie muddy flats where pintails drowse during the winter, watching stately white egrets and blue Ward's herons as they fish for mullet.

To the east of the shell ridge, a shallow lagoon takes up part of the island, being separated from Aransas Bay by a narrow, lower ridge of shell from which sportsmen fish for trout and redfish.

It was near this island - then nameless — that Cabeza de Vaca crossed Aransas Bay over 400 years ago, on his long trek to California, the first white man to travel from the Atlantic to the Pacific, and it was a favorite camping ground for the wandering cannibalistic Karankawas.

Men still living in Rockport remember when many Indian relics were once uncovered on Frandoleg. Harry Traylor says that, years ago, a roadway was cut along the shores of Little Bay, about where the present paved boach drive is located. This exposed many piles of buried oyster shells, kitchen middens where the Indians cast them aside after eating the oyster.

But the best evidence of all came from J. P. Frandoleg himself, as he spelled it. Presumably a son or grandson of old Napoleon, he was the first white settler on the island which bears the family name. The shell ridge, where he built his home at a spot still marked by fig trees and oleanders, was a favorite Indian camping ground, and he had to kill and bury three of them before he was left in

that the campsite was once littered with whole and broken tools and weapons, flint chips and fragments

But Frandoleg's patent to the island from the State of Texas, signed by Governor J. S. Hogg, only called for 60 acres, leaving a portion of it open for other inhabitants who moved in immediately after the Civil War, and founded a hide and tallow factory.

The requirements of setting up such a packery, according to J. Frank Dobie, were exceedingly simple. Any man with excess cattle might start such an establishment in which to take off their hides and make salt junk of the meat. Or he might merely save the tallow along with the hides, and throw the carcasses to the hogs, buzzards

and coyotes. How many such packeries sprang up along the Gulf Coast it would be difficult to say, but there were at least a dozen of them around Rockport. One of them, the Hall packery, slaughtered 11,000 head of cattle in one year, shipping 1,000 barrels of salt beef to New Orleans alone. Another - Cushman's - was at the most southerly tip of Frandoleg Island where, as recently as five or six years ago, the old boiler could still be seen, half buried in the sand.

To this plant, back in the early seventies, before it was moved to the present site of Fulton, came a huge old, steer, which Dobie says







Social security payments of retirement and family insurance will be increased beginning next January, and persons who are now receiving those payments do not matically, but according to H. M. Cleveland, district manager of the Social Security Admniistration in Corpus Christi, benefits are now ctf payable under the new law to some persons who could not qualify before, but they must be applied for.


