ENGINEER IN TOWN ON LITTLE BAY CONSTRUCTION

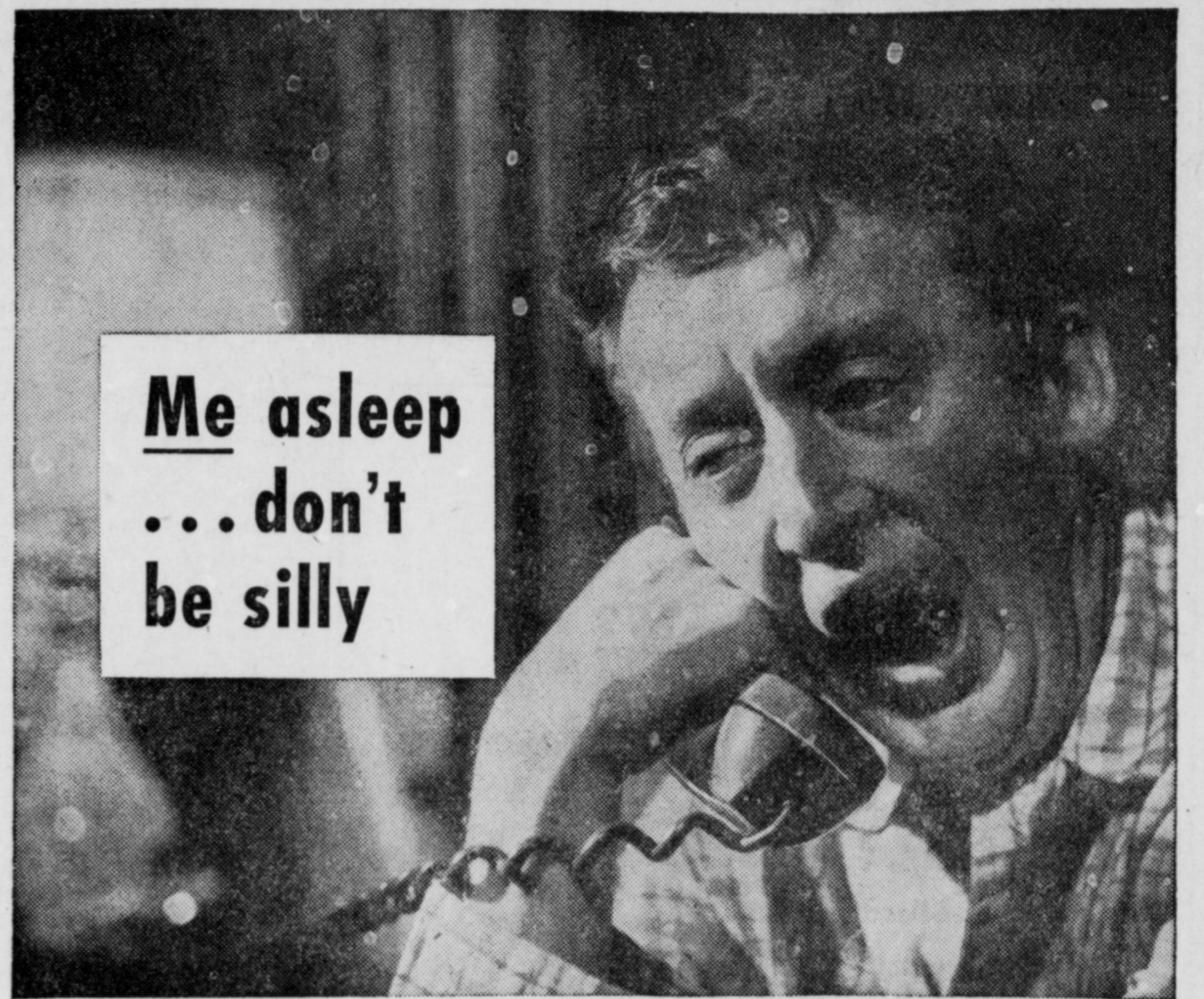

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George Washington— The Teen-Ager

Everyone knows the story about George Washington and how, when he was just a little boy, his conscience would not allow him to tell a lie about the cherry tree. And, nearly everyone knows how, as a young man, he traveled through the wilds of Ohio, Pennsylvania, and West Virginia surveying the state lands. Then, suddenly, he was fighting in the Revolutionary War and later was our first president.

But, George Washington once was a teen-ager!

Like the teen-ager of today, George must have been beset by many problems of conduct. It was just as tough to bridge the gap between boyhood and manhood then as it is now—perhaps more so.

What did young George do about it? He decided to improve himself by drawing his own code of behavior.

At the age of sixteen he left his home to live with his half-brother at Mount Vernon. The young boy felt ill at ease in the sparkling Virginia society.

In the library of his new home he found the book by Francis Hawkins, the Englishman, titled, "Youth's Behaviour, or Decency in Conversation Amongst Men." Its precepts struck a responsive chord, so he took his goose quill pen and wrote in his copy-book 110 "don'ts" which he named, "Rules of Civility and Decent Behaviour in Company and Conversation." By following them, the earnest youth became one of the

most courtly men of his time.

Written in shaky grammar and spelling, some of the rules were copied from the English etiquette book and some he made up himself. Some are quaint and old-fashioned; others will always remain cornerstones in society.

Here are a few of George Washington's tips to himself:

"Every action done in company ought to be with some sign of respect to those that are present.

"In the presence of others sing not to yourself with a humming noise nor drum with your fingers or feet.

"Put not off your clothes in the presence of others, nor go out your chamber half dressed.

"When you sit down keep your feet firm and even, without putting one on the other or crossing them.

"Keep your nails clean and short, also your hands and teeth clean.

"Superfluous compliments and all affections of ceremony are to be avoided, yet when due they are not to be neglected.

"If any one come to speak to you while you are sitting, stand up though he be your inferior.

"Be not hasty to believe flying reports to the disparagement of any.

"Undertake not what you cannot perform but be careful to keep your promise.

"Lay not your arm but only your hand upon the table.

"Let your recreations be manful not sinful.

"Lamour to keep alive in your breast that little spark of celestial fire called conscience."

Shrimpers Warned Again Over Misuse Of Boat Radios

Alfred A. Ritter, Marine Supervisor for the Federal Communications Commission in the Gulf area, has warned shrimp boat captains and owners once more that unless they control the use of unbridled language and yak-yak over their radios, they are liable to stiff fines and imprisonment.

Recently he told officials of the Texas Shrimp Association and the Shrimp Association of the Americas that five trawler captains from Tampa, Florida, had been fined \$500 each, and given suspended sentences of 18 months each on charges of uttering profane and indecent language over the air, and that two Brownsville captains had pled guilty to the same charges.

Ritter, who had visited Brownsville to make a talk to trawler captains attending classes at the high school, told Secretary Jim Barr, of SAOTA that there were very few that attended, even though many trawlers were in port.

In view of the penalties suffered by these men, Ritter said, in a letter to Barr, "it appears to be a good time for trawler owners to start regaining control of radio operation on board their vessels."

Failure to do so, he said, could lead to penalties as high as a \$10,000 fine and one year's imprisonment, and he went on to point out that the owner of the vessel, or licensee in whose name the radio has been approved by the FCC violates the terms of the station license and becomes liable for these penalties when he or she fails to maintain control of the station, no matter whether he or she is aboard or not when the violation occurs.

"The owners are directly responsible," he said, "for conditions as they exist on the air today . . . I hope there is a valid excuse for the lack of interest shown by owners by not having their captains attend the classes given . . . I know that some of the owners are trying, therefore I hope you will be able to help by directing the attention of others to some of these points . . . Captains should be instructed to remove the microphone during periods when they are not aboard or are not in vicinity of the transmitter."

This problem, of profane, indecent, and idle yapping over shrimp boat radios has become a serious one, and the FCC has given every sign that it intends to stop a lot of it, by persuasion if possible, but with a club, if necessary.
