# Schools Crowded **Board Learns at Tuesday Meeting**

Aransas County schools, designed to take care of the county's scholastic population until 1965, are bursting at the seams, and classroom, cafeteria and transportation facilities are already inadequate, Superintendent J. D. Gray told members of the school board

"We are particularly crowded in the new junior high school," he said.
