

An on-the-farm demonstration of Floyd Huffman place) on FM 1781 at 9:30 a.m. Wednesday, Oct. 15, according to Dan Pawlik, county agent. The purpose of the demonstration is to show farm people how to treat their premises for more effective rat control. Bait will also be sold at the farm following the demonstration.

Furmarin, an anti-coagulant, is one of the newer and safer poisons on the market. Being an anticoagulant chemical it reduces or prevents normal clotting time of the blood when consumed in small quantities over a period of several days. It produces death by internal bleeding. It is considered one of the safest and most effective poisons that

Pivalyn is a water soluble bait and is recommended for use where there is plenty of food for rats and mice, where grain is stored and in chicken and turkey pens. For maximum results keep fresh, clean bait out at all times. Four to six pounds of bait should be enough for the average size farm.

Heptachlor, 25% wettable powder, will be available at the bait stations and the demonstration sites for red ants. One pound to 12% gallons water will treat 25 hills one time. Enough material for two or more treatments per hill should be ordered.

Poison grain for gophers will be available at the Extension Service office in Denton only.

No nuns, the 2000 or more Sisters who belong to the community comprise one of the largest secular institutes in the Catholic Church, and they have spread to the four corners of the earth.

In Europe, South Africa, Australia, Chile, Argentine, and Brazil they have built replicas of the Schoenstatt Shrine, and have taken up their life work. In the United States they have one other Mother House, in Wisconsin, serving the north. The one to be built at Lamar is their second in this

The Sisters, who may wear secular clothing when their work demands it, are bound to live according to the spirit of poverty, chastity and obedience. They work in nurseries, kindergartens, grade and high schools, orphanages, homes for the aged and domestic schools. They also nurse in hospitals and homes, engage in social welfare work, and teach in parochial schools like the one they have in Rockport.

During World War II, the movement was a target of the National Socialists, and some members of the Schonenstatt movement were victims of Nazi persecution. Sister Hroswitha came here from work in (continued on page 8)


