Highway Plans In Austin Office Yoes Says Today

According to M. G. Yoes, resident engineer of the State Highway Department, revised plans for the north interchange of the Highway 35 business route have been prepared and are now in the department's Austin office for approval. Once these are approved, Yoes said, they will be returned to his office and presented to the City Council for their approval.

Every effort is being made, the highway engineer said, to clear up various points of contention, and to obtain a clearance on all right of way needed, to meet, if possible, the deadline for the November letting of bids by the department.

The City Council has been proceeding with purchase of the necessary riparian rights, according to Mrs. Jean Tuer, city secretary.

In other action on the Aransas County Highways, T. O. Foster, district highway engineer, announced this morning that a contract for 5.9 miles of construction on Highway 35 was awarded to a Sinton firm at the October letting of bids.

J. Carroll Weaver, contractor, submitted the low bid of \$81,940.50 on the project. Construction of a flexible base shoulder and asphaltic concrete widening, from Lady Clare Street in Rockport to the south end of Copano Bay Causeway, is expected to take 100 working days, Foster said, when contacted at his Corpus Christi office.

Yoes will be in active charge of this project as well as of that on the business route if it eventually goes through.

United Fund Collections Mount Slowly

Collections for the United Fund are mounting slowly, but, according to E. T. White, president of the organization, have hardly reached the halfway mark.

"Unless we pick up," White said, "it is apparently going to be a long drawn out process to get the money to meet this year's budget. I feel that we will eventually get it, but we're going to have to bear down harder than we have, and a lot of folks that don't want the old method of individual drives to return, whereby the townspeople alone bear all the cost of such things."

"We have been fortunate in that many people who have summer homes and other property here recognize the need of such organized charity, and have contributed. We still have considerable contact work to do, both in Rockport and elsewhere. But we want to urge everyone to get behind the drive and push. The need is always there, and unless we work at it, we can't meet these demands as a whole, and the area will be thrown back on the old methods of many individual drives that consume time and energy."

ALFONSO ZAVALA GIVEN LIFE FOR MURDER OF WIFE

Alfonso Zavala, a former cafe employee in Rockport, who was arrested here last spring as one of the perpetrators of a number of burglaries, was sentenced by Judge John Miller to life imprisonment last Thursday morning at Sinton, on the charge of murdering his estranged wife on Aug. 19.

Zavala shot and killed his wife, Hortencia, as she sat on the front porch of her farm home near Gregory, conversing with her mother. The couple had been separated only a few days.

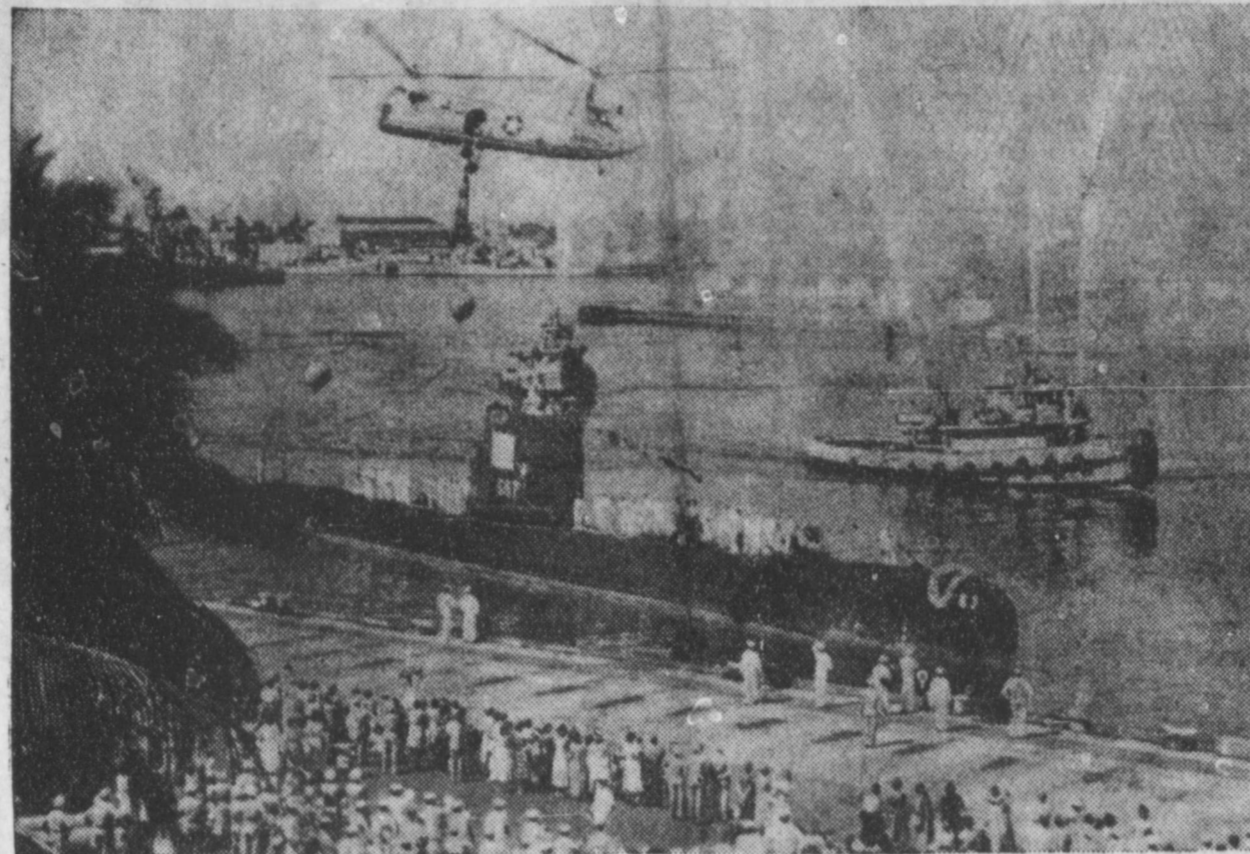
Two witnesses testified for the state—Mrs. Manuel Garcia, mother of the slain girl, and Sheriff Frank Hunt of San Patricio County.

The state recommended life imprisonment in the closing argument before the jury.

Zavala was one of two prisoners who broke out of San Patricio County jail a week ago last Saturday night, on the roof of the second floor of the courthouse. The two men returned to their cell when their makeshift rope of blankets failed to reach the ground.

Drag Races Slated Sunday

The Corpus Christi Timing Association will stage its first drag race of the fall at the Aransas County Airport, according to Bob Veselka, president of the organization. Veselka said that the races will start at 7 a.m. on the morning of Sunday, Oct. 26, and it includes all the usual classes that have made Rockport drag races so popular.

Plans for a big meet later in the year are also being made, Veselka said, at a time when most of the drag strips in the northern part of the state will either be snowed or rained out. The association president pointed to the fact that low rainfall at Rockport, and fine weather during most of the year, plus the exceptionally fine and long runways at the Aransas County Airport, made this a favorite place for dragsters, and had drawn some very fast cars.

Record for the local strip was set July 4, when approximately 6,000 spectators saw Bob Langley of Everman turn up 151.1 miles an hour, bettering the mark set by Melvin Bevly of Corpus Christi on May 25 this year.

Vandals Again

Late last week, after a junior football game, vandals truck again in Rockport, entering Benny Earp's garden and almost stripping his fruit trees of oranges, grapefruit, and other citrus, senselessly throwing the green fruit into the street.

Numerous Traffic Arrests Since First of Month

State Highway Police have made numerous traffic arrests since the first of the month in and around Rockport, and there are a number of things on the complaints filed in Justice Jack Smith's court that show that violators often are guilty of more than the particular misdemeanor on which they pay a fine.

On Oct. 6 Patrolman James Laro ticketed a local man for failure to stop at a sign. On Oct. 11 he issued two tickets for speeding. On Oct. 12 another highway patrolman gave a ticket to another traffic violator for defective brakes, but on the same complaint he noted that this motorist had no operator's license, and that his car was registered out of state, instead of in Texas, as required by law.

Patrolman J. I. Anderson picked up a couple of out-of-town speeders on Friday, and then Saturday, still working this area, he and his partner made three arrests, all of local citizens. One from Lamar, who paid a fine on having no tail light, was also speeding, had defective mufflers, and couldn't produce his driver's license, although he did show up with one in court.

A Fulton driver, proud of his car's ability to make noise, paid a fine for having straight tail pipes, and on his ticket it was also noted that he had only one headlight. A Rockport youth also paid a fine on no muffler Saturday night.

Continental Buses To Start Rolling

Continental buses, halted by a 112-day-old strike of drivers, maintenance and terminal workers, will begin rolling before the end of this week, a Continental Bus Systems, Inc., spokesman in Dallas said Monday.

The spokesman indicated that operations will resume even if it is necessary to hire nonunion personnel.

"It depends on how many of the strikers return to work today," he said.

About 100 Houston employees left their jobs last June along with other members of the Amalgamated Assn. of Street, Railway and Motor Coach Employees throughout the state. They asked wage increases, better working conditions and disability and retirement plans.

Last week Continental sent a letter to all strikers warning them to return to their jobs by Monday. They did not do so.

Continental Service from Houston to San Antonio, Dallas and Corpus Christi has been cut off by the strike. But operations on Continental-Dixie Lines to Shreveport and East Texas have not been affected.

Underprivileged To Benefit From Halloween Collections

For the third consecutive year children in Rockport and Fulton will participate in the Halloween "trick or treat" drive for UNICEF—United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund.

Sponsors this year will be the women of the Episcopal and Methodist Churches. All children of the community are urged to help in this collection. Parents who will drive cars are also needed. Anyone wishing to help should contact Mrs. Charles La Bounty, general chairman.

Children collections for UNICEF will be properly identified by UNICEF badges and milk cartons bearing the UNICEF insignia. Cars transporting these collectors will be driven by responsible adults. The committee suggests that citizens of the community have a treat for the child as well as money for his carton.

Every penny collected goes directly to the United States Committee for UNICEF. For every dollar spent in the 72 nations served by UNICEF the nation aided must contribute two dollars.

One cent will provide the vaccine to protect a child from tuberculosis. A nickel provides penicillin to cure a child of a crippling tropical disease called "yaws." One lime provides 50 glasses of milk, necessary for growth.

UNICEF, supported almost entirely by voluntary donations, supplies food, medicine and medical care for underprivileged children and their mothers around the world. Arrangements for collections at the school carnivals and football game have been made. Worker will meet at Methodist Fellowship Hall at 5 p.m. Friday, Oct. 31. Refreshments will be served.

Canal Delayed

Dredging Bids On Cutoff Link Top Estimates

The proposed alternate route of the Intracoastal Canal by Aransas Pass suffered a delay when bids for the project opened by the Corps of Engineers last week at Galveston were much higher than the government cost estimates.

H. L. Sisson of Corpus Christi, resident engineer, said the government's cost estimate for dredging the 17-mile alternate route is \$1,286,152. He said all bids exceeded the estimate by much more than the 25 per cent tolerance permitted by the government.

Bauer & Smith Dredging Co., Port Lavaca, submitted the low bid of \$2,057,839. Other bids included Standard Dredging Corporation, Galveston, \$2,152,758; McWilliams Dredging Co., New Orleans, \$2,250,506; and Atlantic, Gulf and Pacific Dredging Co., Houston, \$2,289,460.

The proposed canal would extend from Rockport to connect with the Port Aransas-Corpus Christi Waterway near Old Ingleside.

Sisson said no action was taken on the bids due to the great difference with the estimate, but he stated a decision will probably be made within a few days. He suggested the project may be re-submitted for bids or the cost estimates may be reviewed by the Corps of Engineers. The district engineer expressed hope that the project can be started in the near future.

The election climaxes a long campaign by residents of the Fulton area for formation of a water and sewer district to serve the little community, and was brought to a head by presentation to the State Board of Water Engineers of a petition signed by more than 75 property owners residing within the limits of the proposed district.

The district, if formed, will serve most of the congested area in Fulton, where surface wells have been found inadequate and subject to pollution, and proposition one on the ballot is labeled "For Confirmation of District," with the converse being, "Against the Formation of Such District."

If approved, it provides the machinery for formation of a district comparable to the Navigation District, which does not have the power of taxation unless the residents in the district specifically allow such taxation by another election to be held later, in the same manner that county, city, or navigation district bond elections are called.

The five temporary directors of the water district, appointed by the water engineers, may be retained, or their names struck out and others written in, if the voters so desire.

The entire district, according to the election call, shall comprise one precinct, and the voting place will be at the Fulton Elementary School on Nov. 22. C. L. Utz has been appointed presiding judge, Mrs. E. G. Cooke is assistant judge of the election, and clerks are Mrs. E. M. Ward and Mrs. Hettie Weber.

Preliminary plans for the proposed district were prepared by Donoho and Cross, San Antonio engineers, and the financial data presented to the engineers was assembled by Harry Ratliff, of Lovett, Abercrombie and Company, Houston.

Emory Spencer has been elected to the directorate of the Coastal Bend Tourist Association, according to Bob Conwell, manager of the organization. This makes two Rockport men on the board of directors, James H. Sorenson, J., having been elected a short time ago.

The Association, Conwell said, is backing an enlargement of the marine aquarium at Rockport as an added tourist attraction, and he, Sorenson and Spencer are going to check into the possibilities of getting this accomplished.

9. Bidders should carefully examine the plans, specifications and other documents, visit the site of the work, and fully inform themselves as to all conditions and matters which can in any way affect the work or the cost thereof. Should a bidder find discrepancies in, or omission from the plans, specifications or other documents, or should he be in doubt as to their meaning, he should at once notify the ENGINEER and obtain clarification prior to submitting any bid.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Editor, Rockport Pilot, City Dear Sir:

In the letter published by you last week by an anonymous writer, we were made to appear as perpetual objectors to the progress of our good city of Rockport, because we had joined others in objecting to certain segments in the proposed new highway development.

First of all, let us say that we happen to be residents of the city of Rockport and taxpayers and operate our own businesses. We have every reason to believe that the writer who attacked us and our associates last week is not a resident nor a taxpayer to our knowledge, and, certainly not the operator of a business within the city.

The anonymous one's opinion is recognized as his personal conviction. However, could it not be possible that his belief is stronger than impression—less stronger than his positive knowledge?

From the very nature of our businesses it is obvious that we would be the last persons in the world to object to a sound expansion of our highway system. Our present futures are wrapped up in the future of Rockport.

We objected to the proposed plans unveiled recently by the highway people for the simple reason that they had been under cover so long and came out for adoption before even the majority members of the city council had even seen them, needless to mention our citizenry.

I wish to quote page 1 of the Pilot dated December 19, 1957, just 48 hours prior to the time the citizens were asked to go to the poles and signify approval of the \$80,000.00 Bond Issue to install curb and gutter along the State Highway designated business route. QUOTE: "There will be a traffic channelization at the sight of the Old Triangle, and there will

be another where the business route and Highway 35 rejoin, at the T. Noah Smith corner. There will be crossovers in that interchange at various points, for, as H. G. Yoes, district highway engineer explained, the departments thought is always of the best ways to handle traffic, and the safest, but at the same time it DOES NOT LOSE SIGHT OF THE FACT THAT THERE ARE ESTABLISHED BUSINESSES ALONG THE ROUTE."

Present plans definitely show this several block proposed PENNSYLVANIA TURNPIKE without any crossovers whatsoever going north from the Woman's Club to the vicinity of the O'Connor residence. If constructed as planned anyone driving north would be some 200 feet east of the existing Highway 35 beginning at a point near Libs' Golf Course, and as they looked to the west to land areas they would first observe a 160 ft. wide "island or esplanade" that divided the one-way north and one-way south-bound traffic without any crossovers.

Further, as now proposed, from a point beginning near Libs' Golf Course and proceeding to the north termination point (the vicinity of the O'Connor residence) 200 additional feet of land plus all riparian rights (this is exclusive of the 100 ft. right-of-way now owned by the State Highway) would be deeded away to this state agency by our city and navigation district. If such deeds were ever executed and recorded by the State, the State Highway Department would then, without restriction, assume absolute control of our water front.

Mr. Editor it is our earnest opinion that such action could never serve the best interests of our city or community. We advocate the retention of all riparian rights by our local governing bodies. To our knowledge, we are not aware of any city or town,

be it on the East, West or Coast, where a State Highway Department owns and control riparian rights, thus, the waterf

Tell me, sir, if this can pass, how could our navigation district safely proceed with marvelously proposed plans the development of Little Bay. Public necessity not only warms but demands this development, of us should realize and a that our existing harbor facilities are limited and overcrowded, the proposed new harbor and related developments will most surely stimulate a remarkable financial progress.

We and our associates want strongly commend our mayor those members of the city council and, the members of our navigation district, who have asked more time to study these proposed plans and deeds as prepared and presented by the state highway department, district 16, to the local governing bodies. It is our belief that all parties will finally approve plans that best meet overall needs of our entire community; and when this is done we will withdraw our objection and go heartily along with the development.

Immediate action to construct the proposed Diablo Dam at Del Roi was demanded yesterday by the South Texas Chamber of Commerce in 32nd annual convention. During discussion directors expressed the belief that annual sessions would afford pressure groups more frequent access to the legislators with a

August Shrimp Landings Drop

The Texas shrimp catch is off for the first eight months of this year, totaling 22,980,000 pounds of tails, according to latest U. S. Fish and Wildlife figures. This is a drop of 1,651,000 pounds over the same period a year ago.

The Freeport area reported a slight rise in August, from 1,803,000 pounds in July, to 1,869,000 pounds, but the Aransas Pass-Corpus Christi area, although second in total production as it was in July, nevertheless produced about 320,000 pounds less than in that month. The August total was only 1,356,000 pounds.

Third place went to Brownsville, as it did in July, although here, too, there was a slight drop, to 1,007,000 pounds, or 45,000 pounds less than in July.

Port Isabel dropped to 687,000 pounds in August, against 754,000 pounds in July; Galveston jumped 36,000 pounds to a total of 539,000. Port Lavaca and Palacios also showed a rise in August to 259,000 pounds compared to 133,000 the month before, and Rockport reported an August catch of 251,000 pounds, or 47,000 more than in July.

Galveston and Freeport checked in with 76,000 pounds of fish, mostly red snapper, as opposed to 69,000 in July; Port Isabel caught 4,000 pounds of finfish in August, or 1,000 pounds less than in July.

August landings of blue crabs in the Galveston-Freeport area amounted to 3,000 pounds; in Port Lavaca-Palacios 22,000 pounds were reported. The combined total was 13,000 pounds less than the July catch. From these catches, Galveston produced 400 pounds of crab meat; Port Lavaca-Palacios produced 2,800 pounds.

Ducks and Geese Arriving Early on Texas Coast

AUSTIN—Ducks and geese are arriving on the Texas coast now in great numbers, according to the director of law enforcement of the Game & Fish Commission.

"Wardens all along the coast are reporting heavy night movements," the director said. "They expect about Oct. 20 the heaviest movement will be over and the ducks and geese will settle down to living in their winter home."

Many South Texans have reported flights of geese over their houses during the night hours. Although some Canadas and White-fronts have arrived, most of the geese now on the coast are snows and blues. The early duck movement consisted mostly of teal, pintails, and spoon bills. Mallards, canvas backs and red heads are now beginning to move in, however.

Food conditions are excellent on the coast, according to Harold Irby, waterfowl biologist. He plans to make an aerial check of the total coastal population in the near future. In the meantime, J. R. Singleton, another waterfowl biologist, is making plans for the development of the marshland recently bought near Port Arthur.
