Bids On Cove, Little Bay Ready Soon

The following story, by Travis Moorman, appeared in Tuesday's Corpus Christi Caller, and as it deals with things of local interest, is reprinted here, being an excellent summary of the situation, with which most of our readers are familiar, having read the developments as they appeared in previous issues of The Pilot.

Plans should be ready Oct. 6 to call for bids on an industrial harbor at the Cove and for the first phase of development of Little Bay, Homer Innis, associate of the engineering firm of Lockwood, Andrews and Newman said.

The harbor and Little Bay development is sponsored by the Aransas County Navigation District No. 1 Development of the Cove harbor for barge traffic and industrial boats of shallow draft is a part of the long-range development plans of the navigation district. Actual construction was delayed until the cut-off channel from Rockport to Old Ingleside was assured.

Innis said the first construction contract will build a harbor about the size of the Conn Brown Harbor at Aransas Pass. The district owns sufficient land for future development three times its original size, Innis said, and the plans have been made to permit this expansion.

No permanent bulkheads or wharves will be constructed at the present time by the navigation district on the 4,700 foot of available harbor space.

The harbor will have access to highway, rail and water transportation services. It will be connected to the cut-off channel by a 1,200-foot entrance channel and the district's land joins rightway of the railroad and state highway. Innis said provisions are being made for a railroad spur line on the harbor levee.

The harbor will be dredged to a depth of 12 feet and will be protected by a 12-foot earth levee. Innis said the levee is designed for protection against storms and tides that occur on 15-year intervals.

Approximately 6,000 feet of paved road will be constructed around the harbor, connecting with State Highway 35. Water service will also be provided.

The first phase of development on Little Bay includes dredging a 300-foot basin four feet deep for approximately four-fifths of a mile from the present harbor at Rockport to the south end of Frandolig Island.

Material from the dredging will be used to build a six foot embankment adjoining the basin and a mile-long white sand beach fronting on Aransas Bay. Innis said core-tests of the material to be dredged from Little Bay shows it is excellent for building a beach.

Included in the first construction phase is a paved road along the embankment, 24 feet wide and approximately one mile long, with three parking lots, a tie-up harbor for small boats and a concrete boat launching ramp and landscaping with palm trees and oleanders.

Innis said plans on the Little Bay development should be completed to permit asking bids on this construction along with the construction of the harbor at the Cove.

The development of Little Bay as a recreation area for South Texas is planned to tie-in with the future development of Frandolig Island now being offered for sale to private interests by the navigation district. The district will restrict sale of the island for development as a tourist and recreation center.

Engineers Approve Cove Permit Here

Word has been received here that the Corps of Engineers, U. S. Army, has approved a permit requested by the Aransas County Navigation District for construction work at the Cove, south of the city, where an industrial harbor is to be constructed.

The harbor will be oriented in the direction of the southeast breeze which prevails here most of the year, and approximately 550,000 cubic yards of material will be dredged during its construction.

The northwest side of the U-shaped basin extends for approximately 800 feet, parallel to and 239 feet from the Southern Pacific right-of-way. The southeast line will extend for 1030 feet, and the northeast limits of the basin will extend parallel to the dedicated county road south of the city. Maximum width of the basin is 384 feet. The channel entrance is 125 feet wide, and extends from a flared entrance leading into the authorized Intracoastal Canal cut-off between Rockport and Old Ingleside, then curves northward and enters the basin near its south corner.

The channel and basin will be dredged to a depth of 12 feet at mean low tide, and the dredged material will be used to build a levee for storm protection around the basin.

Council Hurries Land Acquisition

Deadline Tomorrow Results In Even More Strenuous Efforts To Obtain All Right-of-Way For Curbing and Guttering Project

The City Council, confronted with the fact that riparian rights along 1530 feet of waterfront on Little Bay had to be acquired as right-of-way for the Highway 35 business route along Broadway before an appropriation deadline runs out on September 26, has authorized expenditure of \$11,985.00 for purchase of the necessary land, hoping to be reimbursed for part

of it by the State Highway Department.

City Annexes Block In D. & M.

The city council at the request of the Shofner Realty Company, passed an ordinance Monday night, annexing Block 145 of the Dougherty and Mathys Addition. This block, which lies west of the State Highway Dept. barn on Highway 35, is scheduled for a development featuring low cost homes, and is bounded on the north by King Street, on the east by Fuqua Street, on the south by Lamar Street, and on the west by Verne Street. It contains 16 lots.

In the application which was presented by County Surveyor James A. Jarboe, James H. Sorenson, Jr., was named as president of the realty company, and Dick Picton as secretary.

In other action, the council took under advisement a request also presented by Jarboe on behalf of M. D. (Buck) Jones, Judge of the Criminal Court of Appeals of San Antonio, who has acquired the Coffee property, lying between Sandra Courts and the Rockport cemetery, on either side of Hillcrest Drive, for permission to tie onto the city water and sewer lines at the north end of Little Bay Shores addition.

Jones proposes to subdivide the Coffee property, and to sell lots along either side of Hillcrest Drive, and told the council through Jarboe, that if the permission is granted, he will install sanitary facilities at his own expense in the area, deeding the lines to the city.

After some discussion the council tabled the request, pending investigation of its deed from Little Bay Shores on the lines in that subdivision. If there is nothing in this that precludes such action, they promised Jarboe that they would approve Jones' request at a future meeting.

Councilmen also passed an ordinance authorizing Mayor Hollis Collum to sign an agreement with the State Highway Department, participating in the cost of the Highway 35 business route in Rockport They also approved issuance of check for \$2,599 to S. F. Jackson, on condition that he move the three buildings which encroach on the proposed route, and that he give the city a deed relinquishing his claim to the land on which they stand.

In the event that the five owners concerned will not accept this price, set by an appraisal board composed of James A. Jarboe, Lawrence Miller and A. C. Glass, City Attorney Richard Hatch has been instructed to start condemnation proceedings immediately, which will satisfy the Highway Department's demands and make it possible for the project to be advertised for bids at the last contract letting of 1958.

This action on the part of the Council marks another step towards solving problems attendant upon paving the business route on Highway 35, from the intersection south of Rockport through the heart of the city, almost to its northern limits, with addition of curbs and gutters along much of the route.

Trouble on the project started this summer when Highway Department surveys disclosed the fact that three buildings belonging to S. F. Jackson and another belonging to Roy Hinton encroached upon the route, in some instances almost as much as 24 feet, and would have to be moved.

S. F. Jackson claimed ownership of the land on which his buildings were located, although Highway Department surveys indicated that they were in the street. The Council, mindful of the Department's time limit (after which state money for the project would no longer be available) agreed at its September 15 meeting to pay Jackson \$2,599, and in return he agreed to move the buildings in question and to relinquish all claims to the 24-foot strip of land involved in the controversy.

The buildings are to be moved this week.

Hinton, who operates a fish market, tavern, and barbecue stand, has asked \$2,294 for moving his building; \$2,000 in damages sustained by the building while it is being moved; \$600 for plumbing expense, and \$50 a day from the time moving starts until it is ready at its new location, to pay for loss of business.

The Council has made two counter offers, either one of which Hinton is at liberty to take.

In the first, it offered to move the building, hook up the utilities, and to pay Hinton \$500 in damages and \$50 for every day he is unable to do business. If this is unacceptable, they said, they were willing to pay him \$3,000 to defray the necessary costs of moving, and hook up his plumbing, ready for business.

There the matter rests at the moment.

While efforts to compose these differences and to iron out other legal technicalities were being pushed, in order to take advantage of the state's appropriation of approximately \$225,000.00 before the time limit ran out, more trouble appeared to harass the councilmen.

At their meeting on September 15, it was disclosed that land title research had disclosed the fact that riparian rights on five parcels of land along Little Bay must be acquired.

The city owned approximately 605 front feet of the needed land, most of which is submerged at high tide; Joe Sheldon, the Bell heirs, Tom O'Connor and Mrs. Armenia Heney owned the rest.

To set a fair value on the property, and on the riparian rights, the council immediately appointed an appraisal board, consisting of Jarboe, Miller and Glass, and instructed County Surveyor Jarboe to make an accurate survey of the area.

Tract One, in question, extends for 310 feet along Little Bay, from in front of the Sinclair station at the corner of Wood and Broadway, to the intersection of Broadway and Laurel and varies from nothing to a few feet wide, and embraces 4/100 of an acre. The city owns half; Sheldon owns ¼; and the Bell heirs, Mrs. Johnson and Mrs. Gray, own ¼.

Tract Two, 600 feet long, runs from Laurel and Broadway to a point on Broadway midway between Nopal and Orleans Streets. Continued on Page 4

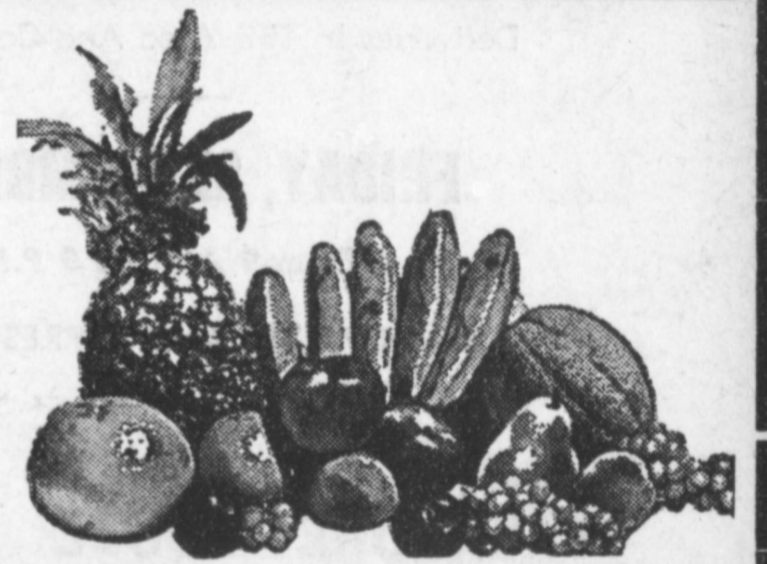

and belongs to Sheldon and the city, the city owning 3/4 and Sheldon 1/4.

One hundred and thirty feet of waterfront, between the northern end of tract 2 and Orleans and Broadway, belong to Mrs. Heney, who owns 1/2, Sheldon 1/4 and the Bell heirs, with another 1/4. From Orleans Street to the park in front of the Picton property, a distance of 300 feet, tract 4 embraces 56/100 of an acre, and here Sheldon and the Bell heirs each own 1/2. Tract 5, extending from the park to the Tom O'Connor pier, is 300 feet long, and 37/100 of an acre in extent. It belongs to Tom O'Connor.

The board of appraisal, after considering other sales of riparian rights in the area, set a price of \$5 per front foot, plus \$4,000 per acre for the land between the water's edge and the present highway right-of-way. Using these figures and Jarboe's computations, the council arrived at the following conclusions.

The city now owns 605 feet mentioned above, with 455/1000 of an acre of land, and this no longer needs to be considered. Joe Sheldon owns 457 1/2 front feet and 53/100 acres of land, which, using the board's base prices, amounts to \$4,407. The Bell heirs, Mrs. Johnson and Mrs. Gray, own 307 1/2 front feet and 385/1000 acres, making their property worth \$3,077.50. Tom O'Connor owns 395 front feet and 455/1000 acres, for a total of \$3,795.00; and Mrs. Heney owns 65 front feet and 95/1000 of an acre, making her value \$705.

All of this land must be acquired or under condemnation proceedings by tomorrow (Friday) or the city stands an excellent chance of losing the Highway 35 business route, for which an \$80,000 bond issue was voted and which the state will match with approximately \$225,000.00 of State and Federal Highway Funds.

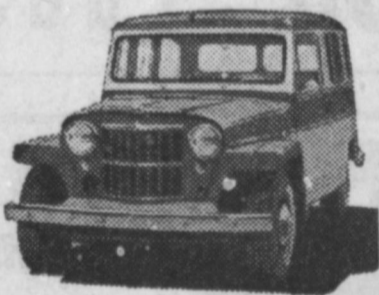

SHRIMPERS SLAIN IN ARANSAS PASS

Aransas Pass—A Negro shrimp-er was shot to death here early Sunday in what witnesses termed an unprovoked murder.

The dead man is Lewis Belling-er, 25, of Charleston, S. C. The shooting occurred 30 feet inside Aransas County at Conn Brown Harbor by Vergissi Salm-mon Seafood Co., Sheriff A. C. Shivers said.

The sheriff and Police Chief Felix Turnbough said there is nothing to work on so far. All four witnesses, fellow shrimpers of the victim, said the attack was completely unprovoked.

They said the gunman walked by a dock where they were re-paring equipment and "cussed" them. They said none of them talked to him. He returned a few minutes later with a shotgun and fired one shot without a word. He dashed off on foot, they said.

Belling-er fell dead with pellets in his head and chest, Shivers said.

Investigation into the killing was snagged Monday as lie de-ctor tests on the three men proved negative.

One of those tested Monday night was a man police picked up late Sunday after he boasted of slaying one man and threaten- ing to kill others shortly after the shooting.

Another suspect, who admitted having a fight with some shrim- pers, was taken off a boat and tested in Corpus Christi. A man who said he witnessed the killing was also given the test.

Since all results were negative, the men were released.

Monday, a white Husky dog, re-ported stolen from a car in Corpus Christi, entered the case and it began to take on the cloak of a first-class murder mystery.

Investigators gave this account: Late Saturday night, Roy Lee, 2814 UpRiver Road, reported his dog stolen while his car was park- ed in the 2800 block of North Water. This was at 11:45 p.m.

Meanwhile, witnesses to the shooting said two white men drove up to the dock where they were working shortly before the man they identify as the killer ap- peared and began cursing them. The shooting occurred about 1:15 a.m. Sunday.

The dog was found on the docks later.

At first, the witnesses could not agree whether the assailant was a Negro or a white man. Later, they agreed he was white. They said it was dark at the time and the slayer was 30 or 40 paces away when he fired the fatal blast.

SUNRAY ASKS PERMIT FOR ARANSAS BAY

The Sunray-Midcontinent Oil Company has requested permission from the Corps of Engineers, U. S. Army to operate in Aransas Bay on State Tracts 73, 74, 75, 76, 77, 78, 96, 97, 100, 101 and 117, about 7 miles northeast of Rockport.

Sunray has asked for a blanket permit authorizing erection and maintenance of structures used in connection with the drilling of wells at the above location. The Humble Oil and Refining Company have asked the Corps of Engineers, U. S. Army, for a per- mit to place a 2 1/2-inch pipeline in Aransas Bay, at a point ap- proximately two miles south of Rockport.

The company also proposes to place two single pile markers at the same location. 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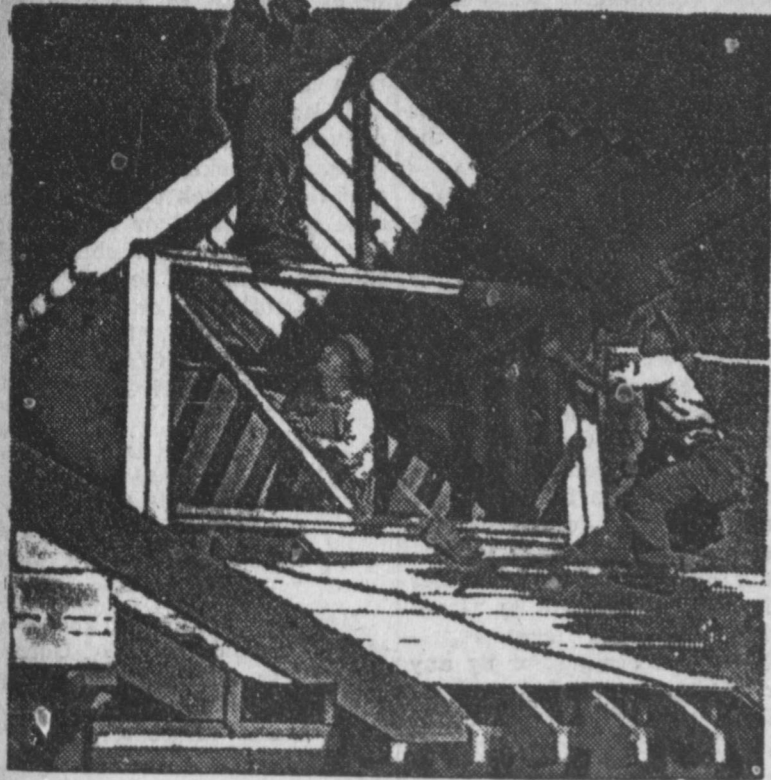

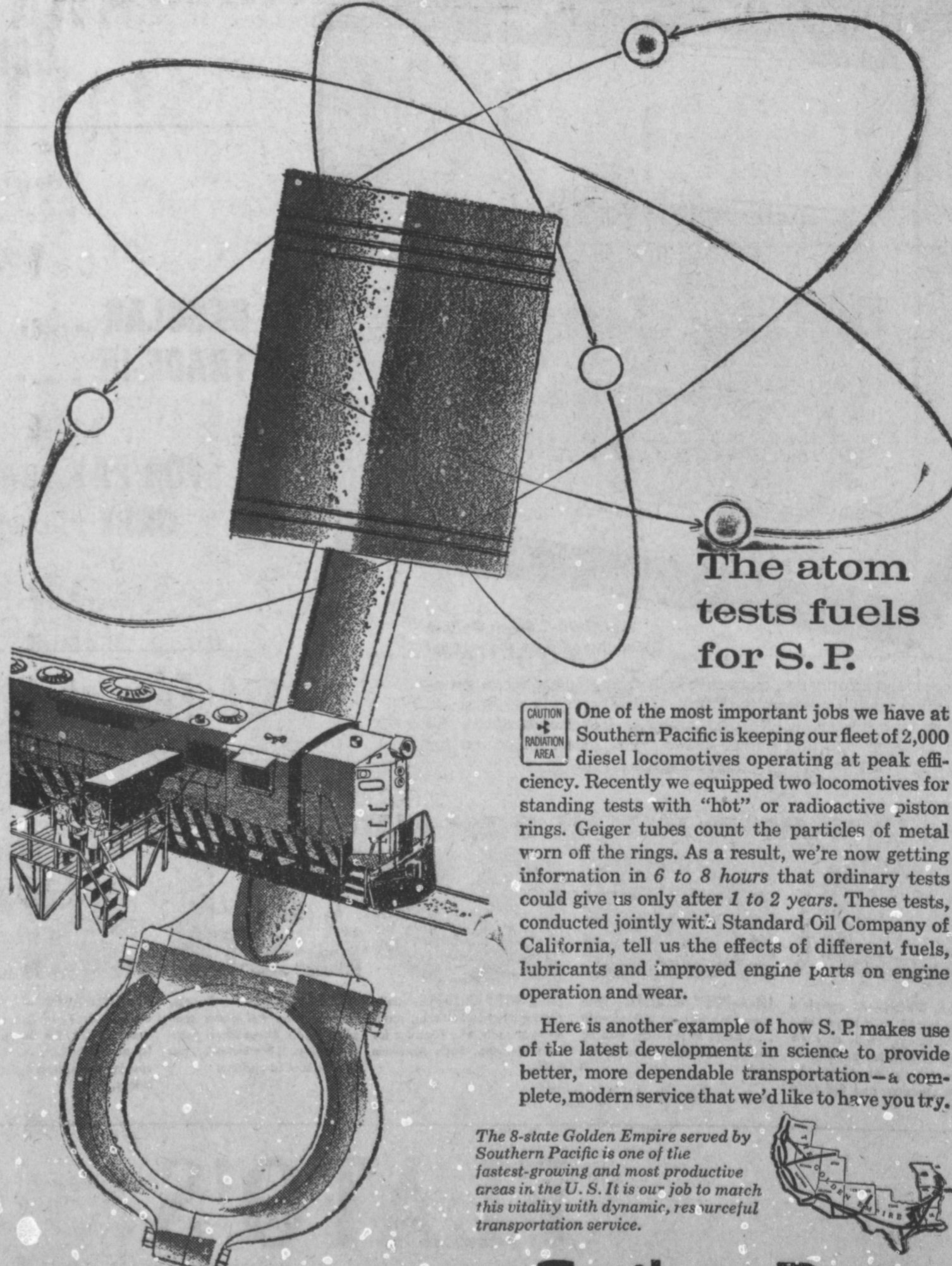

A single pile channel marker would be placed on each side of the channel at the site of the crossing and approximately 85 feet bayward from the top of slope of the channel. The dredged material from the crossing would be placed in the bay.

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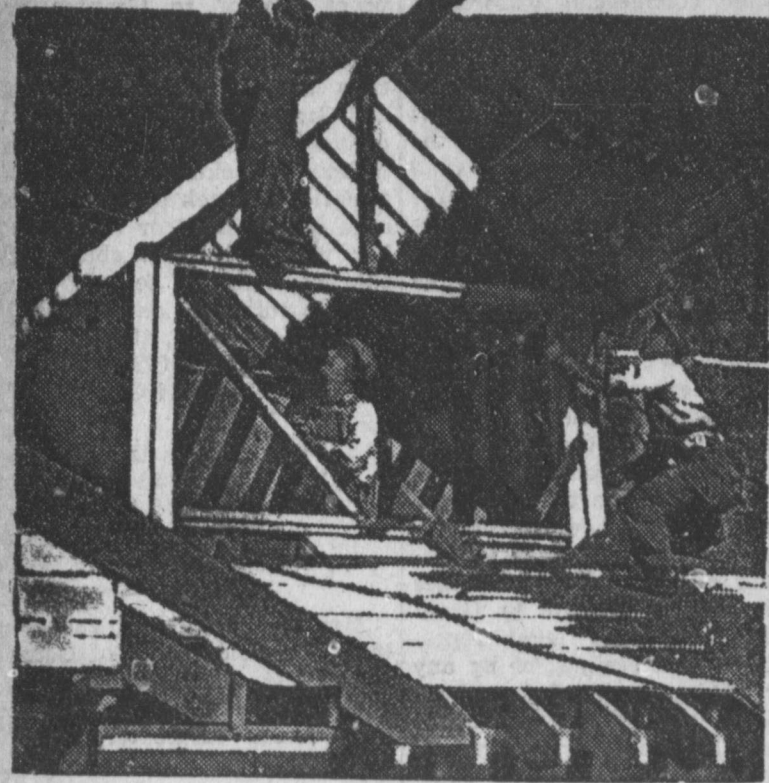
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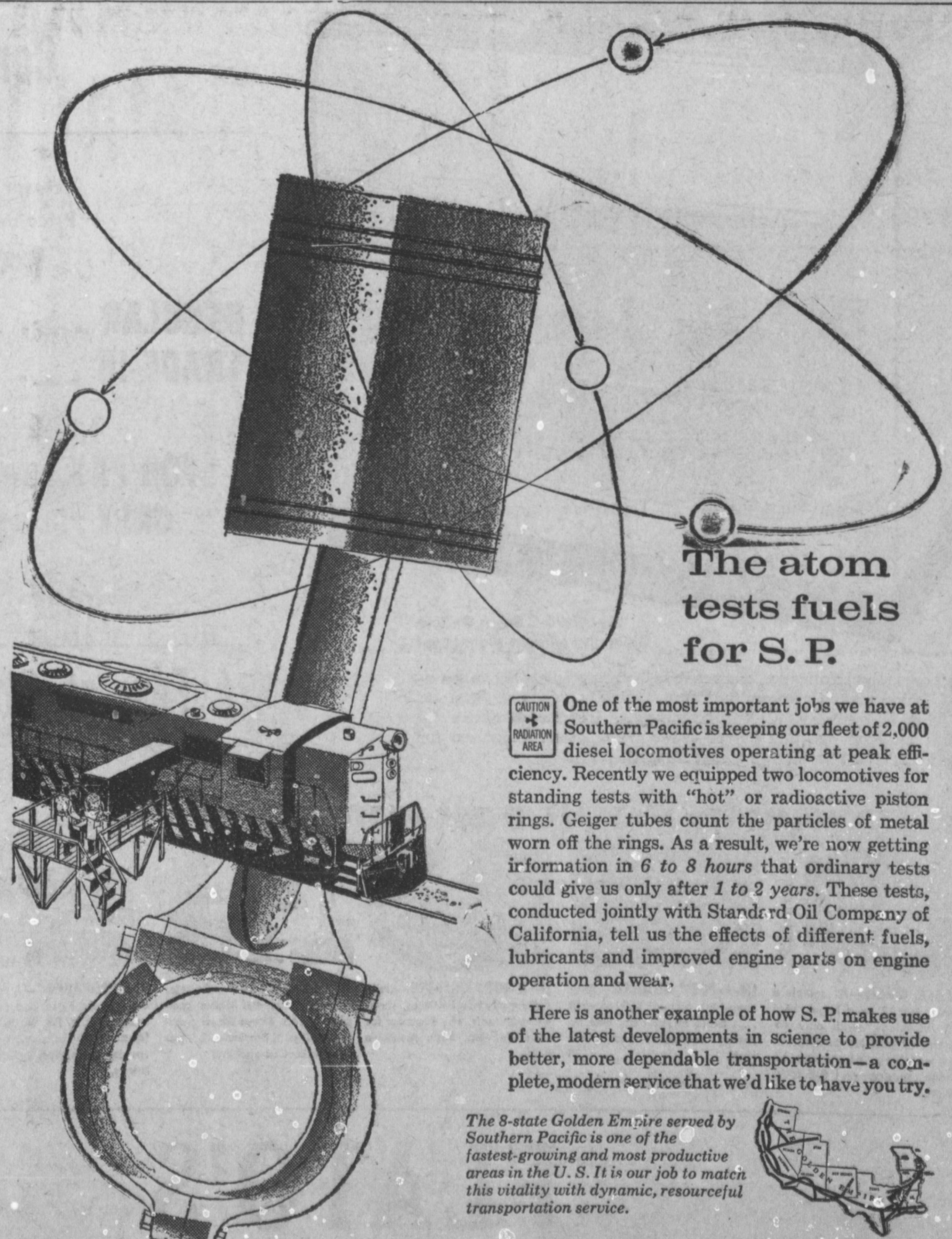

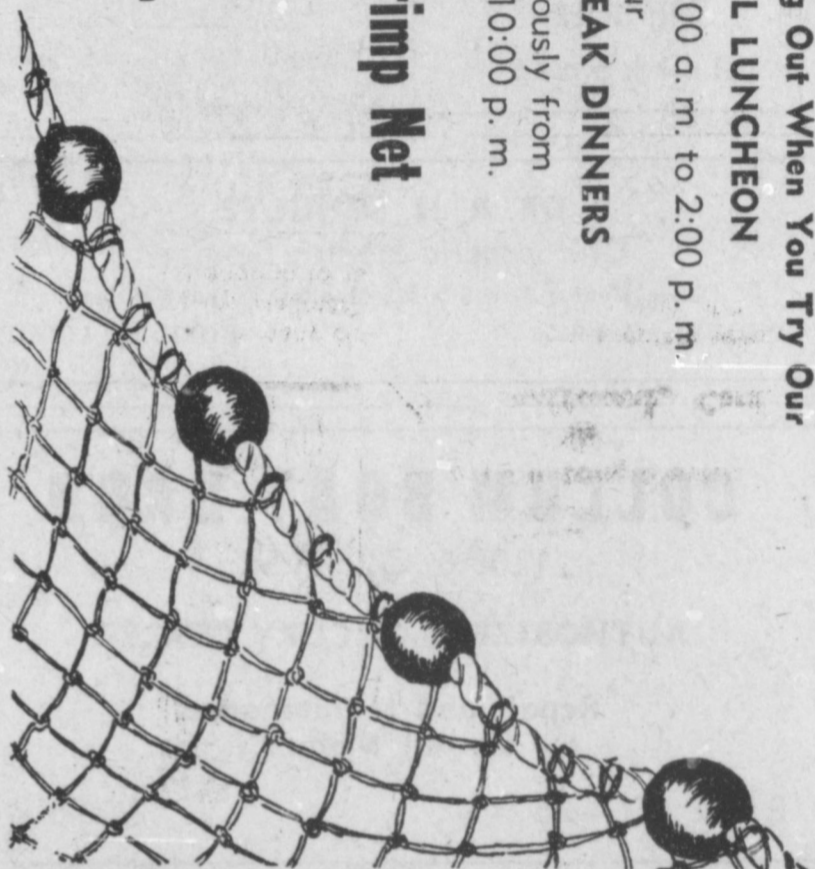
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
