

Along The Waterfront



Free shooting for 150 duck and goose hunters a week will be provided this year on the recently acquired Big Hill Bayou wildlife management area near Port Arthur, it has been announced by the Game and Fish Commission.

Regulations have been set up to allow 50 permits to be issued each day for hunting on Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Saturdays between Nov. 1 and Jan. 14, inclusive from 30 minutes before sunrise to 12 o'clock noon.

This property was bought last December but final details of the purchase were not completed until September. Boundary lines have been marked but a development program has not been put underway as yet. The area is located in Jefferson County about five miles southwest of Port Arthur, and less than one mile from Port Arthur, and less than one mile from Port Acres, on U. S. Highway 73.

Persons desiring permits to hunt the area must make their reservations by telephone only, calling Raymond 6-1641 at Port Acres, Texas, between the hours of 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. Mondays through Fridays.

The entire 8,000 acre tract is flooded at present and the water depth varies from six inches to four feet or more. Entrance to the hunting area can be made only by boat, and hunters must bring their own boats. There should be at least two persons in each hunting party.

Lucky hunters must be at the headquarters area by 4 a.m. on the day they are to hunt. There they will receive their permits and be guided to the hunting areas by Game Commission personnel. Temporary headquarters have been set up at 92 Ave. B in Port Acres.

Anticipating a record year, more than 41,000 Texas sportsmen bought hunting licenses during September, according to the Game and Fish Commission. September 1 began the second year of the \$3.15 hunting license fee.

On the basis of revenue collected, receipts were reported of \$123,443.45 from hunting license sales. This is an increase of approximately \$14,000 for the same period in 1957.

Remitting agents had until October 10 to pay for licenses sold during September; therefore, this does not include money on all licenses sold.

Fishing license sales totaled \$154,275.60 for the month. This figure represents more than 77,000 resident fishing licenses.

Sales of all types of licenses is expected to increase this year due to the good condition of game and fish populations throughout the state.

Many Amendments To Be Decided On November 4

Nine amendments to the State Constitution are to be decided at the general election to be held next Tuesday, Nov. 4, among them one on yearly sessions of the state legislature on which the Pilot has a story elsewhere in this issue.

Another of more local interest is a provision giving elective officers of the state pension privileges, and the third provides that under certain conditions the offices of county judge and justice of the peace may be filled by commissioners' court.

Pensions for retired Texas Rangers, a law governing running for office by already elected officials, another on municipal office holding, one authorizing medical assistance for people receiving old age pensions, and authorization for a hospital district at Amarillo are others to be voted on, and will be found in fuller form on page 6.

One of the most controversial, and at the same time one of the most badly needed is amendment number seven, allowing the state to advertise for the purpose of drawing tourists and industries to Texas. This is one of the few states that does not have such a law, and, as a result, has been falling farther and farther behind when compared with states like Florida and California.

On the strictly local level, another item to be voted on Tuesday is separation of the sheriff's office from that of tax assessor-collector.

No Date Set for Bus Run to Houston

Continental Trailways hasn't set a date to resume bus service to Houston, Hubert Gilson, company traffic manager from Dallas, said this week.

Ingleside, Rockport and Tivoli have been without bus service since the strike began three months ago.

Gilson said the company hasn't reset service on Highway 9 to San Antonio and won't do so until the Corpus Christi-Houston route is begun.

The company is providing service to San Antonio through Alice with Union Trailways buses.

He said the company has resumed services between Dallas and San Antonio.

Percy Anders, district passenger agent in Corpus Christi, said that 10 new employees have been hired to replace the strikers. Continental had 13 men on strike here but one of them returned to work last week.

In Dallas, T. S. Reese, vice-president of the company, said that a final offer by the company to bus employees Local 1142 has expired and new employees hired.

Reese, testifying in a court hearing in which six Dallas mechanics claimed they were not allowed by the union to vote on the Oct. 13 offer, said that 30 company buses are running.

He said this is about 25 per cent of the normal schedule.

Marine News

H. L. Rymal has asked the army engineers for a permit to construct a wharf in Copano Bay extending out from Tract 33 in Copano Village, approximately 2 1/2 miles northwest of Fulton. The wharf will be four feet wide and eight hundred feet long, and will have a 12 by 24 foot T-head.

An engineer permit has also authorized Phillips Petroleum to erect structures for production of oil in 24 state tracts located central to a point approximately three miles northwest from the Copano Causeway and approximately six miles northwest of Rockport.

A similar permit has been granted to Renwar Oil Corporation for operations in state tracts 105 and 106, located in Copano Bay approximately five miles north of town.

Mrs. Janie Eell Gray, of Floresville, has also asked for a permit to build a 1000-foot wharf opposite Live Oak Tract 37, approximately a mile north of Fulton. The wharf will have a 12-24 foot T-head.

City Council Meeting Routine

The regular meeting of the City Council Monday night was largely routine in nature.

There was some discussion on progress of the Highway 35 business route and the Council expressed appreciation of a petition signed by most of the merchants along Austin Street, expressing appreciation for the way in which the matter had been handled. A similar letter from the Rockport Chamber of Commerce was also read by Mrs. Jean Tuer, city secretary.

In addition to expressing appreciation of the way the Council had cooperated with all agencies concerned on the highway, the petition urged the city fathers to continue to do everything possible to get the rest of the preliminary work out of the way, so that the State Highway Department could once again advertise for bids on this section of the highway.

V. A. Dullye, Jr., Charlie Duck and Herman Johnson, who own businesses along the route, were again present at the council meeting, and presented some new data for the consideration of the councilmen, to aid them in working planning details.

A resolution including the section of Highway 35 from Woods Street to Lady Clare Street in the rest of the project was approved.

Water Superintendent Tom Shults was authorized to proceed with acquisition of an easement for installation of a sewage lift station in the western part of town, necessary to implement the city's drive against outdoor privies.

Mayor Hollis Collum and any members of the council that wished to attend were authorized to go to the meeting of the Texas League of municipalities in Houston in November.

Gonzales Warm Springs Still Needs Help

Gonzales—"Texans have given \$52,586 to Warm Springs as of Sept. 30," said Walter H. Richter, executive director of TRC, in a report to the State on the emergency drive to keep this non-profit hospital open.

"We hope to receive as much in October partly as a result of AFL-CIO drives and partly from donations by individuals and clubs," Richter said.

The more than \$52,000 raised in September went toward wiping out a \$100,000 indebtedness and even a like sum in October would only bring the balance up to zero with no money for operating expenses in the bank.

However, some 85 Community Chests and United Funds in the State have included the Foundation as a participating agency and most of the money from these agencies will come to TRC after December and later in 1959.

TRC's officials estimate that in order to keep the hospital open they will need \$500,000 annually in contributions to supplement regular hospital revenues. The more than \$52,000 raised in September includes the Austin campaign (more than \$20,000) raised by businessmen and labor's Perch Light march; a statewide letter campaign; and some United Fund contributions.

Council of Church Women Schedule World Community Day

The Council of Church Women will hold their World Community Day Services on Friday, Nov. 7, at 4 p.m. at St. Peter's Episcopal Church.

The women attending are asked to bring balls of yarn of any kind that can be used for knitting and pieces of material of any weight or length to make clothing. All gifts will be sent to mothers in Germany, Austria, Hong Kong, and the Middle East where there are thousands upon thousands of escapees from Communist countries.

This is to give them opportunity to make things for themselves that they need and that they may not get in gifts of clothes.

Annual Sessions A Costly Scheme

In 1957, the last year in which the Texas Legislature met in regular session, expenses incurred in the conduct of legislative business of the state amounted to \$1,896,582.21. This included the \$25 per diem for 120 days allowed the 181 members of the House and Senate, travel expenses and the other salary and operating costs and allowances.

What might be anticipated in regard to legislative costs should the salary increase and annual sessions amendment pass in the Nov. 4 general election?

They cannot be figured accurately. Like almost everything else in government, however, cost is rising. But some projection is possible.

An annual salary of \$7,500 for each of the legislators, as proposed, would total \$2,357,500 a year when multiplied by the present number of 131 representatives and senators. This is almost as much as the aggregate legislative session bill now figures, and it must be kept in mind that regular sessions are held only every two years.

The two-year salary bill would come to \$2,710,000, more than five times the present amount of \$543,000, provided there are no special sessions in the biennium.

Other legislative expenses incurred, besides salaries, came to \$1,339,572.21 in the fiscal year of 1957. This is approximately the amount the legislature's being in session costs in additional expenses.

Instead of a legislative cost of about \$1,900,000 every two years, the proposed amendment would require an outlay of well over \$5,000,000 in a two-year period of annual sessions.

The additional amount exceeds \$3,000,000. It is a sizable sum of money, and an expenditure that can be avoided if the voters defeat amendment No. 1 on the general election ballot.

Woodsboro lost to Ingleside 8 to 6 week before last, for those who want to figure the dope, and in season play, the Pirates' record stands at four games won and two lost, while the Eagles can produce only three wins against four losses.

However, the Eagles have a high-scoring offense, with Arch Koontz running at left half and Milton Gillespie on the right side of the backfield, both of whom have to be held behind the line of scrimmage to be held scoreless.

Aransas Election Interest Light

No Contests in Election Elicit Little

Comment in County, With Only Separation Of Tax Office From Sheriff's of Interest

With the run-offs deciding various local races, the upcoming general election next Tuesday, Nov. 4, is not exciting any particular interest in Aransas County, there being no contests of any sort that

the local vote could influence in the slightest.

Duck Season Opens Saturday

Duck hunters get in their licks this year beginning at 6:11 Saturday morning (one-half hour before sunrise). They're allowed to shoot from Nov. 1 through Jan. 14 from one-half hour before sunrise to sunset each day.

Overall bag limit is five a day and the possession limit is 10. However, there's a new ruling that allows a person to have in his daily bag limit only (1) two redheads, (2) two canvasbacks, or (3) one of each. His possession limit may include (1) four red heads, (2) four canvasbacks, or (3) four redheads and canvasbacks in the aggregate.

Goose hunters have something new to watch out for in the way of season dates this time.

Saturday morning it will be legal to shoot snow geese and blue geese and you can shoot 'em when you find them through Jan. 14. It's the same as for ducks and you're allowed five a day and five in possession.

But watch this one: The season on Canada geese and speckled-bellies opens Nov. 16 and closes Jan. 14.

Since this area of the coast has some 90 or 95 per cent Canada population, be careful.

As long as the shooting is limited to snows and blues, you have nothing to worry about other than getting to shoot the geese and then not getting more than five.

After Canadas and specks become legal game on the 16th, the over-all bag limit stays at five and may include (1) two Canadas, (2) one speckled-belly, or (3) one of each. Under no conditions is it legal to take two speckled-bellies in one day.

Nov. 1 not only serves as an important milestone for duck and goose hunters but serves as opening day for deer, turkey hunters in LaSalle and McMullen Counties.

Hunters will be out in force again in quest of the fattest bucks in recent years after a couple of wet seasons.

Abundant water and feed following heavy spring and fall rains put the deer in top condition.

The situation also creates its own drawbacks, too. With the rain came more cover and hunters likely will have a harder time finding the game even though it should be more plentiful.

The season closes in McMullen and LaSalle on Dec. 15.

The deer, turkey and javelina seasons generally open Nov. 16 and close Dec. 31.

Two Pennsylvania Men Arrested Here

Two alleged car thieves, Robert Rabe and David Shafer, are in Rockport jail, due to the sharp eye of Deputy Sheriff Sherman Mundine, who came upon them last week stripping a car. Their story that they had the car papers and that one of them was the owner didn't set so well with Sherman, who took them to jail. When Sheriff A. C. Shivers started to check up on them, he found that they had reportedly stolen the car they were stripping in Marietta, Ohio, and they are being held for officers from there.

Before this, they had reportedly stolen another in Pinburg, Penn., their home town, which they had abandoned in West Virginia.

Bauer & Smith Dredging Co., Fort Lavaca, has protested to the Chief of Army Engineers.

The company bid \$2,057,839. The government's estimate was \$1,286,152. Bids were opened Oct. 15.

LEONARD LEBLANC HAS CONTRACT ON GORDON BUILDING

Leonard LeBlanc was successful bidder on a contract to completely renovate the Bill Gordon building, next to Johnson's Drug Store, and started work there Monday morning.

Gordon, who lives in Bay City, intends to remodel the front, to harmonize with Johnson's, install a new concrete floor and to lower the ceiling to 10 feet, installing acoustical tile to deaden noise.

In addition to this, the walls are to be refinished, four-inch concrete blocks being used to give them the rough texture so popular in similar business buildings.

JUNIOR CLASS TO SELL CHRYSANTHEMUMS FOR HOMECOMING GAME

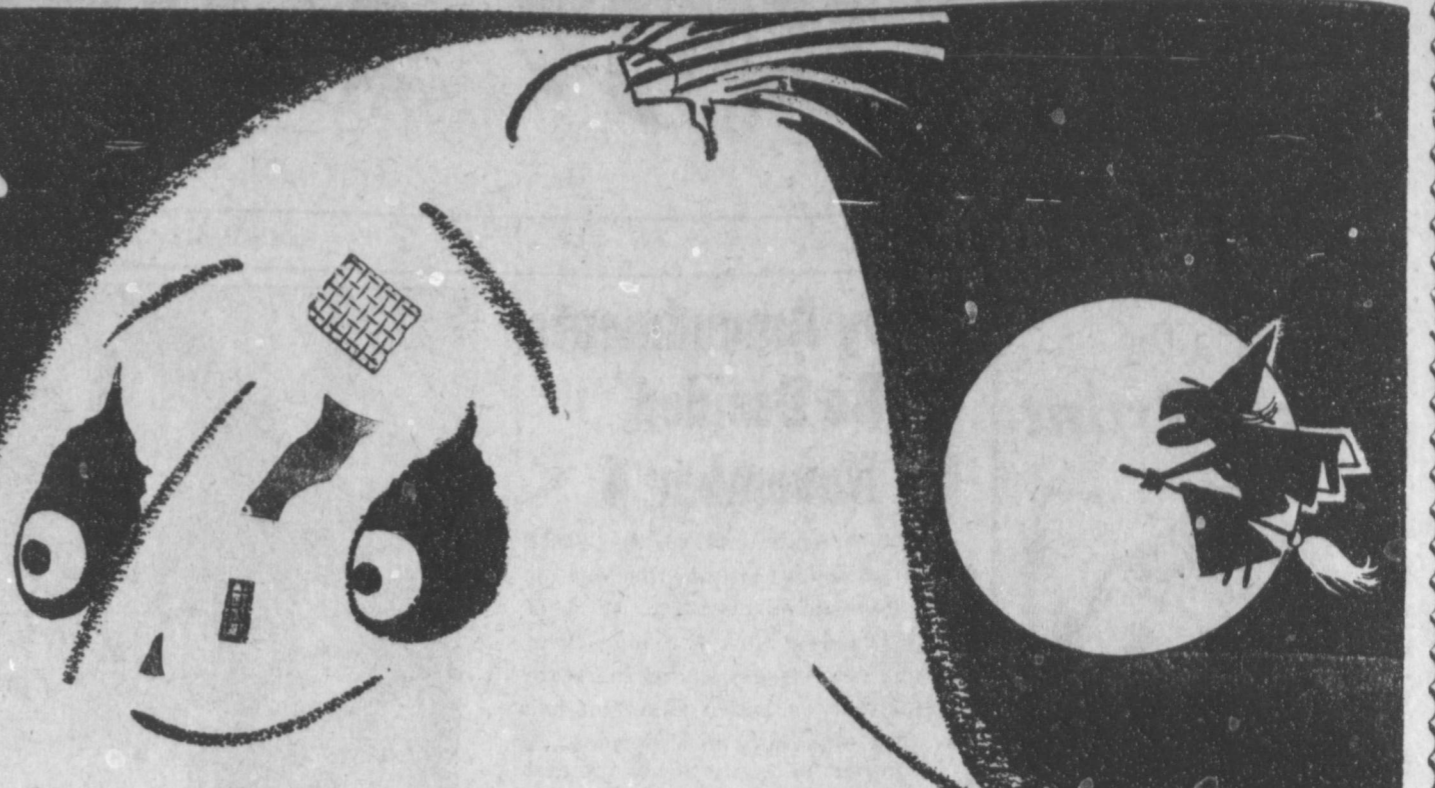

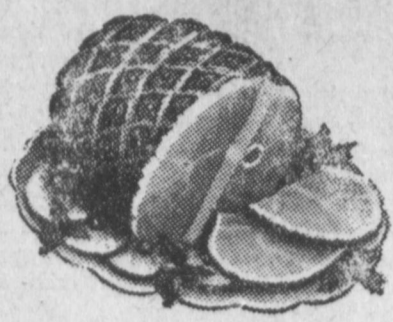

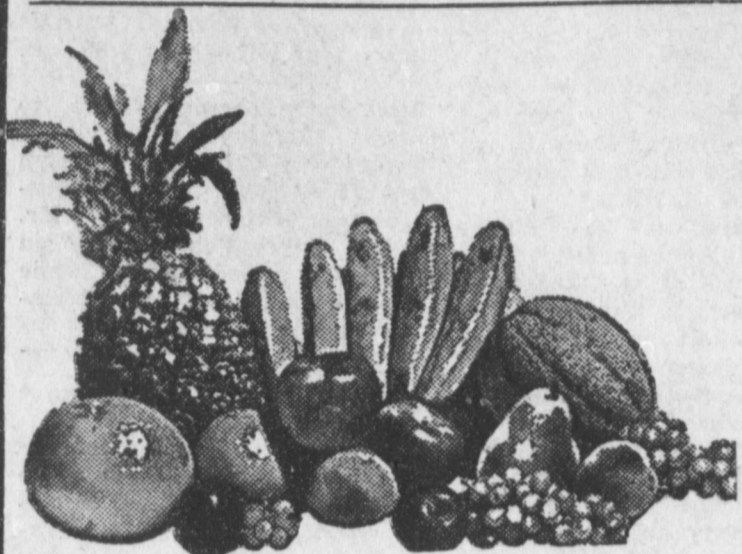

About Halloween

While Halloween is one of the oldest holidays on our calendar, it is also probably one of the most vague in the minds of those who celebrate it.

For the six and seven year old, Halloween is simply "trick or treat" and lo! the household that doesn't have a handout for the scary little imps. For the older kids, Halloween is still nothing more than an excuse of revelry.

Every costumes, ducking apples, and general merriment have a real significance.

Halloween means Hallowmas, or the Eve of All Saints. Originally it was a pagan harvest celebration. With the coming of Christianity, the belief sprang up among peoples that wicked souls were called together on this night to inhabit the bodies of animals. This belief developed into the notion that on Halloween, all the ghosts and spirits walked around at night. But these weird spirits and ghosts had appetites, hence the feasting angle.

Today, we don't believe in spirits and ghosts, so the day has been reduced to fun-making. However, some of the customs have been preserved. In the Middle Ages, ducking for apples had a very important significance. The maiden fortunate enough to catch an apple could put it under her pillow and dream of her lover, or eat it before a mirror, combing her hair at the time, and her future husband would appear next to her in the mirror. Under no circumstances was she to turn around, or the vision would be lost.

Centuries ago, people paraded as saints and devils around the churchyard on Halloween, hence the costume angle.

The pumpkin is purely an American innovation, and is used as a symbol of the fall harvest.

Law enforcement officers take a dim view of the vandalism that once was prevalent on Halloween night. Any mischief was blamed on the witches and ghosts. The prudent citizen will see to it that his garage is locked, his clothesline in, and the porch furniture stored safely against the "goblins." It's no trick to don a costume and join in the fun—so get in on the treat.

Schoenstatt Sisters of Mary's Proposed New Home at Lamar



The Schoenstatt Sisters of Mary are in process of building this Mother House, the second of its kind in the United States and the first of its kind in the south at Old Lamar, on the property just to the eastward of the old Catholic Chapel of Our Lady Star of the Sea. Sister Superior Hroswitha, of 810 Antelope, Corpus Christi, says that there will be approximately 50 resident sisters at the Mother House, which will have jurisdiction over all members of the teaching order in the southern portion of the United States. Sister Hroswitha says that Old Lamar was chosen as a site for the Mother house because of the peace and quiet of the peninsula there, and that this building will be augmented from time to time as need and money are available. Nearly a hundred and forty feet long, it faces the bay, and provision has been made to add another wing if necessary. In addition, the Sister Superior said, there will be another building, a replica of the chapel at Schoenstatt, Germany, where the Schoenstatt movement started. Sisters of the Order, who may wear secular clothes if their apostolic duties demand it, are teachers in schools, nurses in hospitals, and perform similar duties throughout the world. Three of them, under leadership of Sister Ludhelma, conduct the Sacred Heart School in Rockport, where Sister Hroswitha once taught, but others are spread over most of the world.

A pitch back to Happner made four and then a pass to John Goff from Shivers sacked up a first down on the Pirate 46.

Shivers' pass was incomplete; another to Rouquette, in the flat, lost five yards; and then Cabaniss punted to the Mustang 27.

Kilpatrick's pass was broken up by Gene Gregory, but a 15-yard penalty against the Pirates for roughing the passer put the ball on the Mustang 42 just as the half ended.

Croakers Start October Run in Coastal Waters

AUSTIN—The croaker run is beginning on the Texas coast, according to the executive secretary of the Game & Fish Commission.

The croakers, members of the same family as the speckled trout, redfish, drum and whiting, usually weigh slightly under a pound. It is estimated that more than 300 tons of them were taken by sports fishermen in the Roll-over pass area near Gilchrist during last year's fall migration.

"The croakers are now moving toward the Gulf to spawn," according to Terrance R. Leary, marine biologist. "There is a wonderful chance for fishermen to get full stringers of this tasty fish."

"Fishermen utilizing bottom rigs, often with multiple hooks, find passes the best spots to meet the outgoing schools. The beginning of the mass migration varies somewhat along the coastline. Generally, however, October finds these fish in their annual pilgrimage."

Although croaker fishing pressure is heaviest at Rollover because of the heavy population of the Houston-Galveston area, hundreds of fishermen all along the coast play these croaker runs.

ARE YOU DISABLED?

"You don't have to be helpless or bedridden to establish a disability with social security," said Thomas W. Wilson, Field Representative of the social security office in Corpus Christi. The disability must be so severe, however, that you are unable to engage in any substantial gainful work, he said. It must be a physical or mental condition which is expected to continue indefinitely and one which will show up in medical examinations and tests. To be eligible for disability benefits or to have your social security record frozen, the disability must have lasted for six months or more, and must have begun at least six months before reaching retirement age, Wilson explained. If the disabling condition is temporary or partial and it is expected that you will be able to return to work, you cannot qualify under these provisions. If you are disabled or have any questions about the social security
